Amends the Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive Health Education Act. Makes a technical change in a Section concerning a comprehensive health education program.

1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive
 Health Education Act is amended by changing Section 3 as
 follows:
- 7 (105 ILCS 110/3) (from Ch. 122, par. 863)
- 8 Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. The The 9 program established under this Act shall include, but not be limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis 10 for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this 11 12 State: human ecology and health, human growth and development, the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic and 13 14 social responsibilities of family life, including sexual abstinence until marriage, prevention and control of disease, 15 16 including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, transmission and spread of AIDS, public and environmental 17 health, consumer health, safety education and disaster 18 19 survival, mental health and illness, personal health habits, 20 alcohol, drug use, and abuse including the medical and legal 21 ramifications of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during 22 sexual abstinence until pregnancy, marriage, tobacco, nutrition, and dental health. The program shall also provide 23

course material and instruction to advise pupils of Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act. Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the following areas may also be included as a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first aid (including, but not limited to, cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), early prevention and detection of cancer, heart disease, diabetes, stroke, and the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide. The school board of each public elementary and secondary school in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly life-saving techniques, administer including limitation the Heimlich maneuver and rescue breathing. The training shall be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or nationally recognized certifying organization. A school board may use the services of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise in life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school personnel in these techniques. Each school board is encouraged to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, at least one person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by another qualified certifying agency, qualified to administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In addition, each school board is authorized to allocate appropriate portions of its institute or inservice 1

days to conduct training programs for teachers and other school personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming qualified administer emergency first aid or cardiopulmonary resuscitation. School boards are urged to encourage their teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic other extracurricular school activities to and acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards and requirements established by the American Red Cross or another qualified certifying agency. No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any class or course on AIDS or family life instruction if his parent or quardian submits written objection thereto, and refusal to take or participate in the course or program shall not be reason for suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

Curricula developed under programs established in accordance with this Act in the major educational area of alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall be integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of Education shall develop and make available to all elementary and secondary schools in this State instructional materials and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating the

- 1 instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, school
- 2 districts may offer, as part of existing curricula during the
- 3 school day or as part of an after school program, support
- 4 services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose parent,
- 5 parents, or guardians are chemically dependent.
