### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/21-2 105 ILCS 5/21B-20 from Ch. 122, par. 21-2

Amends the Certification of Teachers Article and the Educator Licensure Article of the School Code. Authorizes the waiver of the student teaching requirement if the person seeking certification or licensure presents evidence of 100 hours or more of successful teaching experience on a valid substitute certificate or valid substitute teaching license. Effective immediately.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections
21-2 and 21B-20 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/21-2) (from Ch. 122, par. 21-2)

7 (Section scheduled to be repealed on June 30, 2013)

8 Sec. 21-2. Grades of certificates.

9 (a) All certificates issued under this Article shall be State certificates valid in every school district coming under 10 the provisions of this Act and shall be limited in time and 11 designated as follows: Provisional vocational certificate, 12 temporary provisional vocational certificate, early childhood 13 14 certificate, elementary school certificate, special certificate, secondary certificate, school service personnel 15 16 certificate, administrative certificate, provisional 17 certificate, and substitute certificate. The requirement of student teaching under close and competent supervision for 18 obtaining a teaching certificate may be waived by the State 19 20 Teacher Certification Board upon presentation to the Board by 21 the teacher of evidence of one year or more of successful 22 teaching experience on a valid certificate and graduation from a recognized institution of higher learning with a bachelor's 23

1 degree or higher. <u>The requirement of student teaching under</u> 2 <u>close and competent supervision for obtaining a teaching</u> 3 <u>certificate shall be waived by the State Teacher Certification</u> 4 <u>Board upon presentation to the Board by the teacher of evidence</u> 5 <u>of 100 hours or more of successful teaching experience on a</u> 6 valid substitute certificate.

(b) Initial Teaching Certificate. Persons who (1) have 7 8 completed an approved teacher preparation program, (2) are 9 recommended by an approved teacher preparation program, (3) 10 have successfully completed the Initial Teaching Certification 11 examinations required by the State Board of Education, and (4) 12 have met all other criteria established by the State Board of 13 Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, shall be issued an Initial Teaching Certificate valid 14 for 4 years of teaching, as defined in Section 21-14 of this 15 16 Code. Initial Teaching Certificates shall be issued for 17 categories corresponding to Early Childhood, Elementary, Secondary, and Special K-12, with special certification 18 designations for Special Education, Bilingual Education, 19 20 fundamental learning areas (including Language Arts, Reading, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Physical Development and 21 22 Health, Fine Arts, and Foreign Language), and other areas 23 designated by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. Notwithstanding 24 25 any other provision of this Article, an Initial Teaching 26 Certificate shall be automatically extended for one year for 1 all persons who (i) have been issued an Initial Teaching 2 Certificate that expires on June 30, 2004 and (ii) have not 3 met, prior to July 1, 2004, the Standard Certificate 4 requirements under paragraph (c) of this Section. An 5 application and fee shall not be required for this extension.

6 (b-5) A person who holds an out-of-state certificate and 7 who is otherwise eligible for a comparable Illinois certificate may be issued an Initial Certificate if that person has not 8 9 completed 4 years of teaching. Upon completion of 4 years of 10 teaching, the person is eligible for a Standard Certificate. 11 Beginning July 1, 2004, an out-of-state candidate who has 12 already earned a second-tier certificate in another state is 13 any Standard Certificate not subject to eligibility 14 requirements stated in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of this 15 Section other than completion of the 4 years of teaching. An 16 out-of-state candidate who has completed less than 4 years of 17 teaching and does not hold a second-tier certificate from another state must meet the requirements stated in paragraph 18 19 (2) of subsection (c) of this Section, proportionately reduced 20 by the amount of time remaining to complete the 4 years of teaching. 21

(c) Standard Certificate.

(1) Persons who (i) have completed 4 years of teaching, as
defined in Section 21-14 of this Code, with an Initial
Certificate or an Initial Alternative Teaching Certificate and
have met all other criteria established by the State Board of

1 Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification 2 Board, (ii) have completed 4 years of teaching on a valid equivalent certificate in another State or territory of the 3 United States, or have completed 4 years of teaching in a 4 5 nonpublic Illinois elementary or secondary school with an 6 Initial Certificate or an Initial Alternative Teaching 7 Certificate, and have met all other criteria established by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 8 9 Teacher Certification Board, or (iii) were issued teaching certificates prior to February 15, 2000 and are renewing those 10 certificates after February 15, 2000, shall be issued a 11 12 Standard Certificate valid for 5 years, which may be renewed 13 thereafter every 5 years by the State Teacher Certification 14 Board based on proof of continuing education or professional 15 development. Beginning July 1, 2003, persons who have completed 4 years of teaching, as described in clauses (i) and (ii) of 16 17 paragraph (1), have successfully completed this the requirements of paragraphs (2) through (4) of this subsection 18 (c), and have met all other criteria established by the State 19 Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher 20 Certification Board, shall be issued Standard Certificates. 21 22 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Section, 23 beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold valid out-of-state certificates and have completed 4 years of teaching on a valid 24 equivalent certificate in another State or territory of the 25 26 United States shall be issued comparable Standard

Certificates. Beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold valid 1 2 out-of-state certificates as described in subsection (b-5) of 3 this Section are subject to the requirements of paragraphs (2) through (4) of this subsection (c), as required in subsection 4 5 (b-5) of this Section, in order to receive a Standard Certificate. Standard Certificates 6 shall be issued for 7 categories corresponding to Early Childhood, Elementary, 8 Secondary, and Special K-12, with special certification 9 designations for Special Education, Bilingual Education, 10 fundamental learning areas (including Language Arts, Reading, 11 Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Physical Development and 12 Health, Fine Arts, and Foreign Language), and other areas 13 designated by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. 14

15 (2) This paragraph (2) applies only to those persons 16 required to successfully complete the requirements of this 17 paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). In order 18 to receive a Standard Teaching Certificate, a person must 19 satisfy one of the following requirements:

20 (A) Completion of a program of induction and mentoring 21 for new teachers that is based upon a specific plan 22 approved by the State Board of Education, in consultation 23 with the State Teacher Certification Board. Nothing in this 24 Section, however, prohibits an induction or mentoring 25 program from operating prior to approval. Holders of 26 Initial Certificates issued before September 1, 2007 must complete, at a minimum, an approved one-year induction and mentoring program. Holders of Initial Certificates issued on or after September 1, 2007 must complete an approved 2-year induction and mentoring program. The plan must describe the role of mentor teachers, the criteria and process for their selection, and how all the following components are to be provided:

8 (i) Assignment of a formally trained mentor 9 teacher to each new teacher for a specified period of 10 time, which shall be established by the employing 11 school or school district, provided that a mentor 12 teacher may not directly or indirectly participate in 13 the evaluation of a new teacher pursuant to Article 24A 14 of this Code or the evaluation procedure of the school.

15

(ii) Formal mentoring for each new teacher.

16 (iii) Support for each new teacher in relation to
17 the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards, the
18 content-area standards applicable to the new teacher's
19 area of certification, and any applicable local school
20 improvement and professional development plans.

21 (iv) Professional development specifically
22 designed to foster the growth of each new teacher's
23 knowledge and skills.

(v) Formative assessment that is based on the
 Illinois Professional Teaching Standards and designed
 to provide feedback to the new teacher and

1 opportunities for reflection on his or her 2 performance, which must not be used directly or 3 indirectly in any evaluation of a new teacher pursuant to Article 24A of this Code or the evaluation procedure 4 5 of the school and which must include the activities specified in clauses (B)(i), (B)(ii), and (B)(iii) of 6 7 this paragraph (2).

8 (vi) Assignment of responsibility for coordination 9 of the induction and mentoring program within each 10 school district participating in the program.

11 (B) Successful completion of 4 semester hours of 12 graduate-level coursework on the assessment of one's own 13 performance in relation to the Illinois Professional 14 Teaching Standards. The coursework must be approved by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 15 16 Teacher Certification Board; must be offered either by an 17 institution of higher education, by such an institution in partnership with a teachers' association or union or with a 18 19 regional office of education, or by another entity 20 authorized to issue college credit; and must include demonstration of performance through all of the following 21 22 activities for each of the Illinois Professional Teaching 23 Standards:

(i) Observation, by the course instructor or
 another experienced teacher, of the new teacher's
 classroom practice (the observation may be recorded

for later viewing) for the purpose of identifying and 1 2 describing how the new teacher made content meaningful for students; how the teacher motivated individuals 3 and the group and created an environment conducive to 4 5 positive social interactions, active learning, and 6 self-motivation; what instructional strategies the 7 teacher used to encourage students' development of 8 critical thinking, problem solving, and performance; 9 how the teacher communicated using written, verbal, 10 nonverbal, and visual communication techniques; and 11 how the teacher maintained standards of professional 12 conduct and provided leadership to improve students' 13 learning.

14 (ii) Review and analysis, by the course instructor 15 or another experienced teacher, of written 16 documentation (i.e., lesson plans, assignments, 17 assessment instruments, and samples of students' work) prepared by the new teacher for at least 2 lessons. The 18 19 documentation must provide evidence of classroom 20 performance related to Illinois Professional Teaching Standards 1 through 9, with an emphasis on how the 21 22 teacher used his or her understanding of students, 23 assessment data, and subject matter to decide on 24 learning goals; how the teacher designed or selected 25 activities and instructional materials and aligned 26 instruction to the relevant Illinois Learning 1 Standards; how the teacher adapted or modified 2 curriculum to meet individual students' needs; and how 3 the teacher sequenced instruction and designed or 4 selected student assessment strategies.

5 (iii) Demonstration of professional expertise on 6 the part of the new teacher in reflecting on his or her 7 practice, which was observed under clause (B)(i) of 8 this paragraph (2) and documented under clause (B)(ii) 9 of this paragraph (2), in terms of teaching strengths, 10 weaknesses, and implications for improvement according 11 to the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards.

12 (C) Successful completion of a minimum of 4 semester hours of graduate-level coursework addressing preparation 13 14 to meet the requirements for certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS). The 15 16 coursework must be approved by the State Board of 17 Education, in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, and must be offered either by an 18 19 institution of higher education, by such an institution in 20 partnership with a teachers' association or union or with a 21 regional office of education, or by another entity 22 authorized to issue college credit. The course must address 23 5 NBPTS Core Propositions and relevant standards the 24 through such means as the following:

(i) Observation, by the course instructor or
 another experienced teacher, of the new teacher's

classroom practice (the observation may be recorded 1 for later viewing) for the purpose of identifying and 2 3 describing how the new teacher made content meaningful for students; how the teacher motivated individuals 4 and the group and created an environment conducive to 5 6 positive social interactions, active learning, and 7 self-motivation; what instructional strategies the 8 teacher used to encourage students' development of 9 critical thinking, problem solving, and performance; 10 how the teacher communicated using written, verbal, 11 nonverbal, and visual communication techniques; and 12 how the teacher maintained standards of professional 13 conduct and provided leadership to improve students' 14 learning.

15 (ii) Review and analysis, by the course instructor 16 another experienced teacher, of written or 17 (i.e., lesson documentation plans, assignments, assessment instruments, and samples of students' work) 18 prepared by the new teacher for at least 2 lessons. The 19 20 documentation must provide evidence of classroom 21 performance, including how the teacher used his or her 22 understanding of students, assessment data, and 23 subject matter to decide on learning goals; how the 24 teacher designed or selected activities and 25 instructional materials and aligned instruction to the 26 relevant Illinois Learning Standards; how the teacher

adapted or modified curriculum to meet individual students' needs; and how the teacher sequenced instruction and designed or selected student assessment strategies.

5 (iii) Demonstration of professional expertise on 6 the part of the new teacher in reflecting on his or her 7 practice, which was observed under clause (C)(i) of 8 this paragraph (2) and documented under clause (C)(ii) 9 of this paragraph (2), in terms of teaching strengths, 10 weaknesses, and implications for improvement.

11 (C-5) Satisfactory completion of a minimum of 12 12 semester hours of graduate credit towards an advanced 13 degree in an education-related field from an accredited 14 institution of higher education.

15 (D) Receipt of an advanced degree from an accredited 16 institution of higher education in an education-related 17 field that is earned by a person either while he or she 18 holds an Initial Teaching Certificate or prior to his or 19 her receipt of that certificate.

20 (E) Accumulation of 60 continuing professional development units (CPDUs), earned by completing selected 21 22 activities that comply with paragraphs (3) and (4) of this 23 subsection (c). However, for an individual who holds an Initial Teaching Certificate on the effective date of this 24 25 amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, the number of 26 CPDUs shall be reduced to reflect the teaching time

remaining on the Initial Teaching Certificate.

2 (F) Completion of a nationally normed, 3 performance-based assessment, if made available by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State 4 5 Teacher Certification Board, provided that the cost to the person shall not exceed the cost of the coursework 6 7 described in clause (B) of this paragraph (2).

8 (G) Completion of requirements for meeting the 9 Illinois criteria for becoming "highly qualified" (for 10 purposes of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Public 11 Law 107-110) in an additional teaching area.

(H) Receipt of a minimum 12-hour, post-baccalaureate, education-related professional development certificate issued by an Illinois institution of higher education and developed in accordance with rules adopted by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board.

18 (I) Completion of the National Board for Professional
19 Teaching Standards (NBPTS) process.

(J) Receipt of a subsequent Illinois certificate or
 endorsement pursuant to Article 21 of this Code.

(3) This paragraph (3) applies only to those persons
required to successfully complete the requirements of this
paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). Persons
who seek to satisfy the requirements of clause (E) of paragraph
(2) of this subsection (c) through accumulation of CPDUs may

earn credit through completion of coursework, workshops, 1 seminars, conferences, and other similar training events that 2 3 pre-approved by the State Board of Education, are in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board, for 4 5 the purpose of reflection on teaching practices in order to address all of the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards 6 necessary to obtain a Standard Teaching Certificate. These 7 activities must meet all of the following requirements: 8

9 (A) Each activity must be designed to advance a 10 person's knowledge and skills in relation to one or more of 11 the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards or in 12 relation to the content-area standards applicable to the 13 teacher's field of certification.

(B) Taken together, the activities completed must
address each of the Illinois Professional Teaching
Standards as provided in clauses (B)(i), (B)(ii), and
(B)(iii) of paragraph (2) of this subsection (c).

18 (C) Each activity must be provided by an entity 19 approved by the State Board of Education, in consultation 20 with the State Teacher Certification Board, for this 21 purpose.

22 (D) Each activity, integral to its successful 23 completion, must require participants to demonstrate the 24 degree to which they have acquired new knowledge or skills, 25 such as through performance, through preparation of a 26 written product, through assembling samples of students'

or teachers' work, or by some other means that is appropriate to the subject matter of the activity.

3 (E) One CPDU shall be available for each hour of direct 4 participation by a holder of an Initial Teaching 5 Certificate in a qualifying activity. An activity may be 6 attributed to more than one of the Illinois Professional 7 Teaching Standards, but credit for any activity shall be 8 counted only once.

9 This paragraph (4) applies only to those persons (4) 10 required to successfully complete the requirements of this 11 paragraph under paragraph (1) of this subsection (c). Persons 12 who seek to satisfy the requirements of clause (E) of paragraph 13 (2) of this subsection (c) through accumulation of CPDUs may earn credit from the following, provided that each activity is 14 15 designed to advance a person's knowledge and skills in relation 16 to one or more of the Illinois Professional Teaching Standards 17 or in relation to the content-area standards applicable to the person's field or fields of certification: 18

(A) Collaboration and partnership activities related
to improving a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher,
including all of the following:

(ii) Mentoring in a formal mentoring program,

4 (iv) Participating in business, school, or

7 (B) Teaching college or university courses in areas 8 relevant to a teacher's field of certification, provided 9 that the teaching may only be counted once during the 10 course of 4 years.

(C) Conferences, workshops, institutes, seminars, and symposiums related to improving a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher, including all of the following:

14 (i) Completing non-university credit directly 15 related to student achievement, the Illinois 16 Professional Teaching Standards, or content-area 17 standards.

(ii) Participating in or presenting at workshops,
 seminars, conferences, institutes, and symposiums.

(iii) (Blank).

21 (iv) Training as reviewers of university teacher22 preparation programs.

23 An activity listed in this clause (C) is creditable 24 only if its provider is approved for this purpose by the 25 State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 26 Teacher Certification Board.

(D) Other educational experiences related to improving 1 2 a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher, including all of the following: 3 (i) Participating in action research and inquiry 4 5 projects. (ii) Observing programs or teaching in schools, 6 related businesses, or industry that is systematic, 7 purposeful, and relevant to a teacher's field of 8 9 certification. 10 (iii) Participating in study groups related to 11 student achievement, the Illinois Professional 12 Teaching Standards, or content-area standards. 13 (iv) Participating in work/learn programs or 14 internships. 15 (v) Developing a portfolio of students' and 16 teacher's work. 17 (E) Professional leadership experiences related to improving a person's knowledge and skills as a teacher, 18 19 including all of the following: 20 (i) Participating in curriculum development or assessment activities at the school, school district, 21 22 regional office of education, State, or national level. 23 Participating in team (ii) or department leadership in a school or school district. 24 25 (iii) (Blank). 26 (iv) Publishing educational articles, columns, or

books relevant to a teacher's field of certification.

3 4 (v) Participating in non-strike related activities of a professional association or labor organization that are related to professional development.

5 (5) A person must complete the requirements of this 6 subsection (c) before the expiration of his or her Initial 7 Teaching Certificate and must submit assurance of having done 8 so to the regional superintendent of schools or a local 9 professional development committee authorized by the regional 10 superintendent to submit recommendations to him or her for this 11 purpose.

12 Within 30 days after receipt, the regional superintendent 13 of schools shall review the assurance of completion submitted by a person and, based upon compliance with all of the 14 requirements for receipt of a Standard Teaching Certificate, 15 16 shall forward to the State Board of Education a recommendation 17 for issuance of the Standard Certificate or non-issuance. The regional superintendent of schools shall notify the affected 18 person if the recommendation is for non-issuance of the 19 20 Standard Certificate. A person who is considered not to be eligible for a Standard Certificate and who has received the 21 22 notice of non-issuance may appeal this determination to the 23 Regional Professional Development Review Committee (RPDRC). 24 The recommendation of the regional superintendent and the RPDRC, along with all supporting materials, must then be 25 26 forwarded to the State Board of Education for a final

1 determination.

2 Upon review of a regional superintendent of school's 3 recommendations, the State Board of Education shall issue 4 Standard Teaching Certificates to those who qualify and shall 5 notify a person, in writing, of a decision denying a Standard 6 Teaching Certificate. Any decision denying issuance of a 7 Standard Teaching Certificate to a person may be appealed to 8 the State Teacher Certification Board.

9 (6) The State Board of Education, in consultation with the 10 State Teacher Certification Board, may adopt rules to implement 11 this subsection (c) and may periodically evaluate any of the 12 methods of qualifying for a Standard Teaching Certificate 13 described in this subsection (c).

14 (7) The changes made to paragraphs (1) through (5) of this 15 subsection (c) by this amendatory Act of the 93rd General 16 Assembly shall apply to those persons who hold or are eligible 17 to hold an Initial Certificate on or after the effective date 18 of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly and shall 19 be given effect upon their application for a Standard 20 Certificate.

(8) Beginning July 1, 2004, persons who hold a Standard Certificate and have acquired one master's degree in an education-related field are eligible for certificate renewal upon completion of two-thirds of the continuing professional development units specified in subdivision (E) of paragraph (3) of subsection (e) of Section 21-14 of this Code. Persons who

hold a Standard Certificate and have acquired a second master's degree, an education specialist, or a doctorate in an education-related field or hold a Master Certificate are eligible for certificate renewal upon completion of one-third of the continuing professional development units specified in subdivision (E) of paragraph (3) of subsection (e) of Section 21-14 of this Code.

8 Master Certificate. Persons who have successfully (d) 9 achieved National Board certification through the National 10 Board for Professional Teaching Standards shall be issued a 11 Master Certificate, valid for 10 years and renewable thereafter 12 every 10 years through compliance with requirements set forth by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 13 14 Teacher Certification Board. Beginning on July 1, 2012, 15 individuals holding a Master's Certificate in specific areas 16 may work only in an area in which they have a comparable 17 Illinois endorsement or only if the individual has an Illinois National Board for Professional Teaching Standards endorsement 18 19 issued prior to June 30, 2012. A holder of a Master Certificate 20 in an area of science or social science is eligible to teach in any of the subject areas within those fields, including those 21 22 taught at the advanced level, as defined by the State Board of 23 Education in consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board. A teacher who holds a Master Certificate shall be deemed 24 25 to meet State certification renewal requirements in the area or areas for which he or she holds a Master Certificate for the 26

5 Sec. 21B-20. Types of licenses. Before July 1, 2013, the 6 State Board of Education shall implement a system of educator 7 licensure, whereby individuals employed in school districts 8 who are required to be licensed must have one of the following 9 licenses: (i) a professional educator license; (ii) а 10 professional educator license with stipulations; or (iii) a 11 substitute teaching license. References in law regarding 12 individuals certified or certificated or required to be certified or certificated under Article 21 of this Code shall 13 14 also include individuals licensed or required to be licensed 15 under this Article. The first year of all licenses ends on June 16 30 following one full year of the license being issued.

The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, may adopt such rules as may be necessary to govern the requirements for licenses and endorsements under this Section.

(1) Professional Educator License. Persons who (i)
have successfully completed an approved educator
preparation program and are recommended for licensure by
the Illinois institution offering the educator preparation
program, (ii) have successfully completed the required

testing under Section 21B-30 of this Code, (iii) have 1 2 successfully completed coursework on the psychology of, the identification of, and the methods of instruction for 3 the exceptional child, including without limitation the 4 5 learning disabled, (iv) have successfully completed 6 coursework in methods of reading and reading in the content 7 area, and (v) have met all other criteria established by rule of the State Board of Education shall be issued a 8 Professional Educator License, All Professional Educator 9 10 Licenses are valid until June 30 immediately following 5 11 years of the license being issued. The Professional 12 Educator License shall be endorsed with specific areas and grade levels in which the individual is eligible to 13 14 practice.

15The requirement of student teaching under close and16competent supervision for obtaining a Professional17Educator License shall be waived by the State Educator18Preparation and Licensure Board upon presentation to the19Board by the teacher of evidence of 100 hours or more of20successful teaching experience on a valid substitute21certificate or valid substitute teaching license.

Individuals can receive subsequent endorsements on the Professional Educator License. Subsequent endorsements shall require a minimum of 24 semester hours of coursework in the endorsement area, unless otherwise specified by rule, and passage of the applicable content area test.

(2) Educator License with Stipulations. An Educator 1 License with Stipulations shall be issued an endorsement 2 that (i) is non-renewable, (ii) limits the license holder 3 to one particular position, or (iii) does not require 4 5 completion of an approved educator program or anv combination of items (i) through (iii) of this paragraph 6 7 (2).

8 An individual with an Educator License with 9 Stipulations must not be employed by a school district or 10 any other entity to replace any presently employed teacher 11 who otherwise would not be replaced for any reason.

12 An Educator License with Stipulations may be issued 13 with the following endorsements:

14 (A) Provisional educator. A provisional educator 15 endorsement in a specific content area or areas on an 16 Educator License with Stipulations may be issued to an 17 applicant who holds an educator license with a minimum of 15 semester hours in content coursework from another 18 19 state, U.S. territory, or foreign country and who, at 20 the time of applying for an Illinois license, does not meet the minimum requirements under Section 21B-35 of 21 22 this Code, but does, at a minimum, meet both of the 23 following requirements:

24 (i) Holds the equivalent of a minimum of a
25 bachelor's degree, unless a master's degree is
26 required for the endorsement, from a regionally

1 accredited college university or or, for 2 individuals educated in a country other than the 3 United States, the equivalent of a minimum of a bachelor's degree issued in the United States, 4 5 unless a master's degree is required for the 6 endorsement.

7 (ii) Has passed a test of basic skills and
8 content area test, as required by Section 21B-30 of
9 this Code.

10 However, a provisional educator endorsement for principals 11 may not be issued, nor may any person with a provisional 12 educator endorsement serve as a principal in a public school in this State. In addition, out-of-state applicants 13 14 shall not receive a provisional educator endorsement if the person completed an alternative licensure program in 15 16 another state, unless the program has been determined to be 17 equivalent to Illinois program requirements.

A provisional educator endorsement is valid until June 18 19 immediately following 2 years of the license being 30 20 issued, during which time any remaining testing and 21 coursework deficiencies must be met. Failure to satisfy all 22 stated deficiencies shall mean the individual is 23 ineligible to receive a Professional Educator License at 24 that time. A provisional educator endorsement on an 25 Educator License with Stipulations shall not be renewed.

(B) Alternative provisional educator. An

alternative provisional educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who, at the time of applying for the endorsement, has done all of the following:

5 (i) Graduated from a regionally accredited 6 college or university with a minimum of a 7 bachelor's degree.

8 (ii) Successfully completed the first phase of 9 the Alternative Educator Licensure Program for 10 Teachers, as described in Section 21B-50 of this 11 Code.

12 (iii) Passed a test of basic skills and content
13 area test, as required under Section 21B-30 of this
14 Code.

The alternative provisional educator endorsement is valid for 2 years of teaching and may be renewed for a third year by an individual meeting the requirements set forth in Section 21B-50 of this Code.

19 (C) Alternative provisional superintendent. An 20 alternative provisional superintendent endorsement on 21 an Educator License with Stipulations entitles the 22 holder to serve only as a superintendent or assistant 23 superintendent in a school district's central office. 24 This endorsement may only be issued to an applicant 25 who, at the time of applying for the endorsement, has 26 done all of the following:

1(i) Graduated from a regionally accredited2college or university with a minimum of a master's3degree in a management field other than education.

(ii) Been employed for a period of at least 5 years in a management level position in a field other than education.

7 (iii) Successfully completed the first phase
8 of an alternative route to superintendent
9 endorsement program, as provided in Section 21B-55
10 of this Code.

11 (iv) Passed a test of basic skills and content 12 area tests required under Section 21B-30 of this 13 Code.

14The endorsement may be registered for 2 fiscal15years in order to complete one full year of serving as16a superintendent or assistant superintendent.

17 (D) Resident teacher endorsement. A resident 18 teacher endorsement on an Educator License with 19 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who, at the 20 time of applying for the endorsement, has done all of 21 the following:

(i) Graduated from a regionally accredited
institution of higher education with a minimum of a
bachelor's degree.

25 (ii) Enrolled in an approved Illinois educator26 preparation program.

(iii) Passed a test of basic skills and content
 area test, as required under Section 21B-30 of this
 Code.

The resident teacher endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for 4 years of teaching and shall not be renewed.

A resident teacher may teach only under the direction of a licensed teacher, who shall act as the resident mentor teacher, and may not teach in place of a licensed teacher. A resident teacher endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations shall no longer be valid after June 30, 2017.

13 (E) Career and technical educator. A career and 14 technical educator endorsement on an Educator License 15 with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who has 16 a minimum of 60 semester hours of coursework from a 17 regionally accredited institution of higher education, has passed a test of basic skills required under 18 19 Section 21B-30 of this Code, and has a minimum of 2,000 20 hours of experience in the last 10 years outside of education in each area to be taught. 21

The career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of the endorsement being issued.

(F) Provisional career and technical educator. A

Provisional career and technical educator endorsement 1 2 on an Educator License with Stipulations may be issued 3 to an applicant who has a minimum of 8,000 hours of work experience in the skill for which the applicant is 4 5 seeking the endorsement. It is the responsibility of 6 each employing school board and regional office of 7 education to provide verification, in writing, to the State Superintendent of Education at the time the 8 9 application is submitted that no qualified teacher 10 holding a Professional Educator License or an Educator 11 License with Stipulations with a career and technical 12 educator endorsement is available and that actual 13 circumstances require such issuance.

14 The provisional career and technical educator 15 endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations 16 is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of 17 the endorsement being issued and may be renewed only one time for 5 years if the individual passes a test of 18 19 basic skills, as required under Section 21B-30 of this 20 Code, and has completed a minimum of 20 semester hours 21 from a regionally accredited institution.

(G) Transitional bilingual educator. A
transitional bilingual educator endorsement on an
Educator License with Stipulations may be issued for
the purpose of providing instruction in accordance
with Article 14C of this Code to an applicant who

provides satisfactory evidence that he or she meets all of the following requirements:

(i) Possesses adequate speaking, reading, and writing ability in the language other than English in which transitional bilingual education is offered.

7 (ii) Has the ability to successfully8 communicate in English.

9 Either possessed, within (iii) 5 years previous to his or her applying for a transitional 10 11 bilingual educator endorsement, а valid and 12 comparable teaching certificate or comparable 13 authorization issued by a foreign country or holds a degree from an institution of higher learning in 14 15 а foreign country that the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be 16 17 the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution 18 of higher 19 learning in the United States.

A transitional bilingual educator endorsement shall be valid for prekindergarten through grade 12, is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of the endorsement being issued, and shall not be renewed.

Persons holding a transitional bilingual educator endorsement shall not be employed to replace any presently employed teacher who otherwise would not be

replaced for any reason.

(H) Language endorsement. In an effort to alleviate the shortage of teachers speaking a language other than English in the public schools, an individual who holds an Educator License with Stipulations may also apply for a language endorsement, provided that the applicant provides satisfactory evidence that he or she meets all of the following requirements:

(i) Holds a transitional bilingual endorsement.

(ii) Has demonstrated proficiency in the language for which the endorsement is to be issued by passing the applicable language content test required by the State Board of Education.

15 (iii) Holds a bachelor's degree or higher from 16 a regionally accredited institution of higher 17 education or, for individuals educated in a country other than the United States, holds a 18 degree from an institution of higher learning in a 19 20 foreign country that the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be 21 22 the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a 23 regionally accredited institution of higher learning in the United States. 24

(iv) Has passed a test of basic skills, as
 required under Section 21B-30 of this Code.

A language endorsement on an Educator License with 1 Stipulations is valid for prekindergarten through 2 3 grade 12 for the same validity period as the individual's transitional bilingual 4 educator 5 endorsement on the Educator License with Stipulations and shall not be renewed. 6

7 (I) Visiting international educator. A visiting international educator endorsement on an Educator 8 9 License with Stipulations may be issued to an 10 individual who is being recruited by a particular 11 school district that conducts formal recruitment 12 programs outside of the United States to secure the 13 services of qualified teachers and who meets all of the 14 following requirements:

(i) Holds the equivalent of a minimum of a
 bachelor's degree issued in the United States.

(ii) Has been prepared as a teacher at the grade level for which he or she will be employed.

19 (iii) Has adequate content knowledge in the20 subject to be taught.

21 (iv) Has an adequate command of the English22 language.

A holder of a visiting international educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations shall be permitted to teach in bilingual education programs in the language that was the medium of

instruction in his or her teacher preparation program,
provided that he or she passes the English Language
Proficiency Examination or another test of writing
skills in English identified by the State Board of
Education, in consultation with the State Educator
Preparation and Licensure Board.

A visiting international educator endorsement on
an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for 3
years and shall not be renewed.

10 (J) Paraprofessional educator. A paraprofessional 11 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 12 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who holds a 13 high school diploma or its recognized equivalent and 14 either holds an associate's degree or a minimum of 60 15 semester hours of credit from a regionally accredited 16 institution of higher education or has passed a test of 17 basic skills required under Section 21B-30 of this Code. The paraprofessional educator endorsement is 18 19 valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of 20 the endorsement being issued and may be renewed through application and payment of the appropriate fee, as 21 22 required under Section 21B-40 of this Code. An 23 individual who holds only a paraprofessional educator endorsement is not subject to additional requirements 24 25 in order to renew the endorsement.

26 (3) Substitute Teaching License. A Substitute Teaching

issued to qualified applicants 1 be License mav for 2 substitute teaching in all grades of the public schools, 3 prekindergarten through grade 12. Substitute Teaching Licenses are not eligible for endorsements. Applicants for 4 5 a Substitute Teaching License must hold a bachelor's degree 6 or higher from a regionally accredited institution of 7 higher education.

8 Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for 5 years and 9 may be renewed if the individual has passed a test of basic 10 skills, as authorized under Section 21B-30 of this Code. An 11 individual who has passed a test of basic skills for the 12 first licensure renewal is not required to retake the test 13 again for further renewals.

14 Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for substitute 15 teaching in every county of this State. If an individual 16 has had his or her Professional Educator License or 17 Educator License with Stipulations suspended or revoked or 18 has not met the renewal requirements for licensure, then 19 that individual is not eligible to obtain a Substitute 20 Teaching License.

A substitute teacher may only teach in the place of a licensed teacher who is under contract with the employing board. If, however, there is no licensed teacher under contract because of an emergency situation, then a district may employ a substitute teacher for no longer than 30 calendar days per each vacant position in the district if

the district notifies the appropriate regional office of 1 2 education within 5 business days after the employment of 3 the substitute teacher in the emergency situation. An emergency situation is one in which an unforeseen vacancy 4 has occurred and (i) a teacher is unable to fulfill his or 5 her contractual duties or (ii) teacher capacity needs of 6 7 the district exceed previous indications, and the district 8 is actively engaged in advertising to hire a fully licensed 9 teacher for the vacant position.

10 There is no limit on the number of days that a 11 substitute teacher may teach in a single school district, 12 provided that no substitute teacher may teach for longer 13 than 90 school days for any one licensed teacher under 14 contract in the same school year. A substitute teacher who 15 holds a Professional Educator License or Educator License 16 with Stipulations shall not teach for more than 120 school 17 days for any one licensed teacher under contract in the 18 same school year. The limitations in this paragraph (3) on 19 the number of days a substitute teacher may be employed do 20 not apply to any school district operating under Article 34 of this Code. 21
