Findings and declarations. The General 13 Assembly finds and declares all of the following: 14 (1) The revised system of teacher certification 15 16 established under subsection (g) of Section 21-1a of this 17 Code recognizes that the first years of teaching are particularly critical to a teacher's professional 18 development and that teachers who hold Initial Teaching 19 20 Certificates need to develop their knowledge, skills, and

 <u>Certificates.</u>

3 (2) When new teachers are provided with focused 4 professional development opportunities and support and 5 guidance from experienced teachers, a process known as 6 induction and mentoring, the new teachers more quickly 7 and effectively develop the knowledge, skills, and 8 abilities expected of teachers holding Standard Teaching 9 Certificates.

10 (3) To be effective, induction and mentoring 11 programs must be designed to enhance the knowledge, skills, and abilities described in the Illinois 12 Professional Teaching Standards and content area 13 standards. These programs must be based on research and 14 15 best practices, targeted toward a set of clearly defined 16 purposes, and must include mentoring, continuing support 17 and professional development, and regular opportunities for formative assessment of a new teacher. 18

19 <u>(4) In authorizing induction and mentoring</u> 20 programs, it is the intent of the General Assembly to 21 create programs to maximize the development of the 22 knowledge, skills, and abilities of teachers who hold 23 Initial Teaching Certificates and to provide adequate 24 funding for these programs.

26 <u>Sec. 21A-10. Definitions. In this Article:</u>

27 <u>"New teacher" means the holder of an Initial Teaching</u> 28 <u>Certificate, as set forth in Section 21-2 of this Code, who</u> 29 <u>is employed by a public school and who has not previously</u> 30 <u>participated in a new teacher induction and mentoring program</u> 31 <u>required by this Article, except as provided in Section</u> 32 <u>21A-30 of this Code.</u>

the authority of this Code, including without limitation a school district, a charter school, a cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control, and a school operated by a regional office of education.

Sec. 21A-15. Development of program required. During 6 the 2003-2004 school year, each public school or 2 or more 7 public schools acting jointly shall develop, in conjunction 8 with its exclusive representative or their exclusive 9 representatives, if any, a new teacher induction and 10 mentoring program to assist new teachers in developing the 11 12 skills and strategies necessary for instructional excellence, provided that funding is made available by the State Board of 13 14 Education from an appropriation made for this purpose.

15 (105 ILCS 5/21A-20 new)

Sec. 21A-20. When program is to be established and 16 implemented. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this 17 Code, by the beginning of the 2004-2005 school year, each 18 public school or 2 or more public schools acting jointly 19 shall establish and implement, in conjunction with its 20 exclusive representative or their exclusive representatives, 21 22 if any, the new teacher induction and mentoring program as set forth in this Article, provided that funding is made 23 available by the State Board of Education, from an 24 25 appropriation made for this purpose, as described in Section 21A-30 of this Code. 1 at least does all of the following: 2 (1) Assigns a mentor teacher to each new teacher 3 for a period of time established by the public school, 4 which must be for a period of at least 2 school years. (2) Aligns with the Illinois Professional Teaching 5 Standards, content area standards, and applicable local 6 7 school improvement and professional development plans, if 8 <u>any.</u> 9 (3) Addresses all of the following elements and how they will be provided: 10 11 (A) Mentoring of the new teacher. 12 (B) Professional development specifically 13 designed to ensure the growth of the new teacher's knowledge and skills. 14 15 (C) Formative assessment designed to ensure 16 feedback and reflection, which must not be used in 17 any evaluation of the new teacher. (4) Describes the role of mentor teachers, the 18 criteria and process for their selection, and how they 19 will be trained, provided that each mentor teacher shall 20 21 demonstrate the best practices in teaching his or her 22 respective field of practice. 27 <u>Sec. 21A-30.</u> Funding. From a separate appropriation 28 made for the purposes of this Article, for each new teacher 29 participating in a new teacher induction and mentoring 30 program, the State Board of Education shall pay the public 31 school \$1,200 annually for each of 2 school years for the 32 purpose of providing one or more of the following:

33 (1) Mentor teacher compensation.

1 (2) Mentor teacher training or new teacher training 2 or both. 3 (3) Release time. 4 However, if a new teacher, after participating in the new 5 teacher induction and mentoring program for one school year, becomes employed by another public school, the State Board of 6 Education shall pay the teacher's new school \$1,200 for the 7 8 second school year and the teacher shall continue to be a 9 new teacher as defined in this Article. The State Board of Education may retain 16 up to \$1,000,000 of the appropriation for new teacher 17 induction and mentoring programs to train mentor teachers, 18 19 administrators, and other personnel, to provide best practices information, and to conduct an evaluation of these 20 21 programs' impact and effectiveness.

Sec. 21A-35. Evaluation of programs. The State Board of 23 24 Education and the State Teacher Certification Board shall 25 jointly contract with an independent party to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of new teacher induction and 26 mentoring programs established pursuant to this Article. The 27 first report of this evaluation shall be presented to the 28 General Assembly on or before January 1, 2009. Subsequent 29 30 evaluations shall be conducted and reports presented to the General Assembly on or before January 1 of every third year 31 32 thereafter.
