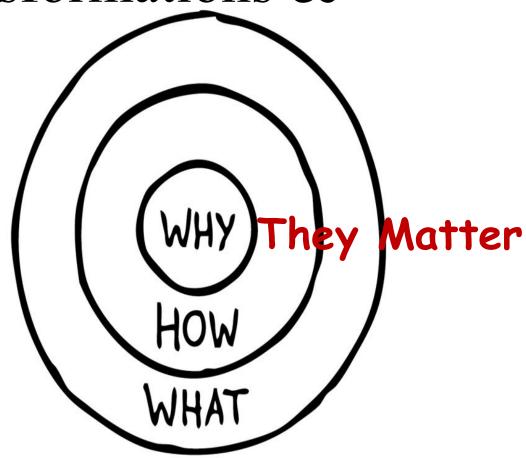

#### WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

The Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) and her team believe that their purpose is to interpret and enforce the State's procurement laws, while advancing the efficacy of the procurement function. In Fiscal Year 2018, four activities that transformed State procurement in significant and lasting ways were rooted in this belief.

#### Actions We Live By

Do the right things in the right way.

Show people what you're doing.

Stand up and take responsibility for your actions.

Answer when asked.

Listen to and value other's opinions.

Whether you're a Cubs or Cards fan, enjoy the game and don't boo (too loudly).

When Ellen Daley began as the CPO in June 2015, she shared with her staff the following words printed on a 2" x 3" notecard:

"Cooperation, consistency & compliance combined with customer service to provide the best goods and services in the marketplace at the best price to the State in a timely, efficient & legal manner."

This was more than a slogan and more than a mission statement. This was a declaration that the purpose of the Chief Procurement Office for General Services (CPO-GS) is multi-dimensional and encompasses many roles and many customers. These words are rooted in the CPO's beliefs and values that Illinois' procurement system can be better and



that each person with procurement responsibilities is a linchpin to procurement's daily success and long-term transformation.

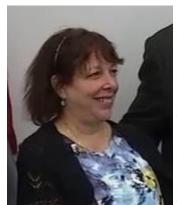
Why should taxpayers, legislators, vendors, interest groups and State agencies care about this chief procurement officer's beliefs? Because without the belief that improvement only comes through a deep understanding of each stakeholder's unique needs and a balanced approach to solve them, the CPO-GS' efforts might unfairly focus on one group's issues at the expense of others. In other words, improving the State's procurement function and systems doesn't require winners and losers. But, it does require trust, collaboration, and perseverance.

This report reflects the Fiscal Year 2018 results and achievements in transforming State procurement.

#### WHO WE ARE

Any transformation requires a strong organizational culture; one where members' behaviors align with the organization's values. The Chief Procurement Office for General Services (CPO-GS) is a team of 29 employees who regulate approximately \$8 billion in annual procurements for 62 State agencies, boards, and commissions. The **team is diverse in background and experience** and is led by the Chief Procurement Officer (CPO), Ellen Daley.

The CPO is the ultimate procurement authority under the Illinois Pro-



curement Code (30 ILCS 500/). She has a fiduciary duty to the taxpayers and is statutorily mandated to ensure the lawfulness and integrity of each agency's procurements. This charge alone would be enough for any government official. But to improve the way that all stakeholders perceive and engage in the procurement process, and to advance the State's desire for a more responsive and effective procurement system, this CPO acts with clear strategic purpose.

In Fiscal Year 2018, Public Act 100-43 (<a href="http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/fulltext.asp?Name=100-0043&GA=100">http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/fulltext.asp?Name=100-0043&GA=100</a>) went into effect. This important legislation provided reforms in the Procurement Code and Governmental Joint Purchasing Act (30 ILCS 525/) permitting many of the activities described in this report. The CPO provided expert testimony and feedback to the General Assembly to assist in crafting this meaningful legislation.

20 State Purchasing Officers (SPO) and Procurement Specialists work with State agencies to make sure that they get the supplies and services they need. With tens of thousands of transactions conducted each year, SPOs must be expert facilitators and have a deep understanding of procurement laws and best practices. While only State agencies decide what they need, the SPO and agency work together to ensure that the procurement process results in satisfying the need while maintaining the interests of fair competition, value, and lawfulness.

In Fiscal Year 2018, CPO-GS staff provided thousands of hours of formalized training to State agencies and vendors. This was a significant increase over previous years, but represents the underlying value of all four transformations: transformation only occurs when stakeholders understand and are committed to why we do what we do, and possess the skills to fully participate in State procurement.

The CPO-GS delivers a procurement system enabling 62 State agencies, boards, and commissions to procure \$8 billion of the supplies and services they need to deliver on their missions.

#### WHO WE ARE



One measure of how well an SPO assists a State agency procure what it needs is the number of times a protest is upheld. A bidder may protest a solicitation or award when they feel that either was unfair or involved an error. In Fiscal Year 2018, SPOs authorized the publication of 1,220 Invitations for Bid and Requests for Proposal which is the population of procurements that may have been protested. Only one of the procurements protested was upheld. Another way of looking at this is that 1,219 of these procurements, or 99.9%, were conducted without a protest being upheld.

5 CPO-GS team members comprise the CPO-GS' Procurement Systems Group. They service and support two electronic systems, the Illinois Procurement Gateway (IPG) and BidBuy, that State agencies and vendors use throughout procurement process.

The four chief procurement officers launched the IPG in 2014 as an online portal where vendors submit financial disclosures and certifications in advance of submitting a bid. The IPG has saved the State, vendors, and taxpayers millions of dollars. More than 8,000 applications have been submitted. One CPO-GS employee assists an average of 20 vendors per day with their applications either inperson, on the phone, or via email, . The IPG also

serves as the application and registry for 1,600 small business owners in the CPO-GS' Small Business Set-Aside Program. Because of the IPG, State contractors may easily update disclosures within minutes.

Most of the Procurement Systems Group support the second electronic procurement system, BidBuy. BidBuy is a single enterprise solution that consolidates the State's functional and technical procurement silos into a seamless procurement solution. Every profession is a combination of art and science. The science is represented by facts and rules, things that are known and predictable. The art is the use of creativity, adaptability, and judgment to develop options and solutions. In public procurement, there is a natural overabundance of science. CPO-GS team members follow a code of ethics, enforce State laws, and employ procurement best practices. But, what gives the team added value to the people they serve - State agencies, vendors, the public - is their ability to adapt and thrive to ever-changing demands. With the implementation of the BidBuy e-procurement system, UPP joint and cooperative purchasing program, and amendments in Public Act 100 -43, Fiscal Year 2018 demanded an artful approach to implement creative solutions for unique problems. The result is that the CPO and her team had their most successful year to date.

#### **Transformation #1 - Increasing Transparency into State Contracts**

Taxpavers and vendors develop greater trust in the procurement process when they have easier access and more visibility into it. In Fiscal Year 2018, State agencies began publishing on the Chief Procurement Office for General Services' (CPO-GS) Procurement Bulletin two categories of purchases that have never before been regularly published to a website.

First, Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) required State agencies to publish small purchase procurements valued at \$10,000 and greater. The Procurement Code has a number of requirements to publish procurement information related to various procurement methods, like invitations for bid, requests for proposal, emergencies and sole source procurements. But the vast majority of purchases the State makes occurs through small purchases which have never been published.

In January 2018, the first State agencies began using BidBuy, the eprocurement system co-owned by the CPO-GS and the Department of Central Management Services (CMS), to procure new contracts for supplies and services. After discussions with the Director of CMS, the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) told State agencies that they must use BidBuy to publish small purchases. This creates • Collective bargaining unprecedented visibility into the supplies and services that State agencies purchase since the Procurement Code does not require the publication of procurements valued under \$100,000.

Second, Public Act 100-43 amended Section 1-10(b) of the Procurement Code requiring State agencies to publish information to the Procurement Bulletin about certain types of contracts exempt from the **Procurement Code.** 

The CPO supported this amendment and provided reporting instructions to the State agencies. 17 agencies published exempt contracts with an estimated value of \$7.96 billion.

In December 2017, the CPO voided a contract entered into by the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) with McKinsey & Company. HFS incorrectly exempted the contract from the Procurement Code believing it met the exemption requirements as a contract necessary to prepare for anticipated litigation, an enforcement action, or investigation. The CPO determined the services to be provided under the contract were for the avoidance of litigation, and not anticipated litigation.

#### **Exempt Contracts**

The Procurement Code does not apply to a number of contract types including:

- Intergovernmental Agreements
- Grants
- Purchase of care
- Purchase of real estate
- Contracts to prepare for anticipated litigation, enforcement actions, or investigations
- Participation expenditures required by trade shows

#### **Report of Sole Source Procurements**

#### Introduction

To the general public, the use of the sole source procurement method is a sensitive and often misunderstood means of awarding a State contract. After all, sole source procurements are non-competitive and sometimes characterized derogatorily as "no-bid" contracts. This may lead to the suspicion that the State improperly selected the awarded vendor by excluding competition. This begs the questions: When can sole source procurements be conducted? How does the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) ensure that this procurement method is used appropriately?

Section 20-25 of the Illinois Procurement Code (30 ILCS 500/20-25) allows contracts to be awarded

without using a competitive method of source selection when there is only one economically feasible source for an item. While the Procurement Code makes procurements with competition the preferred method of awarding contracts, it recognizes that sole source procurements are appropriate when there is only one known source or only one single supplier that can fulfill the State's requirements. For example, a sole source is appropriate when procuring public utilities or where the item is proprietary and available only from the manufacturer.

However, because sole source is an exception to the preferred practice of competitive solicitation using Invitation for Bids or Requests for Proposals, the CPO requires State agencies to follow strict procedures to ensure the appropriateness and necessity of the sole source procurement method. These procedures are designed to thoroughly vet the State agency's request that the sole source method is appropriate under the circumstances.

#### What the Numbers Mean

When evaluating the numbers associated with sole source procurements, caution should be used before drawing conclusions that some numbers are good while others are bad. In other words, if a State agency has a need to which there is only one legitimate supplier, then that sole source contract is appropriate whether the value of it is \$200 thousand or \$2 million.

State agencies under the jurisdiction of the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) conduct thousands of procurements each year valued at approximately \$7 billion. In Fiscal Year 2018, the CPO authorized State agencies to award 103 contracts by the sole source procurement method. This is a 37.2% decrease from Fiscal Year 2017 and a 57.4% decrease from Fiscal Year 2016. It's worth noting that the number of sole source awards from Fiscal Years 2013 through 2015 was 277, 210, and 235 respectively.

However, while the number of sole source awards decreased, the value of the 103 contracts is 27.8% greater than the previous fiscal year.

The largest award of \$67.5 million (26.9% of the total award value) was made by the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) to Deloitte Consulting to continue implementation of the State's Integrated Eligibility System (IES). IES is an integrated system that replaces old computer systems and enables Illinois residents to apply for and manage their Medicaid benefits, Supplemental Food and Nutrition Program benefits, and cash assistance.

At the request of the Office of the Illinois Comptroller, the CPO held a public hearing to evaluate HFS' justification for awarding the sole source. Comments were received by HFS, the Comptroller's Office, and the Procurement Policy Board.

#### Report of Sole Source Procurements cont.

After receiving testimony and conducting thorough analysis, the hearing officer determined the justification to be sufficient and recommended that the CPO-GS approve the award.

The five largest of the 103 sole source awards total \$158.1 million and constitute 63.1% of the \$250.6 million total award value. It's no coincidence that four of the five awards were for services related to Information Technology, an industry that's built on innovation, proprietary information, and customization.

- 1) Healthcare and Family Services award of \$67,531,687 to Deloitte Consulting
- 2) Toll Highway Authority award of \$32,000,000 to Vantiv LLC
- 3) Toll Highway Authority award of \$24,500,000 to Electronic Transaction Consultants Corporation
- 4) State Board of Education award of \$19,618,500 to New Meridian Corp.
- 5) Revenue award of \$14,500,00 to Fast Enterprises LLC

Ellen Daley is the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services. CPO Daley is also the State of Illinois' representative to the National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO). NASPO facilitates active participation, access, and benchmarking with all 50 states' procurement officials and their policies. In 2014, NASPO studied (<a href="http://www.naspo.org/solesourceprocurement/index.html">http://www.naspo.org/solesourceprocurement/index.html</a>) 41 states' practices regarding sole source procurements. Survey highlights and Illinois' comparative practice follows.

- Sole source procurements are not permitted without justifications in most states. The CPO-GS requires extensive justification and pubic hearing.
- Criteria to allow sole sources procurement are established in statute for most states. The Illinois Procurement Code and CPO-GS' rules and policies establish criteria.
- When processing a sole source procurement, 50 percent of respondents require that some form of public notification (i.e. "intent to sole source") be published.
   The CPO-GS requires publication of an intent to sole source, and an award notice.
- Only 15 responding jurisdictions limit the length of a sole source procurement contract.
  - CPO-GS limits sole source contract terms to one year without further justification.
- Twenty-six responding state central procurement offices maintain a record listing all
  sole source contracts. Only five of those who maintain records of sole source contracts submit a copy of this record to their legislature.
  - The CPO-GS tracks all sole source procurements and produce and distribute an annual report of sole sources.
- Final approval for sole source procurement requests in most states resides with the Chief Procurement Official.
  - The CPO-GS provides final approval in Illinois.

When only one responsible and economically feasible source for a supply or service exists, and no other supply or service will satisfy the State's requirements, a sole source procurement is

used.

# Regulating the Process - How We Do It

Prior to award of the 103 sole source contracts, the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) ensured that each received the highest level of scrutiny and was justified as either being available only from a single supplier, or only one supplier is deemed economically feasible. All requests to use the sole source procurement method must follow procedures prescribed in law and by the CPO. These procedures not only ensure the openness and legitimacy of sole source awards, but frequently lead to a competitive procurement instead or a reduction of the request to only the pieces that justify being sole sourced.

- 1. The State agency identifies a need and researches options to fulfill the need.
- 2. The State agency believes the need qualifies as a sole source and submits a Sole Source Justification Form to their State Purchasing Officer (SPO).
- 3. The SPO discusses the request and agrees or disagrees with the State agency's request. If the SPO disagrees with justification, then they work with the State agency on procurement alternatives.
  - The CPO discourages sole source contracts lasting longer than one year. This policy forces State agencies to review their own needs and the marketplace frequently. The premise is that the marketplace is dynamic, and ever-changing technologies and vendors present an opportunity for the State to conduct a competitive procurement.
- 4. If the SPO agrees with the justification, then the SPO publishes for at least 14 days to the Procurement Bulletin in BidBuy that the State agency intends to make a sole source award.
- 5. The publication of the intent to award the sole source includes the date and time for a public hearing for anyone to listen to, question, and challenge the reasons justifying the sole source. The Procurement Policy Board also receives this notice.
- 6. If no one requests that the public hearing be held, then the CPO cancels the hearing date and permits the State agency to make the award.
- 7. If a public hearing is held, the hearing officer provides minutes of the hearing and a written recommendation to the CPO to proceed or not proceed to award. The CPO then decides to allow the sole source to proceed or not proceed.
- 8. The SPO publishes the CPO's decision to award or not award the sole source to the Procurement Bulletin in BidBuy.

#### **Report of Sole Source Procurements cont.**

#### Public Hearings

In Fiscal Year 2018, SPOs published 124 intents to award sole sources (Step 5 above). Of the 124 opportunities to request a public hearing, only two hearings were requested. After both hearings, the hearing officer recommended to the CPO-GS that both procurements proceed to award. Several of the 124 published sole sources had issues and had to be re-posted or were cancelled.

# Regulating the Process - Making An Impact

The Chief Procurement Office for General Services and the State agencies it regulates operate ethically, transparently, and fairly. By working collaboratively and following procurement procedures, this report presents the 103 sole source awards in Fiscal Year 2018. This number would have been greater without the collaboration and regulation in place. Here are a few examples where a procurement did not proceed as a sole source.

- The Department of Corrections presented justification to sole source electronic medical records from Cerner Health Systems. The value of the sole source was \$22.8 million. The State Purchasing Officer (SPO) agreed with the reasons for the sole source. But, by the time the proposed IT system received approval from the Department of Innovation and Technology per protocol, the facts supporting the sole source had changed. The SPO now requires a competitive solicitation.
- The Department of Human Services requested a \$250,000 sole source to obtain software licenses. The State Purchasing Officer denied the request because other vendors in the marketplace are able to sell the software.
- The Toll Highway Authority (THA) sought a \$247,130 sole economically feasible source
  procurement with Kronos to replace their employee timekeeping system. The State Purchasing Officer denied the sole source request as she had instructed THA the previous year
  to conduct a competitive solicitation since the marketplace contains many vendors offering
  solutions.
- The Department of Public Health (DPH) requested a \$243,750 sole source for IT consulting on an as need basis for DPH's HIV/AIDS Enterprise Development. The vendor is expected to address system issues due to changes in federal or State program requirements. However, DPH could not identify any specific consulting need at the time of the request. Because DPH is close to publishing a competitive RFP for the same consulting services, the SPO denied the sole source for blanket approval for unspecified changes to the current system.

It is a long-standing practice for state governments to use public procurement to promote social and economic policies. In fact, Article 45 of the Illinois Procurement Code is titled "Preferences." Committed to driving up participation from small businesses in State procurement, the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) has taken important steps to increase the number of contracts available to small businesses and make procurement processes more understandable.

The question most asked by vendors, large and small, is "why do I have to go to so many places in search of procurement personnel and answers?"

On May 17, 2018, the

Chief Procurement Office for General Services partnered with the Department of Central Management Services (CMS) and Business Enterprise Program to hold the Procurement Fair and Vendor Learning Event. The conference connected 300 vendors with personnel from more than 30 State agencies in one location. Vendors attended eight workshops covering a variety of subjects, learned about State procurement programs, interacted with the chief procurement officers, and networked with prime contractors and subcontractors.

#### **GOING BEYOND REGULATION**

In Fiscal Year 2018, all State agencies, boards and commissions began using BidBuy. Throughout Fiscal Year 2018, staff from the CPO-GS provided extensive training to agency personnel and vendors on the use of BidBuy. BidBuy is e-procurement software used by State agencies to process all major steps of every procurement, including publication of the solicitations and award. Vendors use BidBuy to access the State's information about procurement opportunities and in some cases to submit their bids completely online. While BidBuy is co-owned by the CPO-GS and CMS, the CPO-GS' Procurement Systems Group configured the processes to comply with statute, trained State personnel in all agencies, and provided Help Desk support for end users.

BidBuy consolidates the information for more than 20,000 annual procurement actions.

Successful implementation of this enterprise-wide software system has required tremendous effort, long hours, and an unwavering perseverance. The benefits of consolidating into BidBuy the functions of three aging procurement systems reflects the belief and values that the CPO-GS's role is to not only serve as a procurement regulator and overseer, but as a catalyst of positive and systemic change.

Only small businesses based in Illinois may participate in the Small Business Set-Aside Program (SBSP) Once the small business owner knows how to participate in State procurement, they want the opportunity to win a contract. To increase those opportunities, the CPO supported the legislation raising the small purchase maximum to \$100,000. The CPO has set-aside contracts below the small purchase maximum for only small businesses. Public Act 100-43, which raised the maximum, went into effect on 8/9/2017 and had a significant affect on small business contracting.

A set-aside simply limits the pool of vendors eligible to compete for contracts, but still promotes competition Section 45-90 of the Procurement Code establishes a goal that not less than 10% of the total dollar amount of State contracts be awarded as a contract or subcontract to small businesses. Additionally, Section 45-45 permits each chief procurement officer to designate contracts as set-aside for award to small businesses in Illinois. The CPO uses small business set-asides as one tool to further State progress towards the 10% goal.

1,600 Illinois businesses are registered in the SBSP. 1 in 2 receive a state contract.

There is a distinction between a contract with a small business that was or was not purposely set-aside at the start of the procurement. A contract that was intentionally set-aside limits competition from the outset to only small businesses. A contract with a small business that was not set-aside means the small business won the contract in open competition against potentially large businesses and non-Illinois companies.

The importance of using set-asides shows up in this statistic:

**84.1%** of payments by State agencies to small businesses resulted from set-aside contracts.

#### **GOING BEYOND REGULATION**

Participation in State procurement doesn't only occur for businesses that bid and receive contracts. While the CPO-GS has historically only reported on the impact of prime contracts, many small business owners told the CPO that they do not want to be, or cannot be, the holder of the State contract. Many State contracts are simply too large and too complicated for some small businesses to pursue as prime contractors... but involve services ideal for subcontracting to small businesses.

Many Illinois small businesses currently serve as **subcontractors** on State contracts. Just like the prime contractor, these subcontractors are invested in revenue from the State contract to hire employees, cover operating expenses, and make a profit. For these reasons, and because it presents a more accurate picture of the impact State contracts have on Illinois small businesses, the CPO proposed and supported the counting of small business subcontracts towards the 10% small business goal in Section 45-90 of the Procurement Code. In Fiscal Year 2019, the CPO will implement an online self-reporting tool to count subcontracts.

In November 2017, the CPO-GS began working with the Illinois Stewardship Alliance (ISA) and the Illinois Environmental Council (IEC) to **explore strategies** that make State agencies purchase more food and food products from local farms. The Local Food, Farms, and Jobs Act (30 ILCS 595/1) establishes the goal that 20% of all food and food products purchased by State agencies and State-owned facilities purchase are from local farms or are local food products. The Act is intended to facilitate the growth of an Illinois-based local farm and food product economy, promote access to fresh foods, and ensure a readily available supply of safe food in an emergency event. The Act went into effect in 2009, but there has been little progress.

The group is considering amendments to the Act that add definitions and clarifications making the Act easier to implement. Additionally, the CPO-GS is evaluating options to create small business set-asides for fresh fruits and vegetables, and Illinois food products.

This collaboration between the CPO-GS, ISA, and IEC is a good example of how the CPO is using procurement as a tool for economic development and local job creation.

# Transformation #3 - Creating Contract Opportunities for State and Local Government

With the issuance of CPO Notice 2018.04 on December 15, 2017, the Chief Procurement Officer for General Services (CPO) introduced her new joint and cooperative purchasing program branded as the Unified Procurement Program (UPP).

With fewer personnel and smaller budgets, State agencies seek more efficient use of staff time and greater value from each dollar spent. UPP is a comprehensive joint and cooperative purchasing program that was

created to deliver lower cost and higher value contracts.

With joint and cooperative purchasing, Illinois collaborates with other states and government entities to combine their purchasing needs and use procurement and subject matter experts to procure best-in-class contracts. Fewer state resources are used to procure joint and cooperative contracts and they usually result in better pricing and terms due to leveraged buying power.

Through UPP, the CPO will make more cooperative and consortium contracts available than are currently available to State agencies, local units of government, and qualified not-for-profit agencies advancing her goal "to achieve the best goods and services in the marketplace at the best price in a timely, efficient and legal manner."

In Fiscal Year 2018, the CPO authorized the following three joint purchase contracts procured via the sole economically feasible source procurement method:

There were no joint purchase contracts procured via emergency or piggyback methods.

The CPO participated in a procurement led by the State of Arizona, in cooperation with the NASPO ValuePoint cooperative purchasing organization and other states, for mailroom equipment, supplies, and maintenance with Bell & Howell, Neopost and Pitney Bowes. The CPO authorizes State agencies and Illinois' local governmental units to use the resulting contracts on a non-mandatory basis.

The CPO also participated in a solicitation led by the State of Utah, in cooperation with NASPO ValuePoint and other states, for cloud solutions. Contracts were executed with Carahsoft Technology Corporation, Cherry Road Technologies, Collab9, Quest Media & Supplies, Strategic Communications, and SaaS TCC Software Solutions. The CPO also makes these contracts available to State agencies and local governmental units on a non-mandatory basis.



#### STANDARDIZING PRACTICES

#### **Transformation #4** - Implementing E-Procurement

When Fiscal Year 2018 began in July 2017, none of the 62 State agencies, boards, and commissions in the Chief Procurement Office for General Services' (CPO-GS) jurisdiction used BidBuy to conduct procurements. By June 2018, all of them used BidBuy.

BidBuy is a single enterprise solution that consolidates the State's functional and technical procurement silos into a **seamless procurement solution**. The CPO-GS relies on BidBuy to carry out many of its statutory mandates. Vendors see solicitation opportunities and award notices on BidBuy. State agencies and the CPO-GS use BidBuy to share information, document various approvals, and create the procurement file. In Fiscal Year 2019, Illinois' local governments and several constitutional officers will begin to use BidBuy. Tens of thousands of procurement actions will occur in BidBuy each year, and will result in more accessible and useable data for vendors, procurement staff, lawmakers, and tax payers.

In November 2014, the CPO-GS awarded Texas-based Periscope Holdings for the cloud-based software that is BidBuy. The CPO-GS and Department of Central Management Services (CMS) co-own and manage the BidBuy system. BidBuy is **integrated** with the State's enterprise accounting software, SAP, and the Illinois Procurement Gateway. It replaces the Illinois Procurement Bulletin which has been used since 1998. The CPO-GS' Procurement Systems Group provides all BidBuy support to State employees and offers training to vendors. CMS provides help desk support to vendors.

The practical reasons for implementing BidBuy include modernizing and consolidating three of the State's aging electronic procurement systems, collecting and analyzing State spend to enable better sourcing, standardizing procurement practices across all agencies, providing more accountability when

internally routing procurements, and making small purchases publicly visible for the first time.

In July 2015, the CPO knew that only through an e-procurement system would gains be yielded exponentially versus incrementally. She also knew that implementation needed to be done systematically and with determination. With such an important initiative, the CPO re-allocated staff resources to drive the project to conclusion. At the same time, she created a specialized team, called the Procurement Systems Group, to manage the daily demands of thousands of users once the system went live in Fiscal Year 2018.

The benefits of standardizing and

streamlining the way that 62 agencies conduct thousands of annual procurements worth more than \$7 billion will be realized for decades. The successful implementation of BidBuy is the CPO's greatest achievement of Fiscal Year 2018.
