**RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN**, that when the two Houses adjourn on Thursday, February 18, 2010, the Senate stands adjourned until Tuesday, February 23, 2010 at 12:00 o'clock noon, or until the call of the President; and the House of Representatives stands adjourned until Thursday, February 23, 2010, at 12:00 o'clock noon, or until the call of the Speaker.

## **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

## HOUSE RESOLUTION 927

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, The Social Security Fairness Act of 2009 was introduced into the U.S. House of Representatives on January 7, 2009 as H.R. 235 and into the U.S. Senate on February 25, 2009 as S. 484; and

WHEREAS, The Social Security Fairness Act of 2009 amends Title II of the Social Security Act to repeal the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision; and

WHEREAS, The Government Pension Offset was enacted in 1977 and the Windfall Elimination Provision was enacted in 1983; and

WHEREAS, The majority of public employees affected by the Government Pension Offset lost their entire spousal benefit despite the fact that their spouses paid Social Security contributions for many years; and

WHEREAS, An affected public employee loses an average of \$3,000 per year because of the Government Pension Offset; and

WHEREAS, The Windfall Elimination Provision causes public employees to lose up to 60% of the benefits that they earned; and

WHEREAS, According to the Social Security Administration's actuaries, the long-term cost of eliminating both of these provisions is negligible while the loss of income to affected employees caused by these provisions forces some civil servants into poverty; and

WHEREAS, These provisions discriminate against teachers, police, firefighters, social workers, and other civil servants; and

WHEREAS, The State and national shortage of teachers, police officers, and firefighters is exacerbated by these provisions because they discourage people from entering and staying in these professions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. Congress to pass the Social Security Fairness Act of 2009 or other legislation that eliminates both the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President pro tempore of the U.S. Senate, the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, and each member of the Illinois Congressional delegation.

## HOUSE RESOLUTION 933

Offered by Representative Reitz:

WHEREAS, It is necessary for the Congress of the United States to provide a fair and effective approach to climate and energy supply issues in order to safeguard American jobs, ensure affordable energy for America, and maintain America's global competitiveness; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's plan to regulate greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from new cars and light trucks will trigger the same regulation of GHG emissions from stationary sources, like manufacturing facilities, power plants, hospitals, and commercial establishments; and

WHEREAS, Regulating greenhouse gas emissions from "stationary sources" under the Clean Air Act would be a great anchor on manufacturing and the economy in general; and

WHEREAS, The pending USEPA effort would burden progress on 2 of the nation's top priorities, environmental improvement and economic recovery, by imposing onerous permitting requirements that will significantly delay or even eliminate investments in new energy-efficient technologies; and

WHEREAS, Over 4 million jobs were lost in 2009, and these proposed regulations have the potential to cause even more job losses; and

WHEREAS, The regulatory requirements of the Clean Air Act will overwhelm state agencies, which are not equipped to handle the estimated 6 million anticipated permitting requests; and

WHEREAS, Only Congress can act to avoid the significant costs and burdens imposed by the regulations on stationary sources, which even the USEPA admits will lead to "absurd results"; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage the Congress of the United States to adopt legislation that would postpone the USEPA's effort to regulate greenhouse gas emissions from stationary sources using existing Clean Air Act authority until Congress adopts a balanced approach to address climate and energy supply issues without crippling the economy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 934

Offered by Representative Poe:

WHEREAS, Ambucs is a national organization comprised of local civic clubs located throughout the United States dedicated to creating mobility and independence for people with disabilities, by performing community service, providing AmTryke therapeutic tricycles for children with disabilities, and providing scholarships for therapists; and

WHEREAS, There are twelve Ambucs Chapters located throughout the State of Illinois devoted to the mission of National Ambucs: Cornbelt Bloomington Ambucs, Champaign-Urbana Ambucs, Danville Ambucs, Decatur Ambucs, Lincolnland Decatur Ambucs, Jacksonville Ambucs, Loves Park Ambucs, Pekin Ambucs, Rockford Ambucs, Springfield Ambucs, Sullivan Ambucs, Tuscola Ambucs, and Greater Champaign County Ambucs; and

WHEREAS, The number of Ambucs actively involved in their local and National Ambucs Chapters in the State of Illinois totals 570, with the largest Ambucs Chapter in the entire National Ambucs network being the Springfield Ambucs Chapter, with 200 members and friends; and

WHEREAS, Ambucs Chapters and Ambuc individuals throughout the State of Illinois annually and freely contribute thousands of hours of community service and hundreds of thousands of dollars of monetary gifts to providing AmTrykes to disabled children, endowing scholarships for therapy students, building ramps for disabled persons, and countless other deserving local and national projects; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we proclaim February of 2010 as Ambucs Appreciation Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Cornbelt Bloomington Ambucs, Champaign-Urbana Ambucs, Danville Ambucs, Decatur Ambucs, Lincolnland Decatur Ambucs, Jacksonville Ambucs, Loves Park Ambucs, Pekin Ambucs, Rockford Ambucs, Springfield Ambucs, Sullivan Ambucs, Tuscola Ambucs, and Greater Champaign County Ambucs as symbols of our respect and esteem.

## HOUSE RESOLUTION 936

Offered by Representative Reitz:

WHEREAS, Spartan Light Metal Products has been an industry leader in magnesium custom die castings for the past 4 decades; the company has been owned and operated as a family business since 1961 and employs over 600 people; and

WHEREAS, Spartan Light Metal Products provides die cast products from magnesium alloys that reduce weight and improve performance of products at competitive costs; and

WHEREAS, Magnesium die casting, such as Spartan Light Metal Products, are being greatly harmed by the tariffs (731-TA-1071 and 731-TA-1072) that have been placed on imported magnesium alloys by the United States International Trade Commission; these tariffs allow the nation's lone magnesium producer to set whatever price it chooses for raw magnesium, driving many die cast companies out of business; and

WHEREAS, The tariffs have created an advantage for foreign competitors, who can purchase magnesium at globally-competitive prices and export finished products to U.S. markets free of penalties; this practice replaces U.S. manufacturing jobs and could lead to bankruptcy for the industry; and

WHEREAS, The tariffs have also placed U.S. car manufacturers at a cost and weight disadvantage against foreign carmakers in meeting Corporate Average Fuel Economy requirements; as a result, about 60% of Spartan Light Metal Products' magnesium business for 2011 is disappearing at a time when the demand for magnesium products is growing; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. President and Congress to find a creative solution to protect the nation's lone magnesium producer without destroying the U.S. magnesium die casting industry; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we further urge the U.S. President and Congress to lift U.S. tariffs 731-TA-1071 and 731-TA-1072 on die cast magnesium alloys from China and Russia or to create a fair market by placing a similar tariff on imported assemblies and products made from die cast magnesium alloys; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the President of the United States and the members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 101

Offered by Representative Madigan:

WHEREAS, The Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority is a municipal corporation created by the General Assembly; and

WHEREAS, The Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority owns and manages McCormick Place and historic Navy Pier for the purposes of tourism, conventions, fairs, and expositions; McCormick Place and Navy Pier function as prominent economic engines for both the City of Chicago and the State; and

WHEREAS, The Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority is directed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Governor of the State of Illinois and the Mayor of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, The Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority has statutory authority to levy taxes for debt service through a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority Retailers' Occupation Tax (1% food and beverage tax in a defined downtown district within the City of Chicago and O'Hare International Airport and Midway Airport), a 2.5% hotel tax imposed within the City of Chicago, a 6% auto rental tax imposed within Cook County, and a \$1 departure tax on public transportation at O'Hare International Airport and Midway Airport; and

WHEREAS, Since the 1980s, the State has provided dedicated backing through State use and occupation tax revenues for Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority debt service on its bonds in the amount of \$31.7 million annually; and

WHEREAS, Since September 11, 2001, the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority tax collections have fallen short of annual debt service by an average of \$4.1 million dollars; and

WHEREAS, Reserves in the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority Fund, which initially covered this annual tax revenue shortfall, have been depleted; and

WHEREAS, Additional distributions of State use and occupation tax revenues to the Authority to make up the Authority's shortfalls in its tax revenue collections have been necessary since Fiscal Year 2009; and

WHEREAS, The Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority, by its own projections, estimates that cumulative draws on the State use and occupation taxes through Fiscal Year 2027 may total \$804 million before the Authority's projected tax collections are sufficient for existing debt service; and

WHEREAS, Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority tax collection shortfalls have also ended the flow of surplus funds from which the repair and maintenance of existing Metropolitan Pier and Exposition facilities could be paid; and

WHEREAS, The economic downturn and competitive pressures within the convention industry continue to erode the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority's operational profitability; and

WHEREAS, Trade shows formerly held at the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority's convention center on a long-term basis continue their exodus to alternative venues in Nevada and Florida; and

WHEREAS, The operational stability and profitability of the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority is of genuine interest to the General Assembly and the people of the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Joint Committee on the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Joint Committee shall consist of 16 members as follows: the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, who shall serve as co-chairs of the Committee; the Minority Leader of the Senate and Minority Leader of the House, who, if they so choose, may serve as co-vice chairs; 4 members of the General Assembly appointed by the President of the Senate; 4 members of the General Assembly appointed by the President of the General Assembly appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; 2 members of the General Assembly appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; and 2 members of the General Assembly appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Joint Committee shall meet at the call of the Speaker and President; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Joint Committee shall examine and recommend ways to improve the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority's operational stability and profitability; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Joint Committee shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly no later than April 30, 2010; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Board of Trustees of the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Cross introduced the following:

# HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 56

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Sections 2 and 3 of Article IV of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

# ARTICLE IV

# THE LEGISLATURE

# SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE COMPOSITION

(a) One Senator shall be elected from each Legislative District. Immediately following each decennial redistricting, the General Assembly by law shall divide the Legislative Districts as equally as possible into three groups. Senators from one group shall be elected for terms of four years, four years and two years; Senators from the second group, for terms of four years, two years and four years; and Senators from the third group, for terms of two years, four years and four years. The Legislative Districts in each group shall be distributed substantially equally over the State.

(b) Each Legislative District shall be divided into two Representative Districts. In <u>2012</u> 1982 and every two years thereafter one Representative shall be elected from each Representative District for a term of two years.

(c) To be eligible to serve as a member of the General Assembly, a person must be a United States citizen, at least 21 years old, and for the two years preceding his election or appointment a resident of the district which he is to represent. In the general election following a redistricting, a candidate for the General Assembly may be elected from any district which contains a part of the district in which he resided at the time of the redistricting and reelected if a resident of the new district he represents for 18 months prior to reelection.

(d) Within thirty days after a vacancy occurs, it shall be filled by appointment as provided by law. If the vacancy is in a Senatorial office with more than twenty-eight months remaining in the term, the appointed Senator shall serve until the next general election, at which time a Senator shall be elected to serve for the remainder of the term. If the vacancy is in a Representative office or in any other Senatorial office, the appointment shall be for the remainder of the term. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall be a member of the same political party as the person he succeeds.

(e) No member of the General Assembly shall receive compensation as a public officer or employee from any other governmental entity for time during which he is in attendance as a member of the General Assembly.

No member of the General Assembly during the term for which he was elected or appointed shall be appointed to a public office which shall have been created or the compensation for which shall have been increased by the General Assembly during that term.

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING

(a) On the second Tuesday in February in the year following each Federal decennial census year, the

President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, and the Minority Leader of the House may each, considering the diversity of the State, appoint two members to the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission. On or before the second Tuesday in March, one additional member shall be elected by a majority of the members appointed, and that member shall serve as Chair. Members of the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission shall not be eligible to be elected to the General Assembly or appointed to any office that is subject to confirmation by the Senate for ten years after completion of service on the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission. No person may serve as a member of the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission who is at the time of appointment, becomes at any time during service, or who was at any time during the preceding four years (i) a registered lobbyist in Illinois; (ii) an employee or contractor of the State of Illinois; (iii) an elected official of or a candidate for or appointed member of any elected body of: the federal government, the State, a unit of local government, a school district or a political party; or (iv) an immediate family member of any of the foregoing. As used in this Article IV, Section 3, "immediate family member" is a person with whom the person has a bona fide relationship established through close blood or legal kinship. If any member of the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission shall be unable to fulfill the duties required under this Section, then the person who appointed said member, or that person's successor, shall appoint a person to fill said vacancy within five days of the occurrence of the vacancy.

A meeting of a majority of a quorum of the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission shall be open to the public with at least twenty-four hour notice.

The Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission shall have authority to hire independent private firms for any assistance. The Commission shall conduct at least five public hearings on separate days around five distinct geographic regions of the State before voting on any redistricting plans, and at least three of the hearings shall be after receipt of the data from the United States Census Bureau. Within three days after receipt of the data from the United States Census Bureau, the Commission shall make that data, together with redistricting software, available to the public.

(b) The Commission shall approve any redistricting plans by a majority vote of its members.

<u>The Commission shall establish districts pursuant to a mapping process using the following criteria as set</u> forth in the following order of priority:

(1) Districts shall comply with all Federal laws and shall not be drawn with the intent or result of denying or abridging the equal opportunity of racial or language minorities to participate in the political process or to diminish their ability to elect representatives of their choice.

(2) Districts shall be contiguous.

(3) Districts shall be substantially equal in population.

(4) Districts shall be compact.

(5) District boundaries shall, to the extent practical, follow visible geographic features and municipal boundaries.

(6) The plan shall not be drawn to purposefully or significantly favor or discriminate against any political party or group.

<u>Party registration, voting history data and incumbency shall not be considered in the mapping process,</u> except to evaluate compliance with the criteria listed in subsections (b)(1) and (b)(6). The Commission shall establish definitions where applicable for each of the criteria listed in subsections (b)(1)-(6).

A Representative District need not be entirely within a single Legislative District.

After preliminary approval of the redistricting plans, the Commission shall release the proposed plans to the public, conduct at least three public hearings around three distinct geographic regions of the State, and submit a report to the General Assembly. At any time prior to the submission of a plan under subsection (c), any member of the General Assembly or general public may submit a plan to be considered by the Commission and for public viewing. All documents submitted to or plans considered by the Commission shall be made available to the public within a reasonable time period.

(c) After conducting the required public hearings, the Commission shall approve by a majority vote a Representative redistricting plan by third Monday in May, which the Chair of the Commission shall deliver to the House of Representatives on the third business day after approval. The House must take a record vote to accept the plan by a House Resolution. The Resolution is adopted if it receives the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected.

After conducting the required public hearings, the Commission shall approve by a majority vote a Senate redistricting plan by the third Monday in May, which the Chair of the Commission shall deliver to the Senate on the third business day after approval. The Senate must take a record vote to accept the plan by a Senate Resolution. The Resolution is adopted if it receives the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the

#### members elected.

Redistricting plans may not be amended by either chamber. An adopted redistricting resolution shall be filed with the Secretary of State by the presiding officer of the chamber that initiated the resolution. Each chamber shall have until the first Monday in June to file a resolution with the Secretary of State approving the redistricting plan.

(d) If a plan is not adopted by a chamber of the General Assembly, the Commission shall approve an alternative redistricting plan no later than third Monday in June, and the Chair of the Commission shall deliver that plan to the appropriate chamber of the General Assembly on the third business day after approval. The appropriate chamber of the General Assembly shall approve or reject that plan in the same manner established by subsection (c). Each chamber shall have until the first Monday in July to file a resolution with the Secretary of State approving the alternative redistricting plan.

(e) If a plan is not approved by a chamber of the General Assembly by the first Monday in July, the Commission shall approve by a majority one of the two previous plans submitted to the appropriate chamber of the General Assembly under subsections (c) and (d). The Chair of the Commission shall file the approved redistricting plan for the appropriate chamber with the Secretary of State not later than the third Monday in July.

(f) If at any time the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission fails to meet one of the deadlines set forth herein, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and a Supreme Court Judge chosen by the Judges of the Supreme Court who are not of the political party of the Chief Justice shall within ten days jointly appoint and certify to the Secretary of State one person to act as Special Master to generate any maps not previously approved. No person may serve as Special Master who is not eligible to serve on the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission. A person who serves as Special Master is not eligible to be elected to the General Assembly or appointed to any office that is subject to confirmation by the Senate for ten years after completion of service as a Special Master. A Special Master shall consider all redistricting plans delivered by or submitted to the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission, the Senate, or the House as applicable. The Special Master shall have authority to hire independent assistance, make available the data received from the United States Census Bureau, together with redistricting software, to the public within three days of receipt unless the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission has already done so; shall conduct at least five public hearings on separate days around five distinct geographic regions of the State after receipt of the data from the United States Census Bureau and before promulgating any preliminary redistricting plans, and shall hold at least three public hearings on separate days around three distinct geographic regions of the State after promulgating any preliminary redistricting plans and before finalizing any plan or plans. All documents submitted to or utilized by the Special Master shall be made available to the public within a reasonable amount of time. The Special Master shall file a redistricting plan complying with the criteria set forth in subsection 3(b) for the Legislative Districts and Representative Districts, as applicable, with the Secretary of State not later than September 30.

(a) Legislative Districts shall be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population. Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population.

(b) In the year following each Federal decennial census year, the General Assembly by law shall redistrict the Legislative Districts and the Representative Districts.

If no redistricting plan becomes effective by June 30 of that year, a Legislative Redistricting Commission shall be constituted not later than July 10. The Commission shall consist of eight members, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party.

The Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives shall each appoint to the Commission one Representative and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The President and Minority Leader of the Senate shall each appoint to the Commission one Senator and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly.

The members shall be certified to the Secretary of State by the appointing authorities. A vacancy on the Commission shall be filled within five days by the authority that made the original appointment. A Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be chosen by a majority of all members of the Commission.

Not later than August 10, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

If the Commission fails to file an approved redistricting plan, the Supreme Court shall submit the names of two persons, not of the same political party, to the Secretary of State not later than September 1.

Not later than September 5, the Secretary of State publicly shall draw by random selection the name of one of the two persons to serve as the ninth member of the Commission.

Not later than October 5, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan

(g) A An approved redistricting resolution or redistricting plan filed with the Secretary of State shall be presumed valid, shall have the force and effect of law and shall be published promptly by the Secretary of State.

The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning redistricting the House and Senate, which shall be initiated in the name of the People of the State by the Attorney General.

### SCHEDULE

The State Board of Elections shall proceed, as soon as all the returns are received but no later than 31 days after the election, to canvass the votes given for and against this Constitutional Amendment, as shown by the abstracts of votes cast. If this Constitutional Amendment is approved by either three-fifths of those voting on the question or a majority of those voting in the election, then the State Board of Elections shall declare the adoption of this Constitutional Amendment and it shall, upon declaration of its adoption, take effect and become a part of the Constitution of this State. This Schedule supersedes and applies notwithstanding any statute to the contrary, and no other requirements, including without limitation proclamation of the results of the vote or notice by publication, are necessary for its effectiveness. This Constitutional Amendment applies to redistricting beginning in 2011 for the election of members of the General Assembly beginning in 2012.
