SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 110/3

Amends the Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive Health Education Act. Provides that training on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation and how to use an automated external defibrillator shall be included as a basis for health education curricula in all secondary schools in this State and shall be a prerequisite to receiving a high school diploma. Effective July 1, 2014.

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AN ACT concerning education.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive
Health Education Act is amended by changing Section 3 as
follows:

7 (105 ILCS 110/3)

Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. 8 The 9 program established under this Act shall include, but not be limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis 10 for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this 11 12 State: human ecology and health, human growth and development, the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic and 13 14 social responsibilities of family life, including sexual abstinence until marriage, prevention and control of disease, 15 including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, 16 17 transmission and spread of AIDS, age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and prevention education in grades 18 19 pre-kindergarten through 12, public and environmental health, 20 consumer health, safety education and disaster survival, 21 mental health and illness, personal health habits, alcohol, 22 drug use, and abuse including the medical and legal ramifications of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during 23

pregnancy, evidence-based and medically accurate information 1 2 regarding sexual abstinence, tobacco, nutrition, and dental health. The program shall also provide course material and 3 instruction to advise pupils of the Abandoned Newborn Infant 4 5 Protection Act. The program shall include information about cancer, including without limitation types of cancer, signs and 6 7 symptoms, risk factors, the importance of early prevention and 8 detection, and information on where to go for help. 9 Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the following 10 areas may also be included as a basis for curricula in all 11 elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first aid 12 (including, but not limited to, cardiopulmonary resuscitation 13 and the Heimlich maneuver), heart disease, diabetes, stroke, 14 the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide, and teen dating violence in grades 7 through 12. Beginning with the 15 2014-2015 school year, training on how to properly administer 16 17 cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 18 19 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized 20 certifying organization) and how to use an automated external 21 defibrillator shall be included as a basis for curricula in all 22 secondary schools in this State and shall be a prerequisite to 23 receiving a high school diploma.

The school board of each public elementary and secondary school in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the

1 skills necessary to knowledge and properly administer 2 life-saving techniques, including without limitation the Heimlich maneuver and rescue breathing. The training shall be 3 in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 4 5 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized 6 certifying organization. A school board may use the services of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise in 7 life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school 8 9 personnel in these techniques. Each school board is encouraged 10 to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, at least one 11 person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by 12 qualified certifying agency, another as qualified to 13 administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In addition, each school board is authorized to 14 allocate appropriate portions of its institute or inservice days to 15 16 conduct training programs for teachers and other school 17 personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming qualified emergency first aid 18 administer or cardiopulmonary to resuscitation. School boards are urged to encourage their 19 20 teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic and other extracurricular school activities to 21 programs 22 develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills acquire, 23 necessary to properly administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards and requirements 24 established by the American Red Cross or another qualified 25 26 certifying agency. Subject to appropriation, the State Board of

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Education shall establish and administer a matching grant 1 2 program to pay for half of the cost that a school district 3 incurs in training those teachers and other school personnel who express an interest in becoming qualified to administer 4 5 cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 6 7 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized 8 certifying organization) or in learning how to use an automated 9 external defibrillator. A school district that applies for a 10 grant must demonstrate that it has funds to pay half of the 11 cost of the training for which matching grant money is sought. 12 The State Board of Education shall award the grants on a 13 first-come, first-serve basis.

14 No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any 15 class or course on AIDS or family life instruction if his 16 parent or guardian submits written objection thereto, and 17 refusal to take or participate in the course or program shall 18 not be reason for suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

19 Curricula developed under programs established in 20 accordance with this Act in the major educational area of alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom 21 22 instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which 23 shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall be 24 25 integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of 26 Education shall develop and make available to all elementary

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and secondary schools in this State instructional materials and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating the instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, school districts may offer, as part of existing curricula during the school day or as part of an after school program, support services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose parent, parents, or guardians are chemically dependent.
