SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/10-17a

from Ch. 122, par. 10-17a

Amends the School Code. Provides that for a school district that has an approved waiver from the requirement that tuition be charged to non-resident pupils, the school district report card shall include the total cost of allowing non-resident pupils to attend the schools of the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, the number of non-resident pupils attending the schools of the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, and the number of such pupils who are the children of a parent or guardian who is a full-time or part-time employee or staff member of the school district. Effective immediately.

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AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
10-17a as follows:

8 Sec. 10-17a. State, school district, and school report 9 cards.

(1) By October 31, 2013 and October 31 of each subsequent 10 school year, the State Board of Education, through the State 11 Superintendent of Education, shall prepare a State report card, 12 school district report cards, and school report cards, and 13 14 shall by the most economic means provide to each school district in this State, including special charter districts and 15 16 districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, the report cards for the school district and each of its schools. 17

18 (2) In addition to any information required by federal law, 19 the State Superintendent shall determine the indicators and 20 presentation of the school report card, which must include, at 21 a minimum, the most current data collected and maintained by 22 the State Board of Education related to the following:

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(A) school characteristics and student demographics,

including average class size, average teaching experience, 1 2 student racial/ethnic breakdown, and the percentage of 3 students classified as low-income; the percentage of students classified as English learners; the percentage of 4 5 students who have individualized education plans or 504 6 plans that provide for special education services; the 7 number and percentage of all students who have been 8 assessed for placement in a gifted education or advanced 9 academic program and, of those students: (i) the racial and 10 ethnic breakdown, (ii) the percentage who are classified as 11 low-income, and (iii) the number and percentage of students 12 who received direct instruction from a teacher who holds a 13 gifted education endorsement and, of those students, the 14 percentage who are classified as low-income: the 15 percentage of students scoring at the "exceeds 16 expectations" level on the assessments required under 17 Section 2-3.64a-5 of this Code; the percentage of students who annually transferred in or out of the school district; 18 19 per-pupil operating expenditure of the school the district; and the per-pupil State average operating 20 expenditure for the district type (elementary, high 21 22 school, or unit);

23 curriculum information, (B) including, where 24 applicable, Advanced Placement, International 25 Baccalaureate or equivalent courses, dual enrollment 26 courses, foreign language classes, school personnel

resources (including Career Technical Education teachers), 1 2 before and after school programs, extracurricular 3 activities, subjects in which elective classes are offered, health and wellness initiatives (including the 4 average number of days of Physical Education per week per 5 6 student), approved programs of study, awards received, community partnerships, and special programs such as 7 8 programming for the gifted and talented, students with 9 disabilities, and work-study students;

10 (C) student outcomes, including, where applicable, the 11 percentage of students deemed proficient on assessments of 12 State standards, the percentage of students in the eighth 13 grade who pass Algebra, the percentage of students enrolled 14 post-secondary institutions (including colleges, in 15 universities, community colleges, trade/vocational 16 schools, and training programs leading to career 17 certification within 2 semesters of hiqh school graduation), the percentage of students graduating from 18 19 high school who are college and career ready, and the 20 percentage of graduates enrolled in community colleges, colleges, and universities who are in one or more courses 21 22 that the community college, college, or university 23 identifies as a developmental course;

(D) student progress, including, where applicable, the
 percentage of students in the ninth grade who have earned 5
 credits or more without failing more than one core class, a

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measure of students entering kindergarten ready to learn, a measure of growth, and the percentage of students who enter high school on track for college and career readiness;

school environment, 4 (E) the including, where 5 applicable, the percentage of students with less than 10 6 absences in a school year, the percentage of teachers with 7 less than 10 absences in a school year for reasons other 8 than professional development, leaves taken pursuant to 9 the federal Family Medical Leave Act of 1993, long-term 10 disability, or parental leaves, the 3-year average of the 11 percentage of teachers returning to the school from the 12 previous year, the number of different principals at the 13 school in the last 6 years, the number of teachers who hold 14 a gifted education endorsement, the process and criteria used by the district to determine whether a student is 15 16 eligible for participation in a gifted education program or 17 advanced academic program and the manner in which parents 18 and quardians are made aware of the process and criteria, 2 19 or more indicators from any school climate survey selected 20 or approved by the State and administered pursuant to Section 2-3.153 of this Code, with the same or similar 21 22 indicators included on school report cards for all surveys 23 selected or approved by the State pursuant to Section 24 2-3.153 of this Code, and the combined percentage of 25 teachers rated as proficient or excellent in their most 26 recent evaluation;

(F) a school district's and its individual schools'
 balanced accountability measure, in accordance with
 Section 2-3.25a of this Code;

4 (G) the total and per pupil normal cost amount the
5 State contributed to the Teachers' Retirement System of the
6 State of Illinois in the prior fiscal year for the school's
7 employees, which shall be reported to the State Board of
8 Education by the Teachers' Retirement System of the State
9 of Illinois; and

10 (H) for a school district organized under Article 34 of 11 this Code only, State contributions to the Public School 12 Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago and State 13 contributions for health care for employees of that school 14 district;-

15 <u>(I)</u> (G) a school district's Final Percent of Adequacy, 16 as defined in paragraph (4) of subsection (f) of Section 17 18-8.15 of this Code;

18 <u>(J)</u> (II) a school district's Local Capacity Target, as 19 defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section 20 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount; and

21 <u>(K)</u> (I) a school district's Real Receipts, as defined 22 in paragraph (1) of subsection (d) of Section 18-8.15 of 23 this Code, divided by a school district's Adequacy Target, 24 as defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section 25 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount. 26 The school report card shall also provide information that 1 allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and 2 environment data to the State average, to the school data from 3 the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and 4 environment of similar schools based on the type of school and 5 enrollment of low-income students, special education students, 6 and English learners.

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As used in this subsection paragraph (2):

8 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 9 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability 10 or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers 11 and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated 12 from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge 13 and pace.

14 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 15 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 16 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 17 of this Code.

(3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the 18 school district report card shall include a subset of the 19 20 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating 21 22 to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the 23 school district, and the State report card shall include a subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through 24 25 (E) of subsection (2) of this Section.

26 For a school district that has an approved waiver from

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1 Section 10-20.12a of this Code under Section 2-3.25g of this 2 Code, the school district report card shall include the total 3 cost of allowing non-resident pupils to attend the schools of the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, the 4 5 number of non-resident pupils attending the schools of the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, and the 6 number of such pupils who are the children of a parent or 7 quardian who is a full-time or part-time employee or staff 8 9 member of the school district.

10 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 11 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 12 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 13 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 14 State report card.

15 (5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt 16 of the school district and school report cards from the State Superintendent of Education, each school district, including 17 special charter districts and districts subject to the 18 19 provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice 20 requirements, post the report cards on the school district's 21 22 Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 23 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of general circulation serving the district, and, upon request, send the 24 report cards home to a parent (unless the district does not 25 maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card 26

shall be sent home to parents without request). If the district 1 2 posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 3 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address 4 5 of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone 6 7 number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the 8 report card.

6 (B) curriculum information, including, where 7 Placement, International applicable, Advanced 8 Baccalaureate or equivalent courses, dual enrollment 9 courses, foreign language classes, school personnel 10 resources (including Career Technical Education teachers), 11 before and after school programs, extracurricular 12 subjects in which elective classes are activities, offered, health and wellness initiatives (including the 13 14 average number of days of Physical Education per week per 15 student), approved programs of study, awards received, 16 community partnerships, and special programs such as 17 programming for the gifted and talented, students with disabilities, and work-study students; 18

19 (C) student outcomes, including, where applicable, the 20 percentage of students deemed proficient on assessments of 21 State standards, the percentage of students in the eighth 22 grade who pass Algebra, the percentage of students enrolled 23 post-secondary institutions (including colleges, in 24 universities, community colleges, trade/vocational 25 schools, and training programs leading to career certification within 2 semesters 26 of high school

1 graduation), the percentage of students graduating from 2 high school who are college and career ready, and the 3 percentage of graduates enrolled in community colleges, 4 colleges, and universities who are in one or more courses 5 that the community college, college, or university 6 identifies as a developmental course;

7 (D) student progress, including, where applicable, the 8 percentage of students in the ninth grade who have earned 5 9 credits or more without failing more than one core class, a 10 measure of students entering kindergarten ready to learn, a 11 measure of growth, and the percentage of students who enter 12 high school on track for college and career readiness;

(G) the total and per pupil normal cost amount the State contributed to the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois in the prior fiscal year for the school's employees, which shall be reported to the State Board of Education by the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois; and

19 (H) for a school district organized under Article 34 of 20 this Code only, State contributions to the Public School 21 Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago and State 22 contributions for health care for employees of that school 23 district<u>;-</u>

24 (I) (G) a school district's Final Percent of Adequacy,
 25 as defined in paragraph (4) of subsection (f) of Section
 26 18-8.15 of this Code;

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(J) (H) a school district's Local Capacity Target, as defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount; and <u>(K)</u> (H) a school district's Real Receipts, as defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (d) of Section 18-8.15 of this Code, divided by a school district's Adequacy Target, as defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount.

9 The school report card shall also provide information that 10 allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and 11 environment data to the State average, to the school data from 12 the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and 13 environment of similar schools based on the type of school and 14 enrollment of low-income students, special education students, 15 and English learners.

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As used in this subsection paragraph (2):

17 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 18 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability 19 or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers 20 and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated 21 from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge 22 and pace.

23 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 24 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 25 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 26 of this Code.

For the purposes of paragraph (A) of this subsection (2), waverage daily attendance" means the average of the actual number of attendance days during the previous school year for any enrolled student who is subject to compulsory attendance by Section 26-1 of this Code at each school and charter school.

6 (3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the 7 school district report card shall include a subset of the 8 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of 9 subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating 10 to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the 11 school district, and the State report card shall include a 12 subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through 13 (E) of subsection (2) of this Section.

The school district report card shall include the average daily attendance, as that term is defined in subsection (2) of this Section, of students who have individualized education programs and students who have 504 plans that provide for special education services within the school district.

19 For a school district that has an approved waiver from 20 Section 10-20.12a of this Code under Section 2-3.25g of this Code, the school district report card shall include the total 21 22 cost of allowing non-resident pupils to attend the schools of 23 the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, the 24 number of non-resident pupils attending the schools of the district free of charge or at a reduced-tuition charge, and the 25 number of such pupils who are the children of a parent or 26

1 <u>guardian who is a full-time or part-time employee or staff</u> 2 member of the school district.

3 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 4 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 5 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 6 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 7 State report card.

8 (5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt 9 of the school district and school report cards from the State 10 Superintendent of Education, each school district, including 11 special charter districts and districts subject to the 12 provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a 13 regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice requirements, post the report cards on the school district's 14 15 Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 16 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of general 17 circulation serving the district, and, upon request, send the report cards home to a parent (unless the district does not 18 19 maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card 20 shall be sent home to parents without request). If the district posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 21 22 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that 23 the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card 24 will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone 25 26 number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the

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1 report card.
