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1 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 80 WHEREAS, Article I, Section 11 of the Illinois Constitution 2 3 states "All penalties shall be determined both according to the 4 seriousness of the offense AND WITH THE OBJECTIVE OF RESTORING THE OFFENDER TO USEFUL CITIZENSHIP (emphasis added); and 5 WHEREAS, Illinois is one of only 11 states that has life 6 7 without parole sentences and one of only 6 states where all 8 life sentences are without parole; and 9 WHEREAS, Thirty years ago only a handful of prisoners in Illinois served sentences longer than 30 years; this year 10 approximately 4,000 Illinois prisoners have sentences of 30 11 years or more, including C number prisoners, amounting to about 12 13 10% of all Illinois prisoners; and WHEREAS, In Illinois at least 500 people each year are 14 sentenced as lifers or long-term prisoners; and 15 WHEREAS, With the growth of truth in sentencing laws and 16 increased use of life without parole sentences, the number of 17 long-term prisoners will grow exponentially; and 18 19 WHEREAS, It costs at least one million dollars to confine a 20 person in prison for 30 years; and WHEREAS, It is estimated that close to half of those lifers 21 22 and long-term prisoners will never be released from prison if 23 current policies stay in place; and 24 WHEREAS, The recidivism rate for long termers is the lowest of any group of prisoners; and 25

WHEREAS, A large number of lifers and long-term prisoners

are sentenced under the accountability theory and not for the

- 1 actual commission of the crime, and some are first time
- 2 offenders; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Community crime prevention programs, not harsher
- 4 prison sentences are responsible for the decline in crime
- 5 rates; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Numerous innocent people have been wrongly
- 7 convicted in Illinois; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Many countries no longer impose sentences of life
- 9 without parole; therefore, be it
- 10 RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
- 11 NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE
- 12 SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Long-Term
- 13 Prisoners Study Committee, hereinafter referred to as the
- 14 Committee, consisting of 17 members appointed as follows:
- 15 (1) Three members appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 16 (2) Two members appointed by the Minority Leader of the
- 17 Senate;
- 18 (3) Three members appointed by the Speaker of the House of
- 19 Representatives;
- 20 (4) Two members appointed by the Minority Leader of the
- 21 House of Representatives;
- 22 (5) One member appointed by the Attorney General;
- 23 (6) One member appointed by the Governor;
- 24 (7) One member appointed by the Cook County State's
- 25 Attorney;
- 26 (8) One member appointed by the Office of the Cook County
- 27 Public Defender;
- 28 (9) One member appointed by the Office of the State
- 29 Appellate Defender;
- 30 (10) One member appointed by the Office of the State's
- 31 Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor; and
- 32 (11) One member appointed by the Director of Corrections;

- 1 and be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the Department of Corrections shall provide
- 3 staff and administrative support to the Committee; and be it
- 4 further
- 5 RESOLVED, That the Committee shall study and examine issues
- 6 related to prisoners sentenced to life without parole and
- 7 prisoners sentenced to terms in excess of 30 years; and be it
- 8 further
- 9 RESOLVED, That the Committee in its deliberations shall
- 10 always give priority to public safety and the best use of State
- 11 funds; and be it further
- 12 RESOLVED, That the Committee shall hold public hearings and
- 13 present a report of its findings and recommendations to the
- 95th General Assembly before June 1, 2007.
