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The House met pursuant to adjournment.

Representative Hannig in the chair.

Prayer by Reverend Bill Schell who is the Pastor of Washington Avenue Baptist Church in Johnston City, IL.

Representative Mell led the House in the Pledge of Allegiance.

By direction of the Speaker, a roll call was taken to ascertain the attendance of Members, as follows: 114 present. (ROLL CALL 1)

By unanimous consent, Representatives Brady, (who was inadvertently recorded as present), Mathias and Phelps were excused from attendance.

DISSENT AND PROTEST

February 19, 2009

The undersigned members of the House of Representatives respectfully dissent and protest, pursuant to House Rule 90, the failure of Chairperson Barbara Currie, of the Special Investigative Committee, to submit and make available to the members of the Special Investigative Committee, and enter into the public record, key information and evidence that was obtained after the House of Representatives impeached Governor Blagojevich on January 14, 2009. The failure to take the necessary actions constitutes an injury to the public.

House Resolution 4 re-created the Special Investigative Committee for the 96th General Assembly, because the work of the Committee is ongoing and the Committee may be required to take further evidence in the form of testimony or documents or other materials.

The events and actions of the Chairperson being protested are as follows:

- 1. On January 23, 209, Chairperson Currie had *ex parte* communications with Timothy Wright, counsel to United States Senator Roland Burris, about the Senator's intentions to submit additional information to the Committee. This conversation took place three days prior to the start of the Senate impeachment trial. Under House Resolution 4, the Committee has the authority and *duty* to refer and further evidence the Committee may acquire to the House Prosecutor who was designated to prosecute the Governor. The full Committee was not made aware of the *ex parte* conversations between the Chairperson and Senator Burris' legal counsel until after the conclusion of the Senate impeachment trial.
- 2. The Chairperson received an affidavit from Senator Burris, transmitted February 5, 2009, but did not notify the minority spokesperson of the Special Investigative Committee, Representative James Durkin, about the receipt of the affidavit until after the submission of the affidavit was written about in the media. Contained in the new affidavit was information that was in direct contradiction to sworn testimony given by Senator Burris to the Special Investigative Committee regarding contact with representatives of Governor Blagojevich about the then-vacant United State Senate seat. Upon receipt of the affidavit, the affidavit and its contents should have been made available immediately to members of the Special Investigative Committee, as well as the general public, due to the controversial contents of the affidavit.

Under House Rule 90, members of the House of Representatives may dissent and protest any acts or resolutions that they deem to be injurious to the public or to an individual, and have that protest entered into the House Journal.

Chairperson Currie should have immediately notified the Special Investigative Committee of her January 23rd *ex parte* communication with Senator Burris' legal counsel in light of the scheduled January 26th commencement date of the Senate impeachment trial and the failure to do so constitutes and injury to the public. The citizens of Illinois and the Senate members conducting the trial should have been made aware of the *ex parte* conversation prior to the commencement of the trial.

In addition, the failure of Chairperson Currie to distribute the new affidavit of Senator Burris, transmitted February 5, 2009, to the members of the Special Investigative Committee immediately upon receipt constitutes an injury to the public. The contents of the affidavit were such that they directly contradict the sworn testimony of Senator Burris, and the public was entitled to learn of the new information as quickly as possible.

Pursuant to a motion adopted February 20, 2009, the House authorized for inclusion in the February 19, 2009 House Journal the following response to the Dissent and Protest filed by Representative Dunkin and Representative Tracy.

Many are making much of the delay between the arrival of Senator Burris' most recent affidavit to the House Special Investigative Committee and its dissemination to members and the public. As the document was some to me, here's the story.

I'd had a call from Senator Burris' lawyer alerting me that information in response to unanswered and outstanding questions from the Committee to the Senator was on its way. After a week in Springfield, I picked up the documents, along with the rest of the week's mail, from my district office late Friday. I brought many papers, including the material from Senator Burris, to Springfield on Monday. I'd glanced at the document and saw a list of Senator Burris' lobbying clients – information the Committee has requested he submit. Without a closer look, I assumed the document was a routine response to Committee questions. I searched out staff Monday morning to check the information against our questions and to prepare the document for distribution, but a communications mishap meant staff didn't have the document in hand until late Wednesday, the day before a state holiday and the start of a four-day staff vacation.

In the meantime, Senator Burris' office released the document on Friday, February 13. It was clearly his expectation – and mine – that this document would become part of the public record of the Special Investigative Committee.

Any suggestion that I engaged in a deliberate cover up, that I purposely delayed distribution of the information is totally false. Any suggestion that I should do a better job of reading my mail in a timely fashion is a suggestion I enthusiastically – and more than a little ruefully – embrace.

Offered by Representative Bost:

WHEREAS, Thousands of Americans die each year from mesothelioma, an aggressive cancer caused by asbestos, that attacks the linings of the lungs, abdomen, heart, or testicles; and

WHEREAS, The heavy use of asbestos in manufacturing, industry, and construction has been recognized as "the worst occupational health disaster in U.S. history"; and

WHEREAS, Asbestos was used in the construction of virtually all office buildings, public schools, and homes built before 1975; and

WHEREAS, A high percentage of mesothelioma victims were exposed to asbestos on naval ships and in shipyards; and

WHEREAS, It is believed that many of the firefighters, police officers, and rescue workers from the site of the World Trade Center destruction on September 11, 2001 may be at increased risk of contracting mesothelioma; and

WHEREAS, Even incidental exposure to asbestos is sufficient to cause cancer as long as 30 years later; and

WHEREAS, The lack of sufficient research to advance effective treatments for Mesothelioma has led to inadequate treatment for those stricken with the disease and has resulted in a situation where the majority of Mesothelioma patients succumb to the disease within a mere 12 to 15 months from the time of diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, In 1999, the Mesothelioma Applied Research Foundation was formed to eradicate the life-ending and vicious effects of mesothelioma, and early progress in developing effective treatments for the disease is now being made; and

WHEREAS, The establishment of Mesothelioma Awareness Day would raise public awareness of the disease and the need to develop effective treatments for this devastating disease; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare September 26 of each year to be Mesothelioma Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Mesothelioma Applied Research Foundation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 92

WHEREAS, The United States of America has an economy that is currently in recession; and

WHEREAS, Many voices of the Illinois public, including the editorial page of the "Chicago Tribune" daily newspaper, in its morning edition of February 18, 2009, have urged Senator Burris to resign from office; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge Roland Wallace Burris to resign from his position as a United States Senator from the State of Illinois, effective immediately; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Illinois enact suitable legislation to enable the people of the State to

select a new senator by special statewide election of the people; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this preamble and resolution be presented to the Illinois delegation to the federal House of Representatives, and to the senior and junior federal senators from the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 93

Offered by Representative Tracy:

WHEREAS, On January 8, 2009, the current junior United States Senator from Illinois, Roland Wallace Burris, testified under oath to the House Special Investigative Committee on the circumstances connected to his appointment to the Senate by former Governor Rod Blagojevich; and

WHEREAS, While under oath, Burris responded to questioning from Representative Jim Durkin; and

WHEREAS, Representative Durkin asked Burris whether he had spoken about the Senate appointment with anyone "closely related to the governor, including family members or lobbyists connected with him"; and

WHEREAS, In asking Burris this question, Representative Durkin listed six enumerated individuals connected with Governor Blagojevich; and

WHEREAS, Speaking under oath, Burris answered this question in the negative; and

WHEREAS, In an affidavit dated February 4, 2009, and submitted to the chairperson of the House Special Investigative Committee, Burris sought to revise and extend his January 8 testimony to the Committee; and

WHEREAS, In this February 4th affidavit, Burris for the first time revealed conversations with five enumerated close advisors to Blagojevich, all of whom had been named in Durkin's question to him, and with whom Burris had previously denied, under oath, that he had spoken; and

WHEREAS, At the January 8, 2009 hearing of the House Special Investigative Committee, several representatives asked Burris whether there had been any "quid pro quo" involved in Blagojevich's decision to appoint Burris to the United States Senate; and

WHEREAS, Speaking under oath, Burris on January 8th answered these questions in the negative; and

WHEREAS, On February 16 and 17, 2009, Burris made public statements admitting to having discussed taking on a fundraising role for the former Governor; and

WHEREAS, On February 17, 2009, Burris, speaking in Peoria, Illinois, admitted to reporters that he had "called some people about trying to see if we could put a fundraiser together" for the former Governor; and

WHEREAS, The contradictions between these statements made by Burris under oath on January 8, 2009, and affidavits and statements made by Burris since that time, raise questions about Burris's veracity that have been referred to Sangamon County State's Attorney John Schmidt for possible prosecution for perjury; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Ethics Committee of the United States Senate should conduct a thorough inquiry into the ethical questions raised by the process through which Senator Roland Wallace Burris was appointed by former Governor Rod Blagojevich to the United States Senate; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this inquiry should include, but not be limited to, the fact pattern briefly described in this preamble and resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That if the members of the Senate Ethics Committee believe, after an inquiry into the facts of this case, that their duty requires them to recommend that the Senate use the power granted by Section 5 of Article I of the Constitution of the United States of America to expel a member from their ranks by two-thirds vote, that the Senate, sitting as a whole, adopt this recommendation and take action to expel Senator Roland Wallace Burris; and be it further

RESOLVED, That, if this event takes place, that the State of Illinois enact suitable legislation to enable the people of the State to select a new senator by special Statewide election of the people; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this preamble and resolution be presented to the Illinois delegation to the federal House of Representatives and to the senior and junior federal Senators from the State of Illinois.

WHEREAS, Ronald Reagan served with honor and distinction for two terms as the 40th President of the United States of America, the second of which he earned the confidence of three-fifths of the electorate and was victorious in 49 of the 50 states in the general election, a record that is unsurpassed in the history of American presidential elections; and

WHEREAS, During Mr. Reagan's presidency, he worked in a bipartisan manner to enact his bold agenda of restoring accountability and common sense to government, which led to an unprecedented economic expansion and opportunity for millions of Americans; nd

WHEREAS, President Reagan's commitment to our armed forces contributed to the restoration of pride in America, her values and those cherished by the free world, and prepared America's Armed Forces to meet 21st century challenges; and

WHEREAS, President Reagan's vision of "peace through strength" helped lead to the end of the Cold War and the ultimate demise of the Soviet Union, guaranteeing basic human rights for millions of people; and

WHEREAS, The City of Dixon, Ronald Reagan's boyhood home, has established a 15-person Centennial Commission in order to plan the City's celebration of the 100th birthday of this dynamic and visionary leader in the year 2011; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, Hundreds of millions of dollars have been lost by small businesses, which has forced many businesses to close because they are unable to repay their loans; and

WHEREAS, Thousands of people have lost their homes through foreclosure because they could not pay the mortgages on their homes; and

WHEREAS, Usury laws that were once common in this State have been repealed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Usury Investigation Task Force consisting of 6 members appointed as follows: one Senator chosen by the Senate President, who shall be a co-chairperson, one Representative chosen by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall be a co-chairperson, one Senator chosen by the Senate Minority Leader, one Representative chosen by the House Minority Leader, one member chosen by the Governor, and one member from the lending business community chosen by the co-chairpersons; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall compile information on the following issues, as well as others it deems necessary:

(1) the revival of laws prohibiting usury through appropriate legislation;

(2) the effect usury legislation would have on consumers' and borrowers' rights; and

(3) any potential harm that would come to consumers and borrowers as a result of not

passing legislation that concerns usury; and be it further

RESOLVED, That in order to gather all necessary information, the Task Force shall solicit expert testimony and public opinion through a series of public hearings; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall prepare a report and file it with the General Assembly no later than July 1, 2010 detailing the issues raised and the policy recommendations it deems necessary, if any, as well as outlining the next steps for further study of the issues.

"When the victim is under 18 years of age at the time of the offense, a prosecution for misdemeanor criminal sexual abuse may be commenced within 10 years after the child victim attains 18 years of age."; and

on page 5, by inserting immediately below line 2 the following:

"(720 ILCS 5/11-11) (from Ch. 38, par. 11-11)

Sec. 11-11. Sexual Relations Within Families.

(a) A person commits sexual relations within families if he or she:

(1) Commits an act of sexual penetration as defined in Section 12-12 of this Code; and

(2) The person knows that he or she is related to the other person as follows: (i)

Brother or sister, either of the whole blood or the half blood; or (ii) Father or mother, when the child, regardless of legitimacy and regardless of whether the child was of the whole blood or half-blood or was adopted, was 18 years of age or over when the act was committed; or (iii) Stepfather or stepmother, when the stepchild was 18 years of age or over when the act was committed; or (iv) Aunt or uncle, when the niece or nephew was 18 years of age or over when the act was committed; or (v) Great-aunt or great-uncle, when the grand-niece or grand-nephew was 18 years of age or over when the grand-niece or grand-nephew was 18 years of age or over when the grand-half or step-grandchild was 18 years of age or over when the grand-half or step-grandchild was 18 years of age or over when the act was committed; or (vi) Grandparent or step-grandparent, when the grand-half or step-grandchild was 18 years of age or over when the act was committed.

(b) Sentence. Sexual relations within families is a Class 3 felony.

(Source: P.A. 84-1280.)"; and

Perfunctory Session

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2009

At the hour of 2:18 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTION

The following resolution was offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 86

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, The contributions of many African-Americans have been left out of numerous history books; and

WHEREAS, More than 12 million slaves were shipped to the Americas and of those, 645,000 were brought to the United States; by the 1860 census, the slave population in the United States had grown to approximately 4 million persons; and

WHEREAS, Enslaved labor was necessary for colonial empires to survive in America and without the contributions of slaves performing the jobs necessary to the building of the United States, our country would not have developed into the strong nation that it is today; and

WHEREAS, In the maritime industry, slave labor was needed to load, unload, and transport goods around the United States and abroad; in the South, slave labor was necessary to clear the fields, plant, tend, and harvest the crops, especially the crops of tobacco, cotton, and sugar cane, as well as to transport the crops to market; the enslaved performed all kinds of jobs within the United States; and

WHEREAS, Not only did African-Americans contribute to the development of this country, they fought for its freedom as well; African-Americans have fought in all wars, from the American Revolution to our present wars; and

WHEREAS, It would be fitting to honor the contributions of African-American slaves in the United States by a declaration of the United States Congress that commemorates those efforts and sacrifices; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Illinois State House of Representatives urges the Congress to honor the contributions of African-American slaves in the United States by declaring that every February 28th shall be designated as Honor the Contributions of African-American Slaves in the United States Day; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the United States Senate, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Lang introduced the following:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 19

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL

ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Section 8.1 of Article I of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE I BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 8.1. CRIME VICTIM'S RIGHTS.

(a) <u>To preserve and protect a victim's right to justice and due process, a crime victim</u> Crime victims, as defined by law, shall have the following rights in criminal and juvenile delinquency proceedings as provided by law:

(1) The right to be treated with fairness and respect for <u>the victim's</u> their dignity and privacy <u>and to be</u> free from harassment, intimidation, and abuse

throughout the criminal or juvenile justice process.

(2) The right to have the defendant, any person acting on the defendant's behalf, and the attorney of record prevented from obtaining confidential information or records that could be used to locate or harass the victim or victim's family, that disclose confidential communications made in the course of medical or counseling treatment, or that are otherwise privileged or confidential by law.

(3) (2) The right to timely notification of court proceedings and any related post-judgment proceedings.

(4) (3) The right to <u>confer</u> communicate with the prosecution.

(5) (4) The right to be heard in person or in any other manner the victim chooses, upon request, at any proceeding involving a post-arrest release decision, plea, sentencing, post-conviction or post-adjudication release decision, or any proceeding in which a right of the victim is at issue. The right to receive, upon request, the pre-sentence report when available to the defendant, except for those portions made confidential by law make a statement to the court at sentencing.

(6) (5) The right to <u>be informed of information about</u> the conviction, <u>the</u> sentence, <u>any proposal to</u> reduce the sentence or that would result in release, the imprisonment, and <u>the</u> release of the accused.

(7) (6) The right to timely disposition of the case following the arrest of the accused <u>including related</u> post-judgment proceedings.

(8) (7) The right to be reasonably protected from the accused throughout the criminal <u>or juvenile</u> justice process. The right to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in denying <u>or fixing the amount of bail and release conditions for the defendant.</u>

(9) (8) The right to be present at the trial and all other court proceedings on the same

basis as the accused, unless the victim is to testify and the court determines that the victim's testimony would be materially affected if the victim hears other testimony at the trial.

(10) (9) The right to have present at all court proceedings, subject to the rules of evidence,

an advocate or other support person of the victim's choice.

(11) (10) The right to restitution.

(12) The right to be present, upon request, at all post-judgment proceedings.

(13) The right to have the safety of the victim, the victim's family, and the general public considered before any parole or other post-judgment release decision is made.

(b) Definition. For the purposes of this Section, the term "crime victim" means a person directly and proximately harmed as a result of the commission of a criminal or juvenile offense. In the case of a crime victim who is under 18 years of age, incompetent, incapacitated, or deceased, the legal guardians of the crime victim or the representatives of the crime victim's estate, family members, or any other persons appointed as suitable by the court may assume the crime victim's rights under this Section, but in no event shall the defendant be named as such guardian or representative.

(c) A victim, a lawful representative of the victim including the victim's lawyer, or the prosecuting attorney upon request of the victim may assert the rights enumerated in subsection (a) in any circuit or appellate court with jurisdiction over the case as a matter of right. The court shall act promptly on such a request.

(b) The General Assembly may provide by law for the enforcement of this Section.

(d) (c) The General Assembly may provide for an assessment against convicted defendants to pay for crime victims' rights.

(e) (d) Nothing in this Section or in any law enacted under this Section shall be construed as creating a basis for vacating a conviction . This Section does not create any cause of action for compensation or damages against the State, any political subdivision of the State, any officer, employee, or agent of the

State or of any of its political subdivisions, or any officer or employee of the court or a ground for appellate relief in any criminal case.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 20

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article III of the Illinois Constitution by adding Section 7 as follows:

ARTICLE III

SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS

SECTION 7. RECALL OF EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

(a) The electors of the State may petition for the recall of an executive branch officer as identified in Section 1 of Article V. Upon certification of the recall petition as valid, the question "Shall (officer) be recalled from the office of (office)?" must be submitted to the electors, along with the names of any candidates certified for the successor election, on a separate ballot containing only the recall question and candidates for the successor election, at a special election called by the State Board of Elections or at a regularly scheduled election, the election in either case to occur not more than 90 days after the date of certification of the recall petition. The officer subject to recall may not be a candidate in the successor election.

(b) An executive branch officer is immediately removed upon certification by the State Board of Elections that a majority of the electors voting on the question voted to recall the officer. If an officer is recalled, the candidate who receives the highest number of votes in the successor election is elected successor for the balance of the term. Once a recall petition is certified, the petition may not be withdrawn. Another recall petition may not be initiated against that officer during the remainder of his or her current term of office.

(c) Any elector of the State may file an affidavit with the State Board of Elections providing notice of intent to circulate a petition to recall an officer no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the officer's current term of office. The affidavit must identify the name of the officer, the office to be recalled, the name and address of the proponents of the recall petition, and the date of filing of the affidavit with the State Board of Elections. A recall petition shall not be circulated prior to filing of the affidavit. A recall petition must be filed with the State Board of Elections within 150 days after the filing of the affidavit.

(d) A petition to recall an executive branch officer must include signatures of electors of the State equal to at least 15% of the total votes cast for the office in the election at which the officer was elected, with 100 signatures from each of at least 25 separate counties.

The same standards and requirements governing statewide advisory public questions shall also govern the formatting, circulation, and filing of a recall petition, except as may otherwise be provided in this <u>Section</u>.

(e) The State Board of Elections shall certify the recall petition not more than 30 days after the date the recall petition is filed, provided that the petition meets all of the requirements set forth in this Section. Any recall petition or election pending on the date of the next general election at which a candidate for the office subject to recall is elected is moot.

(f) If a recall election is initiated, the name of a successor candidate may not appear on the ballot unless a nominating petition has been filed with the State Board of Elections within 30 days after the certification of

the recall petition. The nominating petition of a candidate for the successor election must contain the same number of signatures and be circulated in the same manner as required for the nominating petition of an independent or new party candidate for nomination to the office subject to recall. Nominating petitions may be filed no sooner than the day after the filing of the affidavit required in subsection (c). The State Board of Elections shall certify a valid nominating petition not more than 30 days after the date the recall petition is certified, provided the petition conforms to the requirements set forth in this Section.

(g) An election to determine whether to recall an executive officer and to elect a successor shall be proclaimed by the State Board of Elections and held not less than 90 days and no more than 120 days after the date of certification of the recall petition.

(h) The provisions of this Section are self-executing and judicially enforceable.

SCHEDULE

The State Board of Elections shall proceed, as soon as all the returns are received but no later than 31 days after the election, to canvass the votes given for and against this Constitutional Amendment, as shown by the abstracts of votes cast. If this Constitutional Amendment is approved by either three-fifths of those voting on the question or a majority of those voting in the election, then the State Board of Elections shall declare the adoption of this Constitutional Amendment and it shall, upon declaration of its adoption, take effect and become a part of the Constitution of this State. This Schedule supersedes and applies notwithstanding any statute to the contrary, and no other requirements, including without limitation proclamation of the results of the vote or notice by publication, are necessary for its effectiveness.
