Senator O'Malley offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 214

WHEREAS, The United States Congress has called breast cancer a "growing epidemic" and breast cancer is the leading form of cancer among American women; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that 182,000 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed each year in American women, and breast cancer is a major cause of death among middle-aged women; it is estimated that 46,000 women will die each year from breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, American women, in general, have at least a 10% lifetime risk of developing breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, It is reported that the risk of breast cancer increases 30% in women who had an abortion; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that there is created the Abortion-Breast Cancer Task Force consisting of 5 members of the Senate, with 3 members appointed by the President of the Senate (one of whom shall be designated as chairperson) and 2 members appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; all of whom shall serve without compensation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall study various issues relating to the link between cancer and abortion, and that the Task Force shall examine, among other issues it chooses to investigate, the following:

1 Is there a link between induced abortion and breast cancer?

2 Is there a link between miscarriage (spontaneous abortion) and breast cancer?

3 Is there a plausible biological mechanism that can explain how abortion could increase the risk of breast cancer?

4 Is there any experimental evidence in addition to

epidemiological evidence of an abortion-breast cancer link?

5 Is there evidence that abortion interacts with any other variables known to influence breast cancer risk, such as age, number and timing of children, and family history of breast cancer?

6 What action is necessary to ensure that women and their doctors are well informed about health risks identified by the Task Force?

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall meet at the call of the chairperson, shall hold public meetings, shall receive the assistance of legislative staff, and shall report its findings and recommendations concerning various issues relating to the existence of a link between abortion and breast cancer to the Senate by filing a copy of its report with the Secretary of the Senate on or before February 28, 2000; and that upon filing its report the Task Force is dissolved.

Senator W. Jones offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 215

WHEREAS, Meghan Krueger was born on October 23, 1984 in Arlington Heights, Illinois, and was a lifelong resident of Schaumburg; and

WHEREAS, She was the daughter of Mike and Jill Krueger and the sister of Amanda and Jenny Krueger; and

WHEREAS, She loved animals, music, sports, family, and Jesus Christ and will be remembered for her contagious smile; and

WHEREAS, She was an incoming freshman of Hoffman Estates High School; and

WHEREAS, On August 20, 1999, she was on her way home from school to tell her family that she had made the varsity swim team when she was tragically struck by a van; and

WHEREAS, She left this world on August 30, 1999, and is missed by many, and

WHEREAS, Pedestrian overpasses will be built because of the intercession of Governor George Ryan; there are two proposed overpasses on Gannon Road, at the intersections of both Golf Road and Higgins Road, in Hoffman Estates near Hoffman Estates High School; and

WHEREAS, The overpasses will provide a safe passage for children to get to and from Hoffman Estates High School without interfering with the flow of traffic; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the two proposed overpasses on Gannon Road, at the intersections of both Golf Road and Higgins Road in Hoffman Estates, will be named the Meghan Krueger Overpasses; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation be requested to erect, at a suitable location consistent with State and federal regulations, an appropriate plaque or signs giving notice of the name; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Mike and Jill Krueger and the Secretary of Transportation.

Senator Philip offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules:

Senate RESOLUTION NO. 216

WHEREAS, Unfunded mandates by the United States Congress and the executive branch of the federal government increasingly strain already-tight state government budgets if the states are to comply; and

WHEREAS, To further compound this assault on state revenues, federal district courts, with the blessing of the United States Supreme Court, continue to order states to levy or increase taxes to supplement their budgets to comply with federal mandates; and

WHEREAS, The court's actions are an intrusion into a legitimate legislative debate over state spending priorities and not a response to a constitutional directive; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution of the United States of America does not allow, nor do the states need, judicial intervention requiring tax levies or increases as solutions to potentially serious problems; and

WHEREAS, This usurpation of legislative authority begins a process that over time could threaten the fundamental concept of separation of powers that is precious to the preservation of the form of our government embodied by the Constitution of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, Fifteen states, including Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Delaware, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Nevada, New York, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee and Utah, have petitioned the United States Congress to propose an amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America that reads as follows:

"Neither the Supreme Court nor any inferior court of the United States shall have the power to instruct or order a state or political subdivision thereof, or an official of such state or political subdivision, to levy or increase taxes."; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, That this legislative body respectfully requests and petitions the Congress of the United States to propose submission to the states for their ratification an amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America to restrict the ability of the United States Supreme Court or any inferior court of the United States to mandate any state or political subdivision of the state to levy or increase taxes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the United States Senate, the Secretary of the United States Senate, the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of the Illinois Congressional delegation.

Senators Maitland offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 45

WHEREAS, Illinois' 76,000 farmers are the stewards of much of our land base and grow the crops and livestock we all rely on for food, while maintaining open space, scenic views, and wildlife habitat and together comprise Illinois' leading industry; and

WHEREAS, In many parts of Illinois prime farmland faces intense development pressure; and

WHEREAS, It is critically important for Illinois to develop sound and balanced public policies that address farmland and open space needs while preserving the availability and affordability of housing for our citizens; and

WHEREAS, The development of sound land use, housing, and transportation policies would be enhanced by bringing together public

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officials and private organizations who are dedicated to dealing effectively with these issues; and

WHEREAS, Better planning could guide new development to locations where public infrastructure is already in place or nearby, thus reducing damage to the environment and helping sustain our rural heritage; therefore be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Illinois Growth Task Force:

(a) The Task Force consists of at least 12 members and not more than 24 members chosen according to the following requirements:

(1) Six voting members appointed from the House of Representatives, with 3 members appointed by the Speaker and 3 members appointed by the Minority Leader;

(2) Six voting members appointed from the Senate, with 3 members appointed by the President and 3 members appointed by the Minority Leader;

(3) Up to 12 non-voting members appointed from pertinent fields or disciplines by the legislative members of the Task Force, by majority vote, from the following categories:

- (A) Agriculture;
- (B) Environment;
- (C) Local government;
- (D) Real estate;
- (E) Regional planning;
- (F) Building trades and construction;
- (G) Business;

(b) A majority of the legislative appointees shall select a legislative member of the Task Force to serve as chairperson;

(c) The Lieutenant Governor, the Director of Agriculture, the Director of Commerce and Community Affairs, the Director of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Director of Natural Resources, the Secretary of Transportation, and the Chairman of the Illinois Housing Development Authority, or their designees, shall serve as advisory non-voting delegates to the Task Force;

(d) The legislative members may appoint a Planning Committee consisting of non-voting, advisory members to assist with the Task Force;

(e) The Task Force has the following objectives:

(1) Conduct a series of public hearings throughout the State to discuss with citizens in different regions their visions and plans for Illinois in the 21st Century with respect to land use, housing and transportation priorities, and the preservation of open space, farmland, and natural areas;

(2) Develop a set of statewide land use, housing, and transportation goals, based on the testimony of citizens at the task force hearings around Illinois;

(3) Propose enabling legislation and identify revenue sources and incentives to meet the goals of the Task Force;

(4) Review existing State statutes affecting farmland and development to identify gaps and duplications;

(5) Review State and regional land use and transportation policies and priorities to determine their impact on regional development patterns, farmland, agriculture, open space, and housing, and recommend appropriate changes in policy and funding priorities;

(6) Review State and regional land use, planning, and zoning policies to determine their impact on agriculture, open space, and housing, and recommend appropriate changes in policy and funding priorities to promote balanced growth;

(7) Review the policies and programs of other states to identify successful legislative and policy initiatives that could be

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adapted for Illinois to ensure sustainable growth in the 21st century;

(8) Discuss formation of a permanent working group or commission on growth issues, including designation of a lead State agency;

(f) The Task Force shall receive the assistance of legislative staff, legislative agencies, and, upon request, private and public organizations;

(g) The members of the Task Force shall serve without compensation but be reimbursed for their reasonable and necessary expenses from funds appropriated for that purpose; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Growth Task Force shall meet as soon as possible after at least 9 legislative members have been appointed, shall hold public hearings, and shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly by filing a copy of its report with the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House; and that upon filing its report the task force is dissolved.

Sec. 6z-43. Tobacco Settlement Recovery Fund. There is created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known as the Tobacco

Settlement Recovery Fund into which shall be deposited all monies paid to the State pursuant to (1) the Master Settlement Agreement entered in the case of People of the State of Illinois v. Philip Morris, et al. (Circuit Court of Cook County, No. 96-L13146) and (2) any settlement with or judgment against any tobacco product manufacturer other than one participating in the Master Settlement Agreement in satisfaction of any released claim as defined in the Master Settlement Agreement, as well as any other monies as provided by law. All earnings on Fund investments shall be deposited into the Fund. Upon the creation of the Fund, the State Comptroller shall order the State Treasurer to transfer into the Fund any monies paid to the State as described in item (1) or (2) of this Section before the creation of the Fund plus any interest earned on the investment of those monies.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law."

(625 ILCS 5/12-815) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 12-815)

Sec. 12-815. Strobe lamp on school bus.

(a) A school bus ~~manufactured purchased~~ prior to January 1, 2000 ~~the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 91st General Assembly~~ may be equipped with one strobe lamp that will emit 60 to 120 flashes per minute of white or bluish-white light visible to a motorist approaching the bus from any direction. A school bus ~~manufactured purchased~~ on or after January 1, 2000 ~~the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 91st General Assembly~~ shall be equipped with one strobe lamp that will emit 60 to 120 flashes per minute of white or bluish-white light visible to a motorist approaching the bus from any direction. The lamp shall be of sufficient brightness to be visible in normal sunlight when viewed directly from a distance of at least one mile.

(b) The strobe lamp shall be mounted on the rooftop of the bus with the light generating element in the lamp located equidistant from each side and either at or behind the center of the rooftop. The maximum height of the element above the rooftop shall not exceed 1/30 of its distance from the rear of the rooftop. If the structure of the strobe lamp obscures the light generating element, the element shall be deemed to be in the center of the lamp with a maximum height 1/4 inch less than the maximum height of the strobe lamp unless otherwise indicated in rules and regulations promulgated by the Department. The Department may promulgate rules and regulations to govern measurements, glare, effectiveness and protection of strobe lamps on school buses, including higher strobe lamps than authorized

in this paragraph.

(c) The strobe lamp may be lighted only when the school bus is actually being used as a school bus and:

1. is stopping or stopped for loading or discharging pupils on a highway outside an urban area; or
2. is bearing one or more pupils and is either stopped or, in the interest of safety, is moving very slowly at a speed:
 - (i) less than the posted minimum speed limit, or
 - (ii) less than 30 miles per hour on a highway outside

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an urban area.

Where this Act makes changes in a "statute that is represented in this Act by text that is not yet or no longer in effect (for example, a Section represented by multiple versions), the use of that text does not accelerate or delay the taking effect of (i) the changes made by this Act or (ii) provisions derived from any other Public Act.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law."

WHEREAS, The United States Food and Drug Administration has ordered that any medical device containing latex carry a warning about potential allergic reactions; and

WHEREAS, The National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health issued an alert requesting assistance in preventing allergic reactions to natural rubber latex among workers who use gloves and other products containing latex; and

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WHEREAS, The Food and Drug Administration issued final rules that went into effect September 30, 1998, requiring labeling statements concerning the presence of natural rubber latex in medical devices; and

WHEREAS, Latex gloves have been used as a tool in the health care industry by health care workers to prevent the transmission of many infectious diseases; latex is used in emergency equipment, personal protective equipment, office supplies, and hospital and household supplies; and

WHEREAS, Latex is also used in other industries, such as child care, food service, and food processing; and

WHEREAS, With its growing use, there is more awareness that latex and latex-containing products may trigger an allergic reaction; allergic reaction to latex comes in three types: irritant contact dermatitis, allergic contact dermatitis, and latex allergy; and

WHEREAS, Reactions to latex may include skin rashes, hives, itching, swollen red skin, swollen lips and tongue, shortness of breath, dizziness, fainting, eye or synus symptoms, asthma, rapid heart rate, and, on rare occasions, shock; and

WHEREAS, The most severe cases can result in severe blood pressure drop and loss of consciousness; and

WHEREAS, Latex allergy develops most commonly in people who have frequent or intimate exposure to it; at high risk are those who have had frequent surgical procedures, particularly in infancy, and workers with occupational exposure; and

WHEREAS, The number of health care workers and others affected will continue to increase because frequent exposure to latex causes the development of the allergy; and

WHEREAS, The need to protect the residents, including health care workers, against latex allergies is a public health issue and awareness of the public health threat through education is the key to prevention of latex allergic reactions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we hereby proclaim the week of October 1 through 7, 2000 as "Latex Allergy Awareness Week" in an effort to urge all Illinoisans to become educated about latex allergies; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Emergency Medical Services Systems of the State of Illinois Department of Public Health.
