SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

225 ILCS 85/3 225 ILCS 85/16a from Ch. 111, par. 4123 from Ch. 111, par. 4136a

Amends the Pharmacy Practice Act of 1987. Changes the definition of "mail-order pharmacy" and the provisions concerning registration of mail-order pharmacies to include pharmacies located outside of Illinois (rather than in a state of the United States). Allows the Department to make site visits to a mail-order pharmacy and notify the United States Food and Drug Administration that a mail-order pharmacy registered under the provisions is in compliance with State laws and rules governing mail-order pharmacies.

FISCAL NOTE ACT MAY APPLY

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1 AN ACT concerning professional regulation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Pharmacy Practice Act of 1987 is amended by changing Sections 3 and 16a as follows:
- 6 (225 ILCS 85/3) (from Ch. 111, par. 4123)
- 7 (Section scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2008)
- 8 Sec. 3. Definitions. For the purpose of this Act, except 9 where otherwise limited therein:
- (a) "Pharmacy" or "drugstore" means and includes every 10 shop, pharmacy department, or other place 11 store, pharmaceutical care is provided by a pharmacist (1) where 12 drugs, medicines, or poisons are dispensed, sold or offered for 13 14 sale at retail, or displayed for sale at retail; or (2) where 15 prescriptions of physicians, dentists, veterinarians, podiatrists, or therapeutically certified optometrists, within 16 17 the limits of their licenses, are compounded, filled, or 18 dispensed; or (3) which has upon it or displayed within it, or 19 affixed to or used in connection with it, a sign bearing the 20 or words "Pharmacist", "Druggist", "Pharmacy", word "Pharmaceutical Care", "Apothecary", "Drugstore", "Medicine 21 Store", "Prescriptions", "Drugs", "Medicines", or any word or 22 23 words of similar or like import, either in the English language or any other language; or (4) where the characteristic 24 25 prescription sign (Rx) or similar design is exhibited; or (5) 26 any store, or shop, or other place with respect to which any of the above words, objects, signs or designs are used in any 27 28 advertisement.
- 29 (b) "Drugs" means and includes (l) articles recognized in 30 the official United States Pharmacopoeia/National Formulary 31 (USP/NF), or any supplement thereto and being intended for and 32 having for their main use the diagnosis, cure, mitigation,

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treatment or prevention of disease in man or other animals, as approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, but does not include devices or their components, parts, or accessories; and (2) all other articles intended for and having for their main use the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease in man or other animals, as approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, but does not include devices or their components, parts, or accessories; and (3) articles (other than food) having for their main use and intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of man or other animals; and (4) articles having for their main use and intended for use as a component or any articles specified in clause (1), (2) or (3); but does not include devices or their components, parts or accessories.

- (c) "Medicines" means and includes all drugs intended for human or veterinary use approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration.
- "Practice of pharmacy" means 18 the provision of 19 care to patients as determined by pharmaceutical 20 pharmacist's professional judgment in the following areas, 21 which may include but are not limited to (1) patient counseling, (2) interpretation and assisting in the monitoring 22 23 of appropriate drug use and prospective drug utilization review, (3) providing information on the therapeutic values, 24 reactions, drug interactions, side effects, uses, selection of 25 26 medications and medical devices, and outcome of drug therapy, 27 (4) participation in drug selection, drug monitoring, drug 28 utilization review, evaluation, administration, 29 interpretation, application of pharmacokinetic and laboratory 30 data to design safe and effective drug regimens, (5) drug 31 research (clinical and scientific), and (6) compounding and 32 dispensing of drugs and medical devices.
 - (e) "Prescription" means and includes any written, oral, facsimile, or electronically transmitted order for drugs or medical devices, issued by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches, dentist, veterinarian, or

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- 1 podiatrist, or therapeutically certified optometrist, within 2 the limits of their licenses, by a physician assistant in accordance with subsection (f) of Section 4, or by an advanced 3 practice nurse in accordance with subsection (g) of Section 4, 4 5 containing the following: (1) name of the patient; (2) date 6 when prescription was issued; (3) name and strength of drug or description of the medical device prescribed; and (4) quantity, 7 (5) directions for use, (6) prescriber's name, address and 8 9 signature, and (7) DEA number where required, for controlled 10 substances. DEA numbers shall not be required on inpatient drug 11 orders.
- (f) "Person" means and includes a natural person, copartnership, association, corporation, government entity, or any other legal entity.
- 15 (g) "Department" means the Department of Professional Regulation.
- 17 (h) "Board of Pharmacy" or "Board" means the State Board of 18 Pharmacy of the Department of Professional Regulation.
- 19 (i) "Director" means the Director of Professional 20 Regulation.
 - (j) "Drug product selection" means the interchange for a prescribed pharmaceutical product in accordance with Section 25 of this Act and Section 3.14 of the Illinois Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.
 - (k) "Inpatient drug order" means an order issued by an authorized prescriber for a resident or patient of a facility licensed under the Nursing Home Care Act or the Hospital Licensing Act, or "An Act in relation to the founding and operation of the University of Illinois Hospital and the conduct of University of Illinois health care programs", approved July 3, 1931, as amended, or a facility which is operated by the Department of Human Services (as successor to the Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities) or the Department of Corrections.
- 35 (k-5) "Pharmacist" means an individual health care 36 professional and provider currently licensed by this State to

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engage in the practice of pharmacy.

- (1) "Pharmacist in charge" means the licensed pharmacist whose name appears on a pharmacy license and who is responsible for all aspects of the operation related to the practice of pharmacy.
- (m) "Dispense" means the delivery of drugs and medical devices, in accordance with applicable State and federal laws and regulations, to the patient or the patient's representative authorized to receive these products, including compounding, packaging, and labeling necessary for delivery, and any recommending or advising concerning the contents and therapeutic values and uses thereof. "Dispense" does not mean physical delivery to а patient or a patient's representative in a home or institution by a designee of a pharmacist or by common carrier. "Dispense" also does not mean the physical delivery of a drug or medical device to a patient or patient's representative by a pharmacist's designee within a pharmacy or drugstore while the pharmacist is on duty and the pharmacy is open.
- (n) "Mail-order pharmacy" means a pharmacy that is located outside of Illinois in a state of the United States, other than Illinois, that delivers, dispenses or distributes, through the United States Postal Service or other common carrier, to Illinois residents, any substance which requires a prescription.
- (o) "Compounding" means the preparation, mixing, assembling, packaging, or labeling of a drug or medical device:

 (1) as the result of a practitioner's prescription drug order or initiative that is dispensed pursuant to a prescription in the course of professional practice; or (2) for the purpose of, or incident to, research, teaching, or chemical analysis; or (3) in anticipation of prescription drug orders based on routine, regularly observed prescribing patterns.
- (p) "Confidential information" means information, maintained by the pharmacist in the patient's records, released only (i) to the patient or, as the patient directs, to other

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- practitioners and other pharmacists or (ii) to any other person authorized by law to receive the information.
 - (q) "Prospective drug review" or "drug utilization evaluation" means a screening for potential drug therapy problems due to therapeutic duplication, drug-disease contraindications, drug-drug interactions (including serious interactions with nonprescription or over-the-counter drugs), drug-food interactions, incorrect drug dosage or duration of drug treatment, drug-allergy interactions, and clinical abuse or misuse.
 - (r) "Patient counseling" means the communication between a pharmacist or a student pharmacist under the direct supervision of a pharmacist and a patient or the patient's representative about the patient's medication or device for the purpose of optimizing proper use of prescription medications or devices. The offer to counsel by the pharmacist or the pharmacist's designee, and subsequent patient counseling by the pharmacist or student pharmacist, shall be made in a face-to-face communication with the patient or patient's representative unless, in the professional judgment of the pharmacist, a face-to-face communication is deemed inappropriate unnecessary. In that instance, the offer to counsel or patient counseling may be made in a written communication, by telephone, or in a manner determined by the pharmacist to be appropriate.
 - (s) "Patient profiles" or "patient drug therapy record" means the obtaining, recording, and maintenance of patient prescription information, including prescriptions for controlled substances, and personal information.
 - (t) "Pharmaceutical care" includes, but is not limited to, the act of monitoring drug use and other patient care services intended to achieve outcomes that improve the patient's quality of life but shall not include the sale of over-the-counter drugs by a seller of goods and services who does not dispense prescription drugs.
 - (u) "Medical device" means an instrument, apparatus,

- 1 implement, machine, contrivance, implant, in vitro reagent, or
- 2 other similar or related article, including any component part
- 3 or accessory, required under federal law to bear the label
- 4 "Caution: Federal law requires dispensing by or on the order of
- 5 a physician". A seller of goods and services who, only for the
- 6 purpose of retail sales, compounds, sells, rents, or leases
- 7 medical devices shall not, by reasons thereof, be required to
- 8 be a licensed pharmacy.
- 9 (v) "Unique identifier" means an electronic signature,
- 10 handwritten signature or initials, thumb print, or other
- 11 acceptable individual biometric or electronic identification
- 12 process as approved by the Department.

- Sec. 16a. <u>Mail-order pharmacies</u>.
- 17 (a) The Department shall establish rules and regulations,
- 18 consistent with the provisions of this Act, governing
- 19 mail-order pharmacies, including pharmacies providing services
- 20 via the Internet, which sell, or offer for sale, drugs,
- 21 medicines, or other pharmaceutical services in this State.
- 22 (b) The Board shall require and provide for an annual
- 23 nonresident special pharmacy registration for all pharmacies
- located outside of this State that dispense medications for
- 25 Illinois residents and mail, ship, or deliver prescription
- 26 medications into this State. Nonresident special pharmacy
- 27 registration shall be granted by the Board upon the disclosure
- and certification by a pharmacy:
- 29 (1) that it is licensed in the <u>jurisdiction</u> state in
- 30 which the dispensing facility is located and from which the
- 31 drugs are dispensed;
- 32 (2) of the location, names, and titles of all principal
- 33 corporate officers and all pharmacists who are dispensing
- 34 drugs to residents of this State;
- 35 (3) that it complies with all lawful directions and

requests for information from the board of pharmacy of each state in which it is licensed or registered, except that it shall respond directly to all communications from the Board concerning emergency circumstances arising from the dispensing of drugs to residents of this State;

- (4) that it maintains its records of drugs dispensed to residents of this State so that the records are readily retrievable from the records of other drugs dispensed;
- (5) that it cooperates with the Board in providing information to the board of pharmacy of the <u>jurisdiction</u> state in which it is licensed concerning matters related to the dispensing of drugs to residents of this State; and
- (6) that during its regular hours of operation, but not less than 6 days per week, for a minimum of 40 hours per week, a toll-free telephone service is provided to facilitate communication between patients in this State and a pharmacist at the pharmacy who has access to the patients' records. The toll-free number must be disclosed on the label affixed to each container of drugs dispensed to residents of this State.
- (c) The Department may (i) in cooperation with the jurisdiction under which the pharmacy is licensed, make site visits to a pharmacy registered under this Section for quality assurance purposes and (ii) notify the United States Food and Drug Administration that a pharmacy registered under this Section is in compliance with State laws and rules governing mail-order pharmacies.
