

98TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2013 and 2014 SB2805

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Amends the Election Code. Provides that grace period voting may be conducted until the day of the primary or election.

1 AN ACT concerning elections.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Election Code is amended by changing Sections 4-50, 5-50, and 6-100 as follows:
- 6 (10 ILCS 5/4-50)

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- 7 4-50. Grace period. Notwithstanding any 8 provision of this Code to the contrary, each election authority 9 shall establish procedures for the registration of voters and 10 for change of address during the period from the close of registration for a primary or election and until the day of 3rd 11 day before the primary or election. During this grace period, 12 13 an unregistered qualified elector may register to vote, and a 14 registered voter may submit a change of address form, in person in the office of the election authority or at a voter 15 16 registration location specifically designated for this purpose 17 by the election authority. The election authority shall register that individual, or change a registered voter's 18 19 address, in the same manner as otherwise provided by this Article for registration and change of address. 20
 - If a voter who registers or changes address during this grace period wishes to vote at the first election or primary occurring on or after the <u>last day of the</u> grace period, he or

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she must do so by grace period voting. The election authority shall offer in-person grace period voting at the authority's office and may offer in-person grace period voting at additional locations specifically designated for the purpose of grace period voting by the election authority. The election authority may allow grace period voting by mail only if the election authority has no ballots prepared at the authority's office. Grace period voting shall be in a manner substantially similar to voting under Article 19.

Within one day after a voter casts a grace period ballot, but not later than the day of the primary or election, or within one day after the ballot is received by the election authority if the election authority allows grace period voting by mail, the election authority shall transmit by electronic means pursuant to a process established by the State Board of Elections the voter's name, street address, e-mail address, and precinct, ward, township, and district numbers, as the case may be, to the State Board of Elections, which shall maintain those names and that information in an electronic format on its website, arranged by county and accessible to State and local political committees. The name of each person issued a grace period ballot shall also be placed on the appropriate precinct list of persons to whom absentee and early ballots have been issued, for use as provided in Sections 17-9 and 18-5.
