Sec. 5-65. Technology planning. Subject to appropriation, the Department, working with the Illinois Century Network, the Governor's Office of Technology, other public agencies, and a cross-section of private community, nonprofit, and business sector parties, in person and through distance learning and on-line communications, must review developments in priorities for community technology planning and support by federal agencies, including the United States Department of Commerce, the United States Department of Education, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, the United States Department of Justice, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and other federal agencies and federally-supported programs, and must prepare recommendations concerning the best use of State-funded community technology programs to provide sustainability planning in relation to federal programs. During the course of the review, at least one distance learning conference using the preliminary findings must be conducted at locations around the State in order to obtain public comments on the findings.
