**SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:**

5 ILCS 315/14

from Ch. 48, par. 1614

Amends the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act. In a Section concerning security employee, peace officer, and fire fighter disputes, provides that mediation requirements apply to non-sworn employees of public safety agencies.

**A BILL FOR**

1 AN ACT concerning government.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**  
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 5. The Illinois Public Labor Relations Act is  
5 amended by changing Section 14 as follows:

6 (5 ILCS 315/14) (from Ch. 48, par. 1614)

7 Sec. 14. Security employee, peace officer and fire fighter  
8 disputes.

9 (a) In the case of collective bargaining agreements  
10 involving units of security employees of a public employer,  
11 Peace Officer Units, non-sworn employees of a public safety  
12 agency, including, but not limited to, offices of county  
13 sheriffs or coroners, courts, and telecommunications agencies,  
14 or units of fire fighters or paramedics, and in the case of  
15 disputes under Section 18, unless the parties mutually agree to  
16 some other time limit, mediation shall commence 30 days prior  
17 to the expiration date of such agreement or at such later time  
18 as the mediation services chosen under subsection (b) of  
19 Section 12 can be provided to the parties. In the case of  
20 negotiations for an initial collective bargaining agreement,  
21 mediation shall commence upon 15 days notice from either party  
22 or at such later time as the mediation services chosen pursuant  
23 to subsection (b) of Section 12 can be provided to the parties.

1 In mediation under this Section, if either party requests the  
2 use of mediation services from the Federal Mediation and  
3 Conciliation Service, the other party shall either join in such  
4 request or bear the additional cost of mediation services from  
5 another source. The mediator shall have a duty to keep the  
6 Board informed on the progress of the mediation. If any dispute  
7 has not been resolved within 15 days after the first meeting of  
8 the parties and the mediator, or within such other time limit  
9 as may be mutually agreed upon by the parties, either the  
10 exclusive representative or employer may request of the other,  
11 in writing, arbitration, and shall submit a copy of the request  
12 to the Board.

13 (b) Within 10 days after such a request for arbitration has  
14 been made, the employer shall choose a delegate and the  
15 employees' exclusive representative shall choose a delegate to  
16 a panel of arbitration as provided in this Section. The  
17 employer and employees shall forthwith advise the other and the  
18 Board of their selections.

19 (c) Within 7 days after the request of either party, the  
20 parties shall request a panel of impartial arbitrators from  
21 which they shall select the neutral chairman according to the  
22 procedures provided in this Section. If the parties have agreed  
23 to a contract that contains a grievance resolution procedure as  
24 provided in Section 8, the chairman shall be selected using  
25 their agreed contract procedure unless they mutually agree to  
26 another procedure. If the parties fail to notify the Board of

1 their selection of neutral chairman within 7 days after receipt  
2 of the list of impartial arbitrators, the Board shall appoint,  
3 at random, a neutral chairman from the list. In the absence of  
4 an agreed contract procedure for selecting an impartial  
5 arbitrator, either party may request a panel from the Board.  
6 Within 7 days of the request of either party, the Board shall  
7 select from the Public Employees Labor Mediation Roster 7  
8 persons who are on the labor arbitration panels of either the  
9 American Arbitration Association or the Federal Mediation and  
10 Conciliation Service, or who are members of the National  
11 Academy of Arbitrators, as nominees for impartial arbitrator of  
12 the arbitration panel. The parties may select an individual on  
13 the list provided by the Board or any other individual mutually  
14 agreed upon by the parties. Within 7 days following the receipt  
15 of the list, the parties shall notify the Board of the person  
16 they have selected. Unless the parties agree on an alternate  
17 selection procedure, they shall alternatively strike one name  
18 from the list provided by the Board until only one name  
19 remains. A coin toss shall determine which party shall strike  
20 the first name. If the parties fail to notify the Board in a  
21 timely manner of their selection for neutral chairman, the  
22 Board shall appoint a neutral chairman from the Illinois Public  
23 Employees Mediation/Arbitration Roster.

24 (d) The chairman shall call a hearing to begin within 15  
25 days and give reasonable notice of the time and place of the  
26 hearing. The hearing shall be held at the offices of the Board

1 or at such other location as the Board deems appropriate. The  
2 chairman shall preside over the hearing and shall take  
3 testimony. Any oral or documentary evidence and other data  
4 deemed relevant by the arbitration panel may be received in  
5 evidence. The proceedings shall be informal. Technical rules of  
6 evidence shall not apply and the competency of the evidence  
7 shall not thereby be deemed impaired. A verbatim record of the  
8 proceedings shall be made and the arbitrator shall arrange for  
9 the necessary recording service. Transcripts may be ordered at  
10 the expense of the party ordering them, but the transcripts  
11 shall not be necessary for a decision by the arbitration panel.  
12 The expense of the proceedings, including a fee for the  
13 chairman, shall be borne equally by each of the parties to the  
14 dispute. The delegates, if public officers or employees, shall  
15 continue on the payroll of the public employer without loss of  
16 pay. The hearing conducted by the arbitration panel may be  
17 adjourned from time to time, but unless otherwise agreed by the  
18 parties, shall be concluded within 30 days of the time of its  
19 commencement. Majority actions and rulings shall constitute  
20 the actions and rulings of the arbitration panel. Arbitration  
21 proceedings under this Section shall not be interrupted or  
22 terminated by reason of any unfair labor practice charge filed  
23 by either party at any time.

24 (e) The arbitration panel may administer oaths, require the  
25 attendance of witnesses, and the production of such books,  
26 papers, contracts, agreements and documents as may be deemed by

1 it material to a just determination of the issues in dispute,  
2 and for such purpose may issue subpoenas. If any person refuses  
3 to obey a subpoena, or refuses to be sworn or to testify, or if  
4 any witness, party or attorney is guilty of any contempt while  
5 in attendance at any hearing, the arbitration panel may, or the  
6 attorney general if requested shall, invoke the aid of any  
7 circuit court within the jurisdiction in which the hearing is  
8 being held, which court shall issue an appropriate order. Any  
9 failure to obey the order may be punished by the court as  
10 contempt.

11 (f) At any time before the rendering of an award, the  
12 chairman of the arbitration panel, if he is of the opinion that  
13 it would be useful or beneficial to do so, may remand the  
14 dispute to the parties for further collective bargaining for a  
15 period not to exceed 2 weeks. If the dispute is remanded for  
16 further collective bargaining the time provisions of this Act  
17 shall be extended for a time period equal to that of the  
18 remand. The chairman of the panel of arbitration shall notify  
19 the Board of the remand.

20 (g) At or before the conclusion of the hearing held  
21 pursuant to subsection (d), the arbitration panel shall  
22 identify the economic issues in dispute, and direct each of the  
23 parties to submit, within such time limit as the panel shall  
24 prescribe, to the arbitration panel and to each other its last  
25 offer of settlement on each economic issue. The determination  
26 of the arbitration panel as to the issues in dispute and as to

1 which of these issues are economic shall be conclusive. The  
2 arbitration panel, within 30 days after the conclusion of the  
3 hearing, or such further additional periods to which the  
4 parties may agree, shall make written findings of fact and  
5 promulgate a written opinion and shall mail or otherwise  
6 deliver a true copy thereof to the parties and their  
7 representatives and to the Board. As to each economic issue,  
8 the arbitration panel shall adopt the last offer of settlement  
9 which, in the opinion of the arbitration panel, more nearly  
10 complies with the applicable factors prescribed in subsection  
11 (h). The findings, opinions and order as to all other issues  
12 shall be based upon the applicable factors prescribed in  
13 subsection (h).

14 (h) Where there is no agreement between the parties, or  
15 where there is an agreement but the parties have begun  
16 negotiations or discussions looking to a new agreement or  
17 amendment of the existing agreement, and wage rates or other  
18 conditions of employment under the proposed new or amended  
19 agreement are in dispute, the arbitration panel shall base its  
20 findings, opinions and order upon the following factors, as  
21 applicable:

22 (1) The lawful authority of the employer.

23 (2) Stipulations of the parties.

24 (3) The interests and welfare of the public and the  
25 financial ability of the unit of government to meet those  
26 costs.

1           (4) Comparison of the wages, hours and conditions of  
2 employment of the employees involved in the arbitration  
3 proceeding with the wages, hours and conditions of  
4 employment of other employees performing similar services  
5 and with other employees generally:

6           (A) In public employment in comparable  
7 communities.

8           (B) In private employment in comparable  
9 communities.

10          (5) The average consumer prices for goods and services,  
11 commonly known as the cost of living.

12          (6) The overall compensation presently received by the  
13 employees, including direct wage compensation, vacations,  
14 holidays and other excused time, insurance and pensions,  
15 medical and hospitalization benefits, the continuity and  
16 stability of employment and all other benefits received.

17          (7) Changes in any of the foregoing circumstances  
18 during the pendency of the arbitration proceedings.

19          (8) Such other factors, not confined to the foregoing,  
20 which are normally or traditionally taken into  
21 consideration in the determination of wages, hours and  
22 conditions of employment through voluntary collective  
23 bargaining, mediation, fact-finding, arbitration or  
24 otherwise between the parties, in the public service or in  
25 private employment.

26          (i) In the case of peace officers, the arbitration decision



1 shall be limited to wages, hours, and conditions of employment  
2 (which may include residency requirements in municipalities  
3 with a population under 1,000,000, but those residency  
4 requirements shall not allow residency outside of Illinois) and  
5 shall not include the following: i) residency requirements in  
6 municipalities with a population of at least 1,000,000; ii) the  
7 type of equipment, other than uniforms, issued or used; iii)  
8 manning; iv) the total number of employees employed by the  
9 department; v) mutual aid and assistance agreements to other  
10 units of government; and vi) the criterion pursuant to which  
11 force, including deadly force, can be used; provided, nothing  
12 herein shall preclude an arbitration decision regarding  
13 equipment or manning levels if such decision is based on a  
14 finding that the equipment or manning considerations in a  
15 specific work assignment involve a serious risk to the safety  
16 of a peace officer beyond that which is inherent in the normal  
17 performance of police duties. Limitation of the terms of the  
18 arbitration decision pursuant to this subsection shall not be  
19 construed to limit the factors upon which the decision may be  
20 based, as set forth in subsection (h).

21 In the case of fire fighter, and fire department or fire  
22 district paramedic matters, the arbitration decision shall be  
23 limited to wages, hours, and conditions of employment  
24 (including manning and also including residency requirements  
25 in municipalities with a population under 1,000,000, but those  
26 residency requirements shall not allow residency outside of

1 Illinois) and shall not include the following matters: i)  
2 residency requirements in municipalities with a population of  
3 at least 1,000,000; ii) the type of equipment (other than  
4 uniforms and fire fighter turnout gear) issued or used; iii)  
5 the total number of employees employed by the department; iv)  
6 mutual aid and assistance agreements to other units of  
7 government; and v) the criterion pursuant to which force,  
8 including deadly force, can be used; provided, however, nothing  
9 herein shall preclude an arbitration decision regarding  
10 equipment levels if such decision is based on a finding that  
11 the equipment considerations in a specific work assignment  
12 involve a serious risk to the safety of a fire fighter beyond  
13 that which is inherent in the normal performance of fire  
14 fighter duties. Limitation of the terms of the arbitration  
15 decision pursuant to this subsection shall not be construed to  
16 limit the facts upon which the decision may be based, as set  
17 forth in subsection (h).

18 The changes to this subsection (i) made by Public Act  
19 90-385 (relating to residency requirements) do not apply to  
20 persons who are employed by a combined department that performs  
21 both police and firefighting services; these persons shall be  
22 governed by the provisions of this subsection (i) relating to  
23 peace officers, as they existed before the amendment by Public  
24 Act 90-385.

25 To preserve historical bargaining rights, this subsection  
26 shall not apply to any provision of a fire fighter collective

1 bargaining agreement in effect and applicable on the effective  
2 date of this Act; provided, however, nothing herein shall  
3 preclude arbitration with respect to any such provision.

4 (j) Arbitration procedures shall be deemed to be initiated  
5 by the filing of a letter requesting mediation as required  
6 under subsection (a) of this Section. The commencement of a new  
7 municipal fiscal year after the initiation of arbitration  
8 procedures under this Act, but before the arbitration decision,  
9 or its enforcement, shall not be deemed to render a dispute  
10 moot, or to otherwise impair the jurisdiction or authority of  
11 the arbitration panel or its decision. Increases in rates of  
12 compensation awarded by the arbitration panel may be effective  
13 only at the start of the fiscal year next commencing after the  
14 date of the arbitration award. If a new fiscal year has  
15 commenced either since the initiation of arbitration  
16 procedures under this Act or since any mutually agreed  
17 extension of the statutorily required period of mediation under  
18 this Act by the parties to the labor dispute causing a delay in  
19 the initiation of arbitration, the foregoing limitations shall  
20 be inapplicable, and such awarded increases may be retroactive  
21 to the commencement of the fiscal year, any other statute or  
22 charter provisions to the contrary, notwithstanding. At any  
23 time the parties, by stipulation, may amend or modify an award  
24 of arbitration.

25 (k) Orders of the arbitration panel shall be reviewable,  
26 upon appropriate petition by either the public employer or the

1 exclusive bargaining representative, by the circuit court for  
2 the county in which the dispute arose or in which a majority of  
3 the affected employees reside, but only for reasons that the  
4 arbitration panel was without or exceeded its statutory  
5 authority; the order is arbitrary, or capricious; or the order  
6 was procured by fraud, collusion or other similar and unlawful  
7 means. Such petitions for review must be filed with the  
8 appropriate circuit court within 90 days following the issuance  
9 of the arbitration order. The pendency of such proceeding for  
10 review shall not automatically stay the order of the  
11 arbitration panel. The party against whom the final decision of  
12 any such court shall be adverse, if such court finds such  
13 appeal or petition to be frivolous, shall pay reasonable  
14 attorneys' fees and costs to the successful party as determined  
15 by said court in its discretion. If said court's decision  
16 affirms the award of money, such award, if retroactive, shall  
17 bear interest at the rate of 12 percent per annum from the  
18 effective retroactive date.

19 (1) During the pendency of proceedings before the  
20 arbitration panel, existing wages, hours, and other conditions  
21 of employment shall not be changed by action of either party  
22 without the consent of the other but a party may so consent  
23 without prejudice to his rights or position under this Act. The  
24 proceedings are deemed to be pending before the arbitration  
25 panel upon the initiation of arbitration procedures under this  
26 Act.

1           (m) Security officers of public employers, and Peace  
2 Officers, Fire Fighters and fire department and fire protection  
3 district paramedics, covered by this Section may not withhold  
4 services, nor may public employers lock out or prevent such  
5 employees from performing services at any time.

6           (n) All of the terms decided upon by the arbitration panel  
7 shall be included in an agreement to be submitted to the public  
8 employer's governing body for ratification and adoption by law,  
9 ordinance or the equivalent appropriate means.

10           The governing body shall review each term decided by the  
11 arbitration panel. If the governing body fails to reject one or  
12 more terms of the arbitration panel's decision by a 3/5 vote of  
13 those duly elected and qualified members of the governing body,  
14 within 20 days of issuance, or in the case of firefighters  
15 employed by a state university, at the next regularly scheduled  
16 meeting of the governing body after issuance, such term or  
17 terms shall become a part of the collective bargaining  
18 agreement of the parties. If the governing body affirmatively  
19 rejects one or more terms of the arbitration panel's decision,  
20 it must provide reasons for such rejection with respect to each  
21 term so rejected, within 20 days of such rejection and the  
22 parties shall return to the arbitration panel for further  
23 proceedings and issuance of a supplemental decision with  
24 respect to the rejected terms. Any supplemental decision by an  
25 arbitration panel or other decision maker agreed to by the  
26 parties shall be submitted to the governing body for

1 ratification and adoption in accordance with the procedures and  
2 voting requirements set forth in this Section. The voting  
3 requirements of this subsection shall apply to all disputes  
4 submitted to arbitration pursuant to this Section  
5 notwithstanding any contrary voting requirements contained in  
6 any existing collective bargaining agreement between the  
7 parties.

8 (o) If the governing body of the employer votes to reject  
9 the panel's decision, the parties shall return to the panel  
10 within 30 days from the issuance of the reasons for rejection  
11 for further proceedings and issuance of a supplemental  
12 decision. All reasonable costs of such supplemental proceeding  
13 including the exclusive representative's reasonable attorney's  
14 fees, as established by the Board, shall be paid by the  
15 employer.

16 (p) Notwithstanding the provisions of this Section the  
17 employer and exclusive representative may agree to submit  
18 unresolved disputes concerning wages, hours, terms and  
19 conditions of employment to an alternative form of impasse  
20 resolution.
