SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Appropriates \$59,200,000 to the Department of Human Services for various purposes concerning community-integrated living arrangements. Effective immediately.

AN ACT concerning appropriations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented 2 in the General Assembly: 3

Section 5. The amount of \$30,000,000, or so much of that 4 amount as may be necessary, is appropriated from the General 5 Revenue Fund to the Department of Human Services for the purpose 6 7 of reducing the number of daily hours of uncompensated services 8 in 5 to 8 bed community-integrated living arrangements from 7 9 hours to 5 hours.

10 Section 10. The amount of \$5,000,000, or so much of that amount as may be necessary, is appropriated from the General 11 12 Revenue Fund to the Department of Human Services for rate 13 increases for certified community day services providers under 14 community service grant programs for persons with developmental 15 disabilities.

Section 15. The amount of \$6,200,000, or so much of that 16 17 amount as may be necessary, is appropriated from the General 18 Revenue Fund to the Department of Human Services for the purpose 19 of increasing the base nursing reimbursements for any licensed 20 practical nurse by one-half hour per month per person for residents living in 5 to 8 person community-integrated living 21

Section 20. The amount of \$18,000,000 or so much of that amount as may be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Human Services for the purpose of increasing the administration cost reimbursements in community-integrated living arrangements.

9 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon10 becoming law.
