### HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 999**

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Governor Pat Quinn has proposed reductions in the amount of benefits or services provided under the medical assistance (Medicaid) program under the Illinois Public Aid Code; and

WHEREAS, The Governor's proposal will amount to a \$2 billion cut in projected spending under the Medicaid program, or about 18% of the current Medicaid budget; and

WHEREAS, According to a recent report, Medicaid is the primary payer of care for more than 60% of Illinois nursing home residents, or about 47,000 elderly or disabled Illinoisans; and

WHEREAS, The Governor's proposed cuts will mean that many current Medicaid recipients will not be able to obtain needed medications or important healthcare services; and

WHEREAS, This inability to obtain needed medications or important healthcare services will likely lead to more severe medical problems, or even death, for the affected individuals, thus possibly resulting in even higher costs to the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that before the House of Representatives votes on third reading on any bill that will reduce the amount of benefits or services provided under the medical assistance (Medicaid) program under the Illinois Public Aid Code as proposed by the Governor, the Governor shall file with the Clerk of the House of Representatives a report that analyzes the impact of the proposed reductions according to the race, gender, and age of affected Medicaid recipients and the impact on hospitals and on healthcare providers and that explains the expected long-term impact and short-term benefits of the proposed reductions and how the proposed reductions could impact employment in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House of Representatives shall make the Governor's report available to each member of the House of Representatives; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this Resolution be delivered to Governor Pat Quinn.

### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1003

Offered by Representative Golar:

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago has the highest youth homicide rate in the country; homicide is the 2nd leading cause of death for youths age 14 to 24; and

WHEREAS, Homicide rates for African-American males are 3 times higher than those for Latino males and 25 times higher than those for Caucasian males; and

WHEREAS, In 1996, a resolution from the World Health Assembly declared violence to be a leading public health problem; and

WHEREAS, The World Health Organization developed a typology of violence that identified 3 categories: self-directed violence (by oneself), interpersonal violence (by another person), and collective violence (by larger groups); collective violence includes hate crimes, terrorist acts, and mob violence committed to advance a particular social agenda; and

WHEREAS, Violence exacts both a human and an economic toll on nations, and costs economies many billions of U.S. dollars each year in healthcare costs, legal costs, absenteeism from work, and lost productivity; the total direct and indirect costs, including cost for healthcare services, autopsies, police investigations, and lost productivity resulting from premature death, amount to nearly U.S. \$80 million; and

WHEREAS, Violence is the result of the complex interplay of individual, relationships, social, cultural, and environmental factors, and is the product of multiple levels of influence on behavior; and

WHEREAS, There are biological and personal history factors that increase the likelihood of being a victim or perpetrator of violence; those factors include impulsivity, low educational attainment, substance abuse, and prior history of abuse and aggression; and

WHEREAS, Research shows that people are much more likely to engage in negative activities when those behaviors are encouraged and approved by friends, peers, intimate partners, and family members who all have the potential to shape an individual's behavior and range of experience; and

WHEREAS, Research shows that opportunities for violence are greater in areas of poverty or physical deterioration or where there are few institutional supports, such as those provided by places of worship; and

WHEREAS, There are cultural norms that support violence as an acceptable way to resolve conflicts, norms that give priority to parental rights over child welfare, norms that entrench male dominance over women and children, norms that support the use of excessive force by police against citizens, and norms that support political conflict; and

WHEREAS, There are health, educational, economic, and social policies that maintain high levels of economic and social inequalities between groups that contribute to high levels of violence; and

WHEREAS, There are 3 levels of public health violence prevention: primary prevention, which aims to prevent violence before it occurs; secondary prevention, which focuses on immediate responses to violence, such as pre-hospital care, emergency services, or treatment; and tertiary prevention, which focuses on rehabilitation, reintegration, and reducing long-term emotional or physical disabilities relevant to perpetrators of violence; and

WHEREAS, Public health strategies for the prevention of violence focus on specific target groups, such as universal interventions, which are programs such as community-wide media campaigns that are aimed at general populations; selected interventions, which are aimed at high-risk individual populations; and indicated interventions, which are aimed at perpetrators of violence; and

WHEREAS, A comprehensive response to violence is one that protects and supports victims of violence, reduces the perpetration of violence, and changes the circumstances and conditions that give rise to violence in the first place; and

WHEREAS, Faith and community-based organizations provide critical leadership, knowledge, and passion when it comes to preventing and intervening in cycles of youth violence around the country; and

WHEREAS, All throughout the country, faith and non-profit organizations have taken on many tasks in order to keep young people safe and increase positive opportunities for young people; and

WHEREAS, Staff and volunteers from churches, mosques, synagogues, and community centers mentor children, counsel parents, teach classes, serve meals, conduct neighborhood clean-ups, conduct home visits, and work with law enforcement to patrol the streets; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage faith-based organizations to develop and implement universal interventions aimed to prevent violence in Illinois' impoverished, underserved, and atrisk communities by providing employment opportunities, media, and educational campaigns, after school programs, mentoring programs, and other activities that replace negative messages, activities, beliefs, and attitudes with positive and productive activities, beliefs, and messages, through a transparent and collaborative process with the community that takes full advantage of State and federal funding resources.

### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 1010**

Offered by Representative Bellock:

WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is a disease characterized by low bone mass, structural deterioration of bone, and increased susceptibility to fractures, especially in older women; and

WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is a major public health threat for an estimated 52 million Americans; and

WHEREAS, One in every 2 women and one in every 4 men over the age of 50 will be affected by osteoporosis and low bone density; and

WHEREAS, Annual osteoporosis costs for America's healthcare system top \$18 billion and will double by 2050, as America's population ages; and

WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is responsible for 1.5 million bone fractures annually; and

WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is often thought of as a disease more prevalent amongst elders; in actuality, bone health is a concern for people of all ages; and

WHEREAS, Substantial risk of osteoporosis has been reported in persons of all ethnic backgrounds; and WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is a preventable and treatable disease; and

WHEREAS, Building strong bones throughout childhood and adolescence can be the best defense against developing osteoporosis later in life; and

WHEREAS, Almost 90% of bone mass is acquired by age 18 in women and by age 20 in men; and

WHEREAS, Only one in 3 Americans receive enough calcium in their daily diet, a problem which is especially severe for children and adolescents in critical years of bone development; and

WHEREAS, Optimum bone health and prevention of osteoporosis can be maximized by a balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, weight-bearing exercise, and a healthy lifestyle with no smoking or excessive alcohol intake; and

WHEREAS, Osteoporosis is often called the "silent disease" because bone loss can occur without symptoms and may not be detected until a fracture occurs; and

WHEREAS, A bone mineral density test can be performed to identify osteoporosis and determine the risk for fractures and the severity of the disease; and

WHEREAS, At least 14 states, including Illinois, mandate insurance coverage for osteoporosis-related diagnostic and treatment services; and

WHEREAS, The month of May has been designated as National Osteoporosis Awareness and Prevention Month; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize and appreciate the ideals, goals, and activities of National Osteoporosis Awareness and Prevention Month and urge the people of Illinois to observe appropriate good health programs and activities with respect to preventing and controlling osteoporosis.

### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1013

Offered by Representative Franks:

WHEREAS, It is the policy of the State of Illinois to provide and maintain a healthful environment for the benefit of this and future generations; and

WHEREAS Through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, it is the State's mission is to manage, conserve, and protect Illinois' natural, recreational, and cultural resources, further the public's understanding and appreciation of those resources, and promote Illinois' natural resources for present and future generations; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Wildlife Action Plan, prepared by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, provides specific goals for protection of major habitats in the Northeastern Morainal Natural Division of Illinois, identifies specific action items to support the Forest, Farmland and Prairie, Wetlands, and Streams Campaigns, and identifies the Lake-McHenry Wetlands as a Conservation Opportunity Area

containing rare wetland types and rare wetland and grassland species not found elsewhere in Illinois; and WHEREAS, The National Wildlife Refuge System is a national network of public lands managed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and set aside to conserve America's fish, wildlife, and plants; and

WHEREAS, On March 21, 2012, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service released its environmental assessment of the proposed Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge and recommended that a refuge consisting of core areas linked by corridors be established in McHenry County, Illinois and Walworth County, Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, The United States Fish and Wildlife Service goals for the proposed refuge are to:

- (1) protect and enhance habitats for federal trust species and species of management concern with special emphasis on grassland dependent migratory birds and protection of wetlands and grasslands, and
- (2) create opportunities for hunting and fishing, wildlife observation and photography, and environmental education and interpretation, while promoting activities that complement the purposes of the refuge and other protected lands in the region, and
- (3) promote science, education, and research through partnerships to inform land management decisions and encourage continued responsible stewardship of the natural resources of the Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge; and

WHEREAS, The proposed Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge, which lies within the Lake McHenry Wetlands Conservation Opportunity Area, will provide habitat for at least 60 State-listed plant and animal species and support habitat protection goals identified for the Northeastern Morainal Natural Division of Illinois and Campaign action items identified in the Illinois Wildlife Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, Designation of the Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge will serve to assist, protect, conserve, and further the management of the State's endangered and threatened species and their habitats, as well as the refuge's namesake, the tamarack tree, which is known as the "hackmatack" in at least one Native American language, is a rare remnant of the glacial history of Northern Illinois, and is found in the area of the proposed refuge; and

WHEREAS, Increased recreational opportunities from the creation of the refuge will help address child obesity and other pressing health conditions in Illinois where one in 5 Illinois children is obese and 62% of Illinois adults are overweight or obese; the refuge will complement efforts of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources and Chicago Wilderness to partner with organizations to promote outdoor play and recreation; and

WHEREAS, Children benefit from access to the outdoors in many ways, and the creation of the refuge will expand their opportunities to experience nature; studies show that when children spend time outdoors feelings of anxiety and depression decrease, concentration and performance at school improve, and an early appreciation and love of nature is fostered; young people who spend time in nature are also more likely to be strong advocates for the environment as adults; and

WHEREAS, Wildlife refuges are good for Illinois' economy, and outdoor recreation opportunities, such as boating, camping, fishing, hunting, picnicking, sightseeing, wildlife observation, swimming, and trail use, create a \$3.2 billion annual economic impact in Illinois, supporting 33,000 jobs Statewide; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we support the United States Fish and Wildlife Service in its efforts to establish a new national wildlife refuge on the Illinois-Wisconsin border to be named the Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Governor to represent the State of Illinois as a supporter of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service's efforts to establish the Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge as appropriate; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to work in partnership with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service to make the Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge a reality; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the President of the United States, Barack Obama, the Governor of the State of Illinois, the Secretary of the United States Department of the Interior, the Director of the Midwest Region of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the Director of Natural Resources, and members of Illinois' congressional delegation.
