## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/21-1a	from Ch. 122, par. 21-1a
105 ILCS 5/21-2	from Ch. 122, par. 21-2
105 ILCS 5/21-10	from Ch. 122, par. 21-10
105 ILCS 5/21-14	from Ch. 122, par. 21-14

Amends the Teacher Certification Article of the School Code. Removes a provision that provides that a person who holds a valid and comparable out-of-state certificate is not required to take the tests of basic skills and subject matter knowledge. Removes a provision that requires a provisional certificate holder to pass the examinations set forth by the State Board of Education within 9 months. Removes a provision that provides that a failure to pass the tests of basic skills and subject matter knowledge shall result in cancellation of a provisional certificate. With respect to Standard Teaching Certificates, removes a provision that provides that continuing professional development activities may include continuing education units; makes related changes.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections
21-1a, 21-2, 21-10, and 21-14 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/21-1a) (from Ch. 122, par. 21-1a)

Sec. 21-1a. Tests required for certification and teacherpreparation.

9 After July 1, 1988, in addition to all other (a) requirements, early childhood, elementary, special, high 10 school, school service personnel, or, except as provided in 11 Section 34-6, administrative certificates shall be issued to 12 persons who have satisfactorily passed a test of basic skills 13 14 and subject matter knowledge. A person who holds a valid and comparable out of state certificate, however, is not required 15 16 to take a test of basic skills and is not required to take a 17 test of subject matter knowledge, provided that the person has successfully passed a test of subject matter knowledge in 18 19 another state or territory of the United States that is directly related in content to the specific subject area of 20 21 certification. The tests of basic skills and subject matter knowledge shall be the tests which from time to time are 22 designated by the State Board of Education in consultation with 23

the State Teacher Certification Board and may be tests prepared 1 2 by an educational testing organization or tests designed by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher 3 Certification Board. The areas to be covered by the test of 4 5 basic skills shall include the basic skills of reading, writing, grammar and mathematics. The test of subject matter 6 knowledge shall assess content knowledge in the specific 7 8 subject field. The tests shall be designed to be racially 9 neutral to assure that no person in taking the tests is thereby 10 discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national 11 origin or other factors unrelated to the person's ability to 12 perform as a certificated employee. The score required to pass 13 the tests of basic skills and subject matter knowledge shall be fixed by the State Board of Education in consultation with the 14 15 State Teacher Certification Board. The tests shall be held not 16 fewer than 3 times a year at such time and place as may be 17 designated by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. 18

(b) Except as provided in Section 34-6, the provisions of 19 subsection (a) of this Section shall apply equally in any 20 school district subject to Article 34, provided that the State 21 22 Board of Education shall determine which certificates issued 23 under Sections 34-8.1 and 34-83 prior to July 1, 1988 are comparable to any early childhood certificate, elementary 24 25 certificate, special certificate, high school school 26 certificate, school service personnel certificate or

administrative certificate issued under this Article as of July
 1, 1988.

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(c) A person who holds an early childhood, elementary, 3 special, high school or school service personnel certificate 4 5 issued under this Article on or at any time before July 1, 6 1988, including a person who has been issued any such certificate pursuant to Section 21-11.1 or in exchange for a 7 comparable certificate theretofore issued under Section 34-8.1 8 9 or Section 34-83, shall not be required to take or pass the 10 tests in order to thereafter have such certificate renewed.

(d) The State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board shall conduct a pilot administration of the tests by administering the test to students completing teacher education programs in the 1986-87 school year for the purpose of determining the effect and impact of testing candidates for certification.

Beginning with the 2002-2003 academic year, a student may not enroll in a teacher preparation program at a recognized teacher training institution until he or she has passed the basic skills test.

Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 94th General Assembly, prior to completing an approved teacher preparation program, a preservice education candidate must satisfactorily pass the test of subject matter knowledge in the discipline in which he or she will be certified to teach. The teacher preparation program may require passage of 1 the test of subject matter knowledge at any time during the 2 program, including prior to student teaching.

3 (e) The rules and regulations developed to implement the required test of basic skills and subject matter knowledge 4 5 shall include the requirements of subsections (a), (b), and (c) specific regulations to govern test 6 and shall include selection; test validation and determination of a passing 7 8 administration of the tests; frequency score; of 9 administration; applicant fees; frequency of applicants' 10 taking the tests; the years for which a score is valid; and, 11 waiving certain additional tests for additional certificates 12 to individuals who have satisfactorily passed the test of basic skills and subject matter knowledge as required in subsection 13 14 (a). The State Board of Education shall provide, by rule, 15 specific policies that assure uniformity in the difficulty 16 level of each form of the basic skills test and each subject 17 matter knowledge test from test-to-test and year-to-year. The State Board of Education shall also set a passing score for the 18 19 tests.

(f) The State Teacher Certification Board may issue a nonrenewable temporary certificate between July 1, 1988 and August 31, 1988 to individuals who have taken the tests of basic skills and subject matter knowledge prescribed by this Section but have not received such test scores by August 31, 1988. Such temporary certificates shall expire on December 31, 1988.

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Beginning February 15, 2000, the State Board of 1 (q) 2 in consultation with Education, the State Teacher 3 Certification Board, shall implement and administer a new system of certification for teachers in the State of Illinois. 4 5 The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, shall design and implement a 6 system of examinations and various other criteria which shall 7 8 required prior to the issuance of Initial Teaching be 9 Certificates and Standard Teaching Certificates. These 10 examinations and indicators shall be based on national and 11 State professional teaching standards, as determined by the 12 State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 13 Teacher Certification Board. The State Board of Education may 14 adopt any and all regulations necessary to implement and 15 administer this Section.

16 (h) The State Board of Education shall report to the 17 Assembly and the Illinois General Governor with recommendations for further changes and improvements to the 18 teacher certification system no later than July 1, 1999 and on 19 20 an annual basis until July 1, 2001.

23 Sec. 21-2. Grades of certificates.

(a) All certificates issued under this Article shall be
State certificates valid, except as limited in Section 21-1, in

every school district coming under the provisions of this Act 1 2 and shall be limited in time and designated as follows: Provisional vocational certificate, temporary provisional 3 vocational certificate, early childhood certificate, 4 5 elementary school certificate, special certificate, secondary 6 certificate, school service personnel certificate, 7 administrative certificate, provisional certificate, and 8 substitute certificate. The requirement of student teaching 9 under close and competent supervision for obtaining a teaching 10 certificate may be waived by the State Teacher Certification 11 Board upon presentation to the Board by the teacher of evidence 12 years successful teaching experience on a valid of 5 13 certificate and graduation from a recognized institution of 14 higher learning with a bachelor's degree.

15 (b) Initial Teaching Certificate. Persons who (1) have 16 completed an approved teacher preparation program, (2) are 17 recommended by an approved teacher preparation program, (3) have successfully completed the Initial Teaching Certification 18 examinations required by the State Board of Education, and (4) 19 20 have met all other criteria established by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification 21 22 Board, shall be issued an Initial Teaching Certificate valid for 4 years of teaching, as defined in Section 21-14 of this 23 Code. Initial Teaching Certificates shall be issued for 24 25 categories corresponding to Early Childhood, Elementary, Secondary, and Special K-12, with special certification 26

1 designations for Special Education, Bilingual Education, 2 fundamental learning areas (including Language Arts, Reading, 3 Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Physical Development and Health, Fine Arts, and Foreign Language), and other areas 4 5 designated by the State Board of Education, in consultation 6 with the State Teacher Certification Board. Notwithstanding 7 any other provision of this Article, an Initial Teaching 8 Certificate shall be automatically extended for one year for 9 all persons who (i) have been issued an Initial Teaching Certificate that expires on June 30, 2004 and (ii) have not 10 11 met, prior to July 1, 2004, the Standard Certificate 12 under paragraph (c) of this Section. requirements An 13 application and fee shall not be required for this extension.

(b-5) A person who holds an out-of-state certificate and 14 15 who is otherwise eligible for a comparable Illinois certificate 16 may be issued an Initial Certificate if that person has not 17 completed 4 years of teaching. Upon completion of 4 years of teaching, the person is eligible for a Standard Certificate. 18 Beginning July 1, 2004, an out-of-state candidate who has 19 20 already earned a second-tier certificate in another state is 21 not subject to any Standard Certificate eligibility 22 requirements stated in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of this 23 Section other than completion of the 4 years of teaching. An out-of-state candidate who has completed less than 4 years of 24 25 teaching and does not hold a second-tier certificate from 26 another state must meet the requirements stated in paragraph

(2) of subsection (c) of this Section, proportionately reduced
 by the amount of time remaining to complete the 4 years of
 teaching.

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(c) Standard Certificate.

5 (1) Persons who (i) have completed 4 years of teaching, as defined in Section 21-14 of this Code, with an Initial 6 7 Certificate or an Initial Alternative Teaching Certificate and have met all other criteria established by the State Board of 8 9 Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification 10 Board, (ii) have completed 4 years of teaching on a valid 11 equivalent certificate in another State or territory of the 12 United States, or have completed 4 years of teaching in a 13 nonpublic Illinois elementary or secondary school with an Initial Certificate or an Initial Alternative 14 Teaching 15 Certificate, and have met all other criteria established by the 16 State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 17 Teacher Certification Board, or (iii) were issued teaching certificates prior to February 15, 2000 and are renewing those 18 certificates after February 15, 2000, shall be issued a 19 20 Standard Certificate valid for 5 years, which may be renewed thereafter every 5 years by the State Teacher Certification 21 22 Board based on proof of continuing education or professional 23 development. Beginning July 1, 2003, persons who have completed 4 years of teaching, as described in clauses (i) and (ii) of 24 25 this paragraph (1), have successfully completed the 26 requirements of paragraphs (2) through (4) of this subsection

(c), and have met all other criteria established by the State 1 2 Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, shall be issued Standard Certificates. 3 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Section, 4 5 beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold valid out-of-state 6 certificates and have completed 4 years of teaching on a valid 7 equivalent certificate in another State or territory of the issued 8 United States shall be comparable Standard 9 Certificates. Beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold valid 10 out-of-state certificates as described in subsection (b-5) of 11 this Section are subject to the requirements of paragraphs (2) 12 through (4) of this subsection (c), as required in subsection 13 (b-5) of this Section, in order to receive a Standard Certificate. Standard Certificates 14 shall be issued for 15 categories corresponding to Early Childhood, Elementary, Special K-12, with special certification 16 Secondary, and 17 designations for Special Education, Bilingual Education, fundamental learning areas (including Language Arts, Reading, 18 Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Physical Development and 19 20 Health, Fine Arts, and Foreign Language), and other areas designated by the State Board of Education, in consultation 21 22 with the State Teacher Certification Board.

(2) This paragraph (2) applies only to those persons
required to successfully complete the requirements of this
paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). In order
to receive a Standard Teaching Certificate, a person must

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1 satisfy one of the following requirements:

2 (A) Completion of a program of induction and mentoring 3 for new teachers that is based upon a specific plan approved by the State Board of Education, in consultation 4 5 with the State Teacher Certification Board. Nothing in this Section, however, prohibits an induction or mentoring 6 7 program from operating prior to approval. Holders of 8 Initial Certificates issued before September 1, 2007 must 9 complete, at a minimum, an approved one-year induction and 10 mentoring program. Holders of Initial Certificates issued 11 on or after September 1, 2007 must complete an approved 12 2-year induction and mentoring program. The plan must 13 describe the role of mentor teachers, the criteria and 14 process for their selection, and how all the following 15 components are to be provided:

(i) Assignment of a formally trained mentor
teacher to each new teacher for a specified period of
time, which shall be established by the employing
school or school district, provided that a mentor
teacher may not directly or indirectly participate in
the evaluation of a new teacher pursuant to Article 24A
of this Code or the evaluation procedure of the school.

(ii) Formal mentoring for each new teacher.

(iii) Support for each new teacher in relation to
the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards, the
content-area standards applicable to the new teacher's

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area of certification, and any applicable local school improvement and professional development plans.

(iv) Professional development specifically designed to foster the growth of each new teacher's knowledge and skills.

(v) Formative assessment that is based on the 6 7 Illinois Professional Teaching Standards and designed provide feedback to the teacher 8 to new and opportunities 9 for reflection his on or her 10 performance, which must not be used directly or 11 indirectly in any evaluation of a new teacher pursuant 12 to Article 24A of this Code or the evaluation procedure 13 of the school and which must include the activities 14 specified in clauses (B)(i), (B)(ii), and (B)(iii) of 15 this paragraph (2).

(vi) Assignment of responsibility for coordination
of the induction and mentoring program within each
school district participating in the program.

Successful completion of 4 semester hours of 19 (B) 20 graduate-level coursework on the assessment of one's own performance in relation to the Illinois Professional 21 22 Teaching Standards. The coursework must be approved by the 23 State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 24 Teacher Certification Board; must be offered either by an 25 institution of higher education, by such an institution in 26 partnership with a teachers' association or union or with a 1 regional office of education, or by another entity 2 authorized to issue college credit; and must include 3 demonstration of performance through all of the following 4 activities for each of the Illinois Professional Teaching 5 Standards:

6 (i) Observation, by the course instructor or another experienced teacher, of the new teacher's 7 classroom practice (the observation may be recorded 8 9 for later viewing) for the purpose of identifying and 10 describing how the new teacher made content meaningful for students; how the teacher motivated individuals 11 12 and the group and created an environment conducive to 13 positive social interactions, active learning, and 14 self-motivation; what instructional strategies the teacher used to encourage students' development of 15 16 critical thinking, problem solving, and performance; 17 how the teacher communicated using written, verbal, nonverbal, and visual communication techniques; and 18 19 how the teacher maintained standards of professional 20 conduct and provided leadership to improve students' learning. 21

22 (ii) Review and analysis, by the course instructor 23 experienced teacher, or another of written 24 documentation (i.e., lesson plans, assignments, 25 assessment instruments, and samples of students' work) 26 prepared by the new teacher for at least 2 lessons. The

documentation must provide evidence of classroom 1 performance related to Illinois Professional Teaching 2 3 Standards 1 through 9, with an emphasis on how the teacher used his or her understanding of students, 4 5 assessment data, and subject matter to decide on 6 learning goals; how the teacher designed or selected 7 activities and instructional materials and aligned instruction to the relevant Illinois 8 Learning 9 Standards: how the teacher adapted or modified 10 curriculum to meet individual students' needs; and how 11 the teacher sequenced instruction and designed or

selected student assessment strategies.

(C) Successful completion of a minimum of 4 semester 20 21 hours of graduate-level coursework addressing preparation 22 to meet the requirements for certification by the National 23 Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS). The 24 coursework must be approved by the State Board of 25 consultation with the State Education, in Teacher 26 Certification Board, and must be offered either by an

institution of higher education, by such an institution in
partnership with a teachers' association or union or with a
regional office of education, or by another entity
authorized to issue college credit. The course must address
the 5 NBPTS Core Propositions and relevant standards
through such means as the following:

7 (i) Observation, by the course instructor or 8 another experienced teacher, of the new teacher's 9 classroom practice (the observation may be recorded 10 for later viewing) for the purpose of identifying and 11 describing how the new teacher made content meaningful 12 for students; how the teacher motivated individuals 13 and the group and created an environment conducive to 14 positive social interactions, active learning, and 15 self-motivation; what instructional strategies the 16 teacher used to encourage students' development of 17 critical thinking, problem solving, and performance; how the teacher communicated using written, verbal, 18 19 nonverbal, and visual communication techniques; and 20 how the teacher maintained standards of professional 21 conduct and provided leadership to improve students' 22 learning.

23 (ii) Review and analysis, by the course instructor 24 another experienced teacher, of or written 25 documentation (i.e., plans, lesson assignments, 26 assessment instruments, and samples of students' work)

prepared by the new teacher for at least 2 lessons. The 1 2 documentation must provide evidence of classroom 3 performance, including how the teacher used his or her understanding of students, assessment data, 4 and 5 subject matter to decide on learning goals; how the 6 teacher designed or selected activities and 7 instructional materials and aligned instruction to the 8 relevant Illinois Learning Standards; how the teacher 9 adapted or modified curriculum to meet individual 10 students' needs: and how the teacher sequenced 11 instruction and designed selected student or 12 assessment strategies.

(iii) Demonstration of professional expertise on the part of the new teacher in reflecting on his or her practice, which was observed under clause (C)(i) of this paragraph (2) and documented under clause (C)(ii) of this paragraph (2), in terms of teaching strengths, weaknesses, and implications for improvement.

19 (C-5) Satisfactory completion of a minimum of 12 20 semester hours of graduate credit towards an advanced 21 degree in an education-related field from an accredited 22 institution of higher education.

(D) Receipt of an advanced degree from an accredited
institution of higher education in an education-related
field that is earned by a person either while he or she
holds an Initial Teaching Certificate or prior to his or

1 her receipt of that certificate.

2 Accumulation of 60 continuing professional (E) 3 development units (CPDUs), earned by completing selected activities that comply with paragraphs (3) and (4) of this 4 5 subsection (c). However, for an individual who holds an Initial Teaching Certificate on the effective date of this 6 amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, the number of 7 8 CPDUs shall be reduced to reflect the teaching time 9 remaining on the Initial Teaching Certificate.

10 (F) Completion of nationally normed, а 11 performance-based assessment, if made available by the 12 State Board of Education in consultation with the State 13 Teacher Certification Board, provided that the cost to the 14 person shall not exceed the cost of the coursework 15 described in clause (B) of this paragraph (2).

16 (G) Completion of requirements for meeting the
17 Illinois criteria for becoming "highly qualified" (for
18 purposes of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Public
19 Law 107-110) in an additional teaching area.

(H) Receipt of a minimum 12-hour, post-baccalaureate,
education-related professional development certificate
issued by an Illinois institution of higher education and
developed in accordance with rules adopted by the State
Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher
Certification Board.

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(I) Completion of the National Board for Professional

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Teaching Standards (NBPTS) process.

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(J) Receipt of a subsequent Illinois certificate or endorsement pursuant to Article 21 of this Code.

This paragraph (3) applies only to those persons 4 (3) 5 required to successfully complete the requirements of this paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). Persons 6 7 who seek to satisfy the requirements of clause (E) of paragraph 8 (2) of this subsection (c) through accumulation of CPDUs may 9 earn credit through completion of coursework, workshops, 10 seminars, conferences, and other similar training events that 11 are pre-approved by the State Board of Education, in 12 consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, for the purpose of reflection on teaching practices in order to 13 14 address all of the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards 15 necessary to obtain a Standard Teaching Certificate. These 16 activities must meet all of the following requirements:

17 (A) Each activity must be designed to advance a 18 person's knowledge and skills in relation to one or more of 19 the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards or in 20 relation to the content-area standards applicable to the 21 teacher's field of certification.

(B) Taken together, the activities completed must
address each of the Illinois Professional Teaching
Standards as provided in clauses (B)(i), (B)(ii), and
(B)(iii) of paragraph (2) of this subsection (c).

(C) Each activity must be provided by an entity

approved by the State Board of Education, in consultation
 with the State Teacher Certification Board, for this
 purpose.

Each activity, integral to its successful 4 (D) 5 completion, must require participants to demonstrate the degree to which they have acquired new knowledge or skills, 6 7 such as through performance, through preparation of a 8 written product, through assembling samples of students' 9 teachers' work, or by some other means that is or 10 appropriate to the subject matter of the activity.

11 (E) One CPDU shall be available for each hour of direct 12 participation by a holder of an Initial Teaching Certificate in a qualifying activity. An activity may be 13 attributed to more than one of the Illinois Professional 14 Teaching Standards, but credit for any activity shall be 15 16 counted only once.

17 This paragraph (4) applies only to those persons (4) required to successfully complete the requirements of this 18 19 paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). Persons 20 who seek to satisfy the requirements of clause (E) of paragraph (2) of this subsection (c) through accumulation of CPDUs may 21 22 earn credit from the following, provided that each activity is 23 designed to advance a person's knowledge and skills in relation to one or more of the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards 24 25 or in relation to the content-area standards applicable to the person's field or fields of certification: 26

(A) Collaboration and partnership activities related to improving a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher, including all of the following:

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(i) Peer review and coaching.

5 (ii) Mentoring in a formal mentoring program, 6 including service as a consulting teacher 7 participating in a remediation process formulated 8 under Section 24A-5 of this Code.

9 (iii) Facilitating parent education programs
10 directly related to student achievement for a school,
11 school district, or regional office of education.

(iv) Participating in business, school, or
 community partnerships directly related to student
 achievement.

15 (B) Teaching college or university courses in areas 16 relevant to a teacher's field of certification, provided 17 that the teaching may only be counted once during the 18 course of 4 years.

(C) Conferences, workshops, institutes, seminars, and
 symposiums related to improving a person's knowledge and
 skills as a teacher, including all of the following:

(i) Completing non-university credit directly
related to student achievement, the Illinois
Professional Teaching Standards, or content-area
standards.

(ii) Participating in or presenting at workshops,

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(iii) (Blank).
 (iv) Training as reviewers of university teacher
 preparation programs.

seminars, conferences, institutes, and symposiums.

5 An activity listed in this clause (C) is creditable 6 only if its provider is approved for this purpose by the 7 State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 8 Teacher Certification Board.

9 (D) Other educational experiences related to improving 10 a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher, including all 11 of the following:

12 (i) Participating in action research and inquiry13 projects.

(ii) Observing programs or teaching in schools,
related businesses, or industry that is systematic,
purposeful, and relevant to a teacher's field of
certification.

18 (iii) Participating in study groups related to
19 student achievement, the Illinois Professional
20 Teaching Standards, or content-area standards.

21 (iv) Participating in work/learn programs or 22 internships.

(v) Developing a portfolio of students' andteacher's work.

(E) Professional leadership experiences related to
 improving a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher,

1 including all of the following:

2 (i) Participating in curriculum development or
3 assessment activities at the school, school district,
4 regional office of education, State, or national level.

5 (ii) Participating in team or department 6 leadership in a school or school district.

(iii) (Blank).

8 (iv) Publishing educational articles, columns, or
9 books relevant to a teacher's field of certification.

(v) Participating in non-strike related activities
of a professional association or labor organization
that are related to professional development.

13 A person must complete the requirements of (5) this 14 subsection (c) before the expiration of his or her Initial 15 Teaching Certificate and must submit assurance of having done 16 so to the regional superintendent of schools or a local 17 professional development committee authorized by the regional 18 superintendent to submit recommendations to him or her for this 19 purpose.

20 Within 30 days after receipt, the regional superintendent 21 of schools shall review the assurance of completion submitted 22 by a person and, based upon compliance with all of the 23 requirements for receipt of a Standard Teaching Certificate, 24 shall forward to the State Board of Education a recommendation 25 for issuance of the Standard Certificate or non-issuance. The 26 regional superintendent of schools shall notify the affected

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person if the recommendation is for non-issuance of 1 the 2 Standard Certificate. A person who is considered not to be eligible for a Standard Certificate and who has received the 3 notice of non-issuance may appeal this determination to the 4 5 Regional Professional Development Review Committee (RPDRC). 6 The recommendation of the regional superintendent and the 7 RPDRC, along with all supporting materials, must then be forwarded to the State Board of Education for a final 8 9 determination.

Upon review of a regional superintendent of school's recommendations, the State Board of Education shall issue Standard Teaching Certificates to those who qualify and shall notify a person, in writing, of a decision denying a Standard Teaching Certificate. Any decision denying issuance of a Standard Teaching Certificate to a person may be appealed to the State Teacher Certification Board.

17 (6) The State Board of Education, in consultation with the 18 State Teacher Certification Board, may adopt rules to implement 19 this subsection (c) and may periodically evaluate any of the 20 methods of qualifying for a Standard Teaching Certificate 21 described in this subsection (c).

(7) The changes made to paragraphs (1) through (5) of this subsection (c) by this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly shall apply to those persons who hold or are eligible to hold an Initial Certificate on or after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly and shall

be given effect upon their application for a Standard
 Certificate.

(8) Beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold a Standard 3 Certificate and have acquired one master's degree in an 4 5 education-related field are eligible for certificate renewal upon completion of two-thirds of the continuing education units 6 7 specified in subdivision (C) of paragraph (3) of subsection (e) of Section 21 14 of this Code or of the continuing professional 8 9 development units specified in subdivision (E) of paragraph (3) 10 of subsection (e) of Section 21-14 of this Code. Persons who 11 hold a Standard Certificate and have acquired a second master's 12 degree, an education specialist, or a doctorate in an 13 education-related field or hold a Master Certificate are eligible for certificate renewal upon completion of one-third 14 15 of the continuing education units specified in subdivision (C) 16 of paragraph (3) of subsection (e) of Section 21 14 of this 17 Code or of the continuing professional development units specified in subdivision (E) of paragraph (3) of subsection (e) 18 of Section 21-14 of this Code. 19

(d) Master Certificate. Persons who have successfully achieved National Board certification through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards shall be issued a Master Certificate, valid for 10 years and renewable thereafter every 10 years through compliance with requirements set forth by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. However, each teacher who holds a

Master Certificate shall be eligible for a teaching position in 1 2 this State in the areas for which he or she holds a Master 3 Certificate without satisfying any other requirements of this Code, except for those requirements pertaining to criminal 4 5 background checks. A holder of a Master Certificate in an area 6 of science or social science is eligible to teach in any of the 7 subject areas within those fields, including those taught at 8 the advanced level, as defined by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. A 9 10 teacher who holds a Master Certificate shall be deemed to meet 11 State certification renewal requirements in the area or areas 12 for which he or she holds a Master Certificate for the 10-year term of the teacher's Master Certificate. 13

17 Sec. 21-10. Provisional certificate.

(A) Until July 1, 1972, the State Teacher Certification
Board may issue a provisional certificate valid for teaching in
elementary, high school or special subject fields subject to
the following conditions:

A provisional certificate may be issued to a person who presents certified evidence of having earned a bachelor's degree from a recognized institution of higher learning. The academic and professional courses offered as a basis of the

provisional certificate shall be courses approved by the State
 Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher
 Certification Board.

A certificate earned under this plan may be renewed at the 4 5 end of each two-year period upon evidence filed with the State Teacher Certification Board that the holder has earned 8 6 7 semester hours of credit within the period; provided the 8 requirements for the certificate of the same type issued for 9 the teaching position for which the teacher is employed shall 10 be met by the end of the second renewal period. A second 11 provisional certificate shall not be issued. The credits so 12 earned must be approved by the State Board of Education in 13 consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board and must meet the general pattern for a similar type of certificate 14 issued on the basis of credit. No more than 4 semester hours 15 16 shall be chosen from elective subjects.

17 (B) After July 1, 1972, the State Teacher Certification Board may issue a provisional certificate valid for teaching in 18 19 early childhood, elementary, high school or special subject 20 fields, or for providing service as school service personnel or 21 for administering schools subject to the following conditions: 22 A provisional certificate may be issued to a person who meets 23 the requirements for a regular teaching, school service personnel or administrative certificate in another State and 24 25 who presents certified evidence of having earned a bachelor's 26 degree from a recognized institution of higher learning. The

academic and professional courses offered as a basis of the 1 2 provisional certificate shall be courses approved by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher 3 Certification Board. A certificate earned under this plan is 4 5 valid for a period of 2 years and shall not be renewed; 6 however, the individual to whom this certificate is issued 7 shall have passed or shall pass the examinations set forth by the State Board of Education within 9 months of the 8 date <u>of</u> 9 issuance of the provisional certificate. Failure to pass the 10 tests, required in Section 21 1a, shall result in the 11 cancellation of the provisional certificate.

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12 (C) The State Teacher Certification Board may also issue a 13 provisional vocational certificate and a temporary provisional 14 vocational certificate.

15 (1) The requirements for a provisional vocational 16 certificate shall be determined by the State Board of 17 in consultation with the State Teacher Education Certification Board; provided, the following minimum 18 requirements are met: (a) after July 1, 1972, at least 30 19 20 semester hours of credit from a recognized institution of higher learning; and (b) after July 1, 1974, at least 60 21 22 semester hours of credit from a recognized institution of 23 higher learning.

(2) The requirements for a temporary provisional
 vocational certificate shall be determined by the State
 Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher

Certification Board; provided, the following minimum 1 2 requirements are met: (a) after July 1, 1973, at least 3 4,000 hours of work experience in the skill to be certified for teaching; and (b) after July 1, 1975, at least 8,000 4 5 hours of work experience in the skill to be certified for teaching. Any certificate issued under the provisions of 6 7 this paragraph shall expire on June 30 following the date 8 of issue. Renewals may be granted on a yearly basis, but 9 shall not be granted to any person who does not file with 10 the State Teacher Certification Board a transcript showing 11 at least 3 semester hours of credit earned during the 12 previous year in a recognized institution of learning. No 13 such certificate shall be issued except upon certification 14 by the employing board, subject to the approval of the 15 regional superintendent of schools, that no qualified 16 teacher holding a regular certificate or a provisional 17 vocational certificate is available and that actual circumstances and need require such issuance. 18

19 The courses or work experience offered as a basis for the 20 issuance of the provisional vocational certificate or the 21 temporary provisional vocational certificate shall be approved 22 by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State 23 Teacher Certification Board.

(D) Until July 1, 1972, the State Teacher Certification
Board may also issue a provisional foreign language certificate
valid for 4 years for teaching the foreign language named

therein in all grades of the common schools and shall be issued 1 2 to persons who have graduated from a recognized institution of higher learning with not fewer than 120 semester hours of 3 credit and who have met other requirements as determined by the 4 5 State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. If the holder of a provisional foreign 6 7 language certificate is not a citizen of the United States within 6 years of the date of issuance of the original 8 9 certificate, such certificate shall be suspended by the 10 regional superintendent of schools of the region in which the 11 holder is engaged to teach and shall not be reinstated until 12 the holder is a citizen of the United States.

13 (E) Notwithstanding anything in this Act to the contrary, 14 the State Teacher Certification Board shall issue part-time 15 provisional certificates to eligible individuals who are 16 professionals and craftsmen.

The requirements for a part-time provisional teachers certificate shall be determined by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, provided the following minimum requirements are met: 60 semester hours of credit from a recognized institution of higher learning or 4000 hours of work experience in the skill to be certified for teaching.

A part-time provisional certificate may be issued for teaching no more than 2 courses of study for grades 6 through 12.

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1 A part-time provisional teachers certificate shall be 2 valid for 2 years and may be renewed at the end of each 2 year 3 period.

Sec. 21-14. Registration and renewal of certificates.

7 (a) A limited four-year certificate or a certificate issued 8 after July 1, 1955, shall be renewable at its expiration or 9 within 60 days thereafter by the county superintendent of 10 schools having supervision and control over the school where 11 the teacher is teaching upon certified evidence of meeting the 12 requirements for renewal as required by this Act and prescribed by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State 13 14 Teacher Certification Board. An elementary supervisory 15 certificate shall not be renewed at the end of the first 16 four-year period covered by the certificate unless the holder thereof has filed certified evidence with the State Teacher 17 Certification Board that he has a master's degree or that he 18 has earned 8 semester hours of credit in the field of 19 20 educational administration and supervision in a recognized 21 institution of higher learning. The holder shall continue to 22 earn 8 semester hours of credit each four-year period until such time as he has earned a master's degree. 23

All certificates not renewed or registered as herein provided shall lapse after a period of 5 years from the

expiration of the last year of registration. Such certificates 1 2 may be reinstated for a one year period upon payment of all accumulated registration fees. Such reinstated certificates 3 shall only be renewed: (1) by earning 5 semester hours of 4 5 credit in a recognized institution of higher learning in the 6 field of professional education or in courses related to the 7 holder's contractual teaching duties; or (2) by presenting 8 evidence of holding a valid regular certificate of some other 9 type. Any certificate may be voluntarily surrendered by the 10 certificate holder. A voluntarily surrendered certificate 11 shall be treated as a revoked certificate.

12 When those teaching certificates issued before (b) 13 February 15, 2000 are renewed for the first time after February 15, 2000, all such teaching certificates shall be exchanged for 14 15 Standard Teaching Certificates as provided in subsection (c) of 16 Section 21-2. All Initial and Standard Teaching Certificates, 17 including those issued to persons who previously held teaching certificates issued before February 15, 2000, shall be 18 renewable under the conditions set forth in this subsection 19 20 (b).

Initial Teaching Certificates are valid for 4 years of teaching, as provided in subsection (b) of Section 21-2 of this Code, and are renewable every 4 years until the person completes 4 years of teaching. If the holder of an Initial Certificate has completed 4 years of teaching but has not completed the requirements set forth in paragraph (2) of

subsection (c) of Section 21-2 of this Code, then the Initial 1 2 Certificate may be reinstated for one year, during which the requirements must be met. A holder of an Initial Certificate 3 who has not completed 4 years of teaching may continuously 4 5 register the certificate for additional 4-year periods without penalty. Initial Certificates that are not registered shall 6 7 lapse consistent with subsection (a) of this Section and may be 8 reinstated only in accordance with subsection (a). Standard 9 Teaching Certificates are renewable every 5 years as provided in subsection (c) of Section 21-2 and subsection (c) of this 10 11 Section. For purposes of this Section, "teaching" is defined as 12 employment and performance of services in an Illinois public or 13 State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board 14 15 of control, in a certificated teaching position, or a charter 16 school operating in compliance with the Charter Schools Law.

(c) In compliance with subsection (c) of Section 21-2 of this Code, which provides that a Standard Teaching Certificate may be renewed by the State Teacher Certification Board based upon proof of continuing professional development, the State Board of Education and the State Teacher Certification Board shall jointly:

(1) establish a procedure for renewing Standard
Teaching Certificates, which shall include but not be
limited to annual timelines for the renewal process and the
components set forth in subsections (d) through (k) of this

- 1 Section;
- 2

(2) establish the standards for certificate renewal;

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(3) approve or disapprove the providers of continuing professional development activities;

5 (4) determine the maximum credit for each category of 6 continuing professional development activities, based upon 7 recommendations submitted by a continuing professional 8 development activity task force, which shall consist of 6 9 staff members from the State Board of Education, appointed 10 by the State Superintendent of Education, and 6 teacher 11 representatives, 3 of whom are selected by the Illinois 12 Education Association and 3 of whom are selected by the 13 Illinois Federation of Teachers;

14 (5) designate the type and amount of documentation 15 required to show that continuing professional development 16 activities have been completed; and

17 (6) provide, on a timely basis to all Illinois 18 teachers, certificate holders, regional superintendents of 19 schools, school districts, and others with an interest in 20 continuing professional development, information about the 21 standards and requirements established pursuant to this 22 subsection (c).

(d) Any Standard Teaching Certificate held by an individual
 employed and performing services in an Illinois public or
 State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or
 cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board

of control in a certificated teaching position or a charter 1 2 school in compliance with the Charter Schools Law must be maintained Valid and Active through certificate 3 renewal activities specified in the certificate renewal procedure 4 5 established pursuant to subsection (c) of this Section, provided that a holder of a Valid and Active certificate who is 6 7 only employed on either a part-time basis or day-to-day basis 8 substitute teacher shall pay only the as а required 9 registration fee to renew his or her certificate and maintain Standard 10 it. as Valid and Active. All other Teaching 11 Certificates held may be maintained as Valid and Exempt through 12 the registration process provided for in the certificate 13 renewal procedure established pursuant to subsection (c) of 14 this Section. A Valid and Exempt certificate must be 15 immediately activated, through procedures developed jointly by 16 the State Board of Education and the State Teacher 17 Certification Board, upon the certificate holder becoming employed and performing services in an Illinois public or 18 19 State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or 20 cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control in a certificated teaching position or a charter 21 22 school operating in compliance with the Charter Schools Law. A 23 holder of a Valid and Exempt certificate may activate his or her certificate through procedures provided for 24 in the 25 certificate renewal procedure established pursuant to subsection (c) of this Section. 26

(e) (1) A Standard Teaching Certificate that has been 1 2 maintained as Valid and Active for the 5 years of the certificate's validity shall be renewed as Valid and Active 3 upon the certificate holder: (i) completing an advanced degree 4 5 from an approved institution in an education-related field; 6 (ii) completing at least 8 semester hours of coursework as described in subdivision (B) of paragraph (3) of this 7 8 subsection (e); (iii) (blank); earning at least 24 continuing 9 education units as described in subdivision (C) of paragraph 10 (3) of this subsection (e); (iv) completing the National Board 11 for Professional Teaching Standards process as described in 12 subdivision (D) of paragraph (3) of this subsection (e); or (v) 13 earning 120 continuing professional development units ("CPDU") as described in subdivision (E) of paragraph (3) of this 14 15 subsection (e). The maximum continuing professional 16 development units for each continuing professional development 17 activity identified in subdivisions (F) through (J) of paragraph (3) of this subsection (e) shall be 18 jointly determined by the State Board of Education and the State 19 Teacher Certification Board. If, however, the certificate 20 holder has maintained the certificate as Valid and Exempt for a 21 22 portion of the 5-year period of validity, the number of 23 continuing professional development units needed to renew the certificate as Valid and Active shall be proportionately 24 25 reduced by the amount of time the certificate was Valid and Exempt. Furthermore, if a certificate holder is employed and 26

performs teaching services on a part-time basis for all or a 1 2 portion of the certificate's 5-year period of validity, the number of continuing professional development units needed to 3 renew the certificate as Valid and Active shall be reduced by 4 50% for the amount of time the certificate holder has been 5 employed and performed teaching services on a part-time basis. 6 7 Part-time shall be defined as less than 50% of the school day 8 or school term.

9 Notwithstanding any other requirements to the contrary, if 10 a Standard Teaching Certificate has been maintained as Valid 11 and Active for the 5 years of the certificate's validity and 12 the certificate holder has completed his or her certificate 13 renewal plan before July 1, 2002, the certificate shall be 14 renewed as Valid and Active.

(2) Beginning July 1, 2004, in order to satisfy the 15 requirements for continuing professional development provided 16 17 for in subsection (c) of Section 21-2 of this Code, each Valid and Active Standard Teaching Certificate holder shall complete 18 19 professional development activities that address the 20 certificate or those certificates that are required of his or her certificated teaching position, if the certificate holder 21 22 is employed and performing services in an Illinois public or 23 State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board 24 25 of control, or that certificate or those certificates most 26 closely related to his or her teaching position, if the

certificate holder is employed in a charter school. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection (e), the certificate holder's activities must address purposes (A), (B), (C), or (D) and must reflect purpose (E) of the following continuing professional development purposes:

6 (A) Advance both the certificate holder's knowledge 7 and skills as a teacher consistent with the Illinois 8 Professional Teaching Standards and the Illinois Content 9 Area Standards in the certificate holder's areas of 10 certification, endorsement, or teaching assignment in 11 order to keep the certificate holder current in those 12 areas.

(B) Develop the certificate holder's knowledge and
skills in areas determined to be critical for all Illinois
teachers, as defined by the State Board of Education, known
as "State priorities".

17 (C) Address the knowledge, skills, and goals of the 18 certificate holder's local school improvement plan, if the 19 teacher is employed in an Illinois public or State-operated 20 elementary school, secondary school, or cooperative or 21 joint agreement with a governing body or board of control.

22 (D) Expand the certificate holder's knowledge and 23 skills in an additional teaching field or toward the 24 acquisition of another teaching certificate, endorsement, 25 or relevant education degree.

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(E) Address the needs of serving students with

disabilities, including adapting and modifying the general 1 2 curriculum related to the Illinois Learning Standards to meet the needs of students with disabilities and serving 3 such students in the least restrictive environment. 4 5 Teachers who hold certificates endorsed for special education must devote at least 50% of their continuing 6 7 professional development activities to this purpose. 8 Teachers holding other certificates must devote at least 9 20% of their activities to this purpose.

10 A speech-language pathologist or audiologist who is 11 licensed under the Illinois Speech-Language Pathology and 12 Audiology Practice Act and who has met the continuing education requirements of that Act and the rules promulgated under that 13 deemed to have satisfied the continuing 14 shall be Act 15 professional development requirements established by the State 16 Board of Education and the Teacher Certification Board to renew 17 a Standard Certificate.

18 (3) Continuing professional development activities may19 include, but are not limited to, the following activities:

20 (A) completion of an advanced degree from an approved
 21 institution in an education-related field;

(B) at least 8 semester hours of coursework in an
approved education-related program, of which at least 2
semester hours relate to the continuing professional
development purpose set forth in purpose (A) of paragraph

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1 other continuing professional development activities are 2 required;

3 (C) (blank); continuing education units that satisfy the continuing professional development purposes set forth 4 5 in paragraph (2) of this subsection (e), with each 6 continuing education unit equal to 5 clock hours, provided 7 that a plan that includes at least 24 continuing education 8 (or 120 clock/contact hours) need not include units any 9 other continuing professional development activities;

10 (D) completion of the National Board for Professional 11 Teaching Standards ("NBPTS") process for certification or 12 recertification, completion of which means no other 13 continuing professional development activities are 14 required;

15 (E) completion of 120 continuing professional 16 development units that satisfy the continuing professional 17 development purposes set forth in paragraph (2) of this 18 subsection (e) and may include without limitation the 19 activities identified in subdivisions (F) through (J) of 20 this paragraph (3);

(F) collaboration and partnership activities related
to improving the teacher's knowledge and skills as a
teacher, including the following:

(i) participating on collaborative planning and
 professional improvement teams and committees;

(ii) peer review and coaching;

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1 (iii) mentoring in a formal mentoring program, 2 including service as a consulting teacher 3 participating in a remediation process formulated 4 under Section 24A-5 of this Code;

(iv) participating in site-based management or decision making teams, relevant committees, boards, or task forces directly related to school improvement plans;

9 (v) coordinating community resources in schools, 10 if the project is a specific goal of the school 11 improvement plan;

12 (vi) facilitating parent education programs for a 13 school, school district, or regional office of 14 education directly related to student achievement or 15 school improvement plans;

(vii) participating in business, school, or
 community partnerships directly related to student
 achievement or school improvement plans; or

19 (viii) supervising a student teacher or teacher 20 education candidate in clinical supervision, provided 21 that the supervision may only be counted once during 22 the course of 5 years;

23 (G) college or university coursework related to 24 improving the teacher's knowledge and skills as a teacher 25 as follows:

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(i) completing undergraduate or graduate credit

earned from a regionally accredited institution in 1 2 coursework relevant to the certificate area being 3 including coursework that incorporates renewed, induction activities and development of a portfolio of 4 5 both student and teacher work that provides experience 6 in reflective practices, provided the coursework meets Illinois Professional Teaching Standards or Illinois 7 8 Content Area Standards and supports the essential 9 characteristics of quality professional development; 10 or

(ii) teaching college or university courses in areas relevant to the certificate area being renewed, provided that the teaching may only be counted once during the course of 5 years;

15 (H) conferences, workshops, institutes, seminars, and 16 symposiums related to improving the teacher's knowledge 17 and skills as a teacher, subject to disapproval of the 18 activity or event by the State Teacher Certification Board 19 acting jointly with the State Board of Education, including 20 the following:

(i) completing non-university credit directly
related to student achievement, school improvement
plans, or State priorities;

(ii) participating in or presenting at workshops,
seminars, conferences, institutes, and symposiums;
(iii) training as external reviewers for Quality

1 Assurance; or

2 (iv) training as reviewers of university teacher
 3 preparation programs.

A teacher, however, may not receive credit for conferences, 4 5 workshops, institutes, seminars, or symposiums that are designed for entertainment, promotional, or commercial 6 7 purposes or that are solely inspirational or motivational. 8 The State Superintendent of Education and regional 9 superintendents of schools are authorized to review the 10 activities and events provided or to be provided under this 11 subdivision (H) and to investigate complaints regarding 12 those activities and events, and either the State 13 Superintendent of Education or a regional superintendent 14 schools may recommend that the State Teacher of 15 Certification Board and the State Board of Education 16 jointly disapprove those activities and events considered 17 to be inconsistent with this subdivision (H);

(iii) participating on external or internal school
 or school district review teams;

(iv) publishing educational articles, columns, or books relevant to the certificate area being renewed; or

7 (v) participating in non-strike related
8 professional association or labor organization service
9 or activities related to professional development;

10 (K) receipt of a subsequent Illinois certificate or 11 endorsement pursuant to this Article; or

12 (L) completion of requirements for meeting the 13 Illinois criteria for becoming "highly qualified" (for 14 purposes of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Public 15 Law 107-110) in an additional teaching area;-

16 successful completion of 4 semester hours of (M) 17 graduate-level coursework on the assessment of one's own Illinois 18 performance in relation to the Teaching 19 Standards, as described in clause (B) of paragraph (2) of 20 subsection (c) of Section 21-2 of this Code; or -

(N) successful completion of a minimum of 4 semester
hours of graduate-level coursework addressing preparation
to meet the requirements for certification by the National
Board for Professional Teaching Standards, as described in
clause (C) of paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section
21-2 of this Code.

(4) A person must complete the requirements of this 1 2 subsection (e) before the expiration of his or her Standard Teaching Certificate and must submit assurance to the regional 3 superintendent of schools or, if applicable, a 4 local 5 professional development committee authorized by the regional 6 superintendent to submit recommendations to him or her for this 7 purpose. The statement of assurance shall contain a list of the activities completed, the provider offering each activity, the 8 9 number of credits earned for each activity, and the purposes to 10 which each activity is attributed. The certificate holder shall 11 maintain the evidence of completion of each activity for at 12 least one certificate renewal cycle. The certificate holder 13 shall affirm under penalty of perjury that he or she has completed the activities listed and will maintain the required 14 evidence of completion. The State Board of Education or the 15 16 regional superintendent of schools for each region shall 17 conduct random audits of assurance statements and supporting 18 documentation.

21 (f) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Code, a 22 school district is authorized to enter into an agreement with 23 the exclusive bargaining representative, if any, to form a 24 local professional development committee (LPDC). The membership and terms of members of the LPDC may be determined 25 26 by the agreement. Provisions regarding LPDCs contained in a

collective bargaining agreement in existence on the effective 1 2 date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly 3 between a school district and the exclusive bargaining representative shall remain in full force and effect for the 4 term of the agreement, unless terminated by mutual agreement. 5 6 The LPDC shall make recommendations to the regional 7 superintendent of schools on renewal of teaching certificates. 8 The regional superintendent of schools for each region shall 9 perform the following functions:

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Each regional superintendent of schools shall 1 (q)(1) 2 review and concur or nonconcur with each recommendation for renewal or nonrenewal of a Standard Teaching Certificate he or 3 she receives from a local professional development committee, 4 5 if any, or, if a certificate holder appeals the recommendation to the regional professional development review committee, the 6 recommendation for renewal or nonrenewal he or she receives 7 from a regional professional development review committee and, 8 9 within 14 days of receipt of the recommendation, shall provide the State Teacher Certification Board with verification of the 10 11 following, if applicable:

12 certificate holder (A) the has satisfactorily development 13 completed professional and continuing 14 education activities set forth in paragraph (3) of 15 subsection (e) of this Section;

(B) the certificate holder has submitted the statement
of assurance required under paragraph (4) of subsection (e)

20 (C) the local professional development committee, if 21 any, has recommended the renewal of the certificate 22 holder's Standard Teaching Certificate and forwarded the 23 recommendation to the regional superintendent of schools;

24 (D) the certificate holder has appealed his or her 25 local professional development committee's recommendation 26 of nonrenewal, if any, to the regional professional

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development review committee and the result of that appeal; 1 2 (E) the regional superintendent of schools has 3 concurred or nonconcurred with the local professional development committee's or regional professional 5 development review committee's recommendation, if any, to renew or nonrenew the certificate holder's 6 Standard 7 Teaching Certificate and made a recommendation to that 8 effect; and

9 (F) the established registration fee for the Standard 10 Teaching Certificate has been paid.

11 If the notice required by this subsection (g) includes a 12 recommendation of certificate nonrenewal, then, at the same time the regional superintendent of schools provides the State 13 14 Teacher Certification Board with the notice, he or she shall 15 also notify the certificate holder in writing, by certified mail, return receipt requested, that this notice has been 16 17 provided to the State Teacher Certification Board.

(2) Each certificate holder shall have the right to appeal 18 19 his her local professional development committee's or 20 recommendation of nonrenewal, if any, to the regional professional development review committee, within 14 days of 21 22 receipt of notice that the recommendation has been sent to the 23 superintendent of schools. regional Each regional 24 superintendent of schools shall establish а regional 25 professional development review committee or committees for 26 the purpose of advising the regional superintendent of schools,

upon request, and handling certificate holder appeals. This 1 2 committee shall consist of at least 4 classroom teachers, one non-administrative certificated educational 3 employee, 2 administrators, and one at-large member who shall be either (i) 4 5 a parent, (ii) a member of the business community, (iii) a community member, or (iv) an administrator, with preference 6 7 given to an individual chosen from among those persons listed 8 in items (i), (ii), and (iii) in order to secure representation 9 of an interest not already represented on the committee. The 10 teacher and non-administrative certificated educational 11 employee members of the review committee shall be selected by 12 their exclusive representative, if any, and the administrators 13 and at-large member shall be selected by the regional 14 superintendent of schools. A regional superintendent of 15 schools may add additional members to the committee, provided 16 that the same proportion of teachers to administrators and 17 at-large members on the committee is maintained. Any additional non-administrative certificated educational 18 teacher and employee members 19 shall be selected by their exclusive 20 representative, if any. Vacancies in positions on a regional professional development review committee shall be filled in 21 22 the same manner as the original selections. Committee members 23 shall serve staggered 3-year terms. All individuals selected to 24 serve on regional professional development review committees 25 must be known to demonstrate the best practices in teaching or 26 their respective field of practice.

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(h) (1) The State Teacher Certification Board shall review 1 2 the regional superintendent of schools' recommendations to renew or nonrenew Standard Teaching Certificates and notify 3 certificate holders in writing whether their certificates have 4 5 been renewed or nonrenewed within 90 days of receipt of the recommendations, unless a certificate holder has appealed a 6 superintendent of schools' recommendation 7 regional of 8 nonrenewal, as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection 9 (h). The State Teacher Certification Board shall verify that 10 the certificate holder has met the renewal criteria set forth 11 in paragraph (1) of subsection (g) of this Section.

12 (2) Each certificate holder shall have the right to appeal 13 regional superintendent of school's recommendation to а 14 nonrenew his or her Standard Teaching Certificate to the State Teacher Certification Board, within 14 days of receipt of 15 16 notice that the decision has been sent to the State Teacher 17 Certification Board, which shall hold an appeal hearing within 60 days of receipt of the appeal. When such an appeal is taken, 18 the certificate holder's Standard Teaching Certificate shall 19 20 continue to be valid until the appeal is finally determined. The State Teacher Certification Board shall review the regional 21 22 superintendent of school's recommendation, regional the 23 professional development review committee's recommendation, if and the local professional development committee's 24 anv, 25 recommendation, if any, and all relevant documentation to 26 verify whether the certificate holder has met the renewal

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criteria set forth in paragraph (1) of subsection (q) of this 1 2 Section. The State Teacher Certification Board may request that the certificate holder appear before it. All actions taken by 3 the State Teacher Certification Board shall require a quorum 4 5 and be by a simple majority of those present and voting. A record of all votes shall be maintained. The State Teacher 6 7 Certification Board shall notify the certificate holder in 8 writing, within 7 days of completing the review, whether his or 9 Standard Teaching Certificate has been renewed or her 10 nonrenewed, provided that if the State Teacher Certification 11 Board determines to nonrenew a certificate, the written notice 12 provided to the certificate holder shall be by certified mail, 13 requested. All certificate return receipt renewal or nonrenewal decisions of the State Teacher Certification Board 14 15 are final and subject to administrative review, as set forth in 16 Section 21-24 of this Code.

(i) Holders of Master Teaching Certificates shall meet the same requirements and follow the same procedures as holders of Standard Teaching Certificates, except that their renewal cycle shall be as set forth in subsection (d) of Section 21-2 of this Code and their renewal requirements shall be subject to paragraph (8) of subsection (c) of Section 21-2 of this Code.

23 holder of a teaching certificate endorsed А as а 24 speech-language pathologist who has been granted the 25 Certificate of Clinical Competence by the American 26 Speech-Language Hearing Association may renew his or her

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Standard Teaching Certificate pursuant to the 10-year renewal
 cycle set forth in subsection (d) of Section 21-2 of this Code.

3 Holders of Valid and Exempt Standard and Master (j) Teaching Certificates who are not employed and performing 4 5 services in an Illinois public or State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or cooperative or joint agreement 6 7 with a governing body or board of control, in a certificated 8 teaching position, may voluntarily activate their certificates 9 through the regional superintendent of schools of the regional 10 office of education for the geographic area where their 11 teaching is done. These certificate holders shall follow the 12 same renewal criteria and procedures as all other Standard and 13 Master Teaching Certificate holders, except that their 14 continuing professional development activities need not 15 reflect or address the knowledge, skills, and goals of a local 16 school improvement plan.

(m) The changes made to this Section by this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly that affect renewal of Standard and Master Certificates shall apply to those persons who hold Standard or Master Certificates on or after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly and shall be given effect upon renewal of those certificates.
