- 17 provide timely results that are meaningful and educationally
- 18 useful for educators, parents, and the broader community;
- 19 therefore
- 20 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,
- 21 represented in the General Assembly:
- 22 Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing
- 23 Section 2-3.64 as follows:
- 24 (105 ILCS 5/2-3.64) (from Ch. 122, par. 2-3.64)
- Sec. 2-3.64. State goals and assessment.
- 26 (a) Beginning in the 1998-1999 school year, the State
- 27 Board of Education shall establish standards and
- 28 periodically, in collaboration with local school districts,
- 29 conduct studies of student performance in the learning areas
- of fine arts and physical development/health.

1 Beginning with the 1998-1999 school year until the 2 2005-2006 school year at the latest, the State Board of Education shall annually test: (i) all pupils enrolled in the 3 4 3rd, 5th, and 8th grades in English language arts (reading, writing, and English grammar) and mathematics; and (ii) all 5 pupils enrolled in the 4th and 7th grades in the biological 6 and physical sciences and the social sciences (history, 7 8 geography, civics, economics, and government). The maximum 9 time allowed for all actual testing required under this paragraph shall not exceed 25 hours, as allocated among the 10 11 required tests by the State Board of Education, across all 12 grades tested. Beginning no later than the 2005-2006 school year, the 13 State Board of Education shall annually test: (i) all pupils 14 enrolled in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades in 15 reading and mathematics; (ii) all pupils enrolled in 3rd, 16 4th, 6th, and 8th grades in writing; (iii) all pupils 17 enrolled in the 4th and 7th grades in the biological and 18 physical sciences; and (iv) all pupils enrolled in 5th and 19 8th grades in the social sciences (history, geography, 20 economics, civics, and government). The State Board of 21 22 Education shall sample student performance in the learning 23 area of physical development and health in grades 4 and 7 through the science tests and in the learning area of fine 24 25 arts in grades 5 and 8 through the social sciences tests. After the addition of subjects and grades as delineated in 26 this paragraph and including whatever other tests that may be 27 approved from time to time no later than the 2005-2006 school 28 year, the maximum time allowed for all State testing in 29 grades 3 through 8 shall not exceed 40 hours across those 30 31 grades. The State Board of Education shall establish the academic 32 33 standards that are to be applicable to pupils who are subject to State tests under this Section beginning with the 34

Each pupil for whom a remediation program is 22 developed under this subsection shall be required to enroll 23 in and attend whatever program the district determines appropriate for the pupil. Districts may combine students in 24 25 remediation programs where appropriate and may cooperate with other districts in the design and delivery of those programs. 26 The parent or guardian of a student required to attend a 27 remediation program under this Section shall be given written 28 29 notice of that requirement by the school 30 reasonable time prior to commencement of the remediation program that the student is to attend. The State shall be 31 32 responsible for providing school districts with the new and additional funding, under Section 2-3.51.5 or by other or 33 34 additional means, that is required to enable the districts to

All pupils who are in a State approved transitional 12 13 bilingual education program or transitional program of instruction shall participate in the State tests. 14 Any 15 student who has been enrolled in a State approved bilingual 16 education program less than 3 cumulative academic years may 17 take an accommodated State test, to be known as the Illinois Measure of Annual Growth in English (IMAGE), shall--be 18 19 exempted if the student's lack of English as determined by an 20 English language proficiency test would keep the student from 21 understanding the regular State test. If the school district determines, on a case-by-case individual basis, that IMAGE 22 23 would likely yield more accurate and reliable information on 24 what the student knows and can do, the school district may 25 make a determination to assess the student using IMAGE for a period that does not exceed 2 additional consecutive years, 26 provided that the student has not yet reached a level of 27 English language proficiency sufficient to yield valid and 28 29 reliable information on what the student knows and can do on 30 the regular State test., -and-that--student's--district--shall 31 have--an--alternative-test-program-in-place-for-that-student. 2 Reasonable accommodations as prescribed by the State Board of Education shall be provided for individual students 3 4 in the testing procedure. All test procedures prescribed by 5 the State Board of Education shall require: (i) that each 6 test used for State and local student testing under this 7 Section identify by name the pupil taking the test; (ii) that the name of the pupil taking the test be placed on the test 8 9 at the time the test is taken; (iii) that the results or scores of each test taken under this Section by a pupil of 10 11 the school district be reported to that district and identify by name the pupil who received the reported results or 12 scores; and (iv) that the results or scores of each test 13 taken under this Section be made available to the parents of 14 In addition, beginning-with-the-2000-2001-school 15 16 year-and in each school year thereafter, the highest scores and--performance--levels attained by a student on the Prairie 17 State Achievement Examination administered under subsection 18 19 (c) of this Section and any Prairie State Achievement Awards received by the student shall become part of the student's 20 2.1 permanent record and shall be entered on the student's transcript pursuant to regulations that the State Board of 22 23 Education shall promulgate for that purpose in accordance with Section 3 and subsection (e) of Section 2 of 24 25 Illinois School Student Records Act. Nothing in this amendatory Act to is intended, nor shall it be construed, nullify, supersede, or contradict the legislative intent on academic testing expressed during the passage of HB 1005/P.A. 90-296.

Each district's 7 improvement plan must address specific activities the 8 district intends to implement to assist pupils who by teacher 9 judgment and test results as prescribed in subsection (a) this Section demonstrate that they are not meeting State 10 11 standards or local objectives. Such activities may include, but shall not be limited to, summer school, extended school 12 day, 13 special homework, tutorial sessions, modified instructional materials, other modifications 14 in t.he 15 instructional program, reduced class size or retention in 16 To assist school districts in testing proficiency in reading in the primary grades, the State Board 17 make optional reading inventories for diagnostic 18 19 purposes available to each school district that requests such 20 assistance.
