

1 AN ACT concerning civil law.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 5. The Illinois Living Will Act is amended by
5 changing Section 9 and by adding Sections 3.5 and 9.5 as
6 follows:

8 Sec. 3.5. Applicability. Section 4-11 of the Illinois
9 Power of Attorney Act governs the applicability of this Act if
10 a patient has a health care agency. Notwithstanding Section
11 9.5 or any other provision in this Act, a declaration is not
12 operative as long as an agent is available who is authorized by
13 a health care agency to make decisions concerning
14 life-sustaining or death delaying procedures for the patient,
15 and nothing in this Act may impair or supersede the authority
16 of an agent under a health care agency to make decisions
17 regarding life-sustaining or death delaying treatment.

19 Sec. 9. General provisions.

20 (a) The withholding or withdrawal of death delaying
21 procedures from a qualified patient in accordance with the
22 provisions of this Act shall not, for any purpose, constitute

1 a suicide.

2 (b) The making of a declaration pursuant to Section 3
3 shall not affect in any manner the sale, procurement, or
4 issuance of any policy of life insurance, nor shall it be
5 deemed to modify the terms of an existing policy of life
6 insurance. No policy of life insurance shall be legally
7 impaired or invalidated in any manner by the withholding or
8 withdrawal of death delaying procedures from an insured
9 qualified patient, notwithstanding any term of the policy to
10 the contrary.

11 (c) No physician, health care facility, or other health
12 care provider, and no health care service plan, health
13 maintenance organization, insurer issuing disability
14 insurance, self-insured employee welfare benefit plan,
15 nonprofit medical service corporation or mutual nonprofit
16 hospital service corporation shall require any person to
17 execute a declaration as a condition for being insured for, or
18 receiving, health care services.

19 (d) Nothing in this Act shall impair or supersede any
20 legal right or legal responsibility which any person may have
21 to effect the withholding or withdrawal of death delaying
22 procedures in any lawful manner. In such respect the
23 provisions of this Act are cumulative.

24 (e) This Act shall create no presumption concerning the
25 intention of an individual who has not executed a declaration
26 to consent to the use or withholding of death delaying

1 procedures in the event of a terminal condition.

2 (f) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to condone,
3 authorize or approve mercy killing or to permit any
4 affirmative or deliberate act or omission to end life other
5 than to permit the natural process of dying as provided in this
6 Act.

7 (g) An instrument executed before the effective date of
8 this Act that substantially complies with subsection (e) of
9 Section 3 shall be given effect pursuant to the provisions of
10 this Act.

11 (h) A declaration executed in another state in compliance
12 with the law of that state or this State is validly executed
13 for purposes of this Act, and such declaration shall be
14 applied in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

15 (i) Documents, writings, forms, and copies referred to in
16 this Act may be in hard copy or electronic format. Nothing in
17 this Act is intended to prevent the population of a
18 declaration, document, writing, or form with electronic data.
19 Electronic documents under this Act may be created, signed, or
20 revoked electronically using a generic, technology-neutral
21 system in which each user is assigned a unique identifier that
22 is securely maintained and in a manner that meets the
23 regulatory requirements for a digital or electronic signature.
24 Compliance with the standards defined in the Uniform
25 Electronic Transactions Act or the implementing rules of the
26 Hospital Licensing Act for medical record entry authentication

1 for author validation of the documentation, content accuracy,
2 and completeness meets this standard.

3 (j) No physician, health care provider, employee, or
4 facility may require the execution of a POLST or other such
5 similar form to put into effect the qualified patient's
6 declaration if a patient has been determined to be a qualified
7 patient.

8 (k) Except as otherwise provided in this Act, a physician,
9 health care provider, employee, or facility may rely on and
10 must comply with a qualified patient's declaration that is
11 apparent and immediately available if a patient has been
12 determined to be a qualified patient and the patient lacks
13 ability to give directions regarding the use of death delaying
14 procedures.

15 (l) Nothing in this Act impairs or supersedes a surrogate
16 decision maker's authority to make decisions regarding
17 life-sustaining or death delaying treatment on behalf of a
18 patient who lacks decisional capacity and has a qualifying
19 condition as defined in the Health Care Surrogate Act.

22 Sec. 9.5. Operation of living will. Subject to Section 3.5
23 and Section 9(1), a declaration under this Act becomes
24 operative when all of the following conditions have been met:

25 (1) it has been validly executed;

1 (2) it has not been revoked in accordance with Section

2 5;

3 (3) the patient is unable to give directions regarding

4 the use of life-sustaining or death delaying procedures;

5 and

6 (4) the patient is a qualified patient.

7 An operative and unrevoked living will declaration

8 continues in effect until revoked in accordance with this Act.
