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of a house may be closed to the public if two-thirds of the members elected to that house determine that the public interest so requires; and meetings of joint committees and legislative commissions may be so closed if two-thirds of the members elected to each House so determine.

- 6 SECTION 6. ORGANIZATION
- 7 (a) A majority of the members elected to each house constitutes8 a quorum.

9 (b) On the first day of the January session of the General 10 Assembly in odd-numbered years, the Secretary of State shall 11 convene the House of Representatives to elect from its 12 membership a Speaker of the House of Representatives as 13 presiding officer, and the Governor shall convene the Senate 14 to elect from its membership a President of the Senate as 15 presiding officer.

(b-5) Within 5 days after the vacancy of the offices of Speaker 16 of the House of Representatives and President of the Senate 17 under subsection (a-5) of Section 2 of Article VIII, the 18 Secretary of State shall convene the House of Representatives 19 20 to elect from its membership a Speaker of the House of 21 Representatives as presiding officer, and the Governor shall 22 convene the Senate to elect from its membership a President of the Senate as presiding officer. Only members who have not 23 24 previously served as the Speaker of the House of Representatives or the President of the Senate shall be 25 eligible for election. 26

(c) For purposes of powers of appointment conferred by this
 Constitution, the Minority Leader of either house is a member
 of the numerically strongest political party other than the

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party to which the Speaker or the President belongs, as the
 case may be.

3 (d) Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings, judge the elections, returns and gualifications of its 4 members and choose its officers. No member shall be expelled 5 6 by either house, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members 7 elected to that house. A member may be expelled only once for the same offense. Each house may punish by imprisonment any 8 9 person, not a member, guilty of disrespect to the house by disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence. 10 11 Imprisonment shall not extend beyond twenty-four hours at one 12 time unless the person persists in disorderly or contemptuous behavior. 13

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### FINANCE

16 SECTION 2. STATE FINANCE

14

(a) The Governor shall prepare and submit to the General 17 18 Assembly, at a time prescribed by law, a State budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall set forth the estimated 19 balance of funds available for appropriation at the beginning 20 of the fiscal year, the estimated receipts, and a plan for 21 22 expenditures and obligations during the fiscal year of every department, authority, public corporation and quasi-public 23 corporation of the State, every State college and university, 24 and every other public agency created by the State, but not 25 of units of local government or school districts. The budget 26 27 shall also set forth the indebtedness and contingent 28 liabilities of the State and such other information as may be 29 required by law. Proposed expenditures shall not exceed funds

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estimated to be available for the fiscal year as shown in the
 budget.

3 (a-5) If a balanced budget has not been passed by June 30th of vear, the offices of Speaker of the 4 each House of 5 Representatives and President of the Senate become vacant, as 6 provided in subsection (c) of Section 3 of this Article, and 7 shall continue to become vacant every 90 days after the vacancies are filled until the General Assembly passes a 8 9 balanced budget. Elections to fill the vacancies shall be held as provided in subsection (b-5) of Section 6 of Article 10 11 IV.

(b) The General Assembly by law shall make appropriations for
all expenditures of public funds by the State. Appropriations
for a fiscal year shall not exceed funds estimated by the
General Assembly to be available during that year.

16 SECTION 3. STATE AUDIT AND AUDITOR GENERAL

(a) The General Assembly shall provide by law for the audit of 17 18 the obligation, receipt and use of public funds of the State. The General Assembly, by a vote of three-fifths of the members 19 20 elected to each house, shall appoint an Auditor General and 21 may remove him for cause by a similar vote. The Auditor 22 General shall serve for a term of ten years. His compensation 23 shall be established by law and shall not be diminished, but may be increased, to take effect during his term. 24

(b) The Auditor General shall conduct the audit of public funds
of the State. He shall make additional reports and
investigations as directed by the General Assembly. He shall
report his findings and recommendations to the General
Assembly and to the Governor.

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(c) Within 30 days of the enactment of the law or laws 1 2 comprising the State budget for a fiscal year, the Office of 3 the Auditor General must certify whether the enacted budget will be balanced with expenses not exceeding funds estimated 4 by the General Assembly to be available during that year 5 6 pursuant to subsection (b) of Section 2 of this Article. If 7 the Office of the Auditor General certifies that the budget is not balanced, then the offices of Speaker of the House of 8 Representatives and President of the Senate shall become 9 vacant upon filing notice of such certification with the 10 Secretary of State. 11

#### SCHEDULE
