3	everything after the enacting clause with the following:
4	"Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections
5	21B-15, 21B-20, 21B-25, 21B-35, and 21B-45 as follows:
6	(105 ILCS 5/21B-15)
7	Sec. 21B-15. Qualifications of educators.
8	(a) No one may be licensed to teach or supervise or be
9	otherwise employed in the public schools of this State who is
10	not of good character and at least $\underline{19}$ $\underline{20}$ years of age.
11	In determining good character under this Section, the State
12	Superintendent of Education shall take into consideration the
13	disciplinary actions of other states or national entities
14	against certificates or licenses issued by those states and
15	held by individuals from those states. In addition, any felony
16	conviction of the applicant may be taken into consideration;

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1 however, no one may be licensed to teach or supervise in the public schools of this State who has been convicted of (i) an 2 offense set forth in subsection (b) of Section 21B-80 of this 3 4 Code until 7 years following the end of the sentence for the 5 criminal offense or (ii) an offense set forth in subsection (c) 6 of Section 21B-80 of this Code. Unless the conviction is for an offense set forth in Section 21B-80 of this Code, an applicant 7 must be permitted to submit character references or other 8 9 written material before such a conviction or other information 10 regarding the applicant's character may be used by the State 11 Superintendent of Education as a basis for denying the application. 12

(b) No person otherwise qualified shall be denied the right to be licensed or to receive training for the purpose of becoming an educator because of a physical disability, including, but not limited to, visual and hearing disabilities; nor shall any school district refuse to employ a teacher on such grounds, provided that the person is able to carry out the duties of the position for which he or she applies.

20 (c) No person may be granted or continue to hold an 21 educator license who has knowingly altered or misrepresented 22 his or her qualifications, in this State or any other state, in 23 order to acquire or renew the license. Any other license issued 24 under this Article held by the person may be suspended or 25 revoked by the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, depending upon 26 the severity of the alteration or

1 misrepresentation.

2 (d) No one may teach or supervise in the public schools nor 3 receive for teaching or supervising any part of any public 4 school fund who does not hold an educator license granted by 5 the State Superintendent of Education as provided in this Article. However, the provisions of this Article do not apply 6 to a member of the armed forces who is employed as a teacher of 7 8 subjects in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps of any school, 9 nor to an individual teaching a dual credit course as provided 10 for in the Dual Credit Quality Act.

11 (e) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Code, the school board of a school district may grant to a teacher of the 12 13 district a leave of absence with full pay for a period of not 14 more than one year to permit the teacher to teach in a foreign 15 state under the provisions of the Exchange Teacher Program 16 established under Public Law 584, 79th Congress, and Public Law 17 402, 80th Congress, as amended. The school board granting the leave of absence may employ, with or without pay, a national of 18 the foreign state wherein the teacher on the leave of absence 19 20 is to teach if the national is qualified to teach in that 21 foreign state and if that national is to teach in a grade level 22 similar to the one that was taught in the foreign state. The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State 23 24 Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, may adopt rules as 25 may be necessary to implement this subsection (e).

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(105 ILCS 5/21B-20)
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Sec. 21B-20. Types of licenses. Before July 1, 2013, the 2 3 State Board of Education shall implement a system of educator licensure, whereby individuals employed in school districts 4 who are required to be licensed must have one of the following 5 (i) a professional educator license; 6 licenses: (ii) a 7 professional educator license with stipulations; or (iii) a 8 substitute teaching license. References in law regarding 9 individuals certified or certificated or required to be 10 certified or certificated under Article 21 of this Code shall also include individuals licensed or required to be licensed 11 12 under this Article. The first year of all licenses ends on June 13 30 following one full year of the license being issued.

The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, may adopt such rules as may be necessary to govern the requirements for licenses and endorsements under this Section.

(1) Professional Educator License. Persons who (i) 18 19 successfully completed an approved educator have 20 preparation program and are recommended for licensure by 21 the Illinois institution offering the educator preparation 22 program, (ii) have successfully completed the required 23 testing under Section 21B-30 of this Code, (iii) have 24 successfully completed coursework on the psychology of, the identification of, and the methods of instruction for 25

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exceptional child, including without limitation 1 the 2 children with learning disabilities, (iv) have 3 successfully completed coursework in methods of reading and reading in the content area, and (v) have met all other 4 5 criteria established by rule of the State Board of Education shall be issued a Professional Educator License. 6 All Professional Educator Licenses are valid until June 30 7 8 immediately following 5 years of the license being issued. 9 The Professional Educator License shall be endorsed with 10 specific areas and grade levels in which the individual is eligible to practice. 11

12 Individuals can receive subsequent endorsements on the 13 Professional Educator License. Subsequent endorsements 14 shall require a minimum of 24 semester hours of coursework 15 in the endorsement area, unless otherwise specified by 16 rule, and passage of the applicable content area test.

17 (2) Educator License with Stipulations. An Educator
18 License with Stipulations shall be issued an endorsement
19 that limits the license holder to one particular position
20 or does not require completion of an approved educator
21 program or both.

22 An individual with an Educator License with 23 Stipulations must not be employed by a school district or 24 any other entity to replace any presently employed teacher 25 who otherwise would not be replaced for any reason.

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An Educator License with Stipulations may be issued

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with the following endorsements:

(A) Provisional educator. A provisional educator 2 3 endorsement in a specific content area or areas on an Educator License with Stipulations may be issued to an 4 applicant who holds an educator license from another 5 state, U.S. territory, or foreign country and who, at 6 7 the time of applying for an Illinois license, does not 8 meet the minimum requirements under Section 21B-35 of 9 this Code, but does, at a minimum, meet the following 10 requirements:

11 (i) Holds the equivalent of a minimum of a bachelor's degree, unless a master's degree is 12 13 required for the endorsement, from a regionally 14 accredited college or university or, for 15 individuals educated in a country other than the 16 United States, the equivalent of a minimum of a bachelor's degree issued in the United States, 17 18 unless a master's degree is required for the 19 endorsement.

20 (ii) Has passed or passes a test of basic 21 skills and content area test prior to or within one year after issuance of the provisional educator 22 23 the Educator License endorsement on with 24 Stipulations. If an individual who holds an 25 Educator License with Stipulations endorsed for 26 provisional educator has not passed a test of basic

skills and applicable content area test or tests 1 within one year after issuance of the endorsement, 2 3 the endorsement shall expire on June 30 following one full year of the endorsement being issued. If 4 5 such an individual has passed the test of basic skills and applicable content area test or tests 6 either prior to issuance of the endorsement or 7 8 within one year after issuance of the endorsement, 9 the endorsement is valid until June 30 immediately 10 following 2 years of the license being issued, 11 during which time all any and coursework 12 deficiencies must be met and any and all additional 13 testing deficiencies must be met.

14 In addition, a provisional educator endorsement 15 for principals or superintendents may be issued if the 16 individual meets the requirements set forth in 17 subdivisions (1) and (3) of subsection (b-5) of Section 18 21B-35 of this Code. Applicants who have not been 19 entitled by an Illinois-approved educator preparation 20 program at an Illinois institution of higher education 21 shall not receive a provisional educator endorsement 22 if the person completed an alternative licensure 23 program in another state, unless the program has been 24 determined to be equivalent to Illinois program 25 requirements.

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Notwithstanding any other requirements of this

Section, a service member or spouse of a service member 1 may obtain a Professional Educator License with 2 3 Stipulations, and a provisional educator endorsement in a specific content area or areas, if he or she holds 4 5 a valid teaching certificate or license in good standing from another state, meets the qualifications 6 of educators outlined in Section 21B-15 of this Code, 7 8 and has not engaged in any misconduct that would 9 prohibit an individual from obtaining a license 10 pursuant to Illinois law, including without limitation 11 any administrative rules of the State Board of Education. 12

13 In this Section, "service member" means any person 14 who, at the time of application under this Section, is 15 an active duty member of the United States Armed Forces 16 or any reserve component of the United States Armed 17 Forces or the National Guard of any state, commonwealth, or territory of the United States or the 18 District of Columbia. 19

A provisional educator endorsement is valid until June 30 immediately following 2 years of the license being issued, provided that any remaining testing and coursework deficiencies are met as set forth in this Section. Failure to satisfy all stated deficiencies shall mean the individual, including any service member or spouse who has obtained a Professional

Educator License with Stipulations and a provisional 1 educator endorsement in a specific content area or 2 3 areas, is ineligible to receive a Professional Educator License at that time. An Educator License with 4 Stipulations endorsed for provisional educator shall 5 not be renewed for individuals who hold an Educator 6 7 License with Stipulations and who have held a position 8 in a public school or non-public school recognized by 9 the State Board of Education.

10 (B) Alternative provisional educator. An 11 alternative provisional educator endorsement on an 12 Educator License with Stipulations may be issued to an 13 applicant who, at the time of applying for the 14 endorsement, has done all of the following:

(i) Graduated from a regionally accredited
college or university with a minimum of a
bachelor's degree.

18 (ii) Successfully completed the first phase of
19 the Alternative Educator Licensure Program for
20 Teachers, as described in Section 21B-50 of this
21 Code.

(iii) Passed a test of basic skills and content
area test, as required under Section 21B-30 of this
Code.

The alternative provisional educator endorsement is valid for 2 years of teaching and may be renewed for 1

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a third year by an individual meeting the requirements set forth in Section 21B-50 of this Code.

3 (C) Alternative provisional superintendent. An alternative provisional superintendent endorsement on 4 5 an Educator License with Stipulations entitles the holder to serve only as a superintendent or assistant 6 superintendent in a school district's central office. 7 8 This endorsement may only be issued to an applicant 9 who, at the time of applying for the endorsement, has 10 done all of the following:

(i) Graduated from a regionally accredited
college or university with a minimum of a master's
degree in a management field other than education.

14 (ii) Been employed for a period of at least 5
15 years in a management level position in a field
16 other than education.

17 (iii) Successfully completed the first phase
18 of an alternative route to superintendent
19 endorsement program, as provided in Section 21B-55
20 of this Code.

(iv) Passed a test of basic skills and content
 area tests required under Section 21B-30 of this
 Code.

The endorsement may be registered for 2 fiscal years in order to complete one full year of serving as a superintendent or assistant superintendent.

Resident teacher endorsement. A resident 1 (D) 2 teacher endorsement on an Educator License with 3 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who, at the time of applying for the endorsement, has done all of 4 the following: 5 (i) Graduated from a regionally accredited 6 institution of higher education with a minimum of a 7 8 bachelor's degree. 9 (ii) Enrolled in an approved Illinois educator 10 preparation program. (iii) Passed a test of basic skills and content 11 area test, as required under Section 21B-30 of this 12 13 Code. The resident teacher endorsement on an Educator 14 15 License with Stipulations is valid for 4 years of 16 teaching and shall not be renewed. 17 A resident teacher may teach only under the direction of a licensed teacher, who shall act as the 18 19 resident mentor teacher, and may not teach in place of 20 a licensed teacher. A resident teacher endorsement on 21 an Educator License with Stipulations shall no longer 22 be valid after June 30, 2017.

(E) Career and technical educator. A career and
 technical educator endorsement on an Educator License
 with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who has
 a minimum of 60 semester hours of coursework from a

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regionally accredited institution of higher education and has a minimum of 2,000 hours of experience outside of education in each area to be taught.

The career and technical educator endorsement on 4 an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until 5 30 immediately following 5 years of 6 June the endorsement being issued and may be renewed. For 7 individuals who were issued the career and technical 8 9 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 10 Stipulations on or after January 1, 2015, the license 11 may be renewed if the individual passes a test of basic skills or test of work proficiency, as required under 12 13 Section 21B-30 of this Code.

14An individual who holds a valid career and15technical educator endorsement on an Educator License16with Stipulations but does not hold a bachelor's degree17may substitute teach in career and technical education18classrooms.

(F) Part-time provisional career and technical 19 20 educator or provisional career and technical educator. 21 A part-time provisional career and technical educator 22 endorsement or a provisional career and technical 23 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 24 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who has a 25 minimum of 8,000 hours of work experience in the skill 26 for which the applicant is seeking the endorsement. It

is the responsibility of each employing school board 1 and regional office of 2 education to provide 3 verification, in writing, to the State Superintendent of Education at the time the application is submitted 4 that no qualified teacher holding a Professional 5 Educator License 6 Educator License or an with 7 Stipulations with a career and technical educator 8 endorsement is available and that actual circumstances 9 require such issuance.

10 The provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations 11 is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of 12 13 the endorsement being issued and may be renewed only 14 one time for 5 years. For individuals who were issued 15 and technical the provisional career educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations 16 on or after January 1, 2015, the license may be renewed 17 one time if the individual passes a test of basic 18 19 skills or test of work proficiency, as required under 20 Section 21B-30 of this Code, and has completed a 21 minimum of 20 semester hours from a regionally accredited institution. 22

A part-time provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations may be issued for teaching no more than 2 courses of study for grades 6 through 12. The part-time 1

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provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of the endorsement being issued and may be renewed for 5 years if the individual makes application for renewal.

An individual who holds a provisional or part-time provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations but does not hold a bachelor's degree may substitute teach in career and technical education classrooms.

11 Transitional bilingual (G) educator. А transitional bilingual educator endorsement on an 12 13 Educator License with Stipulations may be issued for 14 the purpose of providing instruction in accordance 15 with Article 14C of this Code to an applicant who 16 provides satisfactory evidence that he or she meets all 17 of the following requirements:

(i) Possesses adequate speaking, reading, and
writing ability in the language other than English
in which transitional bilingual education is
offered.

(ii) Has the ability to successfullycommunicate in English.

24 (iii) Either possessed, within 5 years
25 previous to his or her applying for a transitional
26 bilingual educator endorsement, a valid and

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comparable teaching certificate or comparable 1 authorization issued by a foreign country or holds 2 3 a degree from an institution of higher learning in foreign country that the State Educator 4 а 5 Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a 6 regionally accredited institution of 7 higher 8 learning in the United States.

9 A transitional bilingual educator endorsement 10 shall be valid for prekindergarten through grade 12, is 11 valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of 12 the endorsement being issued, and shall not be renewed.

Persons holding a transitional bilingual educator endorsement shall not be employed to replace any presently employed teacher who otherwise would not be replaced for any reason.

17 (H) Language endorsement. In an effort to 18 alleviate the shortage of teachers speaking a language 19 other than English in the public schools, an individual 20 who holds an Educator License with Stipulations may 21 also apply for a language endorsement, provided that 22 the applicant provides satisfactory evidence that he 23 or she meets all of the following requirements:

24 (i) Holds a transitional bilingual25 endorsement.

(ii) Has demonstrated proficiency in the

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language for which the endorsement is to be issued by passing the applicable language content test required by the State Board of Education.

4 (iii) Holds a bachelor's degree or higher from 5 a regionally accredited institution of higher education or, for individuals educated in 6 a country other than the United States, holds a 7 degree from an institution of higher learning in a 8 9 foreign country that the State Educator 10 Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be 11 the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution of 12 higher 13 learning in the United States.

(iv) Has passed a test of basic skills, as required under Section 21B-30 of this Code.

16 A language endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for prekindergarten through 17 18 grade 12 for the same validity period as the 19 individual's transitional bilingual educator endorsement on the Educator License with Stipulations 20 and shall not be renewed. 21

(I) Visiting international educator. A visiting
international educator endorsement on an Educator
License with Stipulations may be issued to an
individual who is being recruited by a particular
school district that conducts formal recruitment

programs outside of the United States to secure the 1 services of qualified teachers and who meets all of the 2 3 following requirements: 4 (i) Holds the equivalent of a minimum of a 5 bachelor's degree issued in the United States. (ii) Has been prepared as a teacher at the 6 grade level for which he or she will be employed. 7 8 (iii) Has adequate content knowledge in the 9 subject to be taught. 10 (iv) Has an adequate command of the English 11 language. A holder of a visiting international educator 12 13 endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations 14 shall be permitted to teach in bilingual education 15 programs in the language that was the medium of 16 instruction in his or her teacher preparation program, 17 provided that he or she passes the English Language Proficiency Examination or another test of writing 18 skills in English identified by the State Board of 19 20 Education, in consultation with the State Educator 21 Preparation and Licensure Board.

A visiting international educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for 3 years and shall not be renewed.

(J) Paraprofessional educator. A paraprofessional
 educator endorsement on an Educator License with

Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who holds a 1 high school diploma or its recognized equivalent and 2 3 either holds an associate's degree or a minimum of 60 4 semester hours of credit from a regionally accredited 5 institution of higher education or has passed a test of basic skills required under Section 21B-30 of this 6 7 Code. The paraprofessional educator endorsement is 8 valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of 9 the endorsement being issued and may be renewed through 10 application and payment of the appropriate fee, as 11 required under Section 21B-40 of this Code. An individual who holds only a paraprofessional educator 12 13 endorsement is not subject to additional requirements in order to renew the endorsement. 14

(K) Chief school business official. A chief school 15 16 business official endorsement on an Educator License 17 with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who 18 qualifies by having a master's degree or higher, 2 19 years of full-time administrative experience in school 20 business management or 2 years of university-approved 21 practical experience, and a minimum of 24 semester 22 hours of graduate credit in a program approved by the 23 State Board of Education for the preparation of school 24 business administrators and by passage of the 25 applicable State tests, including a test of basic 26 skills and applicable content area test.

1 The chief school business official endorsement may also be affixed to the 2 Educator License with 3 Stipulations of any holder who qualifies by having a 4 master's degree in business administration, finance, 5 or accounting and who completes an additional 6 semester hours of internship in school business 6 management from a regionally accredited institution of 7 8 higher education and passes the applicable State 9 tests, including a test of basic skills and applicable 10 content area test. This endorsement shall be required 11 for any individual employed as a chief school business official. 12

The chief school business official endorsement on 13 14 an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until 15 30 immediately following 5 years of June the 16 endorsement being issued and may be renewed if the license holder completes renewal requirements as 17 required for individuals who hold a Professional 18 Educator License endorsed for chief school business 19 20 official under Section 21B-45 of this Code and such 21 rules as may be adopted by the State Board of Education. 22

(L) Provisional in-state educator. A provisional
 in-state educator endorsement on an Educator License
 with Stipulations may be issued to a candidate who has
 completed an Illinois-approved educator preparation

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program at an Illinois institution of higher education and who has not successfully completed an evidence-based assessment of teacher effectiveness but who meets all of the following requirements: (i) Holds at least a bachelor's degree.

6 (ii) Has completed an approved educator 7 preparation program at an Illinois institution.

8 (iii) Has passed a test of basic skills and 9 applicable content area test, as required by 10 Section 21B-30 of this Code.

(iv) Has attempted an evidence-based assessment of teacher effectiveness and received a minimum score on that assessment, as established by the State Board of Education in consultation with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board.

A provisional in-state educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for one full fiscal year after the date of issuance and may not be renewed.

(3) Substitute Teaching License. A Substitute Teaching
License may be issued to qualified applicants for
substitute teaching in all grades of the public schools,
prekindergarten through grade 12. Substitute Teaching
Licenses are not eligible for endorsements. Applicants for
a Substitute Teaching License must hold a bachelor's degree

or higher from a regionally accredited institution of
 higher education.

Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for 5 years.

4 Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for substitute 5 teaching in every county of this State. If an individual 6 has had his or her Professional Educator License or 7 Educator License with Stipulations suspended or revoked or 8 has not met the renewal requirements for licensure, then 9 that individual is not eligible to obtain a Substitute 10 Teaching License.

A substitute teacher may only teach in the place of a 11 licensed teacher who is under contract with the employing 12 13 board. If, however, there is no licensed teacher under 14 contract because of an emergency situation, then a district 15 may employ a substitute teacher for no longer than 30 calendar days per each vacant position in the district if 16 17 the district notifies the appropriate regional office of 18 education within 5 business days after the employment of 19 the substitute teacher in the emergency situation. An 20 emergency situation is one in which an unforeseen vacancy has occurred and (i) a teacher is unable to fulfill his or 21 22 her contractual duties or (ii) teacher capacity needs of 23 the district exceed previous indications, and the district 24 is actively engaged in advertising to hire a fully licensed 25 teacher for the vacant position.

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There is no limit on the number of days that a

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substitute teacher may teach in a single school district, 1 provided that no substitute teacher may teach for longer 2 3 than 90 school days for any one licensed teacher under 4 contract in the same school year. A substitute teacher who 5 holds a Professional Educator License or Educator License with Stipulations shall not teach for more than 120 school 6 7 days for any one licensed teacher under contract in the 8 same school year. The limitations in this paragraph (3) on 9 the number of days a substitute teacher may be employed do 10 not apply to any school district operating under Article 34 11 of this Code.

Sec. 21B-25. Endorsement on licenses. All licenses issued 16 17 under paragraph (1) of Section 21B-20 of this Code shall be 18 specifically endorsed by the State Board of Education for each 19 content area, school support area, and administrative area for which the holder of the license is qualified. Recognized 20 21 institutions approved to offer educator preparation programs 22 shall be trained to add endorsements to licenses issued to applicants who meet all of the requirements for the endorsement 23 24 or endorsements, including passing any required tests. The 25 State Superintendent of Education shall randomly audit

institutions to ensure that all rules and standards are being followed for entitlement or when endorsements are being recommended.

4 (1) The State Board of Education, in consultation with
5 the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, shall
6 establish, by rule, the grade level and subject area
7 endorsements to be added to the Professional Educator
8 License. These rules shall outline the requirements for
9 obtaining each endorsement.

10 (2) In addition to any and all grade level and content 11 area endorsements developed by rule, the State Board of 12 Education, in consultation with the State Educator 13 Preparation and Licensure Board, shall develop the 14 requirements for the following endorsements:

15 (A) General administrative endorsement. A general 16 administrative endorsement shall be added to а 17 Professional Educator License, provided that an 18 approved program has been completed. An individual 19 holding a general administrative endorsement may work 20 only as a principal or assistant principal or in a 21 related or similar position, as determined by the State 22 Superintendent of Education, in consultation with the 23 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board.

24 Beginning on September 1, 2014, the general 25 administrative endorsement shall no longer be issued 26 except to individuals who completed all coursework -24- LRB100 09485 NHT 23572 a

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for the receipt of 1 requirements the general administrative endorsement by September 1, 2014, who 2 3 have completed all testing requirements by June 30, 4 2016, and who apply for the endorsement on or before 5 June 30, 2016. Individuals who hold a valid and registered administrative certificate with a general 6 administrative endorsement issued under Section 21-7.1 7 of this Code or a Professional Educator License with a 8 9 general administrative endorsement issued prior to 10 September 1, 2014 and who have served for at least one 11 full year during the 5 years prior in a position requiring a general administrative endorsement shall, 12 upon request to the State Board of Education and 13 14 through July 1, 2015, have their respective general 15 administrative endorsement converted to a principal 16 endorsement on the Professional Educator License. 17 Candidates shall not be admitted to an approved general 18 administrative preparation program after September 1, 19 2012.

All other individuals holding a valid and registered administrative certificate with a general administrative endorsement issued pursuant to Section 21-7.1 of this Code or a general administrative endorsement on a Professional Educator License issued prior to September 1, 2014 shall have the general administrative endorsement converted to a principal

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endorsement on a Professional Educator License upon request to the State Board of Education and by completing one of the following pathways:

4 (i) Passage of the State principal assessment
 5 developed by the State Board of Education.

6 (ii) Through July 1, 2019, completion of an 7 Illinois Educators' Academy course designated by 8 the State Superintendent of Education.

9 (iii) Completion of a principal preparation 10 program established and approved pursuant to 11 Section 21B-60 of this Code and applicable rules. Individuals who do not choose to convert the 12 13 administrative endorsement general on the 14 administrative certificate issued pursuant to Section 15 21-7.1 of this Code or on the Professional Educator 16 License shall continue to be able to serve in any position previously allowed under paragraph (2) of 17 subsection (e) of Section 21-7.1 of this Code. 18

19 The general administrative endorsement on the 20 Professional Educator License is available only to 21 individuals who, prior to September 1, 2014, had such endorsement on the administrative certificate 22 an 23 issued pursuant to Section 21-7.1 of this Code or who 24 already have a Professional Educator License and have 25 completed a general administrative program and who do 26 not choose to convert the general administrative endorsement to a principal endorsement pursuant to the

7 (i) Successful completion of a principal 8 preparation program approved in accordance with 9 Section 21B-60 of this Code and any applicable 10 rules.

11 (ii) At least 4 total years of teaching or, until June 30, 2021, 4 total years of working in 12 13 the capacity of school support personnel in an 14 Illinois public school or nonpublic school 15 recognized by the State Board of Education or in an 16 out-of-state public school or out-of-state 17 nonpublic school meeting out-of-state recognition 18 standards comparable to those approved by the State Superintendent of Education; however, the 19 20 State Board of Education, in consultation with the 21 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, 22 shall allow, by rules, for fewer than 4 years of experience based on meeting standards set forth in 23 24 such rules, including without limitation a review 25 of performance evaluations or other evidence of 26 demonstrated qualifications.

1 (iii) A master's degree or higher from a regionally accredited college or university. 2 (C) Chief school business official endorsement. A 3 4 chief school business official endorsement shall be 5 affixed to the Professional Educator License of any holder who qualifies by having a master's degree or 6 higher, 2 years of full-time administrative experience 7 8 in school business management or 2 years of 9 university-approved practical experience, and а 10 minimum of 24 semester hours of graduate credit in a 11 program approved by the State Board of Education for the preparation of school business administrators and 12 13 by passage of the applicable State tests. The chief 14 school business official endorsement may also be 15 affixed to the Professional Educator License of any 16 holder who qualifies by having a master's degree in business administration, finance, or accounting and 17 who completes an additional 6 semester hours of 18 19 internship in school business management from a 20 regionally accredited institution of higher education the 21 and passes applicable State tests. This 22 endorsement shall be required for any individual 23 employed as a chief school business official.

(D) Superintendent endorsement. A superintendent
 endorsement shall be affixed to the Professional
 Educator License of any holder who has completed a

program approved by the State Board of Education for 1 the preparation of superintendents of schools, has had 2 3 at least 2 years of experience employed full-time in a 4 general administrative position or as a full-time 5 principal, director of special education, or chief school business official in the public schools or in a 6 State-recognized nonpublic school in which the chief 7 8 administrator is required to have the licensure 9 necessary to be a principal in a public school in this 10 State and where a majority of the teachers are required 11 to have the licensure necessary to be instructors in a public school in this State, and has passed the 12 13 required State tests; or of any holder who has 14 completed a program that is not an Illinois-approved 15 preparation program Illinois educator at an 16 institution of higher education and that has 17 recognition standards comparable to those approved by the State Superintendent of Education and holds the 18 general administrative, principal, or chief school 19 20 business official endorsement and who has had 2 years 21 of experience as a principal, director of special 22 education, or chief school business official while 23 holding a valid educator license or certificate 24 comparable in validity and educational and experience 25 requirements and has passed the appropriate State 26 tests, as provided in Section 21B-30 of this Code. The

superintendent endorsement shall allow individuals to
 serve only as a superintendent or assistant
 superintendent.

4 (E) Teacher leader endorsement. It shall be the 5 policy of this State to improve the quality of instructional leaders by providing a career pathway 6 for teachers interested in serving in leadership 7 8 roles, but not as principals. The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator 9 10 Preparation and Licensure Board, may issue a teacher leader endorsement under this subdivision (E). Persons 11 who meet and successfully complete the requirements of 12 13 the endorsement shall be issued a teacher leader 14 endorsement on the Professional Educator License for 15 serving in schools in this State. Teacher leaders may 16 qualify to serve in such positions as department chairs, coaches, mentors, curriculum and instruction 17 leaders, or other leadership positions as defined by 18 the district. The endorsement shall be available to 19 20 those teachers who (i) hold a Professional Educator 21 License, (ii) hold a master's degree or higher from a 22 regionally accredited institution, (iii) have 23 completed a program of study that has been approved by 24 the State Board of Education, in consultation with the 25 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, and 26 (iv) have successfully demonstrated competencies as 1 defined by rule.

A teacher who meets the requirements set forth in 2 3 this Section and holds a teacher leader endorsement may 4 evaluate teachers pursuant to Section 24A-5 of this 5 Code, provided that the individual has completed the evaluation component required by Section 24A-3 of this 6 Code and a teacher leader is allowed to evaluate 7 8 personnel under the respective school district's 9 collective bargaining agreement.

10 The State Board of Education, in consultation with 11 the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, 12 may adopt such rules as may be necessary to establish 13 and implement the teacher leader endorsement program 14 and to specify the positions for which this endorsement 15 shall be required.

16 (F) Special education endorsement. A special 17 education endorsement in one or more areas shall be 18 affixed to a Professional Educator License for any 19 individual that meets those requirements established 20 by the State Board of Education in rules. Special 21 education endorsement areas shall include without 22 limitation the following:

(i) Learning Behavior Specialist I;
(ii) Learning Behavior Specialist II;
(iii) Speech Language Pathologist;
(iv) Blind or Visually Impaired;

(v) Deaf-Hard of Hearing; and 1 (vi) Early Childhood Special Education; and. 2 3 (vii) Director of Special Education. Notwithstanding anything in this Code to the contrary, 4 the State Board of Education, in consultation with the 5 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, may 6 7 add additional areas of special education by rule. 8 (G) School support personnel endorsement. School 9 support personnel endorsement areas shall include, but 10 are not limited to, school counselor, marriage and family therapist, school psychologist, school speech 11 and language pathologist, school nurse, and school 12 13 social worker. This endorsement is for individuals who 14 are not teachers or administrators, but still require 15 licensure to work in an instructional support position in a public or State-operated elementary school, 16 17 secondary school, or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control or a charter 18 19 school operating in compliance with the Charter 20 Schools Law. The school support personnel endorsement shall be affixed to the Professional Educator License 21 22 and shall meet all of the requirements established in 23 any rules adopted to implement this subdivision (G). 24 The holder of such an endorsement is entitled to all of 25 the rights and privileges granted holders of any other 26 Professional Educator License, including teacher

benefits, compensation, and working conditions. 1 Beginning on January 1, 2014 and ending on April 2 30, 2014, a person holding a Professional Educator 3 4 License with a school speech and language pathologist 5 (teaching) endorsement may exchange his or her school speech and language pathologist (teaching) endorsement 6 7 for а school speech and language pathologist 8 (non-teaching) endorsement through application to the 9 State Board of Education. (a) Individuals holding a Professional Educator License
are required to complete the licensure renewal requirements as
specified in this Section, unless otherwise provided in this
Code.

Individuals holding a Professional Educator License shall meet the renewal requirements set forth in this Section, unless otherwise provided in this Code. If an individual holds a license endorsed in more than one area that has different renewal requirements, that individual shall follow the renewal requirements for the position for which he or she spends the majority of his or her time working.

25 (b) All Professional Educator Licenses not renewed as

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1 provided in this Section shall lapse on September 1 of that year. Lapsed licenses may be immediately reinstated upon (i) 2 payment by the applicant of a \$500 penalty to the State Board 3 4 of Education or (ii) the demonstration of proficiency by 5 completing 9 semester hours of coursework from a regionally 6 accredited institution of higher education in the content area that most aligns with one or more of the educator's endorsement 7 areas. Any and all back fees, including without limitation 8 9 registration fees owed from the time of expiration of the 10 license until the date of reinstatement, shall be paid and kept 11 in accordance with the provisions in Article 3 of this Code concerning an institute fund and the provisions in Article 21B 12 13 of this Code concerning fees and requirements for registration. Licenses not registered in accordance with Section 21B-40 of 14 15 this Code shall lapse after a period of 6 months from the 16 expiration of the last year of registration or on January 1 of the fiscal year following initial issuance of the license. An 17 unregistered license is invalid after 18 September 1 for employment and performance of services in an Illinois public or 19 20 State-operated school or cooperative and in a charter school. 21 Any license or endorsement may be voluntarily surrendered by 22 the license holder. A voluntarily surrendered license, except a 23 substitute teaching license issued under Section 21B-20 of this 24 Code, shall be treated as a revoked license. An Educator License with Stipulations with only a paraprofessional 25 26 endorsement does not lapse.

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1 (c) From July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, in order to satisfy the requirements for licensure renewal provided for in 2 this Section, each professional educator licensee with an 3 4 administrative endorsement who is working in a position 5 requiring such endorsement shall complete one Illinois 6 Administrators' Academy course, as described in Article 2 of 7 this Code, per fiscal year.

(d) Beginning July 1, 2014, in order to satisfy the 8 9 requirements for licensure renewal provided for in this 10 Section, each professional educator licensee may create a 11 professional development plan each year. The plan shall address one or more of the endorsements that are required of his or her 12 13 educator position if the licensee is employed and performing 14 services in an Illinois public or State-operated school or 15 cooperative. If the licensee is employed in a charter school, 16 the plan shall address that endorsement or those endorsements most closely related to his or her educator position. Licensees 17 18 employed and performing services in any other Illinois schools 19 may participate in the renewal requirements by adhering to the 20 same process.

Except as otherwise provided in this Section, the licensee's professional development activities shall align with one or more of the following criteria:

(1) activities are of a type that engage participants
over a sustained period of time allowing for analysis,
discovery, and application as they relate to student

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learning, social or emotional achievement, or well-being;

(2) professional development aligns to the licensee's 3 performance;

4 (3) outcomes for the activities must relate to student 5 growth or district improvement;

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(4) activities align to State-approved standards; and (5) higher education coursework.

8 (e) For each renewal cycle, each professional educator 9 licensee shall engage in professional development activities. 10 Prior to renewal, the licensee shall enter electronically into 11 the Educator Licensure Information System (ELIS) the name, date, and location of the activity, the number of professional 12 development hours, and the provider's name. The following 13 provisions shall apply concerning professional development 14 15 activities:

16 (1) Each licensee shall complete a total of 120 hours of professional development per 5-year renewal cycle in 17 order to renew the license, except as otherwise provided in 18 this Section. 19

20 (2) Beginning with his or her first full 5-year cycle, any licensee with an administrative endorsement who is not 21 22 working in a position requiring such endorsement is not 23 required to shall complete one Illinois Administrators' 24 Academy courses course, as described in Article 2 of this 25 Code, in each 5 year renewal cycle in which the 26 administrative endorsement was held for at least one year. 1The Illinois Administrators' Academy course may count2toward the total of 120 hours per 5-year cycle. Such3licensees must complete one Illinois Administrators'4Academy course within one year after returning to a5position that requires the administrative endorsement.

(3) Any licensee with an administrative endorsement 6 7 who is working in a position requiring such endorsement or 8 an individual with a Teacher Leader endorsement serving in 9 an administrative capacity at least 50% of the day shall 10 complete one Illinois Administrators' Academy course, as described in Article 2 of this Code, each fiscal year in 11 addition to 100 hours of professional development per 12 13 5-year renewal cycle in accordance with this Code.

14 (4) Any licensee holding a current National Board for
15 Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) master teacher
16 designation shall complete a total of 60 hours of
17 professional development per 5-year renewal cycle in order
18 to renew the license.

19 (5) Licensees working in a position that does not 20 require educator licensure or working in a position for 21 less than 50% for any particular year are considered to be 22 exempt and shall be required to pay only the registration 23 fee in order to renew and maintain the validity of the 24 license.

(6) Licensees who are retired and qualify for benefits
 from a State retirement system shall notify the State Board

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of Education using ELIS, and the license 1 shall be maintained in retired status. For any renewal cycle in 2 3 which a licensee retires during the renewal cycle, the licensee must complete professional development activities 4 5 on a prorated basis depending on the number of years during the renewal cycle the educator held an active license. If a 6 7 licensee retires during a renewal cycle, the licensee must 8 notify the State Board of Education using ELIS that the licensee wishes to maintain the license in retired status 9 10 must show proof of completion of professional and development activities on a prorated basis for all years of 11 that renewal cycle for which the license was active. An 12 13 individual with a license in retired status shall not be 14 required to complete professional development activities 15 or pay registration fees until returning to a position that 16 requires educator licensure. Upon returning to work in a 17 position that requires the Professional Educator License, 18 the licensee shall immediately pay a registration fee and 19 complete renewal requirements for that year. A license in 20 retired status cannot lapse. Beginning on January 6, 2017 (the effective date of Public Act 99-920) this amendatory 21 22 Act of the 99th General Assembly through December 31, 2017, 23 any licensee who has retired and whose license has lapsed 24 for failure to renew as provided in this Section may 25 reinstate that license and maintain it in retired status 26 upon providing proof to the State Board of Education using

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ELIS that the licensee is retired and is not working in a position that requires a Professional Educator License.

3 (7)For any renewal cycle in which professional development hours were required, but not fulfilled, the 4 5 licensee shall complete any missed hours to total the minimum professional development hours required in this 6 Section prior to September 1 of that year. For any fiscal 7 8 year or renewal cycle in which an Illinois Administrators' 9 Academy course was required but not completed, the licensee 10 shall complete any missed Illinois Administrators' Academy 11 courses prior to September 1 of that year. The licensee may complete all deficient hours and Illinois Administrators' 12 13 Academy courses while continuing to work in a position that 14 requires that license until September 1 of that year.

15 (8) Any licensee who has not fulfilled the professional 16 development renewal requirements set forth in this Section 17 at the end of any 5-year renewal cycle is ineligible to 18 register his or her license and may submit an appeal to the 19 State Superintendent of Education for reinstatement of the 20 license.

21 (9) If professional development opportunities were 22 unavailable to a licensee, proof that opportunities were 23 unavailable and request for an extension of time beyond 24 August 31 to complete the renewal requirements may be 25 submitted from April 1 through June 30 of that year to the 26 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board. extension is approved, the license shall remain valid
 during the extension period.

3 (10) Individuals who hold exempt licenses prior to
4 December 27, 2013 (the effective date of Public Act 98-610)

(8) Museums as defined in Section 10 of the Museum 2 3 Disposition of Property Act. 4 (h) Approved providers under subsection (q) of this Section 5 shall make available professional development opportunities that satisfy at least one of the following: 6 (1) increase the knowledge and skills of school and 7 8 district leaders who guide continuous professional 9 development; 10 (2) improve the learning of students; 11 (3) organize adults into learning communities whose goals are aligned with those of the school and district; 12 13 (4) deepen educator's content knowledge; 14 (5) provide educators with research-based 15 instructional strategies to assist students in meeting 16 rigorous academic standards; (6) prepare educators to appropriately use various 17 18 types of classroom assessments; 19 (7) use learning strategies appropriate to the 20 intended goals; 21 (8) provide educators with the knowledge and skills to 22 collaborate; or 23 (9) prepare educators to apply research to 24 decision-making. 25 (i) Approved providers under subsection (g) of this Section 26 shall do the following:

(1) align professional development activities to the
 State-approved national standards for professional
 learning;

4 (2) meet the professional development criteria for
5 Illinois licensure renewal;

6 (3) produce a rationale for the activity that explains 7 how it aligns to State standards and identify the 8 assessment for determining the expected impact on student 9 learning or school improvement;

10 (4) maintain original documentation for completion of 11 activities; and

12 (5) provide license holders with evidence of13 completion of activities.

(j) The State Board of Education shall conduct annual 14 15 audits of a subset of approved providers, except for school 16 districts, which shall be audited by regional offices of education and intermediate service centers. Each approved 17 provider, except for school districts, that is audited by a 18 19 regional office of education or intermediate service center 20 must be audited at least once every 5 years. The State Board of 21 Education shall complete random audits of licensees.

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(1) Approved providers shall annually submit to the State Board of Education a list of subcontractors used for delivery of professional development activities for which renewal credit was issued and other information as defined by rule. 10000HB3820ham001 -50- LRB100 09485 NHT 23572 a

1 (2) Approved providers shall annually submit data to 2 the State Board of Education demonstrating how the 3 professional development activities impacted one or more 4 of the following:

5 (A) educator and student growth in regards to
6 content knowledge or skills, or both;

7 (B) educator and student social and emotional8 growth; or

9 (C) alignment to district or school improvement 10 plans.

(3) The State Superintendent of Education shall review the annual data collected by the State Board of Education, regional offices of education, and intermediate service centers in audits to determine if the approved provider has met the criteria and should continue to be an approved provider or if further action should be taken as provided in rules.

18 (k) Registration fees shall be paid for the next renewal 19 cycle between April 1 and June 30 in the last year of each 20 5-year renewal cycle using ELIS. If all required professional 21 development hours for the renewal cycle have been completed and 22 entered by the licensee, the licensee shall pay the 23 registration fees for the next cycle using a form of credit or 24 debit card.

(1) <u>Any Beginning July 1, 2014, any professional educator</u>
 licensee endorsed for school support personnel who is employed

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1 and performing services in Illinois public schools and who holds an active and current professional license issued by the 2 3 Department of Financial and Professional Regulation or a 4 national certification board, as approved by the State Board of 5 Education, related to the endorsement areas on the Professional 6 Educator License shall be deemed to have satisfied the continuing professional development requirements provided for 7 8 in this Section. Such individuals shall be required to pay only 9 registration fees to renew the Professional Educator License. 10 An individual who does not hold a license issued by the 11 Department of Financial and Professional Regulation shall complete professional development requirements for the renewal 12 13 of a Professional Educator License provided for in this 14 Section.

(m) Appeals to the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board must be made within 30 days after receipt of notice from the State Superintendent of Education that a license will not be renewed based upon failure to complete the requirements of this Section. A licensee may appeal that decision to the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board in a manner prescribed by rule.

(1) Each appeal shall state the reasons why the State
Superintendent's decision should be reversed and shall be
sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the
State Board of Education.

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(2) The State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board

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shall review each appeal regarding renewal of a license within 90 days after receiving the appeal in order to determine whether the licensee has met the requirements of this Section. The State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board may hold an appeal hearing or may make its determination based upon the record of review, which shall consist of the following:

8 (A) the regional superintendent of education's 9 rationale for recommending nonrenewal of the license, 10 if applicable;

(B) any evidence submitted to the State
Superintendent along with the individual's electronic
statement of assurance for renewal; and

14 (C) the State Superintendent's rationale for15 nonrenewal of the license.

(3) The State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board
shall notify the licensee of its decision regarding license
renewal by certified mail, return receipt requested, no
later than 30 days after reaching a decision. Upon receipt
of notification of renewal, the licensee, using ELIS, shall
pay the applicable registration fee for the next cycle
using a form of credit or debit card.

(n) The State Board of Education may adopt rules as may benecessary to implement this Section.
