1 AN ACT concerning dentistry. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 2 3 represented in the General Assembly: Section 5. The Illinois Dental Practice Act is amended 4 by changing Section 18 as follows: 5 б (225 ILCS 25/18) (from Ch. 111, par. 2318) (Section scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2006) 7 8 Sec. 18. Acts Constituting the Practice of Dental Hygiene. Limitations. A dental hygienist may be employed or 9 engaged only: 10 (a) Under the supervision of a dentist: 11 In the office of a dentist; 12 (1) 13 (2) By a federal, State, county or municipal agency or institution; 14 (3) By a public or private school; or 15 16 (4) By a public clinic operating under the direction of a hospital or federal, State, county, 17 18 municipal or other public agency or institution. When employed or engaged pursuant to this paragraph (a) a 19 20 dental hygienist may perform the following procedures and 21 acts: 22 (i) the operative procedure of dental hygiene, consisting of oral prophylactic procedures; 23 (ii) the exposure and processing of X-Ray 24 25 films of the teeth and surrounding structures; (iii) the application to the surfaces of the 26 27 teeth or gums of chemical compounds designed to be desensitizing agents or effective agents in the 28 prevention of dental caries or periodontal disease; 29 (iv) all services which may be performed by a 30 dental assistant as specified by rule pursuant to 31

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Section 17;

2 (v) administration and monitoring of nitrous
3 oxide upon successful completion of a training
4 program approved by the Department;

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5 (vi) administration of local anesthetics upon 6 successful completion of a training program approved 7 by the Department; and

8 (vii) such other procedures and acts as shall 9 be prescribed by rule or regulation of the 10 Department.

11 (b) Under the general supervision of a dentist in a long-term care facility licensed by the State of 12 Illinois, or a mental health or developmental disability 13 facility operated by the Department of Human Services, if 14 the patient is unable to travel to a dental office 15 16 because of illness or infirmity. The dentist shall personally examine and diagnose the patient and determine 17 which services are necessary to be performed, which shall 18 be contained in a written order to the hygienist. 19 Such order must be implemented within 120 90 days of its 20 21 issuance, and an updated medical history and oral inspection must be performed by the hygienist immediately 22 23 prior to beginning the procedures to ensure that the patient's health has not changed in any manner to warrant 24 a reexamination by the dentist. 25

26 (c) Without the supervision of a dentist, a dental
27 hygienist may perform dental health education functions
28 and may record case histories and oral conditions
29 observed.

The number of dental hygienists practicing in a dental office shall not exceed, at any one time, 4 times the number of dentists practicing in the office at the time.
