### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/2-3.64a-5

Amends the School Code. Provides that the State Board of Education shall administer no more than one assessment (instead of 3 assessments), per student, of English language arts and mathematics for students in a secondary education program. Removes a provision that specifies that students who do not take the State's final accountability assessment or its approved alternate assessment may not receive a regular high school diploma unless otherwise exempted. Provides that the State Board of Education may not assess students in any manner beyond that required for compliance with the federal Every Student Succeeds Act. Provides that the State Board shall also explore any flexibility afforded to states through waivers under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act. Makes conforming changes. Effective immediately.

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
2-3.64a-5 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/2-3.64a-5)

Sec. 2-3.64a-5. State goals and assessment.

8 (a) For the assessment and accountability purposes of this 9 Section, "students" includes those students enrolled in a public or State-operated elementary school, secondary school, 10 11 or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control, a charter school operating in compliance 12 13 with the Charter Schools Law, a school operated by a regional office of education under Section 13A-3 of this Code, or a 14 public school administered by a local public agency or the 15 16 Department of Human Services.

17 (b) The State Board of Education shall establish the 18 academic standards that are to be applicable to students who 19 are subject to State assessments under this Section. The State 20 Board of Education shall not establish any such standards in 21 final form without first providing opportunities for public 22 participation and local input in the development of the final 23 academic standards. Those opportunities shall include a well-publicized period of public comment and opportunities to
 file written comments.

3 (c) <u>The Beginning no later than the 2014-2015 school year</u>, 4 <u>the</u> State Board of Education shall annually assess all 5 students enrolled in grades 3 through 8 in English language 6 arts and mathematics.

7 <u>The</u> Beginning no later than the 2017 2018 school year, the 8 State Board of Education shall annually assess all students in 9 science at one grade in grades 3 through 5<del>, at one grade in</del> 10 <del>grades 6 through 8, and at one grade in grades 9 through 12</del>.

11 The State Board of Education shall annually assess schools 12 that operate a secondary education program, as defined in 13 Section 22-22 of this Code, in English language arts and mathematics. The State Board of Education shall administer no 14 more than one assessment 3 assessments, per student, of 15 16 English language arts and mathematics for students in a 17 secondary education program. This assessment must One of these assessments shall be recognized by this State's public 18 institutions of higher education, as defined in the Board of 19 20 Higher Education Act, for the purpose of student application or admissions consideration. The assessment administered by 21 22 the State Board of Education for the purpose of student 23 application to or admissions consideration by institutions of higher education must be administered on a school day during 24 25 regular student attendance hours, and student profile 26 information collected by the assessment shall be made

available to the State's public institutions of higher
 education in a timely manner.

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Students who do not take the State's final accountability 3 assessment or its approved alternate assessment may not 4 5 receive a regular high school diploma unless the student is 6 exempted from taking the State assessments under subsection (d) of this Section because the student is enrolled in a 7 8 program of adult and continuing education, as defined in the 9 Adult Education Act, or the student is identified by the State 10 Board of Education, through rules, as being exempt from the 11 assessment.

12 The State Board of Education shall not assess students 13 under this Section in subjects not required by this Section. 14 <u>The State Board of Education may not assess students in any</u> 15 <u>manner beyond that required for compliance with the federal</u> 16 <u>Every Student Succeeds Act. The State Board of Education shall</u> 17 <u>also explore any flexibility afforded to states through</u> 18 <u>waivers under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act.</u>

Districts shall inform their students of the timelines and procedures applicable to their participation in every yearly administration of the State assessments. The State Board of Education shall establish periods of time in each school year during which State assessments shall occur to meet the objectives of this Section.

The requirements of this subsection do not apply if the State Board of Education has received a waiver from the 1 administration of assessments from the U.S. Department of 2 Education.

(d) Every individualized educational program as described 3 in Article 14 shall identify if the State assessment or 4 5 components thereof require accommodation for the student. The State Board of Education shall develop rules governing the 6 administration of an alternate assessment that 7 mav be 8 available to students for whom participation in this State's 9 assessments is not appropriate, regular even with 10 accommodations as allowed under this Section.

11 Students receiving special education services whose 12 individualized educational programs identify them as eligible 13 for the alternative State assessments nevertheless shall have option of also taking this State's regular final 14 the 15 accountability assessment, which shall be administered in 16 accordance with the eligible accommodations appropriate for 17 meeting these students' respective needs.

All students determined to be English learners shall 18 19 participate in the State assessments. The scores of those 20 students who have been enrolled in schools in the United 21 States for less than 12 months may not be used for the purposes 22 of accountability. Any student determined to be an English 23 learner shall receive appropriate assessment accommodations, including language supports, which shall be established by 24 25 rule. Approved assessment accommodations must be provided 26 until the student's English language skills develop to the

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extent that the student is no longer considered to be an
 English learner, as demonstrated through a State-identified
 English language proficiency assessment.

4 (e) The results or scores of each assessment taken under
5 this Section shall be made available to the parents of each
6 student.

7 In each school year, the scores attained by a student on 8 the final accountability assessment must be placed in the 9 student's permanent record pursuant to rules that the State 10 Board of Education shall adopt for that purpose in accordance 11 with Section 3 of the Illinois School Student Records Act. In 12 each school year, the scores attained by a student on the State 13 assessments administered in grades 3 through 8 must be placed 14 in the student's temporary record.

(f) All schools shall administer the State's academic assessment of English language proficiency to all children determined to be English learners.

18 (g) All schools in this State that are part of the sample drawn by the National Center for Education Statistics, in 19 20 collaboration with their school districts and the State Board of Education, shall administer the academic assessments under 21 22 the National Assessment of Educational Progress carried out 23 under Section 411(b)(2) of the federal National Education Statistics Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 9010) if the U.S. Secretary 24 25 of Education pays the costs of administering the assessments. 26 (h) (Blank).

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(i) For the purposes of this subsection (i), "academically 1 2 based assessments" means assessments consisting of questions 3 and answers that are measurable and quantifiable to measure the knowledge, skills, and ability of students in the subject 4 5 matters covered by the assessments. A11 assessments 6 administered pursuant to this Section must be academically 7 assessments. The scoring of academically based based 8 assessments shall be reliable, valid, and fair and shall meet 9 the guidelines for assessment development and use prescribed 10 by the American Psychological Association, the National 11 Council on Measurement in Education, and the American 12 Educational Research Association.

13 The State Board of Education shall review the use of all 14 assessment item types in order to ensure that they are valid 15 and reliable indicators of student performance aligned to the 16 learning standards being assessed and that the development, 17 administration, and scoring of these item types are 18 justifiable in terms of cost.

(j) The State Superintendent of Education shall appoint a 19 20 committee of no more than 21 members, consisting of parents, 21 teachers, school administrators, school board members, 22 assessment experts, regional superintendents of schools, and 23 citizens, to review the State assessments administered by the State Board of Education. The Committee shall select one of 24 25 its members as its chairperson. The Committee shall meet on an 26 ongoing basis to review the content and design of the

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assessments (including whether the requirements of subsection 1 2 (i) of this Section have been met), the time and money expended 3 at the local and State levels to prepare for and administer the assessments, the collective results of the assessments as 4 5 measured against the stated purpose of assessing student 6 performance, and other issues involving the assessments 7 identified by the Committee. The Committee shall make periodic 8 recommendations to the State Superintendent of Education and 9 the General Assembly concerning the assessments.

10 (k) The State Board of Education may adopt rules to 11 implement this Section.
