1 HOUSE RESOLUTION WHEREAS, The combination of an opioid overdose crisis and 2 COVID-19 has created a situation in Illinois where epidemic 3 meets pandemic; and 4 WHEREAS, A stay-at-home order has created a lack of 5 6 physical access to addiction support and harm reduction groups 7 during the COVID-19 epidemic; and 8 WHEREAS, Those unfortunate circumstances increase the risk 9 of overdose deaths in Illinois; and WHEREAS, Social isolation is an additional mental health 10 11 and physical burden on people with substance abuse issues; and 12 WHEREAS, During this time, there is a lack of healthcare capacity as hospitals focus their priorities and resources on 13 treating thousands of COVID-19 patients; and 14 15 WHEREAS, In addition, patients have limited availability 16 to see their doctors during COVID-19; and 17 WHEREAS, Currently, counties in Illinois are seeing a 18 significant increase in overdose deaths; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Many states are taking action to increase access
- 2 to naloxone; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Co-prescription of naloxone with high dose opioid
- 4 prescriptions has been approved in nine states, resulting in a
- 5 decrease in overdose deaths; therefore, be it
- 6 RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE
- 7 HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that
- 8 the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), the Illinois
- 9 Department of Human Services (IDHS), and all other relevant
- 10 agencies and boards are urged to examine the rise in opioid
- overdoses due to COVID-19; and be it further
- 12 RESOLVED, That the IDPH, the IDHS, and all other relevant
- 13 agencies and boards are urged to propose changes to
- 14 prescription rules to include co-prescription of opioid
- antagonists such as naloxone to high risk groups as defined by
- 16 current CDC quidelines to increase access to naloxone; and be
- 17 it further
- 18 RESOLVED, That the State of Illinois is urged to approve
- 19 rules, policies, and legislation that would increase access to
- 20 naloxone and save the lives of those most at risk to overdose
- 21 during COVID-19.
