1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive
Health Education Act is amended by changing Section 3 as
follows:

Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. 8 The 9 program established under this Act shall include, but not be limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis 10 for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this 11 12 State: human ecology and health;, human growth and development; τ the emotional, psychological, physiological, 13 14 hygienic, and social responsibilities of family life, including sexual abstinence until marriage; the, prevention 15 16 and control of disease, including instruction in grades 6 17 through 12 on the prevention, transmission, and spread of AIDS; $_{\tau}$ age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and 18 19 prevention education in grades pre-kindergarten through $12;_{\tau}$ 20 public and environmental health; τ consumer health; τ safety 21 education and disaster survival; mental health and illness; personal health habits; τ alcohol and τ drug use τ and abuse, 22 including the medical and legal ramifications of alcohol, 23

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1 druq, and tobacco use;, abuse during pregnancy; evidence-based and medically accurate information regarding 2 3 sexual abstinence; τ tobacco and e-cigarettes and other vapor devices; τ nutrition; τ and dental health. The instruction on 4 5 mental health and illness must evaluate the multiple dimensions of health by reviewing the relationship between 6 7 mental health so as to enhance student physical and 8 understanding, attitudes, and behaviors that promote health, 9 well-being, and human dignity. The program shall also provide 10 course material and instruction to advise pupils of the 11 Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act. The program shall 12 include information about cancer, including, without limitation, types of cancer, signs and symptoms, risk factors, 13 14 importance of early prevention and detection, the and 15 information on where to go for help. Notwithstanding the above 16 educational areas, the following areas may also be included as 17 a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first aid (including, but not limited to, 18 cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), 19 20 heart disease, diabetes, stroke, the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide, and teen dating violence in 21 22 grades 7 through 12. Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, 23 training on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be in accordance with 24 25 standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart 26 Association, or another nationally recognized certifying

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1 organization) and how to use an automated external 2 defibrillator shall be included as a basis for curricula in 3 all secondary schools in this State.

The school board of each public elementary and secondary 4 5 school in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the 6 7 and skills necessary to properly administer knowledge 8 life-saving techniques, including, without limitation, the 9 Heimlich maneuver and rescue breathing. The training shall be 10 in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 11 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized 12 certifying organization. A school board may use the services 13 of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise in life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school 14 15 personnel in these techniques. Each school board is encouraged 16 to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, at least one 17 person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by another qualified certifying agency, 18 qualified as to administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In 19 20 addition, each school board is authorized to allocate appropriate portions of its institute or inservice days to 21 22 conduct training programs for teachers and other school 23 personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming qualified 24 administer emergency first aid or cardiopulmonary to 25 resuscitation. School boards are urged to encourage their 26 teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic

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and other extracurricular school activities to 1 programs 2 acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills 3 necessary to properly administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards and requirements 4 5 established by the American Red Cross or another qualified 6 certifying agency. Subject to appropriation, the State Board of Education shall establish and administer a matching grant 7 8 program to pay for half of the cost that a school district 9 incurs in training those teachers and other school personnel 10 who express an interest in becoming qualified to administer 11 cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be in 12 accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the 13 American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization) or in learning how to use 14 an automated external defibrillator. A school district that 15 16 applies for a grant must demonstrate that it has funds to pay 17 half of the cost of the training for which matching grant money is sought. The State Board of Education shall award the grants 18 19 on a first-come, first-serve basis.

20 No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any class or course on AIDS or family life instruction or to 21 22 receive training on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary 23 resuscitation how to use automated or an external defibrillator if his or her parent or quardian submits written 24 25 objection thereto, and refusal to take or participate in the 26 course or program or the training shall not be reason for

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1 suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

2 in Curricula developed under programs established 3 accordance with this Act in the major educational area of alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom 4 5 instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal 6 effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall 7 8 be integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of 9 Education shall develop and make available to all elementary 10 and secondary schools in this State instructional materials 11 and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating 12 the instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, 13 school districts may offer, as part of existing curricula during the school day or as part of an after school program, 14 15 support services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose 16 parent, parents, or guardians are chemically dependent.
