Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections
2-3.11d, 14-9.01, 21B-20, 21B-30, 21B-35, 21B-50, and 21B-55 as
follows:

8 Sec. 2-3.11d. Data on tests required for teacher 9 preparation and certification. Beginning with the effective 10 date of this amendatory Act of the 94th General Assembly, to 11 collect and maintain all of the following data for each 12 institution of higher education engaged in teacher preparation 13 in this State:

14 (1) <u>After July 1, 2025, the</u> The number of individuals
15 taking the test of basic skills under Section <u>21B-30</u> 21 1a
16 of this Code.

17 (2) <u>After July 1, 2025, the</u> The number of individuals
18 passing the test of basic skills under Section <u>21B-30</u> 21-1a
19 of this Code.

20 (3) The total number of <u>content area</u> subject-matter
 21 tests attempted under Section <u>21B-30</u> 21-1a of this Code.

(4) The total number of <u>content area</u> subject-matter
 tests passed under Section <u>21B-30</u> 21-1a of this Code.

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1 The data regarding <u>content area</u> subject-matter tests shall be 2 reported in sum, rather than by separately listing each 3 subject, in order to better protect the identity of the 4 test-takers.

5 On or before August 1, 2007, the State Board of Education 6 shall file with the General Assembly and the Governor and shall 7 make available to the public a report listing the institutions 8 of higher education engaged in teacher preparation in this 9 State, along with the data listed in items (1) and (2) of this 10 Section pertinent to each institution.

On or before October 1, 2012 and every 3 years thereafter, the State Board of Education shall file with the General Assembly and the Governor and shall make available to the public a report listing the institutions of higher education engaged in teacher preparation in this State, along with the data listed in items (1) through (4) of this Section pertinent to each institution.

20 14-9.01. Qualifications of Sec. teachers, other 21 professional personnel and necessary workers. No person shall 22 be employed to teach any class or program authorized by this Article who does not hold a valid teacher's license as provided 23 24 by law and unless he has had such special training as the State 25 Board of Education may require. No special license or

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endorsement to a special license issued under Article 21B 1 2 Section 21B-30 of this Code shall be valid for teaching students with visual disabilities unless the person to whom the 3 license or endorsement is issued has attained satisfactory 4 5 performance on an examination that is designed to assess competency in Braille reading and writing skills according to 6 7 standards that the State Board of Education may adopt. Evidence 8 of successfully completing the examination of Braille reading 9 and writing skills must be submitted to the State Board of 10 Education prior to an applicant's taking of the content area 11 test required under Section 21B-30 of this Code. In addition to 12 other requirements, a candidate for a teaching license in the 13 area of the deaf and hard of hearing granted by the Illinois State Board of Education for teaching deaf and hard of hearing 14 15 students in grades pre-school through grade 12 must demonstrate 16 a minimum proficiency in sign language as determined by the 17 Illinois State Board of Education. All other professional personnel employed in any class, service, or program authorized 18 by this Article shall hold such licenses and shall have had 19 20 such special training as the State Board of Education may require; provided that in a school district organized under 21 22 Article 34, the school district may employ speech and language 23 pathologists licensed under the who are Illinois Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology Practice Act but who do 24 25 not hold a license issued under this Code if the district 26 certifies that a chronic shortage of certified personnel

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exists. Nothing contained in this Act prohibits the school board from employing necessary workers to assist the teacher with the special educational facilities, except that all such necessary workers must have had such training as the State Board of Education may require.

6 No later than January 1, 1993, the State Board of Education 7 shall develop, in consultation with the Advisory Council on the Education of Children with Disabilities and the Advisory 8 9 Council Bilingual Education, rules governing the on 10 qualifications for certification of teachers and school 11 service personnel providing services to English learners 12 receiving special education and related services.

13 The employment of any teacher in a special education program provided for 14 in Sections 14-1.01 to 14-14.01, 15 inclusive, shall be subject to the provisions of Sections 24-11 16 to 24-16, inclusive. Any teacher employed in a special 17 education program, prior to the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1987, in which 2 or more districts 18 participate shall enter upon contractual continued service in 19 20 each of the participating districts subject to the provisions of Sections 24-11 to 24-16, inclusive. 21

24 Sec. 21B-20. Types of licenses. The State Board of 25 Education shall implement a system of educator licensure, HB0423 Engrossed - 5 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

whereby individuals employed in school districts who are 1 2 required to be licensed must have one of the following 3 licenses: (i) a professional educator license; (ii) an educator license with stipulations; (iii) a substitute teaching 4 5 license; or (iv) until June 30, 2023, a short-term substitute teaching license. References in law regarding individuals 6 7 certified or certificated or required to be certified or certificated under Article 21 of this Code shall also include 8 9 individuals licensed or required to be licensed under this 10 Article. The first year of all licenses ends on June 30 11 following one full year of the license being issued.

12 The State Board of Education, in consultation with the 13 State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, may adopt such 14 rules as may be necessary to govern the requirements for 15 licenses and endorsements under this Section.

16 (1) Professional Educator License. Persons who (i) 17 successfully completed an have approved educator preparation program and are recommended for licensure by 18 19 the Illinois institution offering the educator preparation 20 program, (ii) have successfully completed the required testing under Section 21B-30 of this Code, (iii) have 21 22 successfully completed coursework on the psychology of, 23 the identification of, and the methods of instruction for exceptional child, including without 24 the limitation 25 children with learning disabilities, (iv) have 26 successfully completed coursework in methods of reading HB0423 Engrossed - 6 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

and reading in the content area, and (v) have met all other 1 criteria established by rule of the State Board of 2 Education shall be issued a Professional Educator License. 3 All Professional Educator Licenses are valid until June 30 4 5 immediately following 5 years of the license being issued. The Professional Educator License shall be endorsed with 6 7 specific areas and grade levels in which the individual is 8 eligible to practice.

9 Individuals can receive subsequent endorsements on the 10 Professional Educator License. Subsequent endorsements 11 shall require a minimum of 24 semester hours of coursework 12 in the endorsement area and passage of the applicable 13 content area test, unless otherwise specified by rule.

14 (2) Educator License with Stipulations. An Educator
15 License with Stipulations shall be issued an endorsement
16 that limits the license holder to one particular position
17 or does not require completion of an approved educator
18 program or both.

An individual with an Educator License with Stipulations must not be employed by a school district or any other entity to replace any presently employed teacher who otherwise would not be replaced for any reason.

An Educator License with Stipulations may be issuedwith the following endorsements:

25(A) (Blank). A A provisional educator endorsement26for a service member or a spouse of a service member is

valid until June 30 immediately following 3 years of 1 the license being issued, provided that any remaining 2 3 testing and coursework deficiencies are met under this Section. In this Section, "spouse of a service member" 4 5 means any person who, at the time of application under 6 this Section, is the spouse of an active duty member of 7 the United States Armed Forces or any reserve component of the United States Armed Forces or the National Guard 8 of any state, commonwealth, or territory of the United 9 10 States or the District of Columbia.

11 Except as otherwise provided under this
12 subparagraph, a

(B) Alternative provisional educator. An
alternative provisional educator endorsement on an
Educator License with Stipulations may be issued to an
applicant who, at the time of applying for the
endorsement, has done all of the following:

18 (i) Graduated from a regionally accredited
19 college or university with a minimum of a
20 bachelor's degree.

(ii) Successfully completed the first phase of
the Alternative Educator Licensure Program for
Teachers, as described in Section 21B-50 of this
Code.

(iii) Passed a test of basic skills and content
 area test and, on and after July 1, 2025, a test of

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basic skills, as required under Section 21B-30 of this Code.

The alternative provisional educator endorsement is 3 valid for 2 years of teaching and may be renewed for a 4 5 third year by an individual meeting the requirements set forth in Section 21B-50 of this Code. 6

7 (C) Alternative provisional superintendent. An alternative provisional superintendent endorsement on 8 9 an Educator License with Stipulations entitles the 10 holder to serve only as a superintendent or assistant superintendent in a school district's central office. 11 12 This endorsement may only be issued to an applicant who, at the time of applying for the endorsement, has 13 done all of the following: 14

15 (i) Graduated from a regionally accredited 16 college or university with a minimum of a master's 17 degree in a management field other than education.

(ii) Been employed for a period of at least 5 18 19 years in a management level position in a field 20 other than education.

21 (iii) Successfully completed the first phase 22 of alternative route to superintendent an 23 endorsement program, as provided in Section 21B-55 24 of this Code.

(iv) Passed a test of basic skills and content 25 26 area test and, on and after July 1, 2025, a test of HB0423 Engrossed - 9 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

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<u>basic</u> skills, as tests required under Section 21B-30 of this Code.

The endorsement is valid for 2 fiscal years in order to complete one full year of serving as a superintendent or assistant superintendent.

(D) (Blank).

7 (E) Career and technical educator. A career and 8 technical educator endorsement on an Educator License 9 with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who has 10 a minimum of 60 semester hours of coursework from a 11 regionally accredited institution of higher education 12 or an accredited trade and technical institution and 13 has a minimum of 2,000 hours of experience outside of 14 education in each area to be taught.

15 The career and technical educator endorsement on 16 an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until 17 immediately following 5 years of June 30 the endorsement being issued and may be renewed. 18 For individuals who were issued the career and technical 19 20 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 21 Stipulations on or after January 1, 2015, the license 22 may be renewed if the individual passes a test of basic 23 skills or test of work proficiency or, on and after 24 July 1, 2025, a test of basic skills, as required under 25 Section 21B-30 of this Code.

An individual who holds a valid career and

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technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations but does not hold a bachelor's degree may substitute teach in career and technical education classrooms.

5 (F) Part-time provisional career and technical 6 educator or provisional career and technical educator. 7 A part-time provisional career and technical educator endorsement or a provisional career and technical 8 9 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 10 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who has a 11 minimum of 8,000 hours of work experience in the skill 12 for which the applicant is seeking the endorsement. It 13 is the responsibility of each employing school board 14 regional office of education to provide and 15 verification, in writing, to the State Superintendent 16 of Education at the time the application is submitted 17 that no qualified teacher holding a Professional License Educator License 18 Educator or an with 19 Stipulations with a career and technical educator 20 endorsement is available and that actual circumstances 21 require such issuance.

The provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of the endorsement being issued and may be renewed for 5 years. For individuals who were issued the provisional 1career and technical educator endorsement on an2Educator License with Stipulations on or after January31, 2015, the license may be renewed if the individual4passes a test of basic skills or test of work5proficiency or, on and after July 1, 2025, a test of6basic skills, as required under Section 21B-30 of this7Code.

part-time provisional career and technical 8 А 9 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 10 Stipulations may be issued for teaching no more than 2 11 courses of study for grades 6 through 12. The part-time 12 provisional career and technical educator endorsement 13 on an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until 14 June 30 immediately following 5 years of the 15 endorsement being issued and may be renewed for 5 years 16 if the individual makes application for renewal.

An individual who holds a provisional or part-time provisional career and technical educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations but does not hold a bachelor's degree may substitute teach in career and technical education classrooms.

(G) Transitional bilingual educator. A
 transitional bilingual educator endorsement on an
 Educator License with Stipulations may be issued for
 the purpose of providing instruction in accordance
 with Article 14C of this Code to an applicant who

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provides satisfactory evidence that he or she meets all of the following requirements:

3 (i) Possesses adequate speaking, reading, and
4 writing ability in the language other than English
5 in which transitional bilingual education is
6 offered.

7 (ii) Has the ability to successfully8 communicate in English.

9 Either possessed, within 5 (iii) years 10 previous to his or her applying for a transitional bilingual educator endorsement, a valid and 11 12 comparable teaching certificate or comparable 13 authorization issued by a foreign country or holds a degree from an institution of higher learning in 14 15 а foreign country that the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be 16 17 the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution of 18 higher learning in the United States. 19

A transitional bilingual educator endorsement shall be valid for prekindergarten through grade 12, is valid until June 30 immediately following 5 years of the endorsement being issued, and shall not be renewed.

Persons holding a transitional bilingual educator endorsement shall not be employed to replace any presently employed teacher who otherwise would not be HB0423 Engrossed - 13 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

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replaced for any reason.

(H) Language endorsement. In an effort to alleviate the shortage of teachers speaking a language other than English in the public schools, an individual who holds an Educator License with Stipulations may also apply for a language endorsement, provided that the applicant provides satisfactory evidence that he or she meets all of the following requirements:

9 (i) Holds a transitional bilingual 10 endorsement.

(ii) Has demonstrated proficiency in the language for which the endorsement is to be issued by passing the applicable language content test required by the State Board of Education.

15 (iii) Holds a bachelor's degree or higher from 16 a regionally accredited institution of higher 17 education or, for individuals educated in a country other than the United States, holds a 18 degree from an institution of higher learning in a 19 20 foreign country that the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board determines to be 21 22 the equivalent of a bachelor's degree from a 23 regionally accredited institution of higher learning in the United States. 24

25 (iv) <u>On and after July 1, 2025, has</u> Has passed
 26 a test of basic skills, as required under Section

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21B-30 of this Code.

2 A language endorsement on an Educator License with 3 Stipulations is valid for prekindergarten through grade 12 for the same validity period as 4 the 5 individual's transitional bilingual educator 6 endorsement on the Educator License with Stipulations 7 and shall not be renewed.

8 (I) Visiting international educator. A visiting 9 international educator endorsement on an Educator 10 License with Stipulations may be issued to an 11 individual who is being recruited by a particular 12 school district that conducts formal recruitment 13 programs outside of the United States to secure the 14 services of qualified teachers and who meets all of the 15 following requirements:

(i) Holds the equivalent of a minimum of a bachelor's degree issued in the United States.

(ii) Has been prepared as a teacher at the grade level for which he or she will be employed.

20 (iii) Has adequate content knowledge in the21 subject to be taught.

22 (iv) Has an adequate command of the English23 language.

A holder of a visiting international educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations shall be permitted to teach in bilingual education HB0423 Engrossed - 15 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

1 programs in the language that was the medium of 2 instruction in his or her teacher preparation program, 3 provided that he or she passes the English Language 4 Proficiency Examination or another test of writing 5 skills in English identified by the State Board of 6 Education, in consultation with the State Educator 7 Preparation and Licensure Board.

8 A visiting international educator endorsement on 9 an Educator License with Stipulations is valid for 3 10 years and shall not be renewed.

11 (J) Paraprofessional educator. A paraprofessional 12 educator endorsement on an Educator License with 13 Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who holds a 14 high school diploma or its recognized equivalent and 15 either holds an associate's degree or a minimum of 60 16 semester hours of credit from a regionally accredited 17 institution of higher education or, on and after July 1, 2025, has passed a test of basic skills required 18 Section 21B - 3019 under of this Code. The paraprofessional educator endorsement is valid until 20 21 June 30 immediately following 5 years of the 22 endorsement being issued and may be renewed through 23 application and payment of the appropriate fee, as required under Section 21B-40 of this Code. 24 An 25 individual who holds only a paraprofessional educator 26 endorsement is not subject to additional requirements

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in order to renew the endorsement.

2 (K) Chief school business official. A chief school business official endorsement on an Educator License 3 with Stipulations may be issued to an applicant who 4 5 qualifies by having a master's degree or higher, 2 years of full-time administrative experience in school 6 7 business management or 2 years of university-approved 8 practical experience, and a minimum of 24 semester 9 hours of graduate credit in a program approved by the 10 State Board of Education for the preparation of school 11 business administrators and by passage of the 12 applicable State tests, including an a test of basic 13 skills and applicable content area test and, on and 14 after July 1, 2025, a test of basic skills.

15 The chief school business official endorsement may 16 also be affixed to the Educator License with 17 Stipulations of any holder who qualifies by having a master's degree in business administration, finance, 18 19 accounting, or public administration and who completes 20 an additional 6 semester hours of internship in school 21 business management from a regionally accredited 22 institution of higher education and passes the applicable State tests, including an a test of basic 23 24 skills and applicable content area test and, on and after July 1, 2025, a test of basic skills. This 25 26 endorsement shall be required for any individual

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employed as a chief school business official.

2 The chief school business official endorsement on 3 an Educator License with Stipulations is valid until years of 30 immediately following 5 4 June the 5 endorsement being issued and may be renewed if the 6 license holder completes renewal requirements as required for individuals who hold a Professional 7 Educator License endorsed for chief school business 8 9 official under Section 21B-45 of this Code and such 10 rules as may be adopted by the State Board of 11 Education.

12The State Board of Education shall adopt any rules13necessary to implement Public Act 100-288.

(L) Provisional in-state educator. A provisional 14 15 in-state educator endorsement on an Educator License 16 with Stipulations may be issued to a candidate who has 17 completed an Illinois-approved educator preparation program at an Illinois institution of higher education 18 19 and who has not successfully completed an 20 evidence-based assessment of teacher effectiveness but 21 who meets all of the following requirements:

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(i) Holds at least a bachelor's degree.

(ii) Has completed an approved educator
 preparation program at an Illinois institution.

(iii) Has passed <u>an</u> a test of basic skills and
 applicable content area test <u>and</u>, on and after July

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<u>1, 2025, a test of basic skills</u>, as required by Section 21B-30 of this Code.

(iv) Has attempted an evidence-based
assessment of teacher effectiveness and received a
minimum score on that assessment, as established
by the State Board of Education in consultation
with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure
Board.

9 A provisional in-state educator endorsement on an 10 Educator License with Stipulations is valid for one 11 full fiscal year after the date of issuance and may not 12 be renewed.

13 (M) School support personnel intern. A school
14 support personnel intern endorsement on an Educator
15 License with Stipulations may be issued as specified by
16 rule.

17 (N) Special education area. A special education
18 area endorsement on an Educator License with
19 Stipulations may be issued as defined and specified by
20 rule.

(3) Substitute Teaching License. A Substitute Teaching
License may be issued to qualified applicants for
substitute teaching in all grades of the public schools,
prekindergarten through grade 12. Substitute Teaching
Licenses are not eligible for endorsements. Applicants for
a Substitute Teaching License must hold a bachelor's degree

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or higher from a regionally accredited institution of
 higher education.

3 Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for 5 years. 4 Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for substitute 5 teaching in every county of this State. If an individual 6 has had his or her Professional Educator License or 7 Educator License with Stipulations suspended or revoked, 8 then that individual is not eligible to obtain a Substitute 9 Teaching License.

10 A substitute teacher may only teach in the place of a 11 licensed teacher who is under contract with the employing 12 board. If, however, there is no licensed teacher under 13 contract because of an emergency situation, then a district 14 may employ a substitute teacher for no longer than 30 15 calendar days per each vacant position in the district if 16 the district notifies the appropriate regional office of 17 education within 5 business days after the employment of the substitute teacher in the emergency situation. An 18 19 emergency situation is one in which an unforeseen vacancy 20 has occurred and (i) a teacher is unable to fulfill his or 21 her contractual duties or (ii) teacher capacity needs of 22 the district exceed previous indications, and the district 23 is actively engaged in advertising to hire a fully licensed 24 teacher for the vacant position.

There is no limit on the number of days that a substitute teacher may teach in a single school district, HB0423 Engrossed - 20 - LRB101 03356 AXK 48364 b

1 provided that no substitute teacher may teach for longer than 90 school days for any one licensed teacher under 2 3 contract in the same school year. A substitute teacher who holds a Professional Educator License or Educator License 4 5 with Stipulations shall not teach for more than 120 school 6 days for any one licensed teacher under contract in the 7 same school year. The limitations in this paragraph (3) on 8 the number of days a substitute teacher may be employed do 9 not apply to any school district operating under Article 34 10 of this Code.

11 A school district may not require an individual who 12 holds a valid Professional Educator License or Educator 13 License with Stipulations to seek or hold a Substitute 14 Teaching License to teach as a substitute teacher.

(4) Short-Term Substitute Teaching License. Beginning 15 16 on July 1, 2018 and until June 30, 2023, the State Board of 17 Education may issue a Short-Term Substitute Teaching 18 License. A Short-Term Substitute Teaching License may be 19 issued to a qualified applicant for substitute teaching in 20 all grades of the public schools, prekindergarten through 21 grade 12. Short-Term Substitute Teaching Licenses are not 22 eligible for endorsements. Applicants for a Short-Term 23 Substitute Teaching License must hold an associate's 24 degree or have completed at least 60 credit hours from a 25 regionally accredited institution of higher education.

26 Short-Term Substitute Teaching Licenses are valid for

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substitute teaching in every county of this State. If an
 individual has had his or her Professional Educator License
 or Educator License with Stipulations suspended or
 revoked, then that individual is not eligible to obtain a
 Short-Term Substitute Teaching License.

6 The provisions of Sections 10-21.9 and 34-18.5 of this 7 Code apply to short-term substitute teachers.

8 An individual holding a Short-Term Substitute Teaching 9 License may teach no more than 5 consecutive days per 10 licensed teacher who is under contract. For teacher 11 absences lasting 6 or more days per licensed teacher who is 12 under contract, a school district may not hire an holding 13 individual а Short-Term Substitute Teaching 14 License. An individual holding a Short-Term Substitute 15 Teaching License must complete the training program under 16 Section 10-20.67 or 34-18.60 of this Code to be eligible to 17 teach at a public school. This paragraph (4) is inoperative on and after July 1, 2023. 18

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(a) This Section applies beginning on July 1, 2012.

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(b) The State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board, shall design and implement a system of examinations, which shall be required prior to the issuance of educator licenses. These examinations and indicators must be based on national and State professional teaching standards, as determined by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board. The State Board of Education may adopt such rules as may be necessary to implement and administer this

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Section.

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12 (c) On and after July 1, 2025, except Except as otherwise provided in this Article, applicants seeking a Professional 13 14 Educator License or an Educator License with Stipulations shall 15 be required to pass a test of basic skills before the license 16 is issued, unless the endorsement the individual is seeking 17 does not require passage of the test. All applicants completing Illinois-approved, teacher education or school 18 service 19 personnel preparation programs shall be required to pass the 20 State Board of Education's recognized test of basic skills 21 prior to starting their student teaching or starting the final 22 semester of their internship. An institution of higher 23 learning, as defined in the Higher Education Student Assistance 24 Act, may not require an applicant to complete the State Board's 25 recognized test of basic skills prior to the semester before 26 student teaching or prior to the semester before starting the

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final semester of an internship. An individual who passes a
 test of basic skills does not need to do so again for
 subsequent endorsements or other educator licenses.

(d) All applicants seeking a State license shall be
required to pass a test of content area knowledge for each area
of endorsement for which there is an applicable test. There
shall be no exception to this requirement. No candidate shall
be allowed to student teach or serve as the teacher of record
until he or she has passed the applicable content area test.

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(e) (Blank).

The score required 6 7 to pass the tests shall be fixed by the State Board of 8 Education, in consultation with the State Educator Preparation 9 and Licensure Board. On or before July 1, 2025, the State Board 10 must reevaluate the method it uses to score a content area 11 knowledge test and may adopt rules to make any changes to those 12 methods. The tests shall be administered not fewer than 3 times 13 a year at such time and place as may be designated by the State Board of Education, in consultation with the State Educator 14 15 Preparation and Licensure Board.

The State Board shall implement a test or tests to assess the speaking, reading, writing, and grammar skills of applicants for an endorsement or a license issued under subdivision (G) of paragraph (2) of Section 21B-20 of this Code in the English language and in the language of the transitional bilingual education program requested by the applicant.

(h) Except as provided in Section 34-6 of this Code, the provisions of this Section shall apply equally in any school district subject to Article 34 of this Code.

(i) The rules developed to implement and enforce thetesting requirements under this Section shall include without

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1 limitation provisions governing test selection, test 2 score, validation and determination of а passing administration of the tests, frequency of administration, 3 applicant fees, frequency of applicants taking the tests, the 4 5 years for which a score is valid, and appropriate special accommodations.
