Senator Cullerton seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2970 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2970. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Tom Cullerton. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Cullerton, on your amendment. SENATOR T. CULLERTON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'll explain it on 3rd. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2970. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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Senate Bill 2970.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Cullerton, on your bill. SENATOR T. CULLERTON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the General Assembly. I appreciate everybody's hard work on this bill. We've had multiple hearings in Executive and came to a -- a great compromise after our amendments. I want to thank my cosponsors and I would ask for an Aye vote and I'll take any questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2970 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2970, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3001. Senator Sandoval. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3033. Senator Weaver. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3033.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Weaver, on your bill. SENATOR WEAVER:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. This bill modifies the term

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"industrial development agency" to include local school districts and community colleges. What it will allow is for the acquisition of equipment to help with career development. And -- just something I think was very important with regard to how we're trying to develop our workforce for the future. There's no opposition on this bill and I'd request an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Holmes, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you so much, Mr. President. I do have just one question. I believe I did ask this in committee when... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

He indicates he will yield. SENATOR HOLMES:

Oh, come on. Thank you. So my question is basically, this is a grant that has never been funded as long as it's been in -in DCEO and I'm just wondering how and what your plans are to get the funding in order to do this?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Weaver.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you for the question. This has been sitting where this funding has been available for other entities, but never for local schools. And we believe that people are beginning to understand the importance of manufacturing, how we're going to be able to prepare people for that. We believe school districts will start asking for this funding. We know that before it can happen, there's got to be a threshold of twenty-five

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employers that are asking that school district to ask. And it's going be something to move ahead on parallel paths - one side's the demand and then the other side's the ability to fund it. And we hope that can happen.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3033 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 51 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3033, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. WCIA 3 seeks permission to record video. Seeing no objection, permission granted. Senate Bill 3046. Senator Manar. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3046.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Manar, on your bill.

SENATOR MANAR:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill came from the Retired Teachers Association and it requires -- or, excuse me -- allows eligible TRS benefit recipients to elect not to participate in CMS health benefit programs, provided that they prove that they have health benefit coverage. I know of no opposition. Be happy to take any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates he will yield.

SENATOR TRACY:

Senator Manar, I believe that in committee we talked about possibly an amendment in -- on the House side. Is that correct? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Manar.

SENATOR MANAR:

Yes, I would've been happy to put it on this bill. I just hadn't -- haven't received it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Right. That's my recollection. I just wanted to confirm that. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3046 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. 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Senator Aquino. Senate Bill 3190. Senator Bertino-Tarrant. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3224. Senator Nybo. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3228. Senator Harmon. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3229. Senator Harmon. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3249. Senator Steans. Senator Steans seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3249 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3249. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Steans. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Steans, on your amendment. SENATOR STEANS:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. This bill, as amended, requires a study on the roles and contributions of LGBT people in the history of the State and the country. We've made a lot of changes based on a lot of input, which I appreciate, and it's incorporating it just in the areas like it does for many other -- in the -- in the study of history like it does for many other populations in the State. I look forward to your support and then I'm happy to answer any questions you may have. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any questions on the amendment? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 3249. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3249.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Steans, on your bill.

SENATOR STEANS:

As noted on the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Barickman, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

A question of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

She indicates she will yield.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Senator, if you could, for legislative intent, I'd like to ask a few questions. First, for the amended Section 27-21, regarding History of the United States, who determines the curriculum?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Steans.

SENATOR STEANS:

It is the local school district that sets curriculum and including determining the minimum amount of instructional time required. We're maintaining local control. It's preserved under

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this bill. They get to leave it in as they desire in their local curriculums, each school district.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Does Senate Bill 3249, as amended, require school districts to include the instruction at a specific grade level? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Steans.

SENATOR STEANS:

No, it does not. The legislation does not require that instruction be at a specific grade level. Again, it's up to local control to determine how to weave it into their curriculum. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. I want to commend the sponsor of the bill for her work on this legislation. Her amendment, through her -- her work and negotiation, I think does some important things that the Body should consider. The bill, as amended -- as amended, and I think we just reflected that in our -- in our -- in our discussion here, preserves local control. The amendment, I think rightfully so, weaves this into an existing school law. It does not impose a new mandate in the School Code. And finally, to the substance of the bill, I think that it ensures simply that the

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history that is taught is factual and accurate, and so I intend to support it. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Weaver, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Yeah, I appreciate the comments that were made, but even after those comments are considered, the School Management Alliance has still remained a No vote on this or has -- is an opponent on this and they still believe that there's unnecessary mandates here and also curriculum control that this is taking away. I don't understand the dynamics of the difference here, but I know they've still remained as an opponent. I'd just encourage the folks to take a serious look at this. I know I'll personally be a No vote on it. There's also concerns about religious freedoms with regard to folks that may have a difference in opinion with regard to how this is handled in a curriculum basis. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Senator Bertino-Tarrant, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

To the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

I'm rising today in support of Senator Steans' bill. I do

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appreciate all the work that she has done, listening to her constituents, and even in my local -- my local paper today there was a nice article 'cause -- that took the students' perspective. And this is what we really have to -- to remember when we -- we look at legislation. This is -- this is not an additional mandate. We have -- there's a lot of mandates we can look at in regards to what we teach our students that probably have less importance than what we are talking about today. So I thank the sponsor for working with many people in this Chamber and with the community, and I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Senator Steans, to close. SENATOR STEANS:

Yes, I think this bill means a great deal to -- to a number of people. What we find is, there is an enormous drop, thirtysix percent drop, in people feeling bullied and getting derogatory remarks made about them when they're included in the curriculum, people of LGBTQ personalities. It matters, it really does. What -- few things that we do here really do help in that regard. I know there's been concerns about religious freedom. That's not what this is trying to do. As the <u>Sun-Times</u> noted in their support of this, it's just acknowledging that a person of historical significant {sic} was gay, lesbian, transgender, or bisexual. It makes no value judgment, except to say the person existed and made contributions. That's not the intent. This is just historical facts that we're going for. So I do appreciate your support and consideration of this very important bill. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 3249 pass. All those in

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favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 34 Ayes, 18 Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3249, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3289. Senator Nybo. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3301. Senator Tom Cullerton. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3388. Senator Clayborne. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3388.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Clayborne, on your bill.

SENATOR CLAYBORNE:

Thank you, Mr. President and -- Members of the Senate. Basically, this bill just allows the expansion of Adult Redeploy -- I mean, to expand the -- the eligibility of Redeploy. It is not a mandate. It is very permissive, and there are some court systems, some counties that would like to expand and include those individuals who they can help get back on the track -- get back on track in our society. I would ask for your favorable vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall 3388 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3388, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared

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passed. Senate Bill 3418. Senator Rezin. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3443. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3443 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3443. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Harmon. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your amendment. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I move for the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 3443. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3443.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your bill.

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SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 3443 is the Secretary of State's initiative to update our notary laws. I'm not aware of any opposition and I ask you for your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will vote -- just -- just -- all those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3443, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3535. Senator Righter. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3535.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Righter, on your bill. SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you very much, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Chamber. Senate Bill 3535 relates to fire inspections of CILA facilities in Illinois. Last year, we passed a handful of bills that became law that were reforms to the CILA regulation process. In error, one of those bills that became law actually removed the Office of State Fire Marshals' responsibility to oversee fire inspections for these facilities. This bill would simply reinstitute their obligation in that regard. Be happy to answer

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any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3535 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3535, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3543. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3543 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Harmon. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your amendment. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I move for the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting -- the Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 3543. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3543.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your bill. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 3543, as amended, reflects an agreement between the Village of Bensenville in my district and the Illinois Department of Transportation for the conveyance of a piece of property that will -- is being used by the Tollway, but with the completion of roadwork, will no longer be needed. I'd ask for your Aye votes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3543 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3543, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3577. Senator Harmon. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3604. Senator Tom Cullerton. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 3604.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Cullerton, on your bill.

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SENATOR T. CULLERTON:

Thank you, Mr. -- thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 3604 creates the Government Severance Pay Act. Provides a unit of local government -- enters into a contract with executive level employees, the contract cannot exceed twenty weeks in severance pay. We've seen rampant cases of abuse throughout the State. And I would appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator McConchie, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR McCONCHIE:

...bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR McCONCHIE:

I just want to commend the sponsor on his hard work on this. I think that it is -- I was very glad to hear that we're applying this to all levels of government so that we don't have this kind of situation that has happened, especially at some universities and so forth, hopefully ever happen again. And so I would also encourage an Aye vote as well. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3604 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record -- will -- could -- take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3604, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed.

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Senator Haine, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR HAINE:

For purposes of introduction of guests, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your introductions.

SENATOR HAINE:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I would like to introduce, first of all, a longtime friend from Alton, Attorney Jonathan Forbes. He's an attorney with the distinguished law firm of Gori Julian in Edwardsville. Mr. Forbes. And then, secondly, I wish to introduce my eldest son, Thomas, who's also a lawyer, thank God, in Clayton with the firm of Armstrong Teasdale. And his lovely wife, Eva, and their three sons, Anselm, Joseph, and little Gabriel Bosco Haine. Ladies and Gentlemen, if you'd give them a welcome, I'd appreciate it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine, we'd like to know which numbers they are. SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you, Mr. President, for that question. Young Gabriel Bosco is our thirty-third grandchild. So we are still moving ahead to bring solvency to Social Security by the time you retire. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senate Bill 35. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 35 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Seeing -- leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 35. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Harmon.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your amendment. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would like to explain this amendment. This amendment was sent straight to the Floor and didn't come through committee. It is merely deleting a paragraph that raised the objection of the State Police to the underlying Immigration Safe Zones Act. So the amendment would delete the offending paragraph. I'd move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 35. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 35.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your bill.

SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 35 creates the Immigration Safe Zones Act. This was

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a component of the TRUST Act that the General Assembly passed in the last Session. The -- the paragraph that I just deleted in the amendment was the paragraph that was upsetting to the State Police and other law enforcement that would have precluded law enforcement from cooperating in certain safe zones. The -- what remains of the bill is a charge to the Attorney General to promulgate model policies for operating within these designated safe zones. With the amendment, I'm not aware of any opposition, but I'd be happy to answer any questions you might have. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 35 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 31 Ayes, 16 Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 35, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 337. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 337 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 337. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Harmon. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harmon, on your amendment. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Here, too, I would like to explain the amendment. This is the revamped Gun Dealer Licensing bill. It embodies Senate Bill 1657,

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which the Governor vetoed as well as the trailer bill that we adopted subsequent to that. I want to assure the Chamber that I am not calling this bill on 3rd Reading. I am merely adopting the amendment. I'd move for its adoption. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Senate Bill 486. Senator Haine. Senator Haine seeks leave of the Body to... Senate Bill 486. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon. Out of the record. Senator Haine, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HAINE:

Mr. President, would the Chamber and the President be open to - since we followed a bill on immigration - a little historic reference?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

In your case, Senator Haine, that's always in order. SENATOR HAINE:

I wish to call attention to the fact that seventy-two hours from today is the 5th of May, Cinco de Mayo, the independence day of Mexico, when they freed themselves from the rule of French tyranny, a monarchy imposed upon them by Emperor Napoleon III. They were assisted -- Benito Juárez was assisted in that effort by none other than General Philip Sheridan, remarkable Civil War

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cavalry officer, who was assigned to the Department of Texas and Louisiana during the Reconstruction. He -- he did -- did a number of things in that regard. He removed the Governors of Louisiana and Texas, removed them from office by the point of a gun because they were assisting the Ku Klux Klan in murdering Black citizens, freed men, who wished to vote. He also arrested and courtmartialed several thousand Ku Klux Klansmen, broke the back of the KKK. He ordered mayors in Louisiana and Texas to hire half of their police forces from Union veterans, which would include African Americans - half. He went on to give arms, several thousand in guns and ammunition, to Benito Juárez on the orders of General Grant, who at that time was General of the United States Army. And Sheridan issued an order to the French troops that if they didn't vacate Mexico, his battle-hardened Union troops would decimate the earth with the bodies of the French, and they left. Maximilian, the erstwhile tyrant, was executed for treason and Juárez became President of Mexico. It was a great partnership between the United States and the people of Mexico for responsible government and we should take an example from that and return to that these days. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Back to our other business. Senate Bill 888. Out of the record. Senate Bill -- Senate Bill 2236. Senator Bertino-Tarrant. Out of the record. Can we keep the noise down a little bit, please? Senate Bill 2269. Senator Manar. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2271. Senator Tracy. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2314. Senator Morrison. Senator Morrison. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2337. Senator Muñoz. Senator Muñoz. Senate Bill 2339. Senator Muñoz. Senate Bill 2351. Senator Lightford.

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Senator Lightford. Senate Bill 2376. Senator Harris. Senator Harris seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2376 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2376. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Harris. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harris, on your amendment. SENATOR HARRIS:

I move for its adoption. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2376. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2376.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Harris, on your bill.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. Senate Bill

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2376, the amendment creates the Cook County Water Infrastructure Fund. It's -- it's a measure to improve infrastructure improvements for facility {sic} water supplies from Lake Michigan for residents of Cook County. And I would appreciate your support. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2376 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2376, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2411. Senator Aquino. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2429. Senator Aquino. Mr. -- Senator Aquino seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2429 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2429. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Aquino. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Aquino, on your amendment. SENATOR AQUINO:

I ask to adopt the amendment and I'll explain it on 3rd. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2429. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2429.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Aquino, on your bill. SENATOR AOUINO:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2429 amends the Public Aid Code and requires HFS to provide preventative dental care to all Medicaid-eligible adults. Preventative dental care services are currently only available to individuals under twenty-one years old and pregnant women. It also requires -- number -- number one, it requires HFS to monitor MCOs and their dental administrator and collect information on care coordination occurring between the two and, secondly, requires managed care organizations to confirm receipt of information on changes to dentists in the MCO's network within three days. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Syverson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Questions of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

He indicates he will yield.

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SENATOR SYVERSON:

Senator, appreciate your work on this and I know we've gone back and forth on some of the numbers and ways to try to bring this more in line to what could be handled budgetarily, but a couple questions. What is the estimated -- what is the Department's estimated cost for implementing this procedure? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you, Mr. -- Senator. So, as you can imagine, the Department and the Dental Society, who are the proponents of these -- this legislation, have different numbers. HFS ranges from an expenditure of ten -- ten million to I believe up to twenty-six million dollars a year. Illinois Dental Society has a lower number, as you can imagine, at about five million. And I believe that this is -- HFS's number is without the match from the federal government, so it'd be technically half of that. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

RESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIN

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

And, Senator, I would agree with you on that range between those -- those two -- those two groups. The -- some of the discussion was about - because of the budgetary problem - about making some phase-ins or making some limitations to it, maybe just one cleaning or checkup a year or one cleaning and checkup for certain types of individual that have certain dental anomalies going on, as a way to try to reduce that cost. Have there been any further discussions on that? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Senator Aquino. SENATOR AQUINO:

Well, a couple things. I was just notified by staff that we can do that in rules. However, I do know that the Dental Society and HFS have -- have -- have been having discussions about this. I haven't seen any new language, but I know -- I know that they are working together and have been since we've -- since I've introduced this bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Yeah, I think we can find for a -- for a limited amount of dollars, we can find some of those -- those individuals that would fall under that high urgency need, that we could -- we could get this much more narrow so it could be something that's possibly affordable. And I guess, question is, whether or not you would be open to trying to narrow this to a point where maybe we can end up getting support from the administration, and if so, are you open to working with those -- or get a -- or give a commitment that working with the sponsor on the other side that we can have those discussions?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Well, I'm -- I'm certainly open to -- to -- to having those discussions. We've been having these discussions, not only with HFS, but we had discussions with the MCOs and got them to neutral over time. So I'm hoping that on the other side, they would continue that. I know that the Dental Society has been diligent

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in making sure that they had been taking that point. I think in -- if you remember in committee, Dave Marsh, did indicate, it seemed, that he was willing to consider some of this -- some of these suggestions. But, again, Mr. -- Senator, we haven't seen any new language from HFS, but I -- I would encourage that on the other side, if they did present some new language, that they would -- they would include it in -- in the bill, if they'd like. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Syverson. SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you. This is just the last question. It -- one other concern I have is, if we start paying for this procedure -currently, a number of the MCOs already do this themselves and they pay for it. They do that as a -- as a -- marketing to try to get more individuals to go into their MCO. And so, currently, we have MCOs that are out of their own pocket paying for the adult dental. If we start funding that, obviously they're not going to do that any longer and so what we're ending up doing is we're -we're -- we're paying someone who's already voluntarily doing it, which is also a concern. And I don't know if there's a better way to do that, where if these guys want to keep doing that, we should be encouraging them to do that at -- on their dime and not on the taxpayers' dime. But with that in mind, I -- I think this needs work. More things need to be done, and because there's a cost factor, we don't have the budget yet done, I would encourage our side to vote No until we have an agreement and a budget is done and we know how much we can afford to increase in the dental line now. But, Senator, I appreciate your working on it and getting it to where we are today and hope we can get it over the finish line.

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Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator McGuire, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR McGUIRE:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR McGUIRE:

I simply want to explain to the Members why I became the chief cosponsor of Senate Bill 2429. It was not as a result of a conversation with the State Dental Society nor with my friend and colleague, Senator Aquino. It was after the executive director of a large provider of services to developmentally disabled adults in my district mentioned to me that his agency, his non-profit, serves non-verbal intellectually/developmentally disabled adults who simply cannot tell anyone, anyone caring for them or any family member, when their teeth hurt. Thus, the need for preventive services covering adults, especially this population, strikes me as convincing. And I urge a -- I appreciate the sponsor's work on this. I appreciate the conversation with the previous speaker. And, again, please be mindful of that - nonverbal, intellectually/developmentally disabled adults who currently do not receive preventive dental care. This bill would enable them to receive that care. I urge a Yes vote. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Senator Aquino, to close. SENATOR AQUINO:

I just want to say that if the private industry, these MCOs, were doing this, and some of 'em are, but they're -- it's not for

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everyone that is Medicaid eligible, and so we want to make sure that everyone in -- in our State that is Medicaid eligible gets the needed preventative care, dental care, that they should be given. And so I ask -- I ask my colleagues for an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2429 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 39 Ayes, 14 Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2429, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2439. Senator Bennett. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2439.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Bennett, on your bill. SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Mr. President. 2439, as we amended it, would allow an individual -- I'm sorry, would -- would mean that an individual's professional license could not be denied, revoked, or suspended due to defaulting on a student loan. We've passed in the -- we have passed this out of this Chamber in the past with, I think, pretty bipartisan support. Our problem has been in the House, but we are continuing to work for amendments {sic}. I'd ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2439 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that who wish? question, there are 54 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2439, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2441. Senator Hastings. Senator Hastings. Senate Bill 2480. Senator Hastings. Senate Bill 2492. Senator Rezin. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2521. Senator Out of the record. Senate Bill 2522. Stadelman. Senator Stadelman. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2541. Senator Lightford. Senator Lightford. Senate Bill 2542 -- or Senate Bill 2552. Senator Steans. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2562. Senator Sandoval. Senator Sandoval. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2562.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Sandoval, on your bill. SENATOR SANDOVAL:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Illinois Senate. I'd like to remind everyone, Members of the Senate, that recent atrocities have highlighted a need for greater security at large public -- large-scale public events. Senate Bill 2562 would give law enforcement the authority to utilize drones to prepare and monitor safety and security at large-scale events. The measure -- I want to remind everyone that Senate Bill 2562 passed out of

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the Senate Judiciary Committee. I don't want Chicago to be the next Vegas-style outdoor terrorist attack. I -- but I also don't want drones to be in -- surveilling everyone's move day in and day out. This bill clearly is limited to the use of drone usage for providing safety of crowd control without stripping the public of its privacy rights. Drones are already used in Los Angeles and Boston, and we know what happened in Los Angeles and we know what happened in Boston. The bill before you reflects the laws in Las Vegas and in Massachusetts. I just want to remind -- just -- I just want you to remember that last October's massacre in Las Vegas, which killed fifty-eight and injured hundreds as the shooter rained bullets down from a hotel room, and just remember that we learned that the shooter booked, but never checked into a hotel room overlooking Lollapalooza in downtown Chicago. The only thing that stopped the attack on Lollapalooza is that the shooter never checked into the room. My children were at Lollapalooza and may -- and like your children, may have been subject to a shooter sitting in a hotel room raining bullets upon them. It's our responsibility to provide the maximum protection of all the residents of Illinois, whether it's at Lollapalooza or at the Illinois State Fair this year. I'd ask a favorable vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Haine, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR HAINE:

Mr. President, would the sponsor yield for questions dealing with legislative intent?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates he will.

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SENATOR HAINE:

Senator Sandoval, the bill provides that a drone could be used at a private or public event with one hundred or more people. Does that mean law enforcement could use a drone to monitor a private event in my backyard?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Sandoval.

SENATOR SANDOVAL:

Senator Haine, there must always be a "legitimate law enforcement purpose". If there is no legitimate law enforcement purpose to surveil a peaceful private party, then law enforcement cannot use a drone at an event. An individual's private event, on their own property, would not fall under the exception for law enforcement for use of a drone. The bill states that large-scale events are events taking place at a sports or entertainment arena, a stadium, a convention hall, a special event center, an amusement facility, any special event licensed or permitted by the unit of local government, or an event open to the public or on government property.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you. The second question is, what if someone rents out a public space for a private event, for example, for a family reunion of my children and grandchildren, which would be over one hundred people, such as a large wedding or a large picnic? Could law enforcement use a drone to monitor our event? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Sandoval.

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SENATOR SANDOVAL:

Senator Haine, again, if there is no legitimate law enforcement purpose to surveil the party at "Casa Haine", then law enforcement cannot use a drone to monitor the event.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you, Mr. President. And I would also ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Raoul, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR RAOUL:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR RAOUL:

The exchange on legislative intent makes an attempt to address questions that I raised during committee. For my sake, I appreciate the -- the -- the value of the utilization of drones to provide for law enforcement to have a tool to protect against tragic incidents that happen at mass gatherings and public forums. But the recitation of no legitimate law enforcement purpose remains vague to me. We took a step years ago to make sure that warrants would have to be issued for the utilization of drones to -- to invade upon private locations. And I think leaving that language is better than just this legislative intent that makes reference to the no legitimate law enforcement purposes. And so, notwithstanding that I know that my colleague's intention and the City of Chicago's intentions are to utilize - I want to trust - to

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utilize the drones to protect against a tragic incident at Lollapalooza or some other mass gathering at a park, I'm not left with a feeling of comfort by a reference to no legitimate law enforcement purpose. And so for that reason, I cannot be in support of this measure.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Oberweis, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR OBERWEIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of this outstanding bill by this outstanding Senator. Thank you very much. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Senator Sandoval, to close. SENATOR SANDOVAL:

I'd ask a favorable vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2562 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 36 Ayes, 2 Nays, 6 voting Present. Senate Bill 2562, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2339. Senator Muñoz. Senator Muñoz seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2339 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2339. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment 2, offered by Senator Muñoz. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your amendment.

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SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. The amendment becomes the bill, which I will explain on 3rd Reading, and I ask for its adoption. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2339. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2339.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your bill. SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. The bill seeks to provide courts with more guidance when a person is charged with possession of a stolen motor vehicle. It provides that knowledge that the vehicle is stolen and -- may be inferred from surrounding facts and circumstances, which would lead a reasonable person to believe the vehicle was stolen. It creates a new process to deal with minors for carjacking or possessions of a stolen motor vehicle. And it provides that those minors be evaluated and receive counseling and other recommended services.

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I'd like to thank Senator Bennett, Senator Cunningham, for their input on this bill, as well as staff on both sides of the aisle. I will attempt to answer any questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Connelly, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CONNELLY:

To the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR CONNELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Leader Muñoz. We talked a little bit at committee and after committee about the problems with carjacking throughout the City and -- and surrounding suburbs. Yesterday, on the way driving down to the Capitol, I -- I heard Superintendent Johnson talking about this problem and he indicated that he was sick and tired of hearing -- or arresting kids on Friday afternoon and the same kids being back on the street on Sunday and being rearrested on Monday for a subsequent carjacking. This bill is a step in the right direction, but, Leader, we have a long way to go. There are other issues we need to address to help Superintendent Johnson, help the Chicago police, and help law enforcement. I commend the sponsor for this bill. I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Raoul, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR RAOUL:

To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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To the bill. SENATOR RAOUL:

I want to -- I want to express appreciation to the sponsor for the work on this bill. There was a -- another version of this bill in the -- in the House of Representatives. I think the -the way that the sponsor worked on this bill is -- makes sure that we don't take a -- we don't overstep and cast a net too wide, such that we distinguish between those who are participating in the vehicular carjacking, as opposed to those who may be joyriding and shouldn't be lumped into the same pool. And I think the step of making certain that we get counseling for some of these juveniles is -- is -- is a good step. And so I commend -- I want to commend the sponsor and urge my colleagues to vote in support of this bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Van Pelt, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR VAN PELT:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

I'm -- I'm rising in support of this bill. I think it's a really important bill and I think it's time to have -- to be able -- for -- for us to have a time when we can sit down and sit -and come together and create a bill like this that actually addresses the real problem. I love it. And I just want to commend the -- the -- commend Senator Muñoz on his work that he did on this bill. And I think it's an important bill and needs to be passed. So I urge an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Senator Cunningham, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

To the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill. SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

I, too, would like to commend the sponsor for being open to the amendment process on this bill to address a lot of concerns that had been verbalized by a -- a number of Members, and I think he, as Senator Raoul referred to, I think he's really struck a good balance there. I think it's important to focus on the juvenile piece here. Earlier this year, the Chicago Sun-Times did a story on carjackings in Chicago. As many of you know, they're -- they're way up. Last year, there were nearly a thousand carjackings in the City of Chicago. Various reports have found that a majority of the arrests made in those carjackings have been of juvenile suspects. So that has really fueled the problem. But what we have seen is that a number of the juveniles are almost immediately released after they are picked up on these very serious There were forty-nine youthful offenders, juveniles, charges. arrested in Cook County last year for carjacking. Thirty of them were released within twenty-four hours. That's not very -- they're not a very effective example of how we should be administering these cases in juvenile court. This bill recognizes it, and what it does is it takes an existing statute and will ensure that these youthful offenders, when they are arrested, that they undergo some form of psychiatric evaluation while they're in juvenile detention to determine if they are a threat to themselves, they're a threat to the public - I think the evidence is, is that they likely are

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- and it slows down the process. It slows down the revolving door that's currently in place. But, importantly, it does not warehouse these youthful offenders. It ensures that they are getting treatment that they desperately need. So I want to commend the sponsor for adding this amendment and I, too, urge an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Muñoz, to close.

SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Again, thank all of you for your input and help, both sides of the aisle, our staff. Ashley Jenkins did an outstanding job, a lot of research. And hopefully they won't make additional changes in the House. We can't speak for the House Members, but at least we're trying to give 'em something, and if we need to come back on this, we could always do a trailer bill later. I ask for support. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2339 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2339, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we'll turn to page 2 {sic} (22) of the printed Calendar, Postponed Consideration. Senate Bill 2213. This is final action. As the bill is -- in the Order have already been presented and debated on the Floor, debate of each bill will be limited to one proponent and one opponent, each to speak on the

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bill. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2213.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Biss, on your bill.

SENATOR BISS:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. We had a robust debate on this bill late last week. Just to reiterate the key points, this is a bill that would protect the environment should the Trump administration succeed in significantly rolling back environmental regulations. It does not change the status quo. It does not do anything retroactive. It simply creates critical Illinois environmental protections in the event that the Trump administration does what they have unfortunately threatened to do, which is to endanger our -- our environment. I'd appreciate Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Now the opponent. Senator Haine, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HAINE:

In opposition to the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your point.

SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, as a point of background, I represent the Wood River/Roxana area, the home of the largest refinery in the State. And my refinery

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tells me that this bill -- and by the way, this refinery has the largest percentage of union employees of any refinery, maybe of any factory, in the State. They only bring in union AFL-CIO craftsmen, laborers to pipefitters, and they're telling me a number of things. Number one, that this bill is unnecessary, that there hasn't been an instance, where there's a threat to the environment by implementing the bill. If -- if it becomes an issue next year or the year after, the Legislature is always available to remedy that. Number two, there -- there have been some federal rules changes, particularly on emissions, that are in litigation and that the refinery and the other refineries of the State - and -and I can't speak for the other factories, although I will note that the Illinois Manufacturers are strongly opposed to this have the same issue, and to require them to figure out what is extant in January of 2017 to now is simply costly; it brings them into a nationwide figure that we're in a State which is basically hostile to any changes in environmental regs, however reasonable. I understand fully the background of the bill. In fact, I initially was going to vote for it until I realized it goes back to 2017. But this is obviously a reaction to EPA -- national EPA Director Pruitt, who's frankly shown himself somewhat unfit for the office. That's up to the President of the United States to remedy that. But that doesn't mean the -- the -- the EPA regulations that have been mollified or modified are improvident or do anything to harm the people of Illinois or my area. And I would remind us all, again, that these refineries are regulated by the Pollution Control Board, by the national EPA, by the State EPA, I believe by the -- by IDNR, and a -- and a number of other entities. This is a national industry. The other states, which

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would not be following this proposed bill, will look at Illinois as a place that is becoming hostile to fossil fuel refining, and they will make a competitive effort to divert some of the resources from our industries to their refineries. This happened in 2002 and '03 in California to our benefit. ConocoPhillips was debating whether to put a major CORE expansion in one of three states - one of which was California. I can't think of the other one. I feel like the former Governor of Texas. What's the other one? And the -- and one was Illinois in Wood River. And California passed a series of stringent emissions rules. The result was ConocoPhillips put four billion dollars - four billion dollars - into the Wood River refinery over a five-year period, hiring forty-two hundred union craftsmen - forty-two hundred - and brought tremendous benefits to my area as it faced the recession of '08. This is the wrong message at this time. Again, it's not necessary. If it was, it would -- I -- I'm sure the refineries could work out something. The -- the -- and I speak -- I can't speak for CITGO and the other refineries, although I've been in contact with the person representing them. This bill does not specifically spell out actual cases where the Illinois agencies or statutes have failed -- failed the people of Illinois in pollution. This is obviously an effort to rebuke the Trump administration and Director Pruitt - and I'm all for that. I think that's great - if it didn't impact the business environment in Illinois. Every -we are a low-energy State. We have many things that we did to encourage these expansions, and this is a signal we're going in the opposite direction. It is a bad signal at this time and -and I don't -- again, I must say again, to reiterate, it's not necessary. If there's a demonstration that we need to tighten, if

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there's something Pruitt has done that has harmed the air quality in my area, I'd like to know about it. I know of no such act and I -- I have a great and abiding respect for the sponsor and his beliefs and his acumen. After all, he's a professor. I'm a mere lawyer. But in all seriousness, I have a high regard for him and his -- and his proposals are well-meant. In this case, I think this is injurious to the business environment, to the manufacturing base of Illinois, which we're struggling to maintain. And I would respectfully ask for an -- a No vote. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2213 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 32 Ayes, 21 Nays, 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 2213, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Righter, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you much, Mr. President. I would request a verification of the most recent roll call, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator -- Senator Righter has requested verification. Will all Members please be in their seat? Mr. Secretary, will you please read the affirmative votes.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

The following Members voted in the affirmative: Senators Aquino, Bennett, Bertino-Tarrant, Biss, Bush, Castro, Collins, Tom Cullerton, Cunningham, Harmon, Hastings, Holmes, Hunter, Hutchinson, Jones, Koehler, Landek, Lightford, Link, Martinez,

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McGuire, Morrison, Mulroe, Muñoz, Murphy, Raoul, Sandoval, Sims, Stadelman, Steans, Van Pelt, and Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Righter, do you question any individual? Senator. SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Martinez. I'm...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Martinez is in the…

SENATOR RIGHTER:

I'm sorry -- I'm sorry, I'm looking for people in their chairs, Mr. President. How about Senator Jones? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Jones. He's right behind you. Do you question any other Senator?

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Hastings. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Hastings. Coming out of the closet. Senator Righter, do you question anybody else? SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Lightford. She's in her chair. Sorry, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator, she's in her chair. SENATOR RIGHTER:

Hey, you got one in your chair, that's good -- that's good. Thank you very much, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

On a verified roll call, there are 32 Ayes, 21 Nays, and 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 2238 {sic}, having received the

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required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We will go to page 9 of the printed Calendar, Senate Bills 3rd Reading. Senate Bill 2572. Senator Holmes. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2572.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes, on your bill. SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you so much, Mr. President. This is actually an extremely simple bill. It allows school districts to determine the schedule and frequency of physical education, provided that pupils in kindergarten through grade 12 shall engage in P.E. for a minimum of a hundred and fifty minutes per week. Currently, what they are mandated to do is to have P.E. three to five days per week. This bill changes that to a hundred and fifty minutes. So, therefore, they can divide that time up and have the flexibility to fit it into their day. I would ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Righter, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield, please? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates she will. SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you. Senator Holmes, how does this change current law?

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It's my recollection that we changed the issue of the physical education mandate just maybe last year. Is that -- is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

And I don't know -- I don't know if you voted for the bill, the comprehensive agreement that changed the education funding formula and those issues. I certainly did. I think a broad bipartisan majority in this Chamber voted for that. It -- it -seeing that that had passed just last year, what -- give me your thoughts on why it's appropriate now, before we've really even given that a chance to work, why -- why it's appropriate to change the law again?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

It's just allowing the schools more flexibility. Three to five days a week is what is mandated in the bill you are referencing. All we're doing is changing it to a hundred and fifty minutes, which means you can divide that up. If you prefer to do it as three days of P.E. for fifty minutes, you can. If you prefer to do five days for thirty minutes, you can. It allows the school that flexibility.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

It -- it's my understanding, Senator, right -- current law is three days a week. If you have thirty-minute periods, this equates to five days a week. So how is it that this isn't an increase on the mandate on schools with regards to P.E.?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Every school is different. This is allowing flexibility by putting it into minutes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

To the bill, if I might, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Chamber, last year the General Assembly passed and the Governor signed a landmark reform with regards to public education funding and related issues, and this was one of 'em. A broad bipartisan majority in both Chambers said we're going to give school districts a little bit of a break on the P.E. mandate and say it's going to be three days a week. Only in the Capitol Building would we suggest that we are giving schools more flexibility by telling them exactly how many minutes their kids have to do P.E. This is a step backward from the agreement that we had last year. I think -- my suggestion - I think others would agree - that we let the

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reform that we passed just last year work for school districts. Let the school districts come to us and say we like this, we don't like this, we'd like this changed, before we jump right in and changing things again. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Tracy, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. I rise in support of the -- this bill actually and, if I could, I'd like to speak to the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

SENATOR TRACY:

What Senator Righter said is true; however, what I've heard from my downstate school districts is that the type of mandate relief they were seeking wasn't relief from P.E. They wanted relief from various assorted other things. But what they did say is they like the idea of flexibility. We can accomplish both purposes. We can have the flexibility for those school districts who are finding that their students can't meet all their curriculum requirements because they have to have so many days of P.E., and so they still retain that flexibility and that relief from the mandate. However, downstate school districts who do not have that wide of a curriculum choice or those that have a lot of sports participation and they allow those students to opt out of the regular P.E., they would prefer having the minutes, because they recognize that their teachers need to have students who have some time off to have a release valve. P.E. serves a very important purpose in our -- our education system. Adams County was just announced as the most obese county in the State. Now that doesn't

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make me happy, but it is certainly - however they determine that. But that being said, we have to recognize that children need all types of educational activity in the classroom, but also outside as a release valve. So I think this makes perfect sense. I had asked that it be included when we did the original education bill. We didn't have time to get to the -- the main substance of that education bill. So I'd -- I'd ask everybody to give this a close look, because we're -- we're accomplishing both purposes. We're allowing schools that need the -- the relief -- the relief. Those that don't still have the option to put as many minutes in and give those teachers and those students, most importantly, some activity, learn about health and nutrition and all that -- that's covered in physical education. Thank you, Mr. -- thank you, Mr.... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Senator Bertino-Tarrant, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

Question of the sponsor, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates she will yield. SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

Senator, can you tell me what happens during a school week, if it's a shortened school week, to those a hundred and fifty minutes? They only have four days of school. Are they still required to get those a hundred and fifty minutes in? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes. SENATOR HOLMES:

The -- the bill is a hundred and fifty minutes a week.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Bertino-Tarrant.

SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

So what I'm understanding is that if it -- if we have a shortened school week, then some other class is going to have to reschedule somehow to make sure that P.E. has their hundred and fifty minutes. We may have to take away ten minutes from math every week or ten minutes from English every week.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Holmes. SENATOR HOLMES:

I would not discuss and make the decision of what the school should do. What I'm telling the schools they're going to be doing is doing a hundred and fifty-minutes of P.E. per week, because we understand the impact of physical activity on a child's ability to learn and to retain information. We also understand that it is a nationwide problem, the obesity crisis in this country and how much money it costs all of us when we see the health effects of this obesity. So I'm going to stand here and say, you know what, P.E. is a mandate on our schools, always has been, still is, just like math and English and science are, and the schools, I trust, will have the expertise and experience to figure out how best to incorporate this into their school day.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Bertino-Tarrant. SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

To the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

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SENATOR BERTINO-TARRANT:

My concern is -- people know very well my -- my concern with the eleventh -- eleventh-hour additions that were put onto our education funding bill. I'm going to take it from -- at a different I've heard the obesity argument. P.E.'s been a perspective. mandate since the 1950s, so I'm sure the P.E. teachers do not want that hanging over their head. Secondly, there is no other subject that has mandated minutes. English does not have mandated minutes, math does not have mandated minutes, economics does not have mandated minutes. So to prioritize this over other subjects is -- is very concerning to me. I appreciate P.E. If this was a bill to take out P.E., I'd be the first one standing up here arguing against it. P.E. is definitely necessary. But so is music, so is art, so is English, so is speech, and we don't mandate minutes for them. Again, I understand the brain research very, very carefully. And -- and the reality, if we really wanted that to work, we'd all be starting our day off with P.E., because a seventh-hour P.E. class really doesn't help with the brain research when, after they're leaving, they're leaving school. Again, this -- I understand the need for P.E. I support P.E. in schools. I would never ask for the removal, but this is about being reasonable. You can achieve a strong physical education class without mandating minutes. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Rooney, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR ROONEY:

To the bill, please, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

To the bill.

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SENATOR ROONEY:

Mr. President, I would just echo the comments of Senator Bertino-Tarrant. I completely agree. This bill doesn't reflect the way a school works. The -- the -- the P.E. mandate relief, as it was called, was a silly idea from the beginning. It shouldn't have been in the bill. But to fix it with another silly way of going about it doesn't make any sense to me. One example, you take a school on a block schedule, where they happen to have the every other day periods. When it falls where the kind of day that they have gym is only Tuesday and Thursday, they're still following the minutes requirement spirit, but there's no way they can meet two hundred and twenty-five minutes in that one week. Every time you do something like this that says it has to be this many per week, a school just doesn't work that way. You'll have the Monday off, but yet there's this, still, statutory requirement. And to -- to get up here and say, well, we understand that schools will meet that requirement as best they can - yes, I'm sure they will. The point is, they shouldn't have to. They should be able to make it fit the way it fits. I wish the P.E. "mandate relief", quote, unquote, never made it into this. But to take a silly provision and try to fix it with an equally silly provision, I -- I don't see any sense in that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Holmes, to close.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Yes, I just want to clarify one point and I -- I -- I'd like to make one point. When the Senator referenced two hundred and twenty-five minutes of P.E., that is definitely what is needed for

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students above sixth grade; we are not requiring that. We are saying all students a hundred and fifty. But anytime you'd like to bring forward a bill that gives them two hundred and fifty minutes of P.E., I would be in huge support of that. So I would ask for an Aye vote. I think this is important for our children. I think this is something -- we need to be responsible when we look at long-term health. And I would ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2572 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 36 Ayes, 14 Nays, 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 2572, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2588. Senator Harmon. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2591. Senator Bennett. Senator Bennett. Senate Bill 2598. Senator Sandoval. Senator Sandoval. Senate Bill 2638. Senator Clayborne. Senator Clayborne. Senate Bill 2640. Senator Muñoz. Senator Muñoz. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. Senator Muñoz seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2640 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Seeing -- leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2640. Mr. Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Muñoz. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your amendment. SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you. Out of the record on that Amendment 1. The only

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one I'm requesting is 3, or asking for its adoption. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Withdraw Amendment No. 1. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Muñoz. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your amendment. SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would just ask for its adoption, becomes the bill, and I will explain it on 3rd Reading. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2640. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2640.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your bill.

SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

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The bill just incorporates the previous two amendments and one for a parliamentary reason. As amended, it calls for the Department of the State Police and Director of the Secretary of State Department of Police to establish a program allowing Illinois police officers, State Police officers, and Department of Natural Resources to purchase their service weapons and/or badge at the end of their service period, provided they are honorably retiring in good standing. I know of no opponents.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2640 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2640, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we'll turn to Senate Bill 2541. Senator Lightford. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2541.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Lightford, on your bill. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Committee {sic}. Senate Bill 2541 requires the Department of Public Health to develop rules and appropriate revisions to the Child Health Examination form. This is a result of the new

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requirements that we passed with Public Act 99-927 back in January of 2017. Our goal here is to make sure the requirements are in place that are related to social-emotional screenings of pupils by no later than January 1 of 2019. I'd be happy to answer questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Senator Syverson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Couple questions of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

She indicates she will yield. SENATOR SYVERSON:

Yeah, I guess just to -- can you explain a little bit about the -- the -- the mandates for doing the assessments at the earliest -- doing at -- I think it was first grade and -- first grade and -- and sixth grade and ninth grade? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Lightford.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Senator Syverson, that's already the law, Senator. This isn't what this bill is about. The law was already enacted, signed by the Governor in January of 2017. There was a rulemaking process through JCAR that should have been established so that school districts would have been -- families and students would have been ready to submit these forms for school by this school year and it did not happen because JCAR had not convened or the process of that team had not been set up. The goal here is just to ensure that that team is in place and the rules are enforced by January 1 so that the schools will have time -- the parents will have time

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to get the examinations done.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you for that explanation. I think that answers the -the underlying question and I think addresses one of those concerns. My concern was really probably more directed to the underlying bill, which this doesn't really affect, which is where I had more of my concerns. So I appreciate you answering the questions on that. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2541 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, 1 Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2541, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2642. Senator Muñoz. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2642.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Muñoz, on your bill. SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. As amended, it requires that a former peace officer who continues to perform services in an armed -- in armed capacity to obtain a

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permanent employee registration card. Once the registration card is obtained, the officer does not have to obtain a firearm control card if the former officer is in compliance with federal Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act of 2004. But the police -- but the peace officer does have to obtain a firearm control card {sic}. I know of no opposition to the bill.

It lowers the cost of these projects and it creates clean-energy jobs. For the Body's notice, historically the IFA has served as the primary statewide conduit for the public financing of these types of projects and is voluntarily undertaken by private borrowers, like health care systems, educational institutions, small manufacturing -- small manufacturers, and others like this. This preserves jobs and attracts businesses to Illinois. I know of no opposition and I would ask for an Aye vote.
