RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that the request made by Mannheim SD 83 - Cook with respect to the limitation of administrative costs, identified in the report filed by the State Board of Education as request WM100-4945, is disapproved; and be it further

RESOLVED, That each of the school district waiver requests identified below by school district name and by the identifying number and subject area of the waiver request as summarized in the report filed by the State Board of Education is approved for only one year and disapproved for the remaining years:

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 309

Offered by Representative Stephens:

WHEREAS, One of the purposes of the correctional system is rehabilitation and to provide an inmate with skills to lead a lawful and productive life after release from incarceration; and

WHEREAS, The Vandalia Correctional Center has plenty of land and fencing suitable for the care of horses; and

WHEREAS, The grooming of thoroughbred horses is a skill that can be taught to inmates and can lead them to a productive life after prison; and

WHEREAS, The program to accomplish this purpose could be established at no cost to the taxpayers since the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation and the Illinois Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association will provide all that's needed to care for the horses, including feed, hay, all equipment needed for the horses, retired thoroughbred horses, farriers, and veterinary care; and

WHEREAS, Similar programs have been established in 8 other states and the recidivism rate of those inmates participating in such programs is low; and

WHEREAS, An inmate can be trained to care for 2 or 3 horses for a 6 month period and receive a certificate that states that he completed the program and is qualified to work as a groomer on a horse farm or race track; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Department of Corrections to establish a thoroughbred horse groomer training program at the Vandalia Correctional Center; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Director of Corrections.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 313

Offered by Representative Ryg:

WHEREAS, Families, large and small businesses, healthcare providers, and State and local government in Illinois are struggling to access the quality, affordable healthcare that they need to promote healthy families and a healthy economy in their State and nationally; and

WHEREAS, As a result of the national healthcare crisis, health insurance premiums in Illinois increased by 73% between the years 2000 and 2007, while median earnings increased by only 11%; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois median yearly wage in 2007 was \$27,330, while the average healthcare premium for a family was \$12,153; and

WHEREAS, Illinois employers spend an average of \$9,071 per year on family coverage, paying 77% of the total cost of premiums for family coverage; and

WHEREAS, An average of 700 Illinoisans lose their health insurance every day; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the time for a national solution to the American healthcare crisis that threatens the economic and physical health of the people of Illinois and people across the country is now; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the urgent need for a national solution to the healthcare crisis that meets key criteria for comprehensive health care reform set forth by President Obama and Health Care for America Now, including the following:

(1) affordable coverage and care, with premiums and out-of-pocket costs based on a family's ability to pay and a choice of providers that meets our families' needs from preventative care to care for serious illness; and

- (2) a choice of health insurance plans, including the right to keep one's current insurance, choose another private plan, or join a public health insurance plan; and
- (3) equity in healthcare access, treatment, research, and resources to people and communities of color and the strengthening of health services in low-income communities; and
- (4) a system in which government sets and enforces rules on insurance company practices and charges, requiring them to put our healthcare before their profits; and
- (5) coverage that is predictable and affordable for working families, retirees, and small businesses and other employers and that controls costs while improving quality, with measures such as: lowering administrative expenses, investing in preventive care, actively managing disease, setting standards for performance, reducing medical errors, and using the public's purchasing power to lower drug and other prices; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage local governments, families, providers, and businesses across Illinois to work together in 2009 with the newly elected President Obama, the Illinois Congressional delegation, and the leaders of the U.S. Congress to guarantee quality, affordable healthcare for everyone in our State and across the country; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to President Obama, the Illinois Congressional delegation, and the leaders of the U.S. Congress.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 315

Offered by Representative Bellock:

WHEREAS, During the transition from childhood to adulthood, adolescents establish unhealthy patterns of behavior and make poor lifestyle choices that affect both their current and future health; and

WHEREAS, Many adolescents may not have access to primary healthcare services; in Illinois over 250,000 children between the ages of birth and seventeen have no insurance; of these children, 6.3 percent have not seen a physician in the last five years and 2.6 percent have never seen a physician; and

WHEREAS, Adolescence is a critical time to develop positive habits and skills that can lead to healthy lifestyles and behavior over the adolescent's lifetime; the Institute of Medicine and National Research Council conducted a study which found that one important factor in designing an adolescent health service is the focus on prevention of disease; one of the study's findings concluded that "prevention, early intervention and timely treatment improve health status for adolescents, prepare them for healthy adulthood, and decrease the incidence of many chronic diseases in adulthood"; and

WHEREAS, Adolescents and young adults are adversely affected by serious health and safety issues such as motor vehicle crashes, violence, and substance abuse; they also struggle to adopt behaviors that could decrease their risk of developing chronic diseases in adulthood behaviors such as eating nutritiously, engaging in physical activity, and choosing not to use tobacco; environmental factors such as family, peer group, school, and community characteristics also contribute to the challenges that adolescents face; and

WHEREAS, In the past few years, immunizations have been licensed to provide protection for teens against infections and diseases such as meningitis, tetanusdiphtheria-acellular pertussis, influenza, and cervical cancer; and

WHEREAS, The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), and the American Medical Association (AMA) recommend a routine healthcare visit for adolescents who are eleven or twelve years of age to receive recommended immunizations and other evidence-based preventive healthcare services; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) has developed, in conjunction with AAP, the Bright Futures Initiative, which provides a set of guidelines including recommendations on immunizations and routine health screenings for adolescents; and

WHEREAS, ACIP recommends the use of FDA-approved vaccines for tetanusdiphtheria-acellular pertussis, meningitis, influenza, and cervical cancer in adolescents; and the CDC has launched a national campaign to raise awareness about adolescent health and immunizations; and

WHEREAS, The Society for Adolescent Medicine has found that adolescent well visits are one of the best tools of preventive care to ensure continued health from childhood to adulthood and that children and adolescents who regularly visit a primary care physician are less likely to have emergency room visits and preventable hospitalizations; and

WHEREAS, Because adolescents remain under the guardianship of their parents, parental awareness of the need for an adolescent well visit plays an enormous role in the incidence of adolescent well visits; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we hereby express support for improved adolescent health and wellness by recognizing the importance of an adolescent well physical to prevent chronic diseases, help better identify and treat chronic diseases, and update immunizations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Illinois Department of Human Services to disseminate to State and federal agencies and stakeholder organizations who can assist with the promotion of adolescent well-health in Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 317

Offered by Representative Burke:

WHEREAS, When we think of the world being a better place, we think of how it begins with young children; and

WHEREAS, Children need a safe and loving environment to grow, learn, excel, and be happy; they have dreams and wishes, and society must do what's best to help their dreams come true; and

WHEREAS, El Dia de los Ninos (Children's Day) is celebrated to recognize and acknowledge every child; and

WHEREAS, By celebrating Children's Day on April 30, we are making a commitment to our children that we will continue to listen, teach, and nurture them; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the date of April 30, 2009 as El Dia de los Ninos (Children's Day) in the State of Illinois in order to commemorate the lives of our children and our future.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 321

Offered by Representative Colvin:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives wish to recognize and honor the upcoming 103rd anniversary of the founding of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established for African-Americans; and

WHEREAS, The Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity was founded on December 4, 1906, by seven young men, respectfully known as the Seven Jewels, at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York; and

WHEREAS, Henry Arthur Callis, Charles Henry Chapman, Eugene Kinckle Jones, George Biddle Kelley, Nathaniel Allison Murray, Robert Harold Ogle, and Vertner Woodson Tandy, the founders of the Fraternity, recognized the need for a strong bond of brotherhood among African descendants in this country; and

WHEREAS, The aims of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity are manly deeds, scholarship, and love for all mankind; and

WHEREAS, For nearly 103 years, the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity has played a fundamental role in the positive development of the character and education of more than 175,000 men; and

WHEREAS, The brothers of Alpha Phi Alpha have shared countless friendships and a common belief in the founding ideals of the fraternity; and

WHEREAS, Alumni from Alpha Phi Alpha include many noteworthy leaders in the areas of government, business, entertainment, science, and higher education; and

WHEREAS, The Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity has 350 college campus chapters and 350 alumni chapters in the United States of America, the District of Columbia, Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and Europe; the Theta Chapter (1910) and the Xi Lambda Chapter (1924), both of Chicago, were the first college and alumni chapters, respectively, in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity continues to enrich the lives of its members, who, in turn, carry out in their communities a commitment to service and the uplifting of humanity; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize and honor the upcoming 103rd anniversary of the founding of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend all Alpha Phi Alpha brothers, past and present, for their bond of friendship, common ideals and beliefs, and service to community; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our best wishes for the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity's continued success and growth; and be it further

RESOLVED, That December 4, 2009 is officially proclaimed as Alpha Phi Alpha Day in the Great State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this Resolution be delivered to the Illinois District Director of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, the Assistant Illinois District Director of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, and the Presidents of the 29 College and Alumni Chapters of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated of the Great District of Illinois.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 48

Offered by Representative May:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is dedicated to providing and preserving a healthy environment for the benefit of the State's citizens and future generations; and

WHEREAS, The State recognizes that to maintain a healthy environment each person must play a part in reducing his or her carbon footprint; and

WHEREAS, One acre of certain trees may remove, over the course of a year, as much as 2.6 tons of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, and one tree may absorb, during that same period, as much carbon dioxide as some cars produce when driven 26,000 miles; and

WHEREAS, We recognize that, through actions and educational programs, we can raise awareness about environmental problems and make changes that will benefit the environment as well as the well-being of the State's citizens; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the date of September 15th as Carbon Day in the State of Illinois in order to raise awareness about the need for reducing the State's carbon footprint; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge individuals, organizations, schools, and communities to play a part in reducing the State's carbon footprint by planting trees on that day and organizing special programs to educate the State's citizens on steps that can be taken to reduce carbon emissions.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 50

Offered by Representative Coulson:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Early Intervention program's mission is to ensure that families who have infants and toddlers, birth to age 3, with diagnosed disabilities, developmental delays, or substantial risk of significant delays receive resources and supports that assist them in maximizing their child's development, while respecting the diversity of families and communities; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Early Intervention services include, but are not limited to: developmental evaluations and assessments, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech/language therapy, developmental therapy, service coordination, psychological services, and social work services; and

WHEREAS, The Part C Early Intervention system has not had a broad review by stakeholders since 2000: and

WHEREAS, The stakeholders have agreed that the Part C Early Intervention system needs to be reviewed by a broad group of stakeholders to ensure that all eligible children and families are receiving quality services; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly finds that a Taskforce to undertake a comprehensive and thorough

review of the Early Intervention system is necessary; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Illinois Part C Early Intervention Taskforce is created to partner with the Department of Human Services to undertake a comprehensive and thorough review of the Early Intervention system and develop recommendations and an action plan to address issues related to workforce, financing, monitoring and evaluation, service delivery, and transitions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Taskforce shall be co-chaired by a staff member from the Department of Human Services and a staff member from Voices for Illinois Children appointed by the Secretary of Human Services; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Taskforce shall consist of members appointed as follows:

- (1) One member representing the Governor, appointed by the Governor;
- (2) One member of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- (3) One member of the Senate, appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;
- (4) One member of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (5) One member of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives;
- (6) One member representing the Division of Mental Health within the Department of Human Services, appointed by the Secretary of Human Services;
- (7) One member representing the Division of Community Health and Prevention within the Department of Human Services, appointed by the Secretary of Human Services;
- (8) One member representing the Special Education Division of the Illinois State Board of Education, appointed by the State Superintendent of Education;
- (9) One member representing the Department of Children and Family Services, appointed by the Director of Children and Family Services; and
- (10) One member representing the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, appointed by the Director of Healthcare and Family Services; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Taskforce shall also include representatives of the following groups, appointed by the Secretary of Human Services, with no more than 30 members in total:

- (1) Advocacy organizations that focus on early childhood, health, or issues related to early intervention;
- (2) Professional groups with members who provide services for or make referrals to the Illinois Part C Early Intervention system;
- (3) Groups that are affiliated with the Early Intervention system for training and consultation;
- (4) The Illinois Interagency Council on Intervention;
- (5) Child and Family Connections (CFC) managers or staff;
- (6) Parents with children in the Part C Early Intervention system; and
- (7) The University of Illinois Division of Specialized Care for Children; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Taskforce shall receive no compensation as members of the Taskforce but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred by the members in performance of their duties as members of the Taskforce from appropriations made for such purpose; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Taskforce shall submit a written report of its findings, recommendations, and action plan to the Governor and the General Assembly by July 1, 2010.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 51

Offered by Representative Thapedi:

WHEREAS, Gun violence and illegal interstate firearms trafficking have become growing problems in all portions of the State of Illinois, other areas of the Midwest, and throughout the nation; and

WHEREAS, Children and students are too often the victims of gun crimes, in their homes, on our streets

and before, after, and during school hours; and

WHEREAS, Since the current school year started in September 2008, twentynine Chicago Public School students have been shot and killed; and

WHEREAS, In *Gun Violence: The Real Costs*, a book written by Philip J. Cook and Jens Ludwig, the data collected by the authors show the cost of security in Chicago public high schools to be \$41 million a year, and the costs of security in suburban and downstate Illinois schools are similarly rising rapidly; and

WHEREAS, Since the federal ban on assault weapons was lifted in 2004, the Chicago Police Department has seized 1,547 such weapons; and

WHEREAS, According to a five-year study conducted by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, 43% of all guns seized within five police districts in the City of Chicago originated in Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, The total cost of gun violence in Chicago is estimated to be \$2.5 billion each year, according to the report Gun Violence among School Age Youth in Chicago, prepared by The University of Chicago Crime Lab, representing a cost to every household in Chicago of about \$2,500 each year; and

WHEREAS, There is an enormous number of illegal guns in Chicago, other areas of Illinois, and throughout the Midwest, and 80% of murder victims in Chicago are killed by guns; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Interstate Gun Trafficking Task Force within the Illinois State Police, to consist of the following: (1) the Director of State Police or his designee; (2) the Illinois Attorney General or her designee; (3) the Cook County States Attorney or her designee; (4) the Sheriff of Cook County or his designee; (5) the Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department or his designee; (6) three appointees of the Governor who are representatives of federal, suburban or downstate law enforcement officials; and (7) three appointees of the Mayor of the City of Chicago who are representatives of law enforcement officials, foundations, or institutions of higher education; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all appointments shall be made no later than 45 days following adoption of this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall study measures that help reduce illegal interstate gun trafficking in Illinois and the harmful effects of such activity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall choose its chair and other officers and meet at the call of the chair; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Task Force shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for their reasonable and necessary expenses from funds appropriated for that purpose; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and General Assembly on or before December 31, 2010; and be it further

RESOLVED, That legislatures of other states in the Midwest are encouraged to create interstate gun trafficking task forces in their respective states, which task forces may cooperate with the Task Force created by this resolution and with each other; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be presented to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, the President of the Illinois Senate, the Minority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Illinois Senate, the Governor of the State of Illinois, and the Director of the Illinois State Police.
