SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

720 ILCS 5/11-9.3

Amends the Criminal Code of 2012. Provides that it is a Class 4 felony for a child sex offender to knowingly reside within 500 feet of a child counseling center. Provides that nothing in this provision prohibits a child sex offender from residing within 500 feet of a child counseling center if the property is owned by the child sex offender and was purchased before the effective date of the amendatory Act. Provides that a child sex offender may not knowingly operate, manage, be employed by, volunteer at, be associated with, or knowingly be present at a child counseling center. Provides exemptions. Defines "child counseling center".

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AN ACT concerning criminal law.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Criminal Code of 2012 is amended by changing
Section 11-9.3 as follows:

6 (720 ILCS 5/11-9.3)

Sec. 11-9.3. Presence within school zone by child sex offenders prohibited; approaching, contacting, residing with, or communicating with a child within certain places by child sex offenders prohibited.

(a) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly be 11 12 present in any school building, on real property comprising any school, or in any conveyance owned, leased, or contracted by a 13 14 school to transport students to or from school or a school related activity when persons under the age of 18 are present 15 16 in the building, on the grounds or in the conveyance, unless 17 the offender is a parent or guardian of a student attending the school and the parent or quardian is: (i) attending a 18 19 conference at the school with school personnel to discuss the progress of his or her child academically or socially, (ii) 20 21 participating in child review conferences in which evaluation 22 and placement decisions may be made with respect to his or her child regarding special education services, or (iii) attending 23

conferences to discuss other student issues concerning his or 1 2 her child such as retention and promotion and notifies the 3 principal of the school of his or her presence at the school or unless the offender has permission to be present from the 4 5 superintendent or the school board or in the case of a private 6 school from the principal. In the case of a public school, if 7 permission is granted, the superintendent or school board 8 president must inform the principal of the school where the sex 9 offender will be present. Notification includes the nature of the sex offender's visit and the hours in which the sex 10 11 offender will be present in the school. The sex offender is 12 responsible for notifying the principal's office when he or she 13 arrives on school property and when he or she departs from 14 school property. If the sex offender is to be present in the 15 vicinity of children, the sex offender has the duty to remain 16 under the direct supervision of a school official.

17 (a-5) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 18 be present within 100 feet of a site posted as a pick-up or 19 discharge stop for a conveyance owned, leased, or contracted by 20 a school to transport students to or from school or a school 21 related activity when one or more persons under the age of 18 22 are present at the site.

(a-10) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly be present in any public park building or on real property comprising any public park when persons under the age of 18 are present in the building or on the grounds and to approach,

contact, or communicate with a child under 18 years of age,
 unless the offender is a parent or guardian of a person under
 18 years of age present in the building or on the grounds.

(b) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 4 5 loiter within 500 feet of a school building or real property comprising any school while persons under the age of 18 are 6 7 present in the building or on the grounds, unless the offender is a parent or quardian of a student attending the school and 8 9 the parent or quardian is: (i) attending a conference at the 10 school with school personnel to discuss the progress of his or 11 her child academically or socially, (ii) participating in child 12 review conferences in which evaluation and placement decisions may be made with respect to his or her child regarding special 13 14 education services, or (iii) attending conferences to discuss 15 other student issues concerning his or her child such as 16 retention and promotion and notifies the principal of the 17 school of his or her presence at the school or has permission to be present from the superintendent or the school board or in 18 19 the case of a private school from the principal. In the case of 20 a public school, if permission is granted, the superintendent or school board president must inform the principal of the 21 22 school where the sex offender will be present. Notification includes the nature of the sex offender's visit and the hours 23 in which the sex offender will be present in the school. The 24 25 sex offender is responsible for notifying the principal's 26 office when he or she arrives on school property and when he or

1 she departs from school property. If the sex offender is to be 2 present in the vicinity of children, the sex offender has the 3 duty to remain under the direct supervision of a school 4 official.

5 (b-2) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly loiter on a public way within 500 feet of a public park 6 building or real property comprising any public park while 7 8 persons under the age of 18 are present in the building or on 9 the grounds and to approach, contact, or communicate with a 10 child under 18 years of age, unless the offender is a parent or 11 guardian of a person under 18 years of age present in the 12 building or on the grounds.

13 (b-5) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly reside within 500 feet of a school building or the real 14 15 property comprising any school that persons under the age of 18 16 attend. Nothing in this subsection (b-5) prohibits a child sex 17 offender from residing within 500 feet of a school building or the real property comprising any school that persons under 18 18 attend if the property is owned by the child sex offender and 19 was purchased before July 7, 2000 (the effective date of Public 20 Act 91-911). 21

(b-10) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly reside within 500 feet of a playground, child care institution, day care center, part day child care facility, day care home, group day care home, <u>child counseling center</u>, or a facility providing programs or services exclusively directed toward

persons under 18 years of age. Nothing in this subsection 1 2 (b-10) prohibits a child sex offender from residing within 500 feet of a playground or a facility providing programs or 3 services exclusively directed toward persons under 18 years of 4 5 age if the property is owned by the child sex offender and was purchased before July 7, 2000. Nothing in this subsection 6 (b-10) prohibits a child sex offender from residing within 500 7 feet of a child care institution, day care center, or part day 8 9 child care facility if the property is owned by the child sex 10 offender and was purchased before June 26, 2006. Nothing in 11 this subsection (b-10) prohibits a child sex offender from 12 residing within 500 feet of a day care home or group day care 13 home if the property is owned by the child sex offender and was purchased before August 14, 2008 (the effective date of Public 14 Act 95-821). Nothing in this subsection (b-10) prohibits a 15 16 child sex offender from residing within 500 feet of a child 17 counseling center if the property is owned by the child sex offender and was purchased before the effective date of this 18 19 amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly.

(b-15) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly reside within 500 feet of the victim of the sex offense. Nothing in this subsection (b-15) prohibits a child sex offender from residing within 500 feet of the victim if the property in which the child sex offender resides is owned by the child sex offender and was purchased before August 22, 2002.

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This subsection (b-15) does not apply if the victim of the
 sex offense is 21 years of age or older.

3 (b-20) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 4 communicate, other than for a lawful purpose under Illinois 5 law, using the Internet or any other digital media, with a 6 person under 18 years of age or with a person whom he or she 7 believes to be a person under 18 years of age, unless the 8 offender is a parent or guardian of the person under 18 years 9 of age.

10 (c) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 11 operate, manage, be employed by, volunteer at, be associated 12 with, or knowingly be present at any: (i) facility providing programs or services exclusively directed toward persons under 13 the age of 18; (ii) day care center; (iii) part day child care 14 15 facility; (iv) child care institution; (v) school providing 16 before and after school programs for children under 18 years of 17 age; (vi) day care home; or (vii) group day care home; or (viii) child counseling center. This does not prohibit a child 18 19 sex offender from owning the real property upon which the 20 programs or services are offered or upon which the day care center, part day child care facility, child care institution, 21 22 child counseling center, or school providing before and after 23 school programs for children under 18 years of age is located, provided the child sex offender refrains from being present on 24 25 the premises for the hours during which: (1) the programs or 26 services are being offered or (2) the day care center, part day

child care facility, child care institution, <u>child counseling</u>
 <u>center</u>, or school providing before and after school programs
 for children under 18 years of age, day care home, or group day
 care home is operated.

5 (c-2)It is unlawful for a child sex offender to participate in a holiday event involving children under 18 6 7 years of age, including but not limited to distributing candy or other items to children on Halloween, wearing a Santa Claus 8 9 costume on or preceding Christmas, being employed as а 10 department store Santa Claus, or wearing an Easter Bunny 11 costume on or preceding Easter. For the purposes of this 12 subsection, child sex offender has the meaning as defined in 13 this Section, but does not include as a sex offense under 14 paragraph (2) of subsection (d) of this Section, the offense 15 under subsection (c) of Section 11-1.50 of this Code. This 16 subsection does not apply to a child sex offender who is a 17 parent or quardian of children under 18 years of age that are present in the home and other non-familial minors are not 18 19 present.

20 (c-5) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 21 operate, manage, be employed by, or be associated with any 22 county fair when persons under the age of 18 are present.

(c-6) It is unlawful for a child sex offender who owns and resides at residential real estate to knowingly rent any residential unit within the same building in which he or she resides to a person who is the parent or guardian of a child or

children under 18 years of age. This subsection shall apply
 only to leases or other rental arrangements entered into after
 January 1, 2009 (the effective date of Public Act 95-820).

4 (c-7) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 5 offer or provide any programs or services to persons under 18 6 years of age in his or her residence or the residence of 7 another or in any facility for the purpose of offering or 8 providing such programs or services, whether such programs or 9 services are offered or provided by contract, agreement, 10 arrangement, or on a volunteer basis.

11 (c-8) It is unlawful for a child sex offender to knowingly 12 operate, whether authorized to do so or not, any of the 13 following vehicles: (1) a vehicle which is specifically 14 designed, constructed or modified and equipped to be used for 15 the retail sale of food or beverages, including but not limited 16 to an ice cream truck; (2) an authorized emergency vehicle; or 17 (3) a rescue vehicle.

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(d) Definitions. In this Section:

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(1) "Child sex offender" means any person who:

(i) has been charged under Illinois law, or any
substantially similar federal law or law of another
state, with a sex offense set forth in paragraph (2) of
this subsection (d) or the attempt to commit an
included sex offense, and the victim is a person under
18 years of age at the time of the offense; and:

(A) is convicted of such offense or an attempt

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to commit such offense; or

(B) is found not guilty by reason of insanity of such offense or an attempt to commit such offense; or

(C) is found not guilty by reason of insanity pursuant to subsection (c) of Section 104-25 of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 of such offense or an attempt to commit such offense; or

9 (D) is the subject of a finding not resulting 10 in an acquittal at a hearing conducted pursuant to 11 subsection (a) of Section 104-25 of the Code of 12 Criminal Procedure of 1963 for the alleged 13 commission or attempted commission of such 14 offense: or

15 (E) is found not guilty by reason of insanity 16 following a hearing conducted pursuant to a 17 federal law or the law of another state substantially similar to subsection (c) of Section 18 104-25 of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 of 19 20 such offense or of the attempted commission of such offense; or 21

(F) is the subject of a finding not resulting
in an acquittal at a hearing conducted pursuant to
a federal law or the law of another state
substantially similar to subsection (a) of Section
104-25 of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963

for the alleged violation or attempted commission
 of such offense; or

(ii) is certified as a sexually dangerous person
pursuant to the Illinois Sexually Dangerous Persons
Act, or any substantially similar federal law or the
law of another state, when any conduct giving rise to
such certification is committed or attempted against a
person less than 18 years of age; or

9 (iii) is subject to the provisions of Section 2 of 10 the Interstate Agreements on Sexually Dangerous 11 Persons Act.

12 Convictions that result from or are connected with the 13 same act, or result from offenses committed at the same 14 time, shall be counted for the purpose of this Section as 15 one conviction. Any conviction set aside pursuant to law is 16 not a conviction for purposes of this Section.

17 (2) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (2.5),
18 "sex offense" means:

19 (i) A violation of any of the following Sections of 20 the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012: 10-4 (forcible detention), 10-7 (aiding or abetting 21 22 child abduction under Section 10-5(b)(10)),23 10-5(b)(10)(child luring), 11-1.40 (predatory 24 criminal sexual assault of a child), 11-6 (indecent 25 of a child), 11-6.5 solicitation (indecent 26 solicitation of an adult), 11-9.1 (sexual exploitation

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1	of a child), 11-9.2 (custodial sexual misconduct),
2	11-9.5 (sexual misconduct with a person with a
3	disability), 11-11 (sexual relations within families),
4	11-14.3(a)(1) (promoting prostitution by advancing
5	prostitution), 11-14.3(a)(2)(A) (promoting
6	prostitution by profiting from prostitution by
7	compelling a person to be a prostitute),
8	11-14.3(a)(2)(C) (promoting prostitution by profiting
9	from prostitution by means other than as described in
10	subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (2) of
11	subsection (a) of Section 11-14.3), 11-14.4 (promoting
12	juvenile prostitution), 11-18.1 (patronizing a
13	juvenile prostitute), 11-20.1 (child pornography),
14	11-20.1B (aggravated child pornography), 11-21
15	(harmful material), 11-25 (grooming), 11-26 (traveling
16	to meet a minor), 12-33 (ritualized abuse of a child),
17	11-20 (obscenity) (when that offense was committed in
18	any school, on real property comprising any school, in
19	any conveyance owned, leased, or contracted by a school
20	to transport students to or from school or a school
21	related activity, or in a public park), 11-30 (public
22	indecency) (when committed in a school, on real
23	property comprising a school, in any conveyance owned,
24	leased, or contracted by a school to transport students
25	to or from school or a school related activity, or in a
26	public park). An attempt to commit any of these

1 offenses.

2 (ii) A violation of any of the following Sections of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 3 2012, when the victim is a person under 18 years of 4 (criminal sexual assault), 5 age: 11-1.20 11-1.30 6 (aggravated criminal sexual assault), 11-1.50 7 (criminal sexual abuse), 11-1.60 (aggravated criminal sexual abuse). An attempt to commit any of these 8 9 offenses. 10 (iii) A violation of any of the following Sections 11 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 12 2012, when the victim is a person under 18 years of age 13 and the defendant is not a parent of the victim: 14 10-1 (kidnapping), 10-2 (aggravated kidnapping), 15 16 10-3 (unlawful restraint), 17 10-3.1 (aggravated unlawful restraint), 11-9.1(A) (permitting sexual abuse of a child). 18 19 An attempt to commit any of these offenses.

20 (iv) A violation of any former law of this State
21 substantially equivalent to any offense listed in
22 clause (2)(i) or (2)(ii) of subsection (d) of this
23 Section.

24 (2.5) For the purposes of subsections (b-5) and (b-10)
 25 only, a sex offense means:

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(i) A violation of any of the following Sections of

the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012: 1 10-5(b)(10) (child luring), 10-7 (aiding or 2 abetting child abduction under Section 10-5(b)(10)), 3 11-1.40 (predatory criminal sexual assault of a 4 5 child), 11-6 (indecent solicitation of a child), 11-6.5 (indecent solicitation of an adult), 11-9.2 6 7 misconduct), 11-9.5 (sexual (custodial sexual misconduct with a person with a disability), 11-11 8 9 (sexual relations within families), 11-14.3(a)(1) 10 (promoting prostitution by advancing prostitution), 11 11-14.3(a)(2)(A) (promoting prostitution by profiting 12 from prostitution by compelling a person to be a prostitute), 11-14.3(a)(2)(C) (promoting prostitution 13 14 by profiting from prostitution by means other than as 15 described in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (2) 16 of subsection (a) of Section 11-14.3), 11-14.4 17 (promoting juvenile prostitution), 11-18.1 (patronizing a juvenile prostitute), 11-20.1 (child 18 19 pornography), 11-20.1B (aggravated child pornography), 20 11-25 (grooming), 11-26 (traveling to meet a minor), or 12-33 (ritualized abuse of a child). An attempt to 21 22 commit any of these offenses.

(ii) A violation of any of the following Sections
of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of
2012, when the victim is a person under 18 years of
age: 11-1.20 (criminal sexual assault), 11-1.30

assault), 1 (aggravated criminal sexual 11-1.60 2 (aggravated criminal sexual abuse), and subsection (a) of Section 11-1.50 (criminal sexual abuse). An attempt 3 to commit any of these offenses. 4 5 (iii) A violation of any of the following Sections of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 6 2012, when the victim is a person under 18 years of age 7 8 and the defendant is not a parent of the victim: 9 10-1 (kidnapping), 10 10-2 (aggravated kidnapping), 11 10-3 (unlawful restraint), 12 10-3.1 (aggravated unlawful restraint), 13 11-9.1(A) (permitting sexual abuse of a child). 14 An attempt to commit any of these offenses. 15 (iv) A violation of any former law of this State 16 substantially equivalent to any offense listed in this 17 paragraph (2.5) of this subsection. (3) A conviction for an offense of federal law or the 18 19 law of another state that is substantially equivalent to 20 any offense listed in paragraph (2) of subsection (d) of this Section shall constitute a conviction for the purpose 21 22 of this Section. A finding or adjudication as a sexually 23 dangerous person under any federal law or law of another state that is substantially equivalent to the Sexually 24 25 Dangerous Persons Act shall constitute an adjudication for 26 the purposes of this Section.

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(4) "Authorized emergency vehicle", "rescue vehicle", 1 2 and "vehicle" have the meanings ascribed to them in 3 Sections 1-105, 1-171.8 and 1-217, respectively, of the Illinois Vehicle Code. 4 5 (5) "Child care institution" has the meaning ascribed to it in Section 2.06 of the Child Care Act of 1969. 6 (5.1) "Child counseling center" means a facility where 7 mental health services are provided solely or primarily for 8 9 children. 10 (6) "Day care center" has the meaning ascribed to it in Section 2.09 of the Child Care Act of 1969. 11 12 (7) "Day care home" has the meaning ascribed to it in Section 2.18 of the Child Care Act of 1969. 13 14 (8) "Facility providing programs or services directed 15 towards persons under the age of 18" means any facility 16 providing programs or services exclusively directed towards persons under the age of 18. 17 (9) "Group day care home" has the meaning ascribed to 18 it in Section 2.20 of the Child Care Act of 1969. 19 20 (10) "Internet" has the meaning set forth in Section 16-0.1 16J-5 of this Code. 21 22 (11) "Loiter" means: 23 (i) Standing, sitting idly, whether or not the 24 person is in a vehicle, or remaining in or around 25 school or public park property. 26 (ii) Standing, sitting idly, whether or not the

person is in a vehicle, or remaining in or around school or public park property, for the purpose of committing or attempting to commit a sex offense.

4 (iii) Entering or remaining in a building in or
5 around school property, other than the offender's
6 residence.

7 (12) "Part day child care facility" has the meaning
8 ascribed to it in Section 2.10 of the Child Care Act of
9 1969.

10 (13) "Playground" means a piece of land owned or 11 controlled by a unit of local government that is designated 12 by the unit of local government for use solely or primarily 13 for children's recreation.

14 (14) "Public park" includes a park, forest preserve,
15 bikeway, trail, or conservation area under the
16 jurisdiction of the State or a unit of local government.

17 (15) "School" means a public or private preschool or18 elementary or secondary school.

(16) "School official" means the principal, a teacher,
or any other certified employee of the school, the
superintendent of schools or a member of the school board.

(e) For the purposes of this Section, the 500 feet distance shall be measured from: (1) the edge of the property of the school building or the real property comprising the school that is closest to the edge of the property of the child sex offender's residence or where he or she is loitering, and (2)

the edge of the property comprising the public park building or 1 2 the real property comprising the public park, playground, child 3 care institution, day care center, part day child care or facility providing programs or 4 facility, services 5 exclusively directed toward persons under 18 years of age, or a 6 victim of the sex offense who is under 21 years of age, to the 7 edge of the child sex offender's place of residence or place 8 where he or she is loitering.

9 (f) Sentence. A person who violates this Section is guilty10 of a Class 4 felony.
