1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive
Health Education Act is amended by changing Section 3 and by
adding Section 3.10 as follows:

Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. program established under this Act shall include, but not be limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: human ecology and health, human growth and development, the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic and social responsibilities of family life, including sexual abstinence until marriage, prevention and control of disease, including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, transmission and spread of AIDS, age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and prevention education in grades pre-kindergarten through 12, public and environmental health, consumer health, safety education and disaster survival, mental health and illness, personal health habits, alcohol, drug use, and abuse including the medical and legal ramifications of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during 1

pregnancy, sexual abstinence until marriage, tobacco, nutrition, and dental health. The program shall also provide course material and instruction to advise pupils of the Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act. The program shall include information about cancer, including without limitation types of cancer, signs and symptoms, risk factors, the importance of early prevention and detection, and information on where to go for help. Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the following areas may also be included as a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first aid (including, but not limited to, cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), heart disease, diabetes, stroke, the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide, and teen dating violence in grades 7 $\frac{8}{3}$ through 12.

The school board of each public elementary and secondary school in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer life-saving techniques, including without limitation the Heimlich maneuver and rescue breathing. The training shall be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization. A school board may use the services of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise in life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school

personnel in these techniques. Each school board is encouraged 1 2 to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, at least one person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by 3 another qualified certifying agency, qualified as 5 administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In 6 addition, each school board is authorized to 7 appropriate portions of its institute or inservice days to 8 conduct training programs for teachers and other school 9 personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming qualified aid 10 administer emergency first or cardiopulmonary 11 resuscitation. School boards are urged to encourage their 12 teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic 13 and other extracurricular school activities programs 14 acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills 15 necessary to properly administer first aid and cardiopulmonary 16 resuscitation in accordance with standards and requirements 17 established by the American Red Cross or another qualified certifying agency. Subject to appropriation, the State Board of 18 Education shall establish and administer a matching grant 19 20 program to pay for half of the cost that a school district incurs in training those teachers and other school personnel 21 22 who express an interest in becoming qualified to administer 23 cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 24 25 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized

certifying organization) or in learning how to use an automated

- 1 external defibrillator. A school district that applies for a
- 2 grant must demonstrate that it has funds to pay half of the
- 3 cost of the training for which matching grant money is sought.
- 4 The State Board of Education shall award the grants on a
- 5 first-come, first-serve basis.
- No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any
- 7 class or course on AIDS or family life instruction if his
- 8 parent or quardian submits written objection thereto, and
- 9 refusal to take or participate in the course or program shall
- not be reason for suspension or expulsion of the pupil.
- 11 Curricula developed under programs established in
- 12 accordance with this Act in the major educational area of
- 13 alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom
- instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which
- shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal
- 16 effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall be
- integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of
- 18 Education shall develop and make available to all elementary
- 19 and secondary schools in this State instructional materials and
- 20 quidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating the
- 21 instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, school
- 22 districts may offer, as part of existing curricula during the
- 23 school day or as part of an after school program, support
- 24 services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose parent,
- parents, or quardians are chemically dependent.

- 5 (a) As used in this Section:
- "Dating" or "dating relationship" means an ongoing social 6
- 7 relationship of a romantic or intimate nature between 2
- 8 persons. "Dating" or "dating relationship" does not include a
- casual relationship or ordinary fraternization between 2 9
- 10 persons in a business or social context.
- 11 "Teen dating violence" means either of the following:
- 12 (1) A pattern of behavior in which a person uses or
- 1.3 threatens to use physical, mental, or emotional abuse to
- control another person who is in a dating relationship with 14
- 15 the person, where one or both persons are 13 to 19 years of
- 16 age.
- (2) Behavior by which a person uses or threatens to use 17
- 18 sexual violence against another person who is in a dating
- relationship with the person, where one or both persons are 19
- 13 to 19 years of age. 20
- 21 (b) The school board of each public school district in this
- 22 State shall adopt a policy that does all of the following:
- 23 (1) States that teen dating violence is unacceptable
- 24 and is prohibited and that each student has the right to a
- safe learning environment. 25

1	(2) Incorporates age-appropriate education about teen
2	dating violence into new or existing training programs for
3	students in grades 7 through 12 and school employees, as
4	recommended by the school officials identified under
5	subdivision (4) of this subsection (b).
6	(3) Establishes procedures for the manner in which
7	employees of a school are to respond to incidents of teen
8	dating violence that take place at the school, on school
9	grounds, at school-sponsored activities, or in vehicles
10	used for school-provided transportation.
11	(4) Identifies by job title the school officials who
12	are responsible for receiving reports related to teen
13	dating violence.
14	(5) Notifies students and parents of the teen dating
15	violence policy adopted by the board.
