

97TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2011 and 2012 HB1540

Introduced 2/15/2011, by Rep. Daniel V. Beiser

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

10 ILCS 5/4-50 10 ILCS 5/5-50 10 ILCS 5/6-100

Amends the Election Code. Provides that nursing homes shall be designated as grace period registration sites for nursing home residents. In counties with less than 500,000 inhabitants, provides that nursing homes shall be designated as grace period registration sites for nursing home residents and employees. Provides that nursing home residents who register or change their address during the grace period shall be permitted to vote during the regular nursing home voting period and shall not be required to have submitted an absentee ballot request in advance. Effective immediately.

FISCAL NOTE ACT MAY APPLY

1 AN ACT concerning elections.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Election Code is amended by changing Sections 4-50, 5-50, and 6-100 as follows:
- 6 (10 ILCS 5/4-50)

7 4-50. Grace period. Notwithstanding any 8 provision of this Code to the contrary, each election authority 9 shall establish procedures for the registration of voters and 10 for change of address during the period from the close of registration for a primary or election and until the 7th day 11 before the primary or election. During this grace period, an 12 unregistered qualified elector may register to vote, and a 13 14 registered voter may submit a change of address form, in person in the office of the election authority or at a voter 15 16 registration location specifically designated for this purpose 17 by the election authority. The election authority shall register that individual, or change a registered voter's 18 19 address, in the same manner as otherwise provided by this 20 Article for registration and change of address. To provide 21 nursing home residents an equal opportunity to exercise their 22 right to vote, each nursing home shall be designated a grace period registration site solely for purposes of registering and 23

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completing address changes for residents and employees of that nursing home. A deputy registrar employed by each nursing home shall be designated to conduct all grace period registrations and address changes for that nursing home in the absence of an employee of the election authority. Upon completion of a grace period registration or address change, the deputy registrar shall deliver to the election authority within 24 hours all completed forms, and the election authority receiving the forms shall add the names of residents who have completed the forms to the list of residents entitled to vote during the regular nursing home voting period.

If a voter who registers or changes address during this grace period wishes to vote at the first election or primary occurring after the grace period, he or she must do so by grace period voting, either in person in the office of the election authority or at a location specifically designated for this purpose by the election authority, or by mail, at the discretion of the election authority. Grace period voting shall be in a manner substantially similar to voting under Article 19. Nursing home residents who register or change their address during the grace period shall be permitted to vote during the regular nursing home voting period and shall not be required to have submitted an absentee ballot request in advance.

Within one day after a voter casts a grace period ballot, the election authority shall transmit the voter's name, street address, and precinct, ward, township, and district numbers, as

the case may be, to the State Board of Elections, which shall
maintain those names and that information in an electronic
format on its website, arranged by county and accessible to
State and local political committees. The name of each person
issued a grace period ballot shall also be placed on the
appropriate precinct list of persons to whom absentee and early
