AN ACT in relation to the regulation of professions.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Illinois Physical Therapy Act is amended
by changing Sections 8 and 8.1 as follows:

8 Sec. 8. Qualifications for licensure as a Physical
9 Therapist.

10 (a) A person is qualified to receive a license as a 11 physical therapist if that person has applied in writing, on 12 forms prescribed by the Department, has paid the required 13 fees, and meets all of the following requirements:

14 (1) He or she is at least 18 years of age and of
15 good moral character. In determining moral character, the
16 Department may take into consideration any felony
17 conviction of the applicant, but such a conviction shall
18 not operate automatically as a complete bar to a license.

19 (2) <u>A person applying for licensure after the</u> 20 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly must have a post-baccalaureate degree from a 21 22 college or university physical therapy education program 23 approved by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical 24 Therapy Education. A person who graduated from a physical therapy program outside the United States or its 25 territories must submit evidence that his or her 26 27 educational background is substantially equivalent to a 28 post-baccalaureate degree from a Commission on 29 Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education approved physical therapy educational program and conferred by a 30 31 regionally accredited college or university in the United

He-or-she-has-graduated-from-a-curriculum-in 2 physical---therapy---approved---by--the--Department----In 3 approving--a--curriculum---in---physical---therapy,---the 4 Department---shall---consider,---but--not--be--bound--by, 5 accreditation--by--the--Commission--on--Accreditation--in Physical-Therapy-Education---A-person-who-graduated--from 6 7 a--physical--therapy-program-outside-the-United-States-or 8 its-territories-shall-have-his-or-her-degree-validated-as 9 equivalent-to-a-physical-therapy-degree--conferred--by--a regionally-accredited-college-or-university-in-the-United 10 11 States. The Department may establish by rule a method 12 for the completion of course deficiencies.

13 (3) He or she has passed an examination approved by the Department to determine his fitness for practice as a 14 15 physical therapist, or is entitled to be licensed without 16 examination as provided in Sections 10 and 11 of this Act. A person who graduated from a physical therapy 17 program outside the United States or its territories and 18 19 first language is not English shall submit whose 20 certification of passage of the Test of English as a 21 Foreign Language (TOEFL) and the Test of Spoken English 22 (TSE) as defined by rule prior to taking the licensure 23 examination.

(b) The Department reserves the right and may request a
personal interview of an applicant before the Committee to
further evaluate his or her qualifications for a license.

therapist assistant. A person is qualified to receive a
license as a physical therapist assistant if that person has

2 (1) Is at least 18 years of age and of good moral 3 character. In determining moral character, the 4 Department may take into consideration any felony conviction of the applicant, but such a conviction shall 5 not operate automatically as a complete bar to a license; 6 7 (2) Has graduated from a 2 year college-level 8 physical therapist therapy assistant program accredited 9 by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy 10 Education. (3) Has successfully completed the examination
authorized by the Department. A person who graduated
from a physical therapy assistant program outside the
United States or its territories and whose first language
is not English shall submit certification of passage of
the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and the
Test of Spoken English (TSE) as defined by rule prior to
