### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/27-8.1

from Ch. 122, par. 27-8.1

Amends the School Code. Provides that the Department of Public Health shall adopt a rule requiring informational material about testicular cancer to be provided as part of the health examination of any male child entering the ninth grade. Provides that the Department of Public Health shall develop the content of the informational material to be provided. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning health.

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
27-8.1 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/27-8.1) (from Ch. 122, par. 27-8.1)

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Sec. 27-8.1. Health examinations and immunizations.

(1) In compliance with rules and regulations which the 8 9 Department of Public Health shall promulgate, and except as hereinafter provided, all children in Illinois shall have a 10 health examination as follows: within one year prior to 11 entering kindergarten or the first grade of any public, 12 private, or parochial elementary school; upon entering the 13 14 sixth and ninth grades of any public, private, or parochial school; prior to entrance into any public, private, or 15 16 parochial nursery school; and, irrespective of grade, 17 immediately prior to or upon entrance into any public, private, or parochial school or nursery school, each child 18 shall present proof of having been examined in accordance with 19 20 Section and the rules and regulations promulgated this 21 hereunder. Any child who received a health examination within 22 one year prior to entering the fifth grade for the 2007-2008 school year is not required to receive an additional health 23

examination in order to comply with the provisions of Public Act 95-422 when he or she attends school for the 2008-2009 school year, unless the child is attending school for the first time as provided in this paragraph.

5 A tuberculosis skin test screening shall be included as a required part of each health examination included under this 6 7 Section if the child resides in an area designated by the 8 Department of Public Health as having a high incidence of 9 tuberculosis. Additional health examinations of pupils, 10 including eye examinations, may be required when deemed necessary by school authorities. Parents are encouraged to 11 12 have their children undergo eye examinations at the same points in time required for health examinations. 13

14 (1.5) In compliance with rules adopted by the Department 15 of Public Health and except as otherwise provided in this 16 Section, all children in kindergarten and the second, sixth, 17 and ninth grades of any public, private, or parochial school shall have a dental examination. Each of these children shall 18 19 present proof of having been examined by a dentist in 20 accordance with this Section and rules adopted under this Section before May 15th of the school year. If a child in the 21 22 second, sixth, or ninth grade fails to present proof by May 23 15th, the school may hold the child's report card until one of 24 the following occurs: (i) the child presents proof of a 25 completed dental examination or (ii) the child presents proof 26 that a dental examination will take place within 60 days after

May 15th. A school may not withhold a child's report card 1 2 during a school year in which the Governor has declared a disaster due to a public health emergency pursuant to Section 3 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act. 4 The 5 Department of Public Health shall establish, by rule, a waiver for children who show an undue burden or a lack of access to a 6 dentist. Each public, private, and parochial school must give 7 8 notice of this dental examination requirement to the parents 9 and quardians of students at least 60 days before May 15th of 10 each school year.

11 (1.10) Except as otherwise provided in this Section, all 12 children enrolling in kindergarten in a public, private, or parochial school on or after January 1, 2008 (the effective 13 date of Public Act 95-671) and any student enrolling for the 14 first time in a public, private, or parochial school on or 15 16 after January 1, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 17 95-671) shall have an eve examination. Each of these children shall present proof of having been examined by a physician 18 licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches or a 19 20 licensed optometrist within the previous year, in accordance with this Section and rules adopted under this Section, before 21 22 October 15th of the school year. If the child fails to present 23 proof by October 15th, the school may hold the child's report card until one of the following occurs: (i) the child presents 24 25 proof of a completed eye examination or (ii) the child 26 presents proof that an eye examination will take place within

60 days after October 15th. A school may not withhold a child's 1 2 report card during a school year in which the Governor has 3 declared a disaster due to a public health emergency pursuant to Section 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act. 4 5 The Department of Public Health shall establish, by rule, a waiver for children who show an undue burden or a lack of 6 access to a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of 7 8 its branches who provides eye examinations or to a licensed 9 optometrist. Each public, private, and parochial school must 10 give notice of this eye examination requirement to the parents 11 and guardians of students in compliance with rules of the 12 Department of Public Health. Nothing in this Section shall be 13 construed to allow a school to exclude a child from attending because of a parent's or guardian's failure to obtain an eye 14 15 examination for the child.

16 (2) The Department of Public Health shall promulgate rules 17 and regulations specifying the examinations and procedures that constitute a health examination, which shall include an 18 19 age-appropriate developmental screening, an age-appropriate social and emotional screening, and the collection of data 20 relating to asthma and obesity (including at a minimum, date 21 22 of birth, gender, height, weight, blood pressure, and date of 23 exam), and a dental examination and may recommend by rule that certain additional examinations be performed. The rules and 24 25 regulations of the Department of Public Health shall specify 26 that a tuberculosis skin test screening shall be included as a

required part of each health examination included under this 1 2 Section if the child resides in an area designated by the 3 Department of Public Health as having a high incidence of tuberculosis. With respect to the developmental screening and 4 5 the social and emotional screening, the Department of Public Health must, no later than January 1, 2019, develop rules and 6 7 appropriate revisions to the Child Health Examination form in 8 conjunction with a statewide organization representing school 9 boards; a statewide organization representing pediatricians; 10 statewide organizations representing individuals holding 11 Illinois educator licenses with school support personnel 12 endorsements, including school social workers, school 13 psychologists, and school nurses; a statewide organization 14 representing children's mental health experts; a statewide 15 organization representing school principals; the Director of Healthcare and Family Services or his or her designee, the 16 17 State Superintendent of Education or his or her designee; and representatives of other appropriate State agencies and, at a 18 minimum, must recommend the use of validated screening tools 19 appropriate to the child's age or grade, and, with regard to 20 the social and emotional screening, require recording only 21 22 whether or not the screening was completed. The rules shall 23 take into consideration the screening recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics and must be consistent with the 24 25 State Board of Education's social and emotional learning 26 standards. The Department of Public Health shall specify that

a diabetes screening as defined by rule shall be included as a 1 2 required part of each health examination. Diabetes testing is not required. The Department of Public Health shall adopt a 3 rule requiring informational material about testicular cancer 4 5 to be provided as part of the health examination of any male child entering the ninth grade. The Department of Public 6 7 Health shall develop the content of the informational material 8 to be provided.

9 Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all of its 10 branches, licensed advanced practice registered nurses, or 11 licensed physician assistants shall be responsible for the 12 performance of the health examinations, other than dental 13 examinations, eye examinations, and vision and hearing 14 screening, and shall sign all report forms required by 15 subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to those portions 16 of the health examination for which the physician, advanced 17 practice registered nurse, or physician assistant is responsible. If a registered nurse performs any part of a 18 health examination, then a physician licensed to practice 19 20 medicine in all of its branches must review and sign all required report forms. Licensed dentists shall perform all 21 22 dental examinations and shall sign all report forms required 23 by subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to the dental examinations. Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all 24 25 its branches or licensed optometrists shall perform all eye examinations required by this Section and shall sign all 26

report forms required by subsection (4) of this Section that 1 pertain to the eye examination. For purposes of this Section, 2 an eye examination shall at a minimum include history, visual 3 acuity, subjective refraction to best visual acuity near and 4 5 far, internal and external examination, and a glaucoma 6 evaluation, as well as any other tests or observations that in 7 the professional judgment of the doctor are necessary. Vision 8 and hearing screening tests, which shall not be considered 9 examinations as that term is used in this Section, shall be conducted in accordance with rules and regulations of the 10 11 Department of Public Health, and by individuals whom the 12 Department of Public Health has certified. In these rules and 13 regulations, the Department of Public Health shall require 14 that individuals conducting vision screening tests give a 15 child's parent or quardian written notification, before the 16 vision screening is conducted, that states, "Vision screening 17 is not a substitute for a complete eye and vision evaluation by an eye doctor. Your child is not required to undergo this 18 vision screening if an optometrist or ophthalmologist has 19 20 completed and signed a report form indicating that an examination has been administered within the previous 12 21 22 months.".

(2.5) With respect to the developmental screening and the social and emotional screening portion of the health examination, each child may present proof of having been screened in accordance with this Section and the rules adopted

under this Section before October 15th of the school year. 1 2 With regard to the social and emotional screening only, the 3 examining health care provider shall only record whether or not the screening was completed. If the child fails to present 4 5 proof of the developmental screening or the social and emotional screening portions of the health examination by 6 7 October 15th of the school year, qualified school support personnel may, with a parent's or guardian's consent, offer 8 9 the developmental screening or the social and emotional 10 screening to the child. Each public, private, and parochial 11 school must give notice of the developmental screening and 12 social and emotional screening requirements to the parents and 13 quardians of students in compliance with the rules of the Department of Public Health. Nothing in this Section shall be 14 15 construed to allow a school to exclude a child from attending 16 because of a parent's or quardian's failure to obtain a 17 developmental screening or a social and emotional screening for the child. Once a developmental screening or a social and 18 19 emotional screening is completed and proof has been presented 20 to the school, the school may, with a parent's or quardian's 21 consent, make available appropriate school personnel to work 22 with the parent or quardian, the child, and the provider who 23 screening form to obtain signed the any appropriate evaluations and services as indicated on the form and in other 24 information and documentation provided by the 25 parents, 26 guardians, or provider.

1 (3) Every child shall, at or about the same time as he or 2 she receives a health examination required by subsection (1) 3 of this Section, present to the local school proof of having 4 received such immunizations against preventable communicable 5 diseases as the Department of Public Health shall require by 6 rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to this Section and 7 the Communicable Disease Prevention Act.

8 (4) The individuals conducting the health examination, 9 dental examination, or eye examination shall record the fact 10 of having conducted the examination, and such additional 11 information as required, including for a health examination 12 data relating to asthma and obesity (including at a minimum, date of birth, gender, height, weight, blood pressure, and 13 14 date of exam), on uniform forms which the Department of Public 15 Health and the State Board of Education shall prescribe for 16 statewide use. The examiner shall summarize on the report form 17 any condition that he or she suspects indicates a need for special services, including for a health examination factors 18 relating to asthma or obesity. The duty to summarize on the 19 20 report form does not apply to social and emotional screenings. 21 The confidentiality of the information and records relating to 22 the developmental screening and the social and emotional 23 screening shall be determined by the statutes, rules, and professional ethics governing the type of provider conducting 24 25 the screening. The individuals confirming the administration of required immunizations shall record as indicated on the 26

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form that the immunizations were administered.

2 (5) If a child does not submit proof of having had either 3 the health examination or the immunization as required, then the child shall be examined or receive the immunization, as 4 5 the case may be, and present proof by October 15 of the current school year, or by an earlier date of the current school year 6 7 established by a school district. To establish a date before 8 October 15 of the current school year for the health 9 examination or immunization as required, a school district 10 must give notice of the requirements of this Section 60 days 11 prior to the earlier established date. If for medical reasons 12 one or more of the required immunizations must be given after October 15 of the current school year, or after an earlier 13 14 established date of the current school year, then the child 15 shall present, by October 15, or by the earlier established 16 date, a schedule for the administration of the immunizations 17 and a statement of the medical reasons causing the delay, both the schedule and the statement being issued by the physician, 18 19 advanced practice registered nurse, physician assistant, 20 registered nurse, or local health department that will be responsible for administration of the remaining required 21 22 immunizations. If a child does not comply by October 15, or by 23 the earlier established date of the current school year, with the requirements of this subsection, then the local school 24 25 authority shall exclude that child from school until such time 26 the child presents proof of having had the health as

examination as required and presents proof of having received 1 2 those required immunizations which are medically possible to receive immediately. During a child's exclusion from school 3 for noncompliance with this subsection, the child's parents or 4 5 legal guardian shall be considered in violation of Section 26-1 and subject to any penalty imposed by Section 26-10. This 6 7 subsection (5) does not apply to dental examinations, eye examinations, and the developmental screening and the social 8 9 and emotional screening portions of the health examination. If 10 the student is an out-of-state transfer student and does not 11 have the proof required under this subsection (5) before 12 October 15 of the current year or whatever date is set by the school district, then he or she may only attend classes (i) if 13 14 he or she has proof that an appointment for the required 15 vaccinations has been scheduled with a party authorized to 16 submit proof of the required vaccinations. If the proof of 17 vaccination required under this subsection (5) is not submitted within 30 days after the student is permitted to 18 attend classes, then the student is not to be permitted to 19 20 attend classes until proof of the vaccinations has been properly submitted. No school district or employee of a school 21 22 district shall be held liable for any injury or illness to 23 another person that results from admitting an out-of-state 24 transfer student to class that has an appointment scheduled 25 pursuant to this subsection (5).

26 (6) Every school shall report to the State Board of

Education by November 15, in the manner which that agency 1 2 shall require, the number of children who have received the 3 necessary immunizations and the health examination (other than examination or eye examination) 4 a dental as required, 5 indicating, of those who have not received the immunizations and examination as required, the number of children who are 6 7 exempt from health examination and immunization requirements 8 on religious or medical grounds as provided in subsection (8). 9 On or before December 1 of each year, every public school 10 district and registered nonpublic school shall make publicly 11 available the immunization data they are required to submit to 12 the State Board of Education by November 15. The immunization data made publicly available must be identical to the data the 13 14 school district or school has reported to the State Board of 15 Education.

16 Every school shall report to the State Board of Education 17 by June 30, in the manner that the State Board requires, the number of children who have received the required dental 18 examination, indicating, of those who have not received the 19 20 required dental examination, the number of children who are exempt from the dental examination on religious grounds as 21 22 provided in subsection (8) of this Section and the number of 23 children who have received a waiver under subsection (1.5) of 24 this Section.

Every school shall report to the State Board of Education by June 30, in the manner that the State Board requires, the

number of children who have received the required 1 eve 2 examination, indicating, of those who have not received the required eye examination, the number of children who are 3 exempt from the eye examination as provided in subsection (8) 4 5 of this Section, the number of children who have received a waiver under subsection (1.10) of this Section, and the total 6 number of children in noncompliance with the eye examination 7 8 requirement.

9 The reported information under this subsection (6) shall 10 be provided to the Department of Public Health by the State 11 Board of Education.

12 (7) Upon determining that the number of pupils who are 13 required to be in compliance with subsection (5) of this Section is below 90% of the number of pupils enrolled in the 14 15 school district, 10% of each State aid payment made pursuant 16 to Section 18-8.05 or 18-8.15 to the school district for such 17 year may be withheld by the State Board of Education until the number of students in compliance with subsection (5) is the 18 19 applicable specified percentage or higher.

(8) Children of parents or legal guardians who object to health, dental, or eye examinations or any part thereof, to immunizations, or to vision and hearing screening tests on religious grounds shall not be required to undergo the examinations, tests, or immunizations to which they so object if such parents or legal guardians present to the appropriate local school authority a signed Certificate of Religious

Exemption detailing the grounds for objection and the specific 1 2 immunizations, tests, or examinations to which they object. 3 The grounds for objection must set forth the specific religious belief that conflicts with the examination, test, 4 5 immunization, or other medical intervention. The signed also reflect the parent's 6 certificate shall or legal 7 guardian's understanding of the school's exclusion policies in 8 of a vaccine-preventable disease outbreak or the case 9 The certificate must also be signed by the exposure. 10 authorized examining health care provider responsible for the 11 performance of the child's health examination confirming that 12 the provider provided education to the parent or legal guardian on the benefits of immunization and the health risks 13 14 to the student and to the community of the communicable 15 diseases for which immunization is required in this State. 16 However, the health care provider's signature on the 17 certificate reflects only that education was provided and does not allow a health care provider grounds to determine a 18 19 religious exemption. Those receiving immunizations required 20 under this Code shall be provided with the relevant vaccine information statements that are required to be disseminated by 21 22 the federal National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, 23 which may contain information on circumstances when a vaccine should not be administered, prior to administering a vaccine. 24 25 healthcare provider may consider including without А 26 limitation the nationally accepted recommendations from

1 federal agencies such as the Advisory Committee on 2 Immunization Practices, the information outlined in the relevant vaccine information statement, and vaccine package 3 along with the healthcare provider's clinical 4 inserts, 5 judgment, to determine whether any child may be more susceptible to experiencing an adverse vaccine reaction than 6 7 the general population, and, if so, the healthcare provider 8 may exempt the child from an immunization or adopt an 9 individualized immunization schedule. The Certificate of 10 Religious Exemption shall be created by the Department of 11 Public Health and shall be made available and used by parents 12 and legal guardians by the beginning of the 2015-2016 school year. Parents or legal guardians must submit the Certificate 13 14 of Religious Exemption to their local school authority prior to entering kindergarten, sixth grade, and ninth grade for 15 16 each child for which they are requesting an exemption. The 17 religious objection stated need not be directed by the tenets of an established religious organization. However, general 18 19 philosophical or moral reluctance to allow physical 20 examinations, eye examinations, immunizations, vision and 21 hearing screenings, or dental examinations does not provide a 22 sufficient basis for an exception to statutory requirements. 23 The local school authority is responsible for determining if the content of the Certificate of Religious 24 Exemption 25 constitutes a valid religious objection. The local school 26 authority shall inform the parent or legal quardian of

exclusion procedures, in accordance with the Department's
 rules under Part 690 of Title 77 of the Illinois
 Administrative Code, at the time the objection is presented.

If the physical condition of the child is such that any one or more of the immunizing agents should not be administered, the examining physician, advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant responsible for the performance of the health examination shall endorse that fact upon the health examination form.

Exempting a child from the health, dental, or eye examination does not exempt the child from participation in the program of physical education training provided in Sections 27-5 through 27-7 of this Code.

(8.5) The school board of a school district shall include 14 informational materials regarding influenza and influenza 15 16 vaccinations and meningococcal disease and meningococcal 17 vaccinations developed, provided, or approved by the Department of Public Health under Section 2310-700 of the 18 Department of Public Health Powers and Duties Law of the Civil 19 Administrative Code of Illinois when the board provides 20 21 immunizations, information on infectious diseases, 22 medications, or other school health issues to the parents or 23 quardians of students.

(9) For the purposes of this Section, "nursery schools"
 means those nursery schools operated by elementary school
 systems or secondary level school units or institutions of
