AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 254 1 2 AMENDMENT NO. \_\_\_\_. Amend Senate Bill 254 by replacing 3 everything after the enacting clause with the following: 4 "Section 5. The Illinois Physical Therapy Act is amended 5 by changing Sections 8 and 8.1 as follows: (225 ILCS 90/8) (from Ch. 111, par. 4258) 6 (Section scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2006) 7 Sec. 8. Qualifications for licensure as a Physical 8 9 Therapist. 10 (a) A person is qualified to receive a license as a 11 physical therapist if that person has applied in writing, on forms prescribed by the Department, has paid the required 12 fees, and meets all of the following requirements: 13 14 (1) He or she is at least 18 years of age and of good moral character. In determining moral character, the 15 Department may take into consideration 16 any felony conviction of the applicant, but such a conviction shall 17 not operate automatically as a complete bar to a license. 18 (2) <u>A person applying for licensure after the</u> 19 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General 20 21 Assembly must have a post-baccalaureate degree from a 22 college or university physical therapy education program

1 approved by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical 2 Therapy Education. A person who graduated from a 3 physical therapy program outside the United States or its 4 territories must submit evicence that his or her 5 educational background is substantially equivalent to a post-baccalaureate degree from a Commission on 6 Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education approved 7 8 physical therapy educational program and conferred by a 9 regionally accredited college or university in the United 10 States. He--or--she--has--graduated-from-a-curriculum-in 11 physical--therapy--approved--by---the---Department----In 12 approving---a---curriculum---in---physical--therapy,--the 13 Department--shall--consider,--but--not---be---bound---by, accreditation--by--the--Commission--on--Accreditation--in 14 15 Physical--Therapy-Education---A-person-who-graduated-from 16 a-physical-therapy-program-outside-the-United--States--or 17 its-territories-shall-have-his-or-her-degree-validated-as equivalent--to--a--physical-therapy-degree-conferred-by-a 18 regionally-accredited-college-or-university-in-the-United 19 20 States. The Department may establish by rule a method 21 for the completion of course deficiencies.

22 (3) He or she has passed an examination approved by the Department to determine his fitness for practice as a 23 physical therapist, or is entitled to be licensed without 24 25 examination as provided in Sections 10 and 11 of this Act. A person who graduated from a physical therapy 26 27 program outside the United States or its territories and whose first language is not English 28 shall submit 29 certification of passage of the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and the Test of Spoken English 30 (TSE) as defined by rule prior to taking the licensure 31 examination. 32

33 (b) The Department reserves the right and may request a34 personal interview of an applicant before the Committee to

further evaluate his or her qualifications for a license.

5 Sec. 8.1. Qualifications for licensure as a physical 6 therapist assistant. A person is qualified to receive a 7 license as a physical therapist assistant if that person has 8 applied in writing, on forms prescribed by the Department, 9 has paid the required fees and:

10 (1) Is at least 18 years of age and of good moral 11 character. In determining moral character, the 12 Department may take into consideration any felony 13 conviction of the applicant, but such a conviction shall 14 not operate automatically as a complete bar to a license;

15 (2) Has graduated from a 2 year college-level 16 physical therapist therapy assistant program accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy 17 Education. A person who graduated from a physical 18 therapy assistant program outside the United States or 19 its territories must submit evidence that his or her 20 21 educational background is substantially equivalent to a Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education 22 23 program and conferred by a regionally accredited college or university in the United States. approved-by-the 24 25 Department----In--approving--such--a--physical--therapist 26 assistant-program-the-Department-shall-consider--but--not be---bound---by---accreditation---by--the--Commission--on 27 28 Accreditation-in-Physical-Therapy-Education---Any--person who--graduated--from-a-physical-therapy-assistant-program 29 30 outside-the-United-States-or-its-territories--shall--have his--or--her-degree-validated-as-equivalent-to-a-physical 31 therapy--assistant--degree--conferred--by--a---regionally 32 accredited--college--or--university-in-the-United-States. 33

A person who graduated 5 from a physical therapy assistant program outside the United States or its territories and whose first language б 7 is not English shall submit certification of passage of the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and the 8 9 Test of Spoken English (TSE) as defined by rule prior to 10 taking the licensure examination.
