MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE

A message from the Senate by

Ms. Rock, Secretary:

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has accepted the Governor's specific recommendations for change, which are attached, to a bill of the following title, the acceptance of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House, to-wit:

Senate Bill No. 1936

A bill for AN ACT concerning revenue.

I am further directed to transmit to the House of Representatives the following copy of the Governor's specific recommendations for change to the Senate:

Action taken by the Senate, February 9, 2010.

January 21, 2010 To the Honorable Members of the Illinois Senate, 96th General Assembly:

I hereby return Senate Bill 1936 with specific recommendations for change.

I commend the sponsors for their hard work on this bill. Special Service Area bonds can be a valuable tool in helping municipalities support and improve local infrastructure and I am pleased to support efforts that help citizens improve their communities. Maximizing the benefits of a Special Service Area, however, should not come at the expense of Special Service Area homeowners. For that reason, I am pleased to accommodate the sponsors' request for an amendatory veto that would eliminate the restrictions on the maximum principal of the refunding bonds and also explicitly ensure that the total amount of taxes paid by Illinois residents would not increase due to refunding. The Senate sponsor has stated that these changes are consistent with the fundamental purpose and legislative scheme set forth in the bill.

Therefore, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9(e) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, I hereby return Senate Bill 1936, entitled "AN ACT concerning revenue.", with the following specific recommendations for change:

on page 3, by replacing lines 11 and 12 with "except that the interest rate on the refunding bonds and the maximum"; and

on page 3, by replacing lines 14 and 15 with "may not be greater than that set forth in the original notice for the refunded bonds. Notwithstanding any provision of this Section to the contrary, the debt service of the refunding bonds issued pursuant to this Section may not exceed the debt service estimated to be paid over the remaining duration of the refunded bonds."

With these changes, Senate Bill 1936 will have my approval. I respectfully request your concurrence.

MOTION

I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 1936 in manner and form as follows:

AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 1936

IN ACCEPTANCE OF GOVERNOR'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Amend Senate Bill 1936 on page 3, by replacing lines 11 and 12 with "except that the interest rate on the refunding bonds and the maximum"; and

on page 3, by replacing lines 14 and 15 with "may not be greater than that set forth in the original notice for the refunded bonds. Notwithstanding any provision of this Section to the contrary, the debt service of the refunding bonds issued pursuant to this Section may not exceed the debt service estimated to be paid over the remaining duration of the refunded bonds."

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 884

Offered by Representative Kosel:

WHEREAS, Our nation's use of energy continues to escalate, with increasingly detrimental environmental and economic impact; and

WHEREAS, Outdoor lighting practices currently in widespread use in the State of Illinois consume large amounts of energy and are very energy-inefficient; much more efficient outdoor lighting practices exist; and

WHEREAS, Energy savings would reduce carbon emissions into our air, preserve natural resources used to produce this energy, set a positive precedent for the rest of the nation, and result in a reduction in costs for Illinois taxpayers and businesses; and

WHEREAS, The safety and welfare of pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists depend upon the reduction of glare and the establishment of consistent and well-defined standards for levels of artificial outdoor illumination; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes the need to define limits and protect the State's residents and business owners from the trespass of excessive and misdirected artificial outdoor illumination from adjacent properties; and

WHEREAS, There is growing evidence that excessive artificial outdoor illumination at night has detrimental effects on human health; and

WHEREAS, Excessive artificial outdoor illumination at night has been shown to have detrimental effects on numerous species of flora and fauna, which depend on the natural cycle of day and night for survival; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes the night sky as a natural resource and the need to preserve the unique quality of life of Illinois residents by preserving and enhancing their ability to view the night sky; and

WHEREAS, The sky glow from artificial outdoor illumination negatively impacts the enjoyment of State parks and other areas of natural beauty and wildlife conservation; and

WHEREAS, Establishing pre-determined standards for artificial outdoor illumination will provide Illinois residents, business owners, and developers with a clear set of guidelines to follow; and

WHEREAS, A clear set of guidelines for artificial outdoor illumination will eliminate the need for business establishments to compete for visual attention by escalating outdoor lighting levels; and

WHEREAS, A void remains in the creation and implementation of a modern, practical set of lighting standards which address the issues of energy consumption, environmental, and quality of life related to artificial outdoor illumination in a "holistic", effective manner; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has the potential to become a leader in the area of artificial outdoor illumination practices by promoting sound environmental policies which will benefit residents of the State of Illinois and serve as a positive example for the nation to follow; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois acknowledges its responsibility to care for both the daytime and nighttime environments; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we express our support for improved night preservation practices in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage municipalities and State agencies to adopt suitable outdoor lighting practices based on the principle of applying artificial light only where it is needed, when it is needed, and to only the levels needed, using the best safety and energy-efficiency standards available; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the Illinois Sustainable Technology Center to provide artificial outdoor illumination engineering assistance to State agencies, municipalities, and businesses that seek to implement responsible outdoor lighting to conserve energy and preserve the important natural phenomenon of night; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be sent to the Governor and the Illinois Sustainable Technology Center.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 888

Offered by Representative William Davis:

WHEREAS, The Republic of China (Taiwan) has achieved economic and social stability; in the last 2 decades, Taiwan has been lauded as a beacon of democracy for Asia, has dramatically improved its record on human rights, and has taken great steps forward to enter the world arena as a trusted partner; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has a strong cultural and economic relationship with Taiwan since the establishment of sister-state relations with Taiwan on August 27, 1992; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan's absence from international organizations dealing with climate change has impeded Taiwan's ability to respond to natural disasters like Typhoon Morakot, which struck Taiwan in the summer of 2009 during an unusually bad typhoon season in the Pacific that was possibly exacerbated by climate change; in addition, the global initiative to tackle climate change has been impaired by the lack of participation (observer status) of Taiwan, the world's 17th-largest economy; and

WHEREAS, The government of Taiwan has expressed its gratitude for the assistance and condolences of the international community in the wake of Typhoon Morakot in 2009, as dozens of international organizations and nations stepped up to help, including the United States, which supplied military equipment for rescue and recovery operations, the European Union, Japan, and the Chinese mainland; and

WHEREAS, Aviation safety has become a major global concern since 2001; Taiwan is a key air transport hub in the Asia-Pacific region, with over 1.35 million flights passing through the Taipei Flight Information Region, and has the world's 15th-largest airport by cargo volume, Taoyuan International Airport; and

WHEREAS, The government of Taiwan has undertaken a policy of "flexible diplomacy" in its international relations and a pragmatic approach to China, having completed a number of cross-strait liberalization measures, including regular, direct passenger flights between mainland China and Taiwan and other goodwill measures, resulting in reciprocal gestures and rapprochement between Taipei and Beijing; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we affirm our support for the participation of Taiwan in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) to increase Taiwan's international space and contribution to the global community; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, UNFCCC Executive Secretary Yvo de Boer, ICAO Secretary General Raymond Benjamin, and the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Chicago.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 890

Offered by Representative McAuliffe:

WHEREAS, Ships of all types sail through the waters in and around our nation every day; and

WHEREAS, These vessels, which are owned by U.S. companies and are registered and operated under the American flag, make up the United States Merchant Marine; and

WHEREAS, In accordance with the Merchant Marine Act of 1936, merchant marines are considered military personnel during war time; and

WHEREAS, During war or national emergency, the Merchant Marine is responsible for delivering military supplies to our armed forces and allies overseas; and

WHEREAS, The role of non-uniformed merchant sailors in World War II was one of the most dangerous and important of the war; and

WHEREAS, Defenseless or lightly armed private merchant ships, facing the same dangers as Navy personnel sailing hostile waters, carried supplies to our soldiers fighting overseas; and

WHEREAS, Hundreds of ships and thousands of men were lost to enemy submarines and aircraft during World War II; and

WHEREAS, There is currently a bill pending in Congress that would allow the merchant marines of World War II to receive benefits for their service; and

WHEREAS, The merchant marines served loyally in times of great danger in defense of their country; it is only fitting and proper that these brave men be given their just reward; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the federal government to adopt legislation allowing merchant marines who served during World War II to receive benefits for their service; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 893

Offered by Representative McGuire:

WHEREAS, According to a new report from the Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois is missing out on an estimated \$153 million in sales tax revenue on online purchases; and

WHEREAS, Not taxing internet purchases subsidizes the growth of distant companies by giving them a price advantage over local stores; such companies contribute little to a community's civic and economic vitality; and

WHEREAS, Such lack of taxation also undermines State and local governments by reducing tax revenue for schools, police, and other government services; the lack of taxes also makes a regressive tax more regressive, due to the fact that only those with Internet access and a credit card are able to take advantage of the tax exemption; and

WHEREAS, Collecting sales taxes for multiple jurisdictions is no longer as burdensome for internet retailers with the advent of software that makes complying with local sales tax rules relatively simple; and

WHEREAS, In addition, the National Governors Association has started the Streamlined Sales Tax Project, approved by 43 states, which will help simplify the tax collection process by establishing uniform sales tax rules and definitions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the President of the United States and the United States Congress to enact legislation requiring internet retailers to collect sales taxes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the President, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, the Majority and Minority Leaders of the United States Senate, and the members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 92

Offered by Representative Riley:

WHEREAS, The most common form of lupus is systemic lupus erythematosus affecting any part of the body with complications, including inflammation of the kidneys, an increase in blood pressure in the lungs, inflammation of the heart muscle, hardening of the arteries, inflammation of the central nervous system and brain, and inflammation of the brain's blood vessels; and

WHEREAS, The residents of Illinois need increased awareness of the autoimmune disease systemic lupus erythematosus; it is necessary to disseminate information about the epidemiology, morbidity, and mortality surrounding this affliction; and

WHEREAS, There is a wide disparity in incidence based on gender and ethnicity; more women than men develop lupus; the ratio of occurrence in women relative to men is 90% to 10%, as indicated by national incidence data; additionally, systemic lupus erythematosus is 3 times more common in women of African American, Hispanic, Asian, and Native American descent than it is in Caucasian women; and

WHEREAS, Because the aforementioned facts have serious implications with regard to health care service delivery to these groups, an examination is needed of whether these disparities hold true in Illinois and whether they are caused by a lack of access to health care or other factors; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we respectfully urge the Department of Human Services, the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, and the Department of Public Health to assess existing State and federal assistance programs regarding the treatment and study of lupus; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the appropriate departments to conduct hearings, examine the above-mentioned ancillary issues, and publish a report on their findings; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be sent to the Secretary of Human Services, the Director of Healthcare and Family Services, and the Director of Public Health.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 93

Offered by Representative Crespo:

WHEREAS, State appropriations to public colleges and universities have historically been made on the bases of enrollments rather than completions; and

WHEREAS, The current and future workforce needs, combined with Illinois' financial difficulties, compel the State of Illinois to examine higher education funding based on course completion rates or other similar indicators of success; and

WHEREAS, Increasing the number of high quality post-secondary credentials to meet the demands of the economy and an increasingly global society is Goal 3 of the Illinois Public Agenda for College and Career Success; and

WHEREAS, Many of the several states in the United States are considering ways to provide an incentive to institutions of higher learning not just to enroll students, but also to ensure that they earn the credentials required by the workplace; and

WHEREAS, Performance-based funding may represent a relatively small percentage of a state's higher education budget which some experts assert that it can lead to remarkable results; and

WHEREAS, The challenge for states is to create a financing system that is clearly understood and yet flexible enough to account for differences in institutional mission and demographics; and

WHEREAS, The same set of guidelines and performance targets should probably not be applied similarly to community colleges, bachelor's and master's degree institutions, and research universities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Board of Higher Education, working in concert with the Illinois Community College Board and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, shall undertake a study of the implementation of performance-based funding for higher education; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board of Higher Education, the Illinois Community College Board, and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission shall prepare a report by June 1, 2010 with findings and submit

that report to the General Assembly; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Board of Higher Education shall provide administrative support for the study and report; and be it further

Resolved, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the chairpersons of the Board of Higher Education, the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, and the Illinois Community College Board.

AGREED RESOLUTIONS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 46

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article 4 of the Illinois Constitution by changing Sections 2 and 3 as follows:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE COMPOSITION

- (a) One Senator shall be elected from each Legislative District. Immediately following each decennial redistricting, the <u>Senate</u>, <u>by resolution</u>, <u>General Assembly by law</u> shall divide the Legislative Districts as equally as possible into three groups. Senators from one group shall be elected for terms of four years, four years and two years; Senators from the second group, for terms of four years, two years and four years; and Senators from the third group, for terms of two years, four years and four years. The Legislative Districts in each group shall be distributed substantially equally over the State.
- (b) Each Legislative District shall be divided into two Representative Districts. In 2012 1982 and every two years thereafter one Representative shall be elected from each Representative District for a term of two years.
- (c) To be eligible to serve as a member of the General Assembly, a person must be a United States citizen, at least 21 years old, and for the two years preceding his election or appointment a resident of the district which he is to represent. In the general election following a redistricting, a candidate for the General Assembly may be elected from any district which contains a part of the district in which he resided at the time of the redistricting and reelected if a resident of the new district he represents for 18 months prior to reelection.
- (d) Within thirty days after a vacancy occurs, it shall be filled by appointment as provided by law. If the vacancy is in a Senatorial office with more than twenty-eight months remaining in the term, the appointed Senator shall serve until the next general election, at which time a Senator shall be elected to serve for the remainder of the term. If the vacancy is in a Representative office or in any other Senatorial office, the appointment shall be for the remainder of the term. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall be a member of the same political party as the person he succeeds.
- (e) No member of the General Assembly shall receive compensation as a public officer or employee from any other governmental entity for time during which he is in attendance as a member of the General Assembly.

No member of the General Assembly during the term for which he was elected or appointed shall be appointed to a public office which shall have been created or the compensation for which shall have been increased by the General Assembly during that term.

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING

- (a) Legislative Districts shall be compact, <u>be</u> contiguous, <u>be</u> and substantially equal in population, <u>reflect minority voting strengths</u>, promote competition, and consider political boundaries. Representative Districts shall be compact, <u>be</u> contiguous, <u>be</u> and substantially equal in population, <u>reflect minority voting strengths</u>, promote competition, and consider political boundaries. A Representative District need not be entirely within a single Legislative District. The General Assembly shall establish by law a method to determine a score for any map for Legislative or Representative districts.
- (b) In the year following each Federal decennial census year, the General Assembly by law shall redistrict the Legislative Districts and the Representative Districts.
- A If no redistricting plan becomes effective by June 30 of that year, a Legislative Redistricting Commission shall be constituted by March 1 of the year following each Federal decennial census year not later than July 10. The Commission shall consist of eight members, no more than four of whom shall be

members of the same political party.

The Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives shall each appoint <u>two persons</u> to the Commission one Representative and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The President and Minority Leader of the Senate shall each appoint <u>two persons</u> to the Commission one Senator and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly.

The members shall be certified to the Secretary of State by the appointing authorities. A vacancy on the Commission shall be filled within five days by the authority that made the original appointment. A Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be chosen by a majority of all members of the Commission. The Commission shall provide to the public data and tools to create Legislative and Representative districts not later than April 7. The Commission shall accept maps for the redistricting of Legislative and Representative districts through May 7.

The Commission shall evaluate all submitted maps according to criteria set forth in subsection (a) as implemented by law and assign each map a score. The Commission shall eliminate maps by a majority vote of the members appointed that fail to meet federal and State law and shall eliminate maps that are substantially the same as other maps of equal or better score. Not later than May 22 the Commission shall give to the Senate the maps for Legislative Districts with the best three scores. Not later than May 22 the Commission shall give to the House of Representatives the maps for Representative Districts with the best three scores.

(c) The Senate by a record vote of three-fifths of the members elected may adopt a redistricting resolution from the three maps for Legislative Districts submitted by the Commission. If the Senate has failed to file a redistricting resolution with the Secretary of State by June 30, the Secretary of State shall certify the redistricting map for Legislative Districts that received the best score from the Commission.

The House by a record vote of three-fifths of the members elected may adopt a redistricting resolution from the three maps for Representative Districts submitted by the Commission. If the House has failed to file a redistricting resolution with the Secretary of State by June 30, the Secretary of State shall certify the redistricting map for Representative Districts that received the best score from the Commission.

Not later than August 10, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

If the Commission fails to file an approved redistricting plan, the Supreme Court shall submit the names of two persons, not of the same political party, to the Secretary of State not later than September 1.

Not later than September 5, the Secretary of State publicly shall draw by random selection the name of one of the two persons to serve as the ninth member of the Commission.

Not later than October 5, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

(d) A An approved redistricting resolution or redistricting map plan filed with the Secretary of State shall be presumed valid, shall have the force and effect of law and shall be published promptly by the Secretary of State.

The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning redistricting the House and Senate, which shall be initiated in the name of the People of the State by the Attorney General.
