AMENDMENT TO HOUSE BILL 2352

2 AMENDMENT NO. ____. Amend House Bill 2352 immediately 3 below the title, by inserting the following:

WHEREAS, The General Assembly supports enhancement of
the current State assessment system in order to develop an
appropriate, high-quality, statewide K-12 assessment system,
based on the Illinois Learning Standards; and

8 WHEREAS, This enhanced statewide assessment system must 9 have a high level of credibility, reliability, and validity 10 and must provide continuity with the assessment system in 11 place prior to the changes made by this amendatory Act of the 12 93rd General Assembly; and

13 WHEREAS, The changes in the assessment system made by this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly are a direct 14 result of the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 15 (Public Law 107-110), which requires the testing of all 16 students as well as enhancements to the system in order to 17 18 provide timely results that are meaningful and educationally useful for educators, parents, and the broader community; 19 therefore"; and 20

21 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the 22 following: "Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing
 Section 2-3.64 as follows:

Sec. 2-3.64. State goals and assessment.

5 (a) Beginning in the 1998-1999 school year, the State 6 Board of Education shall establish standards and 7 periodically, in collaboration with local school districts, 8 conduct studies of student performance in the learning areas 9 of fine arts and physical development/health.

10 Beginning with the 1998-1999 school year until the 2005-2006 school year at the latest, the State Board of 11 Education shall annually test: (i) all pupils enrolled in the 12 3rd, 5th, and 8th grades in English language arts (reading, 13 writing, and English grammar) and mathematics; and (ii) all 14 15 pupils enrolled in the 4th and 7th grades in the biological and physical sciences and the social sciences (history, 16 17 geography, civics, economics, and government). The maximum 18 time allowed for all actual testing required under this paragraph shall not exceed 25 hours, as allocated among the 19 required tests by the State Board of Education, across all 20 21 grades tested.

22 Beginning no later than the 2005-2006 school year, the State Board of Education shall annually test: (i) all pupils 23 24 enrolled in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades in reading and mathematics; (ii) all pupils enrolled in 3rd, 25 4th, 6th, and 8th grades in writing; (iii) all pupils 26 enrolled in the 4th and 7th grades in the biological and 27 physical sciences; and (iv) all pupils enrolled in 5th and 28 8th grades in the social sciences (history, geography, 29 30 economics, civics, and government). The State Board of 31 Education shall sample student performance in the learning area of physical development and health in grades 4 and 7 32 through the science tests and in the learning area of fine 33

1 arts in grades 5 and 8 through the social sciences tests.
2 After the addition of subjects and grades as delineated in
3 this paragraph and including whatever other tests that may be
4 approved from time to time no later than the 2005-2006 school
5 year, the maximum time allowed for all State testing in
6 grades 3 through 8 shall not exceed 40 hours across those
7 grades.

The State Board of Education shall establish the academic 8 9 standards that are to be applicable to pupils who are subject to State tests under this Section beginning with 10 the 11 1998-1999 school year. However, the State Board of Education shall not establish any such standards in final form without 12 first providing opportunities for public participation and 13 input in the development of the final academic 14 local 15 standards. Those opportunities shall include а 16 well-publicized period of public comment, public hearings throughout the State, and opportunities to file written 17 Beginning with the 1998-99 school year and 18 comments. 19 thereafter, the State tests will identify pupils in the 3rd grade or 5th grade who do not meet the State standards. 20

21 If, by performance on the State tests or local 22 assessments or by teacher judgment, a student's performance 23 is determined to be 2 or more grades below current placement, the student shall be provided a remediation program developed 24 25 by the district in consultation with a parent or guardian. Such remediation programs may include, but shall not be 26 limited to, increased or concentrated instructional time, a 27 remedial summer school program of not less than 90 hours, 28 29 improved instructional approaches, tutorial sessions, 30 retention in grade, and modifications to instructional 31 materials. Each pupil for whom a remediation program is 32 developed under this subsection shall be required to enroll in and attend whatever program the district determines is 33 34 appropriate for the pupil. Districts may combine students in

1 remediation programs where appropriate and may cooperate with 2 other districts in the design and delivery of those programs. The parent or guardian of a student required to attend a 3 4 remediation program under this Section shall be given written 5 that requirement by the school notice of district а 6 reasonable time prior to commencement of the remediation 7 program that the student is to attend. The State shall be responsible for providing school districts with the new and 8 9 additional funding, under Section 2-3.51.5 or by other or additional means, that is required to enable the districts to 10 11 operate remediation programs for the pupils who are required to enroll in and attend those programs under this Section. 12 Every individualized educational program as described in 13 Article 14 shall identify if the State test or components 14 15 thereof are appropriate for that student. For-those-pupils 16 for-whom-the--State--tests--or--components--thereof--are--not appropriate, The State Board of Education shall develop rules 17 and regulations governing the administration of alternative 18 19 tests prescribed within each student's individualized educational program which are appropriate to the disability 20 21 of each student.

22 All pupils who are in a State approved transitional 23 education program or transitional program of bilingual instruction shall participate in the State tests. 24 Anv 25 student who has been enrolled in a State approved bilingual 26 education program less than 3 cumulative academic years may take an accommodated State test, to be known as the Illinois 27 Measure of Annual Growth in English (IMAGE), shall--be 28 29 exempted if the student's lack of English as determined by an 30 English language proficiency test would keep the student from 31 understanding the regular State test. If the school district 32 determines, on a case-by-case individual basis, that IMAGE 33 would likely yield more accurate and reliable information on what the student knows and can do, the school district may 34

1 make a determination to assess the student using IMAGE for a 2 period that does not exceed 2 additional consecutive years, 3 provided that the student has not yet reached a level of 4 English language proficiency sufficient to yield valid and 5 reliable information on what the student knows and can do on the regular State test.,-and-that--student's--district--shall 6 7 have--an--alternative-test-program-in-place-for-that-student. 8 The-State-Board-of-Education-shall-appoint-a--task--force--of 9 concerned--parents,-teachers,-school-administrators-and-other 10 professionals--to--assist--in--identifying--such--alternative 11 tests.

12 Reasonable accommodations as prescribed by the State 13 Board of Education shall be provided for individual students in the testing procedure. All test procedures prescribed by 14 15 the State Board of Education shall require: (i) that each 16 test used for State and local student testing under this Section identify by name the pupil taking the test; (ii) that 17 the name of the pupil taking the test be placed on the test 18 19 at the time the test is taken; (iii) that the results or 20 scores of each test taken under this Section by a pupil of 21 the school district be reported to that district and identify 22 by name the pupil who received the reported results or 23 and (iv) that the results or scores of each test scores; taken under this Section be made available to the parents of 24 25 the pupil. In addition, beginning-with-the-2000-2001-school year-and in each school year thereafter, the highest scores 26 27 and--performance--levels attained by a student on the Prairie State Achievement Examination administered under subsection 28 29 (c) of this Section and any Prairie State Achievement Awards received by the student shall become part of the student's 30 permanent record and shall be entered on the student's 31 transcript pursuant to regulations that the State Board of 32 33 Education shall promulgate for that purpose in accordance with Section 3 and subsection (e) of Section 2 of the 34

Illinois School Student Records Act. Beginning with the
 1998-1999 school year and in every school year thereafter,
 scores received by students on the State assessment tests
 administered in grades 3 through 8 shall be placed into
 students' temporary records.

6 The State Board of Education shall establish a period of time, to be referred to as the State test window, common 7 month in each school year for which State testing shall occur 8 9 to meet the objectives of this Section. However, if the schools of a district are closed and classes are not 10 11 scheduled during any week that is established by the State 12 Board of Education as the State test window week-of-the-month when-State-testing-under-this-Section-shall-occur, the school 13 district may (at the discretion of the State Board of 14 15 Education) move its State test window one week earlier or one 16 week later than the established State test window, administer 17 the-required--State--testing--at--any--time--up--to--2--weeks following---the--week--established--by--the--State--Board--of 18 19 Education-for-the-testing, so long as the school district gives the State Board of Education written notice of its 20 intention to deviate from the established schedule 21 by 22 December 1 of the school year in which falls the State test 23 window week established by the State Board of Education for the testing. (a-5) All tests administered pursuant to this Section 28 29 shall be academically based. For the purposes of this 30 Section "academically based tests" shall mean tests consisting of questions and answers that are measurable and 31 32 quantifiable to measure the knowledge, skill, and ability of students in the subject matters covered by tests. 33 The 34 scoring of academically based tests shall be reliable, valid,

1 unbiased and shall meet the guidelines for test development 2 and use prescribed by the American Psychological Association, the National Council of Measurement and Evaluation, and the 3 4 American Educational Research Association. Academically based shall not include assessments or evaluations of 5 tests attitudes, values, or beliefs, or testing of personality, 6 7 self-esteem, or self-concept. Nothing in this amendatory Act 8 is intended, nor shall it be construed, to nullify, supersede, or contradict the legislative intent on academic 9 10 testing expressed during the passage of HB 1005/P.A. 90-296. 1 assessments or in other assessments in order to demonstrate, 2 or---extend---the--use--of--such--questions--to--other--State 3 assessments,-unless-this-pilot-project-demonstrates that the 4 use of short answer questions results in a statistically 5 significant improvement in student achievement as measured on б the State assessments for math and reading or on other State 7 assessments and is justifiable in terms of cost and student 8 performance.

9 It shall be the policy of the State to encourage (b) school districts to continuously test pupil proficiency in 10 11 the fundamental learning areas in order to: (i) provide information on individual students' performance 12 timely relative to State standards that is adequate to guide 13 instructional strategies; (ii) improve future instruction; 14 15 and (iii) complement the information provided by the State 16 testing system described in this Section. Each district's school improvement plan must address specific activities the 17 district intends to implement to assist pupils who by teacher 18 judgment and test results as prescribed in subsection (a) of 19 20 this Section demonstrate that they are not meeting State 21 standards or local objectives. Such activities may include, 22 but shall not be limited to, summer school, extended school 23 special homework, tutorial sessions, modified day, other modifications 24 instructional materials, in the 25 instructional program, reduced class size or retention in To assist school districts in testing 26 grade. pupil 27 proficiency in reading in the primary grades, the State Board make optional reading inventories for diagnostic 28 shall 29 purposes available to each school district that requests such 30 assistance. Districts that administer the reading inventories may develop remediation programs for students who 31 32 perform in the bottom half of the student population. 5 (c) Beginning with the 2000-2001 school year, each 6 school district that operates a high school program for 7 students in grades 9 through 12 shall annually administer the Prairie State Achievement Examination established under this 8 9 subsection to its students as set forth below. The Prairie State Achievement Examination shall be developed by the State 10 11 Board of Education to measure student performance in the academic areas of reading, writing, mathematics, science, and 12 The State Board of Education shall 13 social sciences. establish the academic standards that are to apply in 14 15 measuring student performance on the Prairie State 16 Achievement Examination including the minimum examination score in each area that will qualify a student to receive a 17 Prairie State Achievement Award from the State in recognition 18 19 of the student's excellent performance. Each school district subject to the requirements of this subsection (c) 20 that is 21 shall afford all students 2 opportunities to take the Prairie 22 State Achievement Examination beginning as late as practical 23 during the second semester of grade 11, but in no event before March 1. The State Board of Education shall annually 24 25 notify districts of the weeks during which these test 26 administrations shall be required to occur. Every individualized educational program as described in Article 14 27 shall identify if the Prairie State Achievement Examination 28 29 or components thereof are appropriate for that student. Each 30 student, exclusive of a student whose individualized educational program developed under Article 14 identifies the 31 32 Prairie State Achievement Examination as inappropriate for 33 the student, shall be required to take the examination in 34 grade 11. For each academic area the State Board of

1 Education shall establish the score that qualifies for the 2 Prairie State Achievement Award on that portion of the examination. Any student who fails to earn a qualifying 3 4 score for a Prairie State Achievement Award in any one or more of the academic areas on the initial test administration 5 or who wishes to improve his or her score on any portion of 6 7 the examination shall be permitted to retake such portion or 8 portions of the examination during grade 12. Districts shall 9 inform their students of the timelines and procedures 10 applicable to their participation in every yearly administration of the Prairie State Achievement Examination. 11 12 Students receiving special education services whose individualized educational programs identify the Prairie 13 State Achievement Examination as inappropriate for them 14 15 nevertheless shall have the option of taking the examination, 16 which shall be administered to those students in accordance with standards adopted by the State Board of Education to 17 accommodate the respective disabilities of those students. A 18 student who successfully completes all other applicable high 19 20 school graduation requirements but fails to receive a score 21 on the Prairie State Achievement Examination that qualifies 22 the student for receipt of a Prairie State Achievement Award 23 shall nevertheless qualify for the receipt of a regular high 24 school diploma.

25 Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, (d) all schools in this State that are part of the sample drawn by 26 27 the National Center for Education Statistics, in collaboration with their school districts and the State Board 28 29 Education, shall administer the biennial State academic of 30 assessments of 4th and 8th grade reading and mathematics under the National Assessment of Educational Progress carried 31 32 out under Section mll(b)(2) of the National Education Statistics Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 9010) if the Secretary of 33 34 Education pays the costs of administering the assessments.

1 (e) Beginning no later than the 2005-2006 school year, subject to available federal funds to this State for the 2 purpose of student assessment, the State Board of Education 3 4 shall provide additional tests and assessment resources that may be used by school districts for local diagnostic 5 purposes. These tests and resources shall include without 6 limitation additional high school writing, physical 7 development and health, and fine arts assessments. The State 8 9 Board of Education shall annually distribute a listing of these additional tests and resources, using funds available 10 from appropriations made for student assessment purposes. 11

(f) For the assessment and accountability purposes of 12 this Section, "all pupils" includes those pupils enrolled in 13 a public or State-operated elementary school, secondary 14 15 school, or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or board of control, a charter school operating in 16 compliance with the Charter Schools Law, a school operated by 17 a regional office of education under Section 13A-3 of this 18 Code, a public university laboratory school, Department of 19 Corrections School District 428, a residential school 20 operated by a State agency, and the Illinois Mathematics and 21 22 Science Academy.
