SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

New Act

Creates the Infrastructure Delivery and Program Transparency Act. Provides for the creation of an Infrastructure Implementation Coordinator within the Office of the Secretary of Transportation to administer the Rebuild Illinois Program. Provides that the Office of the Secretary of Transportation shall develop a publicly available project information website that includes detailed information about each infrastructure project. Provides that the Coordinator shall track and make publicly available a master program, budget, and construction schedule and program metrics. Provides that after a review of the program metrics, the Coordinator shall implement improvements to the Rebuild Illinois Program in accordance with the established overall program budget and project schedule. Provides that the Department of Transportation and the Coordinator shall implement certain initiatives to assist the Department with meeting program goals.

AN ACT concerning transportation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the
Infrastructure Delivery and Program Transparency Act.

6 Section 5. Definitions. As used in this Act:

7 "Coordinator" means the Infrastructure Implementation
8 Coordinator appointed by the Office of the Secretary of
9 Transportation.

10 "Department" means the Illinois Department of 11 Transportation.

"Infrastructure" means publicly owned 12 infrastructure 13 located in the State of Illinois including(1) streets, 14 roadways, pedestrian ways, commuter linkages and circulator transit systems, bridges, tunnels, overpasses, bus ways, and 15 16 guideways connected to or adjacent to an infrastructure project; (2) utilities systems and related facilities, utility 17 relocations and replacements, utility-line extensions, network 18 19 and communication systems, streetscape improvements, drainage 20 systems, sewer and water systems, subgrade structures and 21 associated improvements; (3) landscaping, facade construction 22 and restoration, wayfinding, and signage; (4) public transportation and transit facilities and 23 related

infrastructure, vehicle parking 1 facilities, and other 2 facilities that encourage intermodal transportation and public 3 transit connected to or adjacent to a Project; (5) railroad infrastructure, stations, maintenance and storage facilities; 4 5 (6) parks, plazas, atria, cultural facilities, community and recreational facilities, facilities to promote tourism and 6 7 hospitality, educational facilities, conferencing and 8 convention centers, broadcast and related multimedia 9 infrastructure, and destination and community retail, dining, and entertainment facilities; and (7) other facilities with 10 11 the primary purpose of attracting and fostering economic 12 generating additional development by tax base. 13 "Infrastructure" does not include a commercial office, 14 residential or hotel facilities, or any retail, dining, and 15 entertainment space included within such facilities.

16 "Infrastructure project" means the construction or 17 renovation of publicly owned infrastructure located within the 18 State of Illinois.

"Program" means the Rebuild Illinois Program.

20 "Secretary" means the Illinois Secretary of 21 Transportation.

22 Section 10. Infrastructure implementation coordinator.

(a) The Secretary of Transportation shall appoint an
 Infrastructure Implementation Coordinator who shall administer
 the Rebuild Illinois Program, disburse and provide an

accounting of capital funding granted to the State by the U.S.
 Infrastructure Investment Jobs Act, and provide and facilitate
 regular reporting and communication to the Illinois Department
 of Transportation, the General Assembly, the Federal Highway
 Administration, and to key industry and public stakeholders.

(b) The Coordinator shall direct the performance of all 6 7 program implementation processes and procedures and shall be 8 provided the necessary resources to establish a master 9 program, budget, and schedule; to track and monitor key 10 metrics; to report and communicate all program metrics; to 11 implement program initiatives; and to provide leadership that 12 results in improvement to all process and procedures related to the delivery of infrastructure improvements. 13

14 Section 15. Publicly available master program, budget, and 15 construction schedule. For the purpose of allowing key 16 infrastructure stakeholders to effectively plan and schedule the procurement of required materials and resources and to 17 18 keep the public informed of project progress, the Office of 19 the Secretary of Transportation shall develop a publicly available project information website that includes the 20 21 following information:

(1) the name of the infrastructure being constructedor renovated;

(2) the location of each project;

(3) the estimated commencement and completion date of

each project, as well as timely updates on any projected changes to such dates;

(4) the actual cost of each project.

4 Section 20. Program metrics. To measure construction and 5 renovation progress and performance, resolve issues, and 6 publicly report on the program's accomplishments, the 7 Coordinator shall track and make publicly available the 8 following program metrics:

9 (1) the overall program budget, which the Secretary 10 shall track and report by service type (i.e. construction, 11 consultant services, miscellaneous) and which includes the 12 following:

(A) the current program budget;

14 (B) the original amount of each program funding15 award;

16 (C) the cost of each contract change order or 17 supplemental order;

18 (D) the amount of obligated funding for each19 project; and

(E) the amount remaining in each project budget at
the completion of the project;

(2) each individual project budget, categorized by
core work categories (for example, roadway maintenance,
bridges, safety and system modernization, system
expansion, and system support);

(3) general program metrics, which may be categorized 1 2 on a subprogram basis by major corridor or core work type, and include the following: 3 (A) the number of direct and indirect 4 iobs 5 created; 6 (B) the number of contracts awarded under \$10,000,000; 7 8 (C) the number of contracts awarded to 9 construction and engineering firms; 10 (D) the number of contracts awarded to unique 11 veteran-owned firms; and 12 (E) the number of contracts awarded to new firms, 13 established within a year before the date of the 14 contract: (4) diversity metrics, which shall be tracked and 15 16 reported for construction and consultant services and 17 include the following: amount in contract awards 18 (A) the and the 19 percentage of total contracts awarded to participants 20 in the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program; 21 the amount in contract awards and (B) the 22 percentage of total contracts awarded to veteran-owned 23 businesses: (C) the number of contracts awarded under protege 24 25 agreements; 26 (D) the number of contracts awarded to prime

contractors that are participants of the Disadvantaged
 Business Enterprise Program; and

3 (E) the number of contracts awarded to prime
4 contractors that are veteran-owned businesses; and
5 (5) program administrative metrics that include:

6 (A) the average time from selection of a 7 contractor to the contractor's receipt of a Notice to 8 Proceed;

9 (B) the average time to process a project invoice; 10 (C) the average time to process a project payment; 11 (D) the number of actual advertised contracts; 12 (E) the number of projected advertised contracts;

13 and

14 the projected need for construction and (F) 15 consultant services for each year, to be published in 16 each issue of the Illinois Department of 17 Transportation Professional Transportation Bulletin and updated guarterly. 18

19 Section 25. Program goal development. After a review of 20 the program metrics, the Coordinator shall implement 21 improvements to the program in accordance with the established 22 overall program budget and project schedule. As a result, 23 individual project budgets and schedules may be adjusted; 24 however, the overall annual expected program expenditures and 25 target delivery dates for major corridor improvements shall

1 not vary significantly from established goals.

Section 30. Program goals; expedited processes.

3 (a) The Coordinator shall process a Notice to Proceed 4 within 30 days of a construction bid opening or consultant 5 selection and shall expedite the execution of contracts and 6 the issuance of a Notice to Proceed to meet this goal.

7 (b) The Secretary shall disburse payments to construction 8 contractors on a biweekly basis and shall expedite payment to 9 meet this goal.

10 (c) The Secretary shall disburse payments to consultants 11 within 45 days of the completion of services and shall 12 expedite payments to meet this goal.

Section 35. Program initiatives to support program goals.
The Department and the Coordinator shall do the following to assist the Department with meeting program goals:

16 (1) develop a mechanism to openly identify and elevate
17 issues within the Rebuild Illinois Program so that they
18 may be resolved in a timely manner;

(2) evaluate and improve processes and procedures for
State coordination with the Federal Highway Administration
to expedite project delivery;

(3) evaluate and improve the State processes and
 procedures for prioritizing right-of-way issues, utility
 conflicts, and permits, to expedite project delivery;

1 (4) evaluate and improve the State processes and 2 procedures for prioritizing the resolution of construction 3 field issues that require contract change orders;

4 (5) establish and improve a construction and 5 consultant mentor-protege program to promote significant 6 and sustainable growth for participants of the 7 Disadvantaged Enterprise Program and veteran-owned firms.
