13. Thank you very much. Will the Senate please come to order?
14. The prayer will be offered by Rt. Reverend Albert W. Hillestad,
15. Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Springfield.

19. GOVERNOR WALKER:

20. I am appointing as temporary Secretary, Edward E. Fernandes.
21. Mr. Secretary will you please call the roll?

8. GOVERNOR WALKER:

9. I am appointing a committee of four distinguished members
10. of this Senate: Senator Frank Ozinga, Senator Hudson Sours,
11. Senator Daniel Dougherty and Senator Fred Smith, to request the
12. presence of Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Underwood.
13. Chief Justice Underwood.

14. CHIEF JUSTICE UNDERWOOD:

15. Thank you, your excellency. Will the Senators elect please
16. rise? Guests will remain seated please. Will the Senators e-
17. lect raise their right hands and repeat after me the following
18. oath of office: I - state your names - do solemnly swear, that
19. I will support the Constitution of the United States and the
20. Constitution of the State of Illinois, and that I will faith-
21. fully discharge the duties of the office of State Senator to
22. the best of my ability. You may be seated. I extend to each
23. of you a very sincere congratulations and best wishes.

24. GOVERNOR:

25. There being a quorum present the Senate will proceed with
26. the election of a President. The Chair recognizes Senator Graham
27. for the purpose of placing a name in nomination.

28. SENATOR GRAHAM:

29. Mr. Governor, members of the Illinois Senate, friends of
30. the Senators elect, friends of Illinois government, ladies and
31. gentlemen, this marks a new first in Illinois history, insofar,
32. as the Constitution recently adopted provides that the first time
33. in our history the membership of the Illinois State Senate will

1. elect from it's membership a man called upon to preside as
2. the President of the Senate for the coming Session. This will
3. be an awesome task placed upon a man, a challenging ordeal for
4. both himself and his family, challenging to all of those who are
5. associated with that gentlemen, who ultimately will be the Presi-
6. dent. To the due deliberations of the political processes we
7. on this side, the Republican side of the aisle chose a man who in
8. our opinion fit the qualifications of true leadership as many
9. of the Senators on this Floor do, but only one will survive as
10. our President. It seemed important to us that we find among
11. our membership a man who had years of experience, a dedication to
12. duty, a willingness to serve, and a availability to those who need
13. a leader when a leader is needed. We have such a man with 18
14. years of legislative experience, some in the House of Representa-
15. tives, some in the Illinois State Senate, and worked for one
16. term as an Assistant Majority Leader of this august Body. We also
17. chose a man who was born in rural downstate in Livingston County,
18. Illinois, the heartland of Illinois, as the Livingston County
19. people will have it, a qualification certainly additive to a
20. man's ability to understand the problems. We also have chosen
21. a man who has been actively involved in a couple of statewide
22. campaigns, and as a result of those experiences he has further
23. qualified himself to understand the problems of the people of the
24. State of Illinois, and an ability to do something about it.
25. We also have chosen a man who is a warm hearted, understanding,
26. a man with a heart. And I must tell this about the nominee and
27. perhaps you will hear a loud roar behind the galleries when this
28. is over; that will be the discharge of a gun. When Bill Harris
29. was a young boy, a small boy, in Pontiac, Illinois...he used to
30. have a little small dog, and he and the dog would make their re-
31. gular trips to the store for a bar of candy. The young redheaded
32. boy in Pontiac would get out of the store as quickly as possi-
33. ble, break the bar of candy in two, view of the results decide

1. which was the larger of the two pieces; that piece he would
2. give to his dog. I think that he has carried on through his life
3. that willingness to share the greater part of what is his
4. with others, a great attribute for a man of leadership a-
5. bility. And in closing I would like to read just a little
6. poem that might well depict the real life - inward life - of
7. our nominee.

8. A careful man I want to be
9. A little fellow follows me
10. I do not dare go astray
11. For fear he'll go the self same way
12. I cannot once escape his eyes
13. What ere he sees me do he tries
14. He knows that I am big and fine
15. And he believes in every word of mine
16. The base in me he must not see
17. That little fellow who follows me
18. I must remember as I go through
19. Summer suns and winter snow
20. I'm building for the years to be
21. That little chap who follows me....

22. and with that explanation of this warm hearted individual, it is
23. with great pleasure and distinct honor that I place in nomina-
24. tion the name of my dear friend, the Senator from Pontiac,
25. William C. Harris, to be the President of the Illinois State
26. Senate.

27. GOVERNOR:

28. The Chair recognizes Senator McBroom, for the purpose of
29. seconding the nomination of Senator Harris.

30. SENATOR MCBROOM:

31. Governor Walker, Lt. Governor Hartigan, members of the
32. Senate, ladies and gentlemen, I'm delighted to have this op-
33. portunity and for the relief of all involved I assure you I
34. shall be brief. I could...I could say that I've known Senator
35. Harris for over 20 years. I could say to each and everyone of
36. you that I have over these 20 years campaigned for him when he
37. was a very young man and represented Kankakee County as a State
38. Representative. I could say that I have campaigned with him.
39. I could say and I believe both sides of the aisle would agree
40. with this, I believe with undisputed validity that there are

1. few, very few students and practitioners of the art of govern-
2. ment with the stature and the ability of Bill Harris. All of
3. what I believe and all of what I have said I sincerely feel is
4. true. But the basic fact as to why I am delighted to second
5. this nomination is that I deeply and admire deeply admire and
6. respect my long time friend, Senator Bill Harris. Thank you.

7. GOVERNOR:

8. The Chair recognizes Senator Smith for the purpose of
9. placing a name in nomination.

10. SENATOR SMITH:

11. Governor Walker, members of the Illinois State Senate, we
12. on this - the Democratic side of the Senate have no quarrel what-
13. ever with Senators on the other side of the aisle with regards
14. to the ability and the qualifications of the Senator who was just
15. placed in nomination. We agree with you, Senator Graham, that
16. the Senator whom you just placed in nomination is an embodiment
17. of industry and activity. And we further agree with you that if
18. elected he will discharge the duties of President of this Body to
19. the very best of his considerable ability - he's smiling as he
20. faces me - however, Mr. Governor and members of the Senate, in
21. troubled times like these, when the very talents of Government it-
22. self is being tested, criticized and questioned as perhaps never be-
23. fore in our history, we on this side of the Senate believe that the
24. sword of partisan politics should be sheathed, and that the Senator
25. elected President of this Body should, yes, have the qualifications
26. mentioned by the two previous speakers. In addition we think that
27. he should have the manner and the demeanor that will permit
28. him to accord not only to the members of his own immediate party,
29. but to each and every member of this Senate every right, every
30. privilege, guaranteed by the rules, the regulations, and the prac-
31. tices and customs of this Senate. That we have another here in our
32. midsts who measures up in every sense to such qualifications. We
33. have ample evidence of that fact. For the past two years the man

1. man whom I will place in nomination selected by us in caucus
2. has served here as the President pro tem of this Body; this the
3. highest honor within the gift of the membership of this Body.
4. He has served not as a tyrant; not in an arrogant way or manner,
5. but ably, studiously, meticulously, and ever mindful of the
6. rights and prerogatives of even the most humble member of this
7. Body. The man whom we offer you is an able lawyer. He has a
8. most outstanding record, both as a prosecutor and as a defense
9. attorney. He is studious, intellectual, possessed of a brain
10. that enables him to delve beneath the surface and get to the
11. very heart, the core of the matters that will necessarily come
12. before this august Body. He is a devoted husband of a lovely
13. wife, whom I took the liberty - upon whom I took the liberty
14. of bestowing a kiss - with your permission - my friend. The
15. father of lovely children. We were told by my friend of many
16. years, Senator Graham, that the candidate whom he placed in
17. nomination, we were told where he was born. This is not a debate,
18. but sufficed to say, Mr. Governor, that we on this side of the
19. Senate are not concerned over much about our candidate's place of
20. birth. It is enough for us to know that his heart beats in
21. sympathy with the hopes, the longings, the trials, the problems,
22. the expectations of that great mass of people whom a former
23. President Abraham Lincoln was pleased to refer to as the common
24. people. This man if elected will have but one dominating and
25. major desire here, and that is to lead in the passage of laws in
26. the best interest of the peoples of the State of Illinois. And
27. so, Mr. Governor, Governor Walker, ladies and gentlemen of the
28. Senate, it is my privilege and honor to place in nomination for
29. President of this Body, the able Senator from Cook, Cecil A.
30. Partee.

31. GOVERNOR WALKER:

32. The Chair recognizes Senator Donnewald for the purpose of
33. seconding the nomination of Senator Partee.

SENATOR DONNEWALD:

1. Mr. Chairman, Governor Walker, my congratulations to you,
2. sir, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, other dignitaries here
3. today, you know when you work along side a fellow day in and
4. day out, over a long period of time, you learn much about that
5. kind of human being that he really is. You discover, for ex-
6. ample, aspects of his character and disposition that would es-
7. cape you in brief, superficial social or business encounters.
8. You learn how he reacts to pressure and in crisis and you find out
9. if he is the same man at the end of a long work day, when he
10. is tired, as he was in the morning when he was fresh. You find
11. out if he gloats over triumph and just importantly whether he
12. is impossible to be around in defeat. Working beside a co-
13. worker you learn how he treats people, the weak as well as the
14. strong; the poor as well as the affluent; the inarticulate, as
15. well as the articulate. It does not take long to find out if
16. his word is good, and whether he always strives to match his
17. rhetoric with action. The day-to-day work sitting right here
18. in the Senate enables a legislator to gain real insight into the
19. habits, attitudes and life-styles of his legislative colleagues.
20. As a member of the State Democratic leadership team for the past
21. two years, I have come to know, Cecil A. Partee, extremely well.
22. Working side by side with him, day in and day out, in moments of de-
23. feat and exhaustion, as well as moments of fresh energy and victory.
24. I have had a chance to watch him, close, and I liked what I saw. I
25. have seen "Cec" Partee insist upon common sense and reason when con-
26. fusion and emotion threatened to gain the upper hand. I have seen
27. Senator Partee take the lead in producing positive compromise, in
28. the best interest of all Illinoisans when it looked like hopeless
29. impasse would prevail. I have seen him treat the other side of
30. the aisle with courtesy and respect, always in an even-handed
31. manner. And I've seen him go out of his way to bring the rank
32. and file members of his own side of the aisle in the decision-
33. making process. Cecil A. Partee has been a leader by example.

1. By being a healer instead of a headline-grabbing divider;
2. through ability rather than pomposity and sensationalism. There-
3. fore, Mr. Chairman and Governor, it is with great honor for me
4. to second the nomination of Cecil A. Partee, of Chicago, for Pres-
5. ident of the Senate of the 78th General Assembly, the Session of
6. the Illinois General Assembly. By word and deed, he has proven his
7. ability as a leader, whose overriding goal is to make the leg-
8. islative process work for all of the people of Illinois. Thank
9. you.

10. GOVERNOR WALKER:

11. The Secretary will call the roll.

22. GOVERNOR:

23. By a vote of 30 to 29 the Senate has elected Senator Harris,
24. as the President of the Senate. On behalf - on behalf - of the
25. executive branch of the State Government and for myself personally,
26. I would like to extend our congratulations to Senator Harris.
27. This is an historic moment as has been said in the history of the
28. State of Illinois. For the first time this body - this Senate -
29. has elected the President of the Senate. And I know that all of
30. the Senators present will join me in honoring this moment and in
31. honoring the first man in the history of the State of Illinois to
32. become the elected President of the Senate. Senator Harris.

33. SENATOR HARRIS:

1. Your excellency, Governor Walker, Governor Hartigan, Mr.
2. Chief Justice Underwood, my fellow members of the Senate, guests,
3. I am truly thrilled. I want to assure all that I am deeply mindful
4. of this historic change in the structure of the Illinois State
5. Senate, and I pledge to all, my devotion and dedication that ex-
6. perience will prove the framers of the Constitution were wise
7. and considerate in their recommendation to the people of Illi-
8. nois in this significant change in our former role of mix, be-
9. tween the executive and the legislative branches. Legislatures
10. over the years have demonstrated in all too many occasions that
11. they had become moribund. And while my remarks at this point
12. should not be construed at all, that we should be permanently sep-
13. arated from performance and responsibility and cooperation with
14. the executive. The point I want to make is, that the Senate of
15. Illinois now stands truly as a legislative Body in it's entire-
16. ty. And I see this historic occasion as an opportunity for
17. the 59 of us, to respond to the needs as we see them, together,
18. for the people of Illinois. I wish to assure all, that in my res-
19. ponsibilities as Presiding Officer, equity and fairness will be
20. my watchword. With these remarks, I pledge to you all, my will-
21. ingness to be the Senate's President. Thank you. And, now, I
22. would like to assume the first prerogative of the Senate
23. President responsibility, and appoint Senators Graham and Mohr and
24. Donnewald and Rock to escort Governor Walker as he retires from
25. our Chamber. If those Senators would join us, here, on the podium,
26. I would now like to exercise this occasion to introduce the Lt.
27. Governor of Illinois, Governor Neil Hartigan. Governor.

28. GOVERNOR HARTIGAN:

29. Thank you very much. Thank you very much. Mr. Chief Justice,
30. President Harris, Mrs. Harris and Harris family, distinguished
31. Senators. It is in fact a historic moment for the Senate and for
32. the entire State. I've had the opportunity to watch from the gallery
33. for a number of years, the very effective, very professional, very

1. dignified manner in which Senator Harris has conducted himself
2. in the affairs of our State. I think the change is a substan-
3. tial one. And the outcome of this change will have great bearing
4. on the future of all the people of Illinois; to have a person
5. as totally equipped, professionally, as Senator Harris, and at the
6. same time a person who each of us knows is a man of great dig-
7. nity and total decency; is perhaps I think, the most fortunate
8. act that could have been coupled with this change in our State's
9. Constitution. I am totally convinced that with the membership
10. here in this Body, Senator, and with your leadership as Presi-
11. dent, that this will in fact be the finest legislative hour in
12. the history of the Senate of Illinois. Thank you very much.

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

13. I am going to seize one more opportunity here and intro-
14. duce my family. And this moment is one of great inspiration to
15. me. My wife Jeanne - My son Chuck - And my daughter Barbara.
16. I would now like to appoint a committee composed of Senators
17. Soper, Walker and Senators Course and Johns to escort Lt. Gov-
18. ernor Hartigan, as he departs from the Chamber. Will those
19. Senators please come to the podium? And, now, would Senators
20. Ozinga, Sours, Dougherty and Smith, join us at the podium to es-
21. cort Mr. Chief Justice Underwood from the Chambers. Thank you
22. very much. May I make clear that there will be some additional
23. activities of the Senate and we would like all of our guests to
24. remain. But at this point of the formal ceremonies of investi-
25. ture, we are going to ask Bishop Hillestad, to offer an invocation.
26. Bishop Hillestad. I'm sorry a benediction.

27. (Prayer by Bishop Hillestad)

28. PRESIDENT:

29. The Chair recognizes Senator Chew.

30. SENATOR CHEW:

31. Mr. President and members of the Senate, and the guests -
32. I think this is a historical moment for me, very rarely that I
33. get an opportunity to do this. I'm a member of the former

1. Chicago City Council, and I've been here, this is my third term.
2. I shall never depart from the teaching that I received as a
3. member of the City Council. Because as its leader... leader, I think
4. his ability was seldom equal and never excelled. He too, got his
5. start right here in this Body. And he has gone to reach heights
6. that in dreams of yesteryears were more or less impossible.
7. Sometimes when you hear me complaining about the sluggishness
8. of the programs of the Illinois Senate, it's simply because my
9. first teaching as a elected official was under his leadership.
10. His contributions to the world cannot be measured. His willing-
11. ness to help others can not be measured. If I could merely dup-
12. licate in some way the services that he has rendered to the City
13. of Chicago, the County of Cook, and the other remaining hun-
14. dred and one counties. I would think that I would have made my
15. track in the pool of sand. I take great pleasure to introduce
16. Mr. Democrat. Richard J. Daley. And Mr. President, behind every
17. ship there's a current - and behind Richard J. Daley is Ma Daley.
18. And Mr. President, it's above words when he is referred to as a
19. family man. Not only is this Body fortunate to have one of his
20. sons to serve, but he has his entire family down here and that is
21. truly a family man. Would the Daley family stand? And one of the
22. shrewdest men to get a program where it should be and to proceed
23. on with the business at hand; the floor leader of the City Council
24. is also often the Chairman of Finance Committee, Alderman Kane.
25. Thank you, Mr. President.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. The Chair recognizes Senator Fawell.

28. SENATOR FAWELL:

29. My very good friend Bill Harris, who from this point on,
30. Mr. President, I'm very happy to have the opportunity of making
31. the first Motion, Sir, to you, and that is that you at this time
32. exercise your prerogative and that I ask for unanimous consent
33. in this regard, to appoint your Assistant Majority Leaders.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Leave is granted. And I now appoint Senator John Graham
3. and Senator Howard Mohr, as Assistant Majority Leaders, of
4. the 78th General Assembly. The Chair recognizes Senator Rock.

5. SENATOR ROCK:

6. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I have the unique
7. privilege this afternoon to ask unanimous consent of this Body
8. and on behalf of the Democratic members of the Senate, I move
9. that Senator Cecil A. Partee, of Chicago, be declared the Min-
10. ority Leader of the Senate, of the 78th General Assembly.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Chew.

13. SENATOR CHEW:

14. Second that Motion.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Leave is granted. Senator Partee is the Minority Leader
17. of the Senate, for the 78th General Assembly.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I am
22. you say now the Minority Leader. I'll have you know that I have
23. some experience with that word. Let me take this opportunity
24. to say - hello - to all of the many, many wonderful people here
25. today, representing families, sisters, brothers, husbands, wives,
26. cousins, and well wishers, from every possible end of our State.
27. Many of you have spent many nights working diligently, in the
28. campaign of those persons who now are here today and who've taken
29. an oath and who are to be the members of the 78th General As-
30. sembly. Each of you are to be individually and personally con-
31. gratulated for your individual sacrifice and help and encourage-
32. ment that you have given to these persons, who now are members
33. of this august Body. So, I say to all of you, we're happy

1. to have you here today. Yes, it has been pointed out that
2. there are members; former members of this Body who are here to-
3. day, who have gone on to other walks of life. I certainly
4. would be remissive if I didn't take the moment to say that a
5. gentleman who sits just to my left was on this day; 34 years
6. ago, sworn in as a Senator, in the State of Illinois. He was
7. just a young man from the West Side of Chicago, named Abraham
8. Lincoln Marovitz. And he came with another young man, Richard
9. J. Daley, they were in the same class, and they have gone on
10. to other things as Judge Marovitz has become a Federal Judge in
11. Chicago. Mr. President, I wish you well. It is an awesome re-
12. sponsibility. I know that you will handle it well. I would re-
13. mind you that I was one of the first persons to call you - Presi-
14. dent. I will be on behalf of the people of this State on their
15. behalf, I will be making requests of you from time to time, and
16. I want you to remember that I am your supporter, as I voted for
17. you. We will have our days when we will debate questions on
18. which you and I will be on very different and opposite sides.
19. We will work hard in the interest of the people. And when the day
20. is over we will shake hands and still remain friends. Because
21. it is in the tomorrow that we must work together in behalf of all
22. the people of this State. Thank you. I'd like to appoint the
23. two Assistant Minority Leaders, Senator James Donnewald, and
24. Senator Philip Rock. And I'd like to present to this Body, an
25. individual who has given me a great deal of help, a great deal
26. of encouragement. She is the mother of my children - my wife -
27. Mrs. Paris Partee. Thank you.

28. SENATOR HARRIS:

29. The Chair recognizes Senator Bartulis.

30. SENATOR BARTULIS:

31. Mr. President and members of the Senate, It's indeed a great
32. privilege for me as the freshman Senator from the 49th district
33. to place in nomination a man who is very well known to by many

1. of us and has been around here a long time. I would like to
2. place the name of Edward E. Fernandes, as Secretary of the Senate.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Merritt.

5. SENATOR MERRITT:

6. Mr. President, indeed it is an honor and a privilege to
7. address you as Mr. President in this historic occasion, our
8. distinguished guests and members of the Senate. I think all of
9. us are aware of the high capabilities, the worthiness of
10. Eddie Fernandes for certainly this most high and important re-
11. sponsibility in the Senate. Eddie has endeared himself to all
12. of us on both sides of the aisle. He shares our deep respect,
13. esteem, yes, love and admiration. I think it's significant to
14. note that on this very day twenty years ago Eddie started his
15. great service to this august Body. Eddie certainly is grown
16. in great stature over those 20 years and I'm proud to say per-
17. haps many of us here have enjoyed some growth in our stature,
18. because of the dedicated job he has given to the high post of
19. Secretary of the Senate. I am most happy to second the nomina-
20. tion.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Partee.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. I think the Senate of Illinois is indeed fortunate in
25. having in its immediate grasp two of the finest persons who
26. could ever be Secretaries of this Body. You will recall last
27. year, two years ago, when I made the nomination for Kenny,
28. Kenneth Wright of Pawnee as our Secretary; that almost im-
29. mediately after his election, we commenced to work toward keep-

18. in the back for the benefit of the new members. That's in the
19. back of the President's gallery. The elevator there will take
20. you directly up. It's immediately.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. One additional announcement. All of you are familiar with
23. the invitation to attend the reception at the Mansion. There was
24. some question in the addressing of the envelopes that wives and
25. family might not be included. Governor Walker, has asked me
26. to assure the members of the Senate that their families are most
27. welcome. The reception is from 3 to 5. And by all means you are

19. I'd like to take this time as a matter of personal privilege, to
20. introduce to the Senate a group of stalwarts from Worth Township.

12. The Senate will come to order. Senator Donnewald.

13. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

17. Yes, we intend to have a meeting tomorrow at 10:00
