PRESIDENT:

Thank you, Reverend. Messages from the House.

SECRETARY:

A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has passed bills of the following titles, in the passage of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to wit:

House Bills 105, 180, 286, ...pardon me, ... me 338, 453, 465. Passed the House April 11, 1989.

SECRETARY:

Senator Berman, Chairman of the Special Temporary Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education, reports Senate Bills numbered 104, 189, and 267 Do Pass. And Senate Bills Numbered 28, 187 Do Pass as Amended.

Senator Holmberg, Chairman of the Special Temporary Committee on Local Government, reports that Senate Bills Numbered 218, 220, 226, 271, 319, 353, and...and 522 Do Pass. And Senate Bills 182 and 219 Do Pass as Amended.

Senator Jerome J. Joyce, Chairman of the Special Temporary Committee on Executive, reports that Senate Bills Numbered 179, 168, 302, 347, 373, 452, 487, 515, 519, and 527 Do Pass. And Senate Bills Numbered 36, 127, 176, 185, and 467 Do Pass as Amended And Senate Bill 378 Do Not Pass.

PRESIDENT:

Ladies and Gentlemen, if I can have your attention, we...we have only remaining the Resolutions Consent Calendar and the adjournment resolution. Senator Philip and others have filed

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three...motions of some substance, and I think, with leave of the Body, we will show those motions having been filed on the Calendar and deal with them on Tuesday of next week, so that we needn't delay everybody today. Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, there will be a Republican Caucus in Senator Philip's offices immediately after adjournment. A brief caucus.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, Mr. President. There will be a Democratic Caucus in...in...in your office?

PRESIDENT:

No, 212.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

In..in Room 212 immediately after adjournment.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Thank you. Senator Hudson.

SENATOR HUDSON:

Point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT:

Yes, sir, state your point.

SENATOR HUDSON:

...in the...Presidents' Gallery today, we have...this is Sue Friemgen and two friends that have come down from the Chicago area to visit the Senate today in Springfield and its environs, particularly the Senate, and see us in action.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests please rise to be recognize. Welcome to Springfield.

PRESIDENT:

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Senator Geo-Karis.

PRESIDENT:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen on a point of personal privilege. The...in conjunction with the Conference of the Illinois Women in Government, the Department of Employment Security is demonstrating its Job Search Computerized Employment Locating System today and tomorrow in Room 122A. As many of you know, the job search system enables an individual to look for work. The system contains employment opportunities on a national basis as well as locally. Director Sally Jackson invites you to stop by today or tomorrow, at your convenience, in Room 122A in the Capitol.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Madam Secretary, have any objections been filed to the...Resolution Consent Calendar?

SECRETARY:

There have been no objections filed.

PRESIDENT:

All right. No objections having been filed, Senator Demuzio will move the adoption of the Resolutions Consent Calendar. That is Senate Resolution 192, 194, 195, 196, 197, 198, and House Joint Resolution 28. Any discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it and the Consent Calendar is adopted. Yeah, resolutions, Madam Secretary. Senator Demuzio. Resolutions, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Senate Joint Resolution 43 offered by Senator Demuzio.

(Secretary reads SJR 43)

PRESIDENT:

Senator Demuzio...Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Thank you, Mr. President. The adjournment resolution...Senate

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Joint Resolution 43 calls for us upon adjournment today to stand adjourned until Monday, April 17th...

PRESIDENT:

No, Tuesday.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

At the hour of twelve, noon. I would move...move to suspend the rules immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 43.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Demuzio has moved to suspend the rules for the immediate consideration of Senate Joint Resolution 43. (Machine cutoff)...Secretary, read the resolution again, will you please?

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 43.

(Secretary reads SJR 43)

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Demuzio has moved to suspend the rules for the immediate consideration of...Senate Joint Resolution 43. All in favor of the motion to suspend indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended. Senator Demuzio now moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 43, calls for us to return to Springfield next Tuesday...Tuesday, at the hour of noon. All in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. The Revenue Committee is scheduled to meet at two o'clock today. What I am hopeful is that we might be able to begin before two o'clock if the Session is brief enough and if the respective caucuses are brief enough. That would be very helpful to a lot of people. I would represent to everyone that we

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will not be taking votes on any bills that have any revenue impact today whether they are tax increases or tax deductions. There might be one or two very minute technical bills, but I think...you can assume that there will be no voting. I would, however, like to get as many of those bills heard and explained as possible. We will begin...we're going to have a caucus of both right after Session? Well, all I can suggest is that as soon as we have determined that the two caucuses have completed, we will begin, hopefully, by one o'clock, if that is possible. Thank you.

All right. Any further business, Madam Secretary? Message from the Governor.
