7 (A) school characteristics and student demographics, 8 including average class size, average teaching experience, 9 student racial/ethnic breakdown, and the percentage of 10 students classified as low-income; the percentage of students classified as English learners; the percentage of 11 students who have individualized education plans or 504 12 13 plans that provide for special education services; the 14 number and percentage of all students who have been 15 assessed for placement in a gifted education or advanced academic program and, of those students: (i) the racial and 16 17 ethnic breakdown, (ii) the percentage who are classified as low-income, and (iii) the number and percentage of students 18 who received direct instruction from a teacher who holds a 19 20 gifted education endorsement and, of those students, the 21 classified as low-income: percentage who are the 22 percentage of students scoring at the "exceeds 23 expectations" level on the assessments required under 24 Section 2-3.64a-5 of this Code; the percentage of students 25 who annually transferred in or out of the school district; 26 the per-pupil operating expenditure of the school

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1 district; and the per-pupil State average operating 2 expenditure for the district type (elementary, high 3 school, or unit);

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## As used in this <u>subsection</u> <del>paragraph</del> (2):

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1 (1) By October 31, 2013 and October 31 of each subsequent school year, the State Board of Education, through the State 2 Superintendent of Education, shall prepare a State report card, 3 4 school district report cards, and school report cards, and 5 shall by the most economic means provide to each school district in this State, including special charter districts and 6 districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, the report 7 cards for the school district and each of its schools. 8

In this paragraph (L), "Illinois</u> 17 <u>Youth Survey" means a self-report survey, administered in</u> 18 <u>school settings every 2 years, designed to gather</u> 19 <u>information about health and social indicators, including</u> 20 <u>substance abuse patterns and the attitudes of students in</u> 21 grades 8, 10, and 12.

The school report card shall also provide information that allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and environment data to the State average, to the school data from the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and environment of similar schools based on the type of school and enrollment of low-income students, special education students,
 and English learners.

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As used in this <u>subsection</u> paragraph (2):

4 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 5 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability 6 or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers 7 and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated 8 from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge 9 and pace.

10 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 11 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 12 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 13 of this Code.

For the purposes of paragraph (A) of this subsection (2), "average daily attendance" means the average of the actual number of attendance days during the previous school year for any enrolled student who is subject to compulsory attendance by Section 26-1 of this Code at each school and charter school.

(3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the 19 20 school district report card shall include a subset of the 21 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of 22 subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating 23 to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the 24 school district, and the State report card shall include a 25 subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of subsection (2) of this Section. The school district 26

report card shall include the average daily attendance, as that term is defined in subsection (2) of this Section, of students who have individualized education programs and students who have 504 plans that provide for special education services within the school district.

If the district 24 posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 25 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that 26 the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address

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of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the report card.
