HB2461 Engrossed

1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
10-17a as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/10-17a) (from Ch. 122, par. 10-17a)

7 Sec. 10-17a. State, school district, and school report 8 cards.

9 (1) By October 31, 2013 and October 31 of each subsequent school year, the State Board of Education, through the State 10 Superintendent of Education, shall prepare a State report card, 11 school district report cards, and school report cards, and 12 13 shall by the most economic means provide to each school 14 district in this State, including special charter districts and districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, the report 15 16 cards for the school district and each of its schools.

17 (2) In addition to any information required by federal law, 18 the State Superintendent shall determine the indicators and 19 presentation of the school report card, which must include, at 20 a minimum, the most current data <u>collected and maintained</u> 21 possessed by the State Board of Education related to the 22 following:

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(A) school characteristics and student demographics,

1 including average class size, average teaching experience, student racial/ethnic breakdown, and the percentage of 2 3 students classified as low-income; the percentage of students classified as English learners; the percentage of 4 5 students who have individualized education plans or 504 6 plans that provide for special education services; the 7 number and percentage of all students who have been 8 assessed for placement in a gifted education or advanced 9 academic program and, of those students: (i) the racial and 10 ethnic breakdown, (ii) the percentage who are classified as 11 low-income, and (iii) the number and percentage of students 12 who received direct instruction from a teacher who holds a gifted education endorsement and, of those students, the 13 14 percentage who are classified as low-income; the percentage of students scoring at the "exceeds 15 16 expectations" level on the assessments required under Section 2-3.64a-5 of this Code; the percentage of students 17 who annually transferred in or out of the school district; 18 19 per-pupil operating expenditure of the school the district; and the per-pupil State average operating 20 21 expenditure for the district type (elementary, high 22 school, or unit);

(B) curriculum information, including, where
 applicable, Advanced Placement, International
 Baccalaureate or equivalent courses, dual enrollment
 courses, foreign language classes, school personnel

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resources (including Career Technical Education teachers), 1 2 before and after school programs, extracurricular 3 activities, subjects in which elective classes are offered, health and wellness initiatives (including the 4 average number of days of Physical Education per week per 5 6 student), approved programs of study, awards received, community partnerships, and special programs such as 7 8 programming for the gifted and talented, students with 9 disabilities, and work-study students;

10 (C) student outcomes, including, where applicable, the 11 percentage of students deemed proficient on assessments of 12 State standards, the percentage of students in the eighth 13 grade who pass Algebra, the percentage of students enrolled 14 post-secondary institutions (including colleges, in 15 universities, community colleges, trade/vocational 16 schools, and training programs leading to career 17 certification within 2 semesters of hiqh school graduation), the percentage of students graduating from 18 19 high school who are college and career ready, and the 20 percentage of graduates enrolled in community colleges, colleges, and universities who are in one or more courses 21 22 that the community college, college, or university 23 identifies as a developmental course;

(D) student progress, including, where applicable, the
 percentage of students in the ninth grade who have earned 5
 credits or more without failing more than one core class, a

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measure of students entering kindergarten ready to learn, a measure of growth, and the percentage of students who enter high school on track for college and career readiness;

school environment, 4 (E) the including, where 5 applicable, the percentage of students with less than 10 6 absences in a school year, the percentage of teachers with 7 less than 10 absences in a school year for reasons other 8 than professional development, leaves taken pursuant to 9 the federal Family Medical Leave Act of 1993, long-term 10 disability, or parental leaves, the 3-year average of the 11 percentage of teachers returning to the school from the 12 previous year, the number of different principals at the 13 school in the last 6 years, the number of teachers who hold 14 a gifted education endorsement, the process and criteria used by the district to determine whether a student is 15 16 eligible for participation in a gifted education program or 17 advanced academic program and the manner in which parents 18 and guardians are made aware of the process and criteria, 2 19 or more indicators from any school climate survey selected 20 or approved by the State and administered pursuant to Section 2-3.153 of this Code, with the same or similar 21 22 indicators included on school report cards for all surveys 23 selected or approved by the State pursuant to Section 24 2-3.153 of this Code, and the combined percentage of 25 teachers rated as proficient or excellent in their most 26 recent evaluation; and

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(F) a school district's and its individual schools'
 balanced accountability measure, in accordance with
 Section 2-3.25a of this Code.

The school report card shall also provide information that allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and environment data to the State average, to the school data from the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and environment of similar schools based on the type of school and enrollment of low-income students, special education students, and English learners.

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As used in this paragraph (2):

12 <u>"Advanced academic program" means a course of study to</u> 13 <u>which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability</u> 14 <u>or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers</u> 15 <u>and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated</u> 16 <u>from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge</u> 17 <u>and pace.</u>

18 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 19 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 20 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 21 of this Code.

(3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the school district report card shall include a subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the HB2461 Engrossed - 6 - LRB100 08502 MLM 18623 b

school district, and the State report card shall include a
 subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through
 (E) of subsection (2) of this Section.

4 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 5 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 6 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 7 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 8 State report card.

9 (5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt 10 of the school district and school report cards from the State 11 Superintendent of Education, each school district, including 12 special charter districts and districts subject to the 13 provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a 14 regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice 15 requirements, post the report cards on the school district's 16 Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 17 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of general circulation serving the district, and, upon request, send the 18 19 report cards home to a parent (unless the district does not 20 maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card 21 shall be sent home to parents without request). If the district 22 posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 23 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that 24 the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address 25 of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card 26 will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone HB2461 Engrossed - 7 - LRB100 08502 MLM 18623 b 1 number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the 2 report card.

3 (6) Nothing contained in this amendatory Act of the 98th 4 General Assembly repeals, supersedes, invalidates, or 5 nullifies final decisions in lawsuits pending on the effective 6 date of this amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly in 7 Illinois courts involving the interpretation of Public Act 8 97-8.
