

96TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2009 and 2010 HB2437

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

20 ILCS 405/405-216 new 105 ILCS 140/5 105 ILCS 140/15

Amends the Department of Central Management Services Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois. Provides that the Department must require every State-owned building to establish a green cleaning policy whereby the building buys and uses only environmentally-sensitive cleaning products. Authorizes a State-owned building to deplete its existing cleaning and maintenance supply stocks and to implement the requirements in the procurement cycle for the following year. Exempts a State-owned building from meeting the requirement if adhering to the requirement would not be economically feasible for the building. Amends the Green Cleaning Schools Act. Makes changes to a provision concerning legislative findings. Requires certain entities to establish and annually amend guidelines and specifications for the use of environmentally-sensitive cleaning and maintenance products in State-owned buildings and school facilities (now, just "school facilities"). Effective immediately.

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1 AN ACT concerning State government.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Department of Central Management Services
 Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois is amended by
 adding Section 405-216 as follows:
- 7 (20 ILCS 405/405-216 new)
- Sec. 405-216. Green cleaning policy. To require every 8 9 State-owned building to establish a green cleaning policy 10 whereby the building purchases and uses environmentally-sensitive cleaning products, in compliance 11 12 with the guidelines and specifications established by the Illinois Green Government Coordinating Council pursuant to 13 14 Section 15 of the Green Cleaning Schools Act. The Department shall allow a State-owned building to deplete its existing 15 16 cleaning and maintenance supply stocks and implement the new 17 requirements in the procurement cycle for the following year and shall exempt a State-owned building from the green cleaning 18 19 policy requirement if adhering to the requirement would not be 20 economically feasible for the building.
 - For the purposes of this Section, adopting a green cleaning policy is not economically feasible if such adoption would result in an increase in the cleaning costs of the building.

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Section 10. The Green Cleaning Schools Act is amended by changing Sections 5 and 15 as follows:

3 (105 ILCS 140/5)

Sec. 5. Legislative findings. Both children and adults Children are vulnerable to and may be severely affected by hazardous to chemicals, waste, exposure and environmental hazards. The Federal Environmental Protection Agency estimates that human exposure to indoor air pollutants can be 2 to 5 times and up to 100 times higher than outdoor levels. Children, workers, teachers, janitors, and other staff members spend a significant amount of time inside school and other institutional buildings and are continuously exposed to chemicals from cleaners, waxes, deodorizers, and maintenance products.

Sec. 15. Green cleaning supply guidelines and specifications. The Illinois Green Government Coordinating Council (IGGCC) shall, in consultation with the Department of Public Health, the State Board of Education, regional offices of education, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, and a panel of interested stakeholders, including cleaning product industry representatives, non-governmental

- organizations, and others, establish and amend on an annual 1 quidelines 2 basis and specifications for environmentally-sensitive cleaning and maintenance products 3 for use in school facilities as well as State-owned buildings 5 under Section 405-216 of the Department of Central Management Services Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois. The 6 7 IGGCC shall provide multiple avenues by which cleaning products may be determined to be environmentally-sensitive under the 8 9 quidelines. Guidelines and specifications must be established 10 after a review and evaluation of existing research and must be 11 completed no later than 180 days after the effective date of 12 this Act. Guidelines specifications include and may 13 implementation practices, including inspection. The completed guidelines and specifications must be posted on the IGGCC's 14 15 Internet website. 16 (Source: P.A. 95-84, eff. 8-13-07.)
- 17 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.
