### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

from Ch. 108 1/2, par. 6-151.1

40 ILCS 5/6-151.1 30 ILCS 805/8.37 new

Amends the Chicago Firefighter Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Adds Parkinson's disease to the list of diseases for which certain firemen may be entitled to receive an occupational disease disability benefit. Amends the State Mandates Act to require implementation without reimbursement. Effective immediately.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Illinois Pension Code is amended by changing
Section 6-151.1 as follows:

6 (40 ILCS 5/6-151.1) (from Ch. 108 1/2, par. 6-151.1)

7 Sec. 6-151.1. The General Assembly finds and declares that 8 service in the Fire Department requires that firemen, in times 9 of stress and danger, must perform unusual tasks; that by reason of their occupation, firemen are subject to exposure to 10 great heat and to extreme cold in certain seasons while in 11 performance of their duties; that by reason of their employment 12 firemen are required to work in the midst of and are subject to 13 14 heavy smoke fumes and carcinogenic, poisonous, toxic or chemical gases from fires; and that in the course of their 15 16 rescue and paramedic duties firemen are exposed to disabling 17 infectious diseases, including AIDS, hepatitis C, Parkinson's disease, and stroke. The General Assembly further finds and 18 19 declares that all the aforementioned conditions exist and arise 20 out of or in the course of such employment.

Any active fireman who has completed 7 or more years of service and is unable to perform his duties in the Fire Department by reason of heart disease, tuberculosis, any disease of the lungs or respiratory tract, AIDS, hepatitis C,
<u>Parkinson's disease</u>, or stroke resulting from his service as a
fireman, shall be entitled to receive an occupational disease
disability benefit during any period of such disability for
which he does not have a right to receive salary.

6 Any active fireman who has completed 7 or more years of service and is unable to perform his duties in the fire 7 department by reason of a disabling cancer, which develops or 8 9 manifests itself during a period while the fireman is in the 10 service of the department, shall be entitled to receive an 11 occupational disease disability benefit during any period of 12 such disability for which he does not have a right to receive 13 order to receive this occupational disease salary. In disability benefit, the type of cancer involved must be a type 14 15 which may be caused by exposure to heat, radiation or a known 16 carcinogen as defined by the International Agency for Research 17 on Cancer.

Any fireman who shall enter the service after the effective 18 19 date of this amendatory Act shall be examined by one or more 20 practicing physicians appointed by the Board, and if that examination discloses impairment of the heart, lungs, or 21 22 respiratory tract, or the existence of AIDS, hepatitis C, 23 Parkinson's disease, stroke, or cancer, then the fireman shall not be entitled to receive an occupational disease disability 24 25 benefit unless and until a subsequent examination reveals no such impairment, AIDS, hepatitis C, Parkinson's disease, 26

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1 stroke, or cancer.

2 The occupational disease disability benefit shall be 65% of 3 the fireman's salary at the time of his removal from the Department payroll. However, beginning January 1, 1994, no 4 5 occupational disease disability benefit that has been payable 6 under this Section for at least 10 years shall be less than 50% 7 of the current salary attached from time to time to the rank 8 and grade held by the fireman at the time of his removal from 9 the Department payroll, regardless of whether that removal 10 occurred before the effective date of this amendatory Act of 11 1993.

12 Such fireman also shall have a right to receive child's 13 disability benefit of \$30 per month on account of each 14 unmarried child who is less than 18 years of age or 15 handicapped, dependent upon the fireman for support, and either 16 the issue of the fireman or legally adopted by him. The total 17 amount of child's disability benefit payable to the fireman, when added to his occupational disease disability benefit, 18 shall not exceed 75% of the amount of salary which he was 19 20 receiving at the time of the grant of occupational disease 21 disability benefit.

The first payment of occupational disease disability benefit or child's disability benefit shall be made not later than one month after the benefit is granted. Each subsequent payment shall be made not later than one month after the date of the latest payment.

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Occupational disease disability benefit shall be payable 1 2 during the period of the disability until the fireman reaches 3 the age of compulsory retirement. Child's disability benefit shall be paid to such a fireman during the period of disability 4 5 until such child or children attain age 18 or marry, whichever 6 event occurs first; except that attainment of age 18 by a child 7 who is so physically or mentally handicapped as to be dependent upon the fireman for support, shall not render the child 8 9 ineligible for child's disability benefit. The fireman 10 thereafter shall receive such annuity or annuities as are 11 provided for him in accordance with other provisions of this 12 Article.

Section 90. The State Mandates Act is amended by adding Section 8.37 as follows:

16 (30 ILCS 805/8.37 new)

Sec. 8.37. Exempt mandate. Notwithstanding Sections 6 and 8 of this Act, no reimbursement by the State is required for the implementation of any mandate created by this amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly.

21 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon 22 becoming law.
