SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

235 ILCS 5/6-15

from Ch. 43, par. 130

Amends the Liquor Control Act of 1934. Makes a technical change in a Section concerning the sale or delivery of alcoholic liquor in public buildings.

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AN ACT concerning liquor.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by 5 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

6 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

7 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered in any building belonging to or under the the control of the 8 9 State or any political subdivision thereof except as provided 10 in this Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village, incorporated town or township may provide by ordinance, 11 however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or delivered in any 12 specifically designated building belonging to or under the 13 14 control of the municipality or township, or in any building 15 located on land under the control of the municipality; provided that such township complies with all 16 applicable local 17 ordinances in any incorporated area of the township. Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a 18 19 special use permit on any property owned by a conservation 20 district organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event 21 22 authorized by the governing board of the conservation district, 23 (ii) the issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local liquor control commissioner of the territory in which 24 25 the property is located, and (iii) the special use permit authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less. 26 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport 27 28 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more 29 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf 30 course owned by a park district organized under the Park District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board 31 32 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned

1 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate 2 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the 3 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500 4 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district 5 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act 6 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500 7 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject 8 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a 9 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of 10 11 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park, 12 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located 13 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center 14 15 owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River 16 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the 17 operation of an established food serving facility during times when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at 18 19 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art 20 Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of 21 22 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American 23 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at 24 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in 25 connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago 26 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land 27 owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any 28 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned 29 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the 30 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners 31 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability 32 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and 33 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago 34 35 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners, or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational 36

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1 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District 2 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any 3 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which 4 conference and convention type activities take place belonging 5 to or under control of any State university or public community 6 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors 7 8 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference 9 participants or participants in cultural, political or educational activities held in such facilities, and provided 10 11 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a 12 public community college district, or members of an 13 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State 14 university or a public community college district are active 15 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial 16 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at 17 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears professional football team is playing in that stadium during 18 19 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half 20 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of the game, or by a catering establishment which 21 22 has rented facilities from a board of trustees of a public 23 community college district, or, if approved by the District 24 board, on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 25 26 years. Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery 27 of alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in 28 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the 29 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by 30 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates 31 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the 32 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer, or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic 33 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to 34 35 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in 36

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1 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at 2 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at 3 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future 4 5 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the 6 sale of alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save 7 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport, 8 9 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and convention type activities take place, park district, Forest 10 11 Preserve District, public community college district, 12 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss, 13 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities in connection 14 15 with the operation of an established food serving facility 16 during times when food is dispensed for consumption upon the 17 premises. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by a fire protection district 18 19 organized under the Fire Protection District Act, provided that 20 such delivery and sale is approved by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further that such delivery and sale 21 is limited to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events 22 23 per year.

Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold at retail in 24 25 the Dorchester Senior Business Center owned by the Village of 26 Dolton if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in 27 connection with organized functions for which the planned 28 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility 29 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram 30 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold 31 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial 32 loss, damage and harm.

33 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in 34 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

35 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the36 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such

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building is filed with the Commission;

2 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
3 connection with organized functions held on special
4 occasions;

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(iii) the organized function is one for which the planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

7 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
8 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
9 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the
10 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

(i) the written consent of the Public Building
Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is
filed with the Commission;

16 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in 17 connection with organized functions held on special 18 occasions;

19 (iii) the organized function is one for which the20 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

(iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss, damage or harm; and

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(v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

27 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building 28 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or 29 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical 30 properties of the building is used for commercial or recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier 31 32 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. Alcoholic liquor 33 34 may be sold in buildings under the control of the Department of 35 Natural Resources when written consent to the issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such buildings is filed 36

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with the Commission by the Department of Natural Resources. 1 2 Alcoholic liquor may be served or delivered in buildings and 3 facilities under the control of the Department of Natural 4 Resources upon the written approval of the Director of Natural 5 Resources acting as the controlling government authority. The 6 Director of Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval, including but not limited to requirements 7 for 8 insurance and hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other 9 provision of this Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States 10 Army Corps of Engineers or Department of Natural Resources 11 concessionaire who was operating on June 1, 1991 for 12 on-premises consumption only is not subject to the provisions 13 of Articles IV and IX. Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park District Stadium owned by the 14 15 Joliet Park District when written consent to the issuance of a 16 license to sell beer and wine in such premises is filed with 17 the local liquor commissioner by the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in buildings on the grounds of State 18 19 veterans' homes when written consent to the issuance of a 20 license to sell beer and wine in such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, and the 21 facility shall provide dram shop liability in maximum insurance 22 23 coverage limits so as to save the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm. Such liquors may be delivered 24 to and sold at any property owned or held under lease by a 25 26 Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority or Metropolitan 27 Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

28 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional 29 sporting events and at professional concerts and other 30 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest 31 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the 32 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage 33 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial 34 loss, damage and harm. 35

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Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery

of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful manner.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
State parks under the control of the Department of Natural
Resources, provided:

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a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the commission by the Department of Natural Resources, and

c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park 14 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours 15 12 o'clock midnight. 16 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 17 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire 18 19 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on properties under the control of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with
 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

28 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell 29 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the 30 commission by the Historic Sites and Preservation Division 31 of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln 32 Presidential Library and Museum, and

c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or
 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11
 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

36 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does

not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or park districts.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield 8 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation 9 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that 10 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales 11 only if

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a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

b. such sales would not impede normal operations of thedepartments involved;

15 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop 16 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees 17 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of 18 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

d. no such sale shall be made during normal workinghours of the State of Illinois; and

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e. the consent is in writing.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts. Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors on Sundays or Holidays.

29 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care 30 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or 31 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility 32 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the 33 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic 34 35 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches. 36

1 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in 2 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of 3 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished 4 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail, 5 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a 6 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the 7 8 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in 9 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an 10 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or 11 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written 12 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the 13 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization: 14

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 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling government authority;

b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
that does not impair normal operations of State offices
located in the building;

20 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
 21 connection with an official activity in the building;

d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors.

Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit organization or agency of the State from employing the services of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors at authorized functions.

The controlling government authority for the Willard Ice Building in Springfield shall be the Director of the Department of Revenue. The controlling government authority for Illinois State Museum facilities shall be the Director of the Illinois State Museum. 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1 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

2 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or dispensed at any facility, property or building under the 3 jurisdiction of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of 4 5 the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln 6 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether 7 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency 8 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic 9 10 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) a 11 not-for-profit organization provided that such organization:

a. Obtains written consent from the controllinggovernment authority;

b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal workings of State offices or operations located at the facility, property or building;

c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
connection with an official activity of the not-for-profit
organization in the facility, property or building;

20 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram 21 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in 22 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and 23 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss, 24 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of 25 alcoholic liquors.

The controlling government authority for the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency shall be the Director of the Historic Sites and Preservation, and the controlling government authority for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall be the Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal business hours of any day care or child care facility located

in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant 1 2 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management 3 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant 4 5 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses 6 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the 7 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the 8 9 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm 10 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic 11 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, 12 judicial, or executive, provided that such agency first obtains written permission to accept delivery of and sell or dispense 13 alcoholic liquors from the Director of Central Management 14 Services, or by (3) a not-for-profit organization, provided 15 16 that such organization:

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a. obtains written consent from the Department of Central Management Services;

b. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses the
alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal
operations of State offices located in the building;

c. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses alcoholic
 liquors only in connection with an official activity in the
 building; and

d. provides, or its catering service provides, dram shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless, and indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors.

Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit organization or agency of the State from employing the services of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of Central Management Services.

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Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the

1 James R. Thompson Center in Chicago, subject to the provisions 2 of Section 7.4 of the State Property Control Act, and 222 South College Street in Springfield, Illinois by (1) a commercial 3 tenant or subtenant conducting business on the premises under a 4 5 lease or sublease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the (20 ILCS 6 Department of Central Management Services Law 405/405-315), provided that such tenant or subtenant who sells 7 or dispenses alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram 8 9 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the carrier agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless 10 11 the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm 12 arising out of the sale or dispensing of alcoholic liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or 13 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written 14 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the 15 16 Director of Central Management Services, or by (3) a 17 not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization:

a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
Central Management Services;

b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
that does not impair normal operations of State offices
located in the building;

c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in connection with an official activity in the building;

d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors.

Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit organization or agency of the State from employing the services of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of Central Management Services.

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Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered at any facility

owned by the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority provided that dram shop liability insurance has been made available in a form, with such coverage and in such amounts as the Authority reasonably determines is necessary.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the 6 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State, 7 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such 8 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense 9 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management 10 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided 11 that such organization:

a. Obtains written consent from the Department ofCentral Management Services;

b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
that does not impair normal operations of State offices
located in the building;

c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
 connection with an official activity in the building;

d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
alcoholic liquors.

Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit organization or agency of the State from employing the services of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Department of Central Management Services.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in a building that is owned by McLean County, situated on land owned by the county in the City of Bloomington, and used by the McLean County Historical Society if the sale or delivery is approved by an ordinance adopted by the county board, and the municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of

1 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of 2 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County, 3 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean 4 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an 5 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the 6 7 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality 8 to regulate that sale and delivery.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building 10 situated on land held in trust for any school district 11 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building 12 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is 13 approved by the board of education.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in buildings owned by the Community Building Complex Committee of Boone County, Illinois if the person or facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance with coverage and in amounts that the Committee reasonably determines are necessary.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in the building located at 1200 Centerville Avenue in Belleville, Illinois and occupied by either the Belleville Area Special Education District or the Belleville Area Special Services Cooperative.

Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Louis Joliet Renaissance Center, City Center Campus, located at 214 N. Ottawa Street, Joliet, and the Food Services/Culinary Arts Department facilities, Main Campus, located at 1215 Houbolt Road, Joliet, owned by or under the control of Joliet Junior College, Illinois Community College District No. 525.
