Speaker Evans: "The House shall be in order. Members in their chairs. Members in their chairs. We shall be led in prayer today by Lee Crawford, the Pastor of Cathedral of Praise Christian Center in Springfield. Members and guests are asked to refrain from starting their laptops, turn off all cell phones, and rise for the invocation of the Pledge of Allegiance."

Pastor Crawford: "Let us pray. Most gracious and sovereign God, who art the God of all wisdom, God of all power, the God of all presence, the God of all creation, invert your blessings upon this august Assembly, upon the Speaker of this great House, upon its Leaders, upon its Members, upon their families, upon all of the staff. May they, today, be empowered with your wisdom, that they not lack understanding and knowledge in their decisions. May they be led by your spirit, that they not be confused and misguided in their direction. May they find strength in you, oh God, that they not feel weakened and exhausted in the challenges of their duties. May your grace, may your mercy, may your strength, may your peace be upon them this day. This we ask in your son's name, Amen."

Speaker Evans: "We will be led in the Pledge of Allegiance today by Representative Deluca."

Deluca - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Evans: "Roll Call for Attendance. Leader Harris is recognized to report any excused absences on the Democratic side of the aisle."

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Harris: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Let the record reflect that Representatives Gordon-Booth and Guzzardi are absent today and excused... excused today."

Speaker Evans: "Representative Keicher is recognized to report any excused absences on the Republican side of the aisle."

Keicher: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please let the record reflect that Representatives Batinick, Bos, Ozinga, Sosnowski, and Miller are all excused for today."

Speaker Evans: "Have all recorded themselves who wish? Have all recorded themselves who wish? Have all recorded themselves who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. There being 110 present... Members answering the roll, a quorum is present. Representative Mah, for what reason do you rise?"

Mah: "Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point."

Mah: "I'd like to take a moment to honor and celebrate the life of one of my constituents, community leader Bernarda 'Bernie' Wong, who passed away in her sleep early this morning after a long bout with cancer. She was an amazing leader, trailblazer, and visionary. Co-founder and president of the Chinese American Service League for three decades, she helped many. She helped make Chicago's Chinatown community what it is today, helping so many people over the years and building up the community's infrastructure to welcome new immigrants and serve its people. I am forever grateful to her for her steadfast support and her belief in me as I ran for office and aimed to follow in her footsteps in serving the community. She has been a dear friend and a mentor to me and many others in the community. She was a spiritual mother in many ways. I

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admire her so much, especially for her strength and courage as an immigrant to this country and as someone who never hesitated to speak up as an advocate and champion for our community. She leaves an incomparable legacy. She will be so sorely missed, but never forgotten. Rest in peace, Bernie. I hope the Body can join me in sending love and deepest condolences to her daughter, Jacinta, and her family. Thank you."

Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Representative Mah. The Body will stand for a moment of silence. Thank you. Representative Stuart, for what reason do you rise?"

Stuart: "A point of personal privilege."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point."

Stuart: "Thank you. Last week, on Thursday night, around 11:00 p.m., I was standing here presenting to the Body House Bill 3195, which was a measure that would simply put in place the framework for the construction of multi-stall gender-neutral bathrooms. In other words, just to simply allow, for anyone who wishes, the ability to create restrooms that can be accessed by anyone. A colleague on the other side of the aisle took this as an opportunity to spew dangerous, hateful, and transphobic rhetoric. It was very late. We'd been hearing Bills here on the floor and in committees for about 12 hours, at least. We were also scheduled to come back very early the next morning. Out of respect for everyone involved in the work that we do here, my colleagues, our staffers, clerks, doorman, security, everyone who makes this chamber operate for us, I chose not to respond in that moment. I simply requested passage of the Bill 'cause I wanted to allow us to

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continue on with the work at hand and let my colleagues have time to pass their legislation that's important to them. But I did not ignore the comments. I heard them loud and clear. You see, this colleague chose to dehumanize, devalue, and debase members of the transgender and nonbinary community. The community, like some individuals who actually work here in this Capitol Complex alongside of us every day that we're here, like children of some of our colleagues in this chamber and the chamber across the rotunda, like loved ones and family members of the people across Illinois... and that's all of Illinois... who expect us to stand up for them when we're here. This colleague chose to equate them with pedophiles, predators, and criminals. He chose to dehumanize, devalue, and debase all of these people who are no less human and deserving of respect than he himself. It's bad enough to have disrespected an entire community of people, but the context of his comments is also very important to understand. The claim that accusing transgendered individuals of being dangerous predators, under the guise of protecting women, is laughable. And to trot out stories of events that didn't happen in gender-neutral bathrooms, and weren't committed by members of the transgender community, served him no purpose. And this does not protect women. If you want to protect women, start by asking yourself the following. Have you supported the Equal Rights Amendment, without which women are still not represented in our U.S. Constitution? Have you supported policies that ensure women are paid equally for equal work? Do you stand up for the right to be represented by a union in our place of employment to collectively bargain for

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conditions that guarantee our safety in the workplace? Conditions that give us protection from being fired or retaliated against when we actually file the complaints of the sexual harassment and assault that does happen in the workplace. Do you stand with women by ensuring that they have seats on corporate boards, that they're at the tables where decisions are being made? This is the protection that we, as women, want. The protection that becomes from being equal under the law. The protection of being able to report those who actually commit gender-based assault and harassment. The protection of being valued for the contributions we make to our communities and workplaces. Those are your opportunities to support and protect women. I want to thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to say these few words. This isn't something I do very often. I'll close very simply. If you want to know how to protect women, it's pretty simple. Don't spread lies. Don't demonize a group of people. Instead, listen to us, respect us. Make sure that we have dominion and control over our lives and our bodies at all times. Thank you."

Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Representative Stuart. Representative Ford, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Ford: "Mr. Speaker, point of personal privilege."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point."

Ford: "For those that are not watching and those that are listening, please join me in congratulating Leader Evans in the Chair today for the first time. I think everyone is proud in his family. So, thank you so very much. And thank you for all you do, Leader Evans."

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Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Representative Ford. Representative Butler, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Butler: "A point of personal privilege, Speaker Evans."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point, Representative."

Butler: "You look good up there, by the way. I just want to add on to something I said at the end of last week's Session about redistricting. I've asked multiple times in hearings about data being used, and what the process is, and so on. We've had 27 hearings. I've been at almost every one of them. And I see today that the Governor... that Governor Pritzker is once again going back on his word to veto a partisanly drawn map. Let us remind the Governor that he said, previously, short of a Constitutional Amendment, he would urge Democrats and Republicans to agree to an independent commission that would handle the maps. Today... today he said that, in order for us to have an independent commission, we need to have a Constitutional Amendment. That is directly in conflict with what he has previously said. But beyond that, the Governor said, 'I hope that Republicans will choose to work with Democrats on the map. Right now, it looks like they're just saying 'no'. They're not really engaging.' Well, let me tell you Governor, I'm engaged. I've attended almost all these hearings. I've asked questions at practically every hearing. And we get no answers from our side... from the other side. And we actually have the legislation to create an independent commission statutorily. I have introduced that legislation. Representative Spain has introduced that legislation. Senator Barickman has introduced that in the Senate. Language that was written by the Democrat Majority in the Senate, we've

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used in legislation to create a commission. So, Governor, I would say it's not the Republicans who are not engaging. I would say it's your friends in the Democratic Party that aren't engaging. And we need to have you hold to your word, Governor, that you will veto, veto a partisan map like your office has said. Thank you, Speaker Evans."

Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Representative Butler. Leader Ammons, what reason do you seek recognition?"

Ammons: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege, please."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point."

Ammons: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ask the colleagues to rise at this time in recognition of the loss of our Majority Leader and Speaker Pro Temp Jehan Gordon-Booth's father, as well as our House Democratic Chairman of the Black Caucus Kambium Buckner's father, who also passed in the last few days. I believe Mika has sent out where you can send your condolences to and your e-mails. So, if you've not seen that, please check that. And we ask for a moment of silence for both of these great men."

Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Leader Ammons. And again, our thoughts and prayers are with the families of our great coworkers and colleagues. Representative Welter, what reason do you seek recognition?"

Welter: "I know you're all sitting down, but I will ask you one more time... you know, there's been a lot of grief and a lot of loss lately. And if I could please have your attention. Another one of our colleagues also lost their father. Representative Tim Ozinga lost his father, Martin Ozinga III,

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just yesterday at the age of 71. Now, we all have different paths on how we get here. And sometimes we end up seeing those that we met along our way again. I met Tim Ozinga about 13 years ago when I was a senior in high school and I first got involved with politics. I volunteered for his father's campaign when he ran for Congress in 2008. During that time, I got to know the Ozinga family, and Marty, specifically in his generosity. Marty's wife, Ruth, was also always by his side. She has passed since. But what I experienced between them, the love that they shared, the six sons that they raised, the business that they created in Illinois, the jobs, the people in the community that they supported. They did so much for our area, for our state. They're the largest family-owned concrete business in the country. They employ thousands of Illinoisans. And Marty and Ruth were very generous with their charity, their time, their commitment to our community. And I would ask this Body to take a moment of silence as we grieve with all of our colleagues who have lost their loved ones."

Speaker Evans: "Thank you, Representative. Please rise for a moment of silence. Thank you. And again, our thoughts and prayers are with the family of the Ozingas. Representative Swanson, for what reason do you rise?"

Swanson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege, please."

Speaker Evans: "Please speak your point."

Swanson: "Thank you. It was a busy week last week, and I did not overlook this, I just did not present it because of time. I rise today to recognize the 113th anniversary of the founding

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of the United States Army Reserve. Their anniversary was April 23, 2020. What began in 1908 as a small corps of military professionals held in readiness for service, is today the Army's global operational reserve force and the best trained, best equipped, and most ready armed reserve in our nation's history.
