AN ACT concerning taxes.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Illinois Municipal Code is amended by 5 changing Sections 11-74.4-3 and 11-74.4-7 as follows:

6 (65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-3) (from Ch. 24, par. 11-74.4-3)

Sec. 11-74.4-3. Definitions. The following terms,
wherever used or referred to in this Division 74.4 shall have
the following respective meanings, unless in any case a
different meaning clearly appears from the context.

(a) For any redevelopment project area that has been designated pursuant to this Section by an ordinance adopted prior to November 1, 1999 (the effective date of Public Act 91-478), "blighted area" shall have the meaning set forth in this Section prior to that date.

16 On and after November 1, 1999, "blighted area" means any 17 improved or vacant area within the boundaries of a 18 redevelopment project area located within the territorial 19 limits of the municipality where:

20 (1) If improved, industrial, commercial, and residential buildings or improvements are detrimental to 21 22 the public safety, health, or welfare because of a combination of 5 or more of the following factors, each 23 of which is (i) present, with that presence documented, 24 to a meaningful extent so that a municipality may 25 reasonably find that the factor is clearly present within 26 27 the intent of the Act and (ii) reasonably distributed throughout the improved part of the redevelopment project 28 29 area:

30 (A) Dilapidation. An advanced state of31 disrepair or neglect of necessary repairs to the

1 primary structural components of buildings or 2 improvements in such a combination that a documented 3 building condition analysis determines that major 4 repair is required or the defects are so serious and 5 so extensive that the buildings must be removed.

6 (B) Obsolescence. The condition or process of 7 falling into disuse. Structures have become 8 ill-suited for the original use.

9 (C) Deterioration. With respect to buildings, defects including, but not limited to, major defects 10 11 in the secondary building components such as doors, 12 windows, porches, gutters and downspouts, and fascia. With respect to surface improvements, that 13 the condition of roadways, alleys, curbs, gutters, 14 15 sidewalks, off-street parking, and surface storage 16 areas evidence deterioration, including, but not 17 limited to, surface cracking, crumbling, potholes, depressions, loose paving material, and weeds 18 protruding through paved surfaces. 19

20 (D) Presence of structures below minimum code 21 standards. All structures that do not meet the 22 standards of zoning, subdivision, building, fire, 23 and other governmental codes applicable to property, 24 but not including housing and property maintenance 25 codes.

(E) Illegal use of individual structures. The
use of structures in violation of applicable
federal, State, or local laws, exclusive of those
applicable to the presence of structures below
minimum code standards.

31 (F) Excessive vacancies. The presence of
32 buildings that are unoccupied or under-utilized and
33 that represent an adverse influence on the area
34 because of the frequency, extent, or duration of the

1 vacancies.

2 (G) Lack of ventilation, light, or sanitary facilities. The absence of adequate ventilation for 3 4 light or air circulation in spaces or rooms without 5 windows, or that require the removal of dust, odor, gas, smoke, or other noxious airborne materials. 6 7 Inadequate natural light and ventilation means the 8 absence of skylights or windows for interior spaces 9 or rooms and improper window sizes and amounts by room area to window area ratios. 10 Inadequate 11 sanitary facilities refers to the absence or 12 inadequacy of garbage storage and enclosure, bathroom facilities, hot water and kitchens, and 13 structural inadequacies preventing 14 ingress and 15 egress to and from all rooms and units within a 16 building.

(H) Inadequate utilities. 17 Underground and overhead utilities such as storm sewers and storm 18 drainage, sanitary sewers, water lines, and gas, 19 20 telephone, and electrical services that are shown to 21 be inadequate. Inadequate utilities are those that are: (i) of insufficient capacity to serve the uses 22 23 redevelopment project area, in the (ii) deteriorated, antiquated, obsolete, or in disrepair, 24 25 or (iii) lacking within the redevelopment project 26 area.

(I) Excessive land coverage and overcrowding 27 of structures and community facilities. 28 The 29 over-intensive use of property and the crowding of 30 buildings and accessory facilities onto a site. 31 Examples of problem conditions warranting the designation of an area as one exhibiting excessive 32 33 land coverage are: (i) the presence of buildings 34 either improperly situated on parcels or located on

1 parcels of inadequate size and shape in relation to 2 present-day standards of development for health and safety and (ii) the presence of multiple buildings 3 4 on a single parcel. For there to be a finding of excessive land coverage, these parcels must exhibit 5 more of the following conditions: 6 one or 7 insufficient provision for light and air within or 8 around buildings, increased threat of spread of fire 9 the close proximity of buildings, lack of due to adequate or proper access to a public right-of-way, 10 11 lack of reasonably required off-street parking, or 12 inadequate provision for loading and service.

(J) Deleterious land use or layout. The
existence of incompatible land-use relationships,
buildings occupied by inappropriate mixed-uses, or
uses considered to be noxious, offensive, or
unsuitable for the surrounding area.

(K) Environmental clean-up. The 18 proposed redevelopment project area has incurred Illinois 19 Environmental Protection Agency or United States 20 21 Environmental Protection Agency remediation costs 22 for, or a study conducted by an independent 23 consultant recognized as having expertise in environmental remediation has determined a need for, 24 25 clean-up of hazardous waste, hazardous the substances, or underground storage tanks required by 26 State or federal law, provided that the remediation 27 costs constitute a material impediment to the 28 29 development or redevelopment of the redevelopment 30 project area.

31 (L) Lack of community planning. The proposed
32 redevelopment project area was developed prior to or
33 without the benefit or guidance of a community plan.
34 This means that the development occurred prior to

1 the adoption by the municipality of a comprehensive 2 or other community plan or that the plan was not followed at the time of the area's development. 3 4 This factor must be documented by evidence of 5 adverse or incompatible land-use relationships, inadequate street layout, improper subdivision, 6 7 inadequate shape and size to parcels of meet 8 contemporary development standards, or other 9 evidence demonstrating an absence of effective community planning. 10

11 (M) The total equalized assessed value of the 12 proposed redevelopment project area has declined for 3 of the last 5 calendar years prior to the year in 13 which the redevelopment project area is designated 14 15 or is increasing at an annual rate that is less than 16 the balance of the municipality for 3 of the last 5 calendar years for which information is available or 17 is increasing at an annual rate that is less than 18 the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers 19 published by the United States Department of Labor 20 21 or successor agency for 3 of the last 5 calendar 22 years prior to the year in which the redevelopment 23 project area is designated.

24 (2) If vacant, the sound growth of the redevelopment project area is impaired by a combination 25 2 or more of the following factors, each of which is 26 of 27 present, with that presence documented, (i) to а meaningful extent so that a municipality may reasonably 28 29 find that the factor is clearly present within the intent of the Act and (ii) reasonably distributed throughout the 30 31 vacant part of the redevelopment project area to which it pertains: 32

33 (A) Obsolete platting of vacant land that34 results in parcels of limited or narrow size or

1 configurations of parcels of irregular size or shape 2 that would be difficult to develop on a planned basis and in a manner compatible with contemporary 3 4 standards and requirements, or platting that failed to create rights-of-ways for streets or alleys or 5 that created inadequate right-of-way widths for 6 7 streets, alleys, or other public rights-of-way or that omitted easements for public utilities. 8

9 (B) Diversity of ownership of parcels of 10 vacant land sufficient in number to retard or impede 11 the ability to assemble the land for development.

12 (C) Tax and special assessment delinquencies 13 exist or the property has been the subject of tax 14 sales under the Property Tax Code within the last 5 15 years.

16 (D) Deterioration of structures or site
17 improvements in neighboring areas adjacent to the
18 vacant land.

(E) The area has incurred Illinois 19 Environmental Protection Agency or United States 20 21 Environmental Protection Agency remediation costs 22 for, or a study conducted by an independent consultant recognized as having expertise in 23 environmental remediation has determined a need for, 24 25 clean-up of hazardous waste, hazardous the substances, or underground storage tanks required by 26 State or federal law, provided that the remediation 27 costs constitute a material impediment to the 28 29 development or redevelopment of the redevelopment 30 project area.

31 (F) The total equalized assessed value of the
32 proposed redevelopment project area has declined for
33 3 of the last 5 calendar years prior to the year in
34 which the redevelopment project area is designated

1 or is increasing at an annual rate that is less than 2 the balance of the municipality for 3 of the last 5 calendar years for which information is available or 3 4 increasing at an annual rate that is less than is the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers 5 published by the United States Department of Labor 6 7 or successor agency for 3 of the last 5 calendar years prior to the year in which the redevelopment 8 9 project area is designated.

(3) If vacant, the sound growth 10 of the 11 redevelopment project area is impaired by one of the following factors that (i) is present, with that presence 12 documented, to a meaningful extent so that a municipality 13 may reasonably find that the factor is clearly present 14 15 within the intent of the Act and (ii) is reasonably 16 distributed throughout the vacant part of the redevelopment project area to which it pertains: 17

18 (A) The area consists of one or more unused19 quarries, mines, or strip mine ponds.

20 (B) The area consists of unused railyards,
21 rail tracks, or railroad rights-of-way.

(C) The area, prior to its designation, is
subject to chronic flooding that adversely impacts
on real property in the area as certified by a
registered professional engineer or appropriate
regulatory agency.

(D) The area consists of an unused or illegal
disposal site containing earth, stone, building
debris, or similar materials that were removed from
construction, demolition, excavation, or dredge
sites.

32 (E) Prior to November 1, 1999, the area is not 33 less than 50 nor more than 100 acres and 75% of 34 which is vacant (notwithstanding that the area has 1 been used for commercial agricultural purposes 2 within 5 years prior to the designation of the redevelopment project area), and the area meets at 3 4 least one of the factors itemized in paragraph (1) of this subsection, the area has been designated as 5 village center by ordinance 6 a town or or 7 comprehensive plan adopted prior to January 1, 1982, 8 and the area has not been developed for that 9 designated purpose.

10 (F) The area qualified as a blighted improved 11 area immediately prior to becoming vacant, unless 12 there has been substantial private investment in the 13 immediately surrounding area.

14 (b) For any redevelopment project area that has been 15 designated pursuant to this Section by an ordinance adopted 16 prior to November 1, 1999 (the effective date of Public Act 17 91-478), "conservation area" shall have the meaning set forth 18 in this Section prior to that date.

On and after November 1, 1999, "conservation area" means 19 any improved area within the boundaries of a redevelopment 20 21 project area located within the territorial limits of the 22 municipality in which 50% or more of the structures in the 23 area have an age of 35 years or more. Such an area is not yet a blighted area but because of a combination of 3 or more 24 25 of the following factors is detrimental to the public safety, health, morals or welfare and such an area may become a 26 blighted area: 27

(1) Dilapidation. An advanced state of disrepair
or neglect of necessary repairs to the primary structural
components of buildings or improvements in such a
combination that a documented building condition analysis
determines that major repair is required or the defects
are so serious and so extensive that the buildings must
be removed.

1 (2) Obsolescence. The condition or process of 2 falling into disuse. Structures have become ill-suited 3 for the original use.

4 (3) Deterioration. With respect to buildings, defects including, but not limited to, major defects in 5 the secondary building components such as doors, windows, 6 7 gutters and downspouts, and fascia. porches, With 8 respect to surface improvements, that the condition of 9 roadways, alleys, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, off-street surface storage 10 parking, and areas evidence 11 deterioration, including, but not limited to, surface 12 cracking, crumbling, potholes, depressions, loose paving 13 material, and weeds protruding through paved surfaces.

14 (4) Presence of structures below minimum code
15 standards. All structures that do not meet the standards

19 (5) Illegal use of individual structures. The use
20 of structures in violation of applicable federal, State,
21 or local laws, exclusive of those applicable to the
22 presence of structures below minimum code standards.

23 (6) Excessive vacancies. The presence of buildings
24 that are unoccupied or under-utilized and that represent
25 an adverse influence on the area because of the
26 frequency, extent, or duration of the vacancies.

of ventilation, 27 (7) Lack light, or sanitary facilities. The absence of adequate ventilation for 28 light or air circulation in spaces or rooms without 29 30 windows, or that require the removal of dust, odor, gas, smoke, or other noxious airborne materials. Inadequate 31 natural light and ventilation means the absence or 32 inadequacy of skylights or windows for interior spaces or 33 34 rooms and improper window sizes and amounts by room area 1 to window area ratios. Inadequate sanitary facilities 2 refers to the absence or inadequacy of garbage storage 3 and enclosure, bathroom facilities, hot water and 4 kitchens, and structural inadequacies preventing ingress 5 and egress to and from all rooms and units within a 6 building.

7 (8) Inadequate utilities. Underground and overhead 8 utilities such as storm sewers and storm drainage, 9 sanitary sewers, water lines, and gas, telephone, and electrical services that are shown to be inadequate. 10 11 Inadequate utilities are those that are: (i) of 12 insufficient capacity to serve the uses in the (ii) 13 redevelopment project area, deteriorated, antiquated, obsolete, or in disrepair, or (iii) lacking 14 15 within the redevelopment project area.

16 (9) Excessive land coverage and overcrowding of structures and community facilities. The over-intensive 17 use of property and the crowding of buildings and 18 accessory facilities onto a site. Examples of problem 19 conditions warranting the designation of an area as one 20 21 exhibiting excessive land coverage are: the presence of 22 buildings either improperly situated on parcels or 23 located on parcels of inadequate size and shape in relation to present-day standards of development for 24 health and safety and the presence of multiple buildings 25 on a single parcel. For there to be a finding of 26 excessive land coverage, these parcels must exhibit one 27 of the following conditions: insufficient 28 or more provision for light and air within or around buildings, 29 30 increased threat of spread of fire due to the close proximity of buildings, lack of adequate or proper access 31 to a public right-of-way, lack of reasonably required 32 off-street parking, or inadequate provision for loading 33 34 and service.

1 (10) Deleterious land use or layout. The existence 2 of incompatible land-use relationships, buildings occupied by inappropriate mixed-uses, or uses considered 3 4 to noxious, offensive, or unsuitable for the be 5 surrounding area.

(11) Lack of community planning. The proposed 6 7 redevelopment project area was developed prior to or 8 without the benefit or guidance of a community plan. This 9 means that the development occurred prior to the adoption by the municipality of a comprehensive or other community 10 11 plan or that the plan was not followed at the time of the area's development. This factor must be documented by 12 or 13 evidence of adverse incompatible land-use inadequate 14 relationships, street layout, improper 15 subdivision, parcels of inadequate shape and size to meet 16 contemporary development standards, or other evidence demonstrating an absence of effective community planning. 17

(12) The area has incurred Illinois Environmental 18 19 Protection Agency or United States Environmental Protection Agency remediation costs for, or a study 20 21 conducted by an independent consultant recognized as 22 having expertise in environmental remediation has 23 determined a need for, the clean-up of hazardous waste, 24 hazardous substances, or underground storage tanks 25 required by State or federal law, provided that the remediation costs constitute a material impediment to the 26 development or redevelopment of the redevelopment project 27 28 area.

(13) The total equalized assessed value of the proposed redevelopment project area has declined for 3 of the last 5 calendar years for which information is available or is increasing at an annual rate that is less than the balance of the municipality for 3 of the last 5 calendar years for which information is available or is increasing at an annual rate that is less than the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers published by the United States Department of Labor or successor agency for 3 of the last 5 calendar years for which information is available.

(c) "Industrial park" means an area in a blighted or 6 7 conservation area suitable for use by any manufacturing, 8 industrial, research or transportation enterprise, of 9 facilities to include but not be limited to factories, mills, processing plants, assembly plants, packing plants, 10 11 fabricating plants, industrial distribution centers, warehouses, repair overhaul or service facilities, freight 12 terminals, research facilities, test facilities or railroad 13 facilities. 14

(d) "Industrial park conservation area" means 15 an area 16 within the boundaries of a redevelopment project area located within the territorial limits of a municipality that is a 17 labor surplus municipality or within 1 1/2 miles of the 18 19 territorial limits of a municipality that is a labor surplus municipality if the area is annexed to the municipality; 20 21 which area is zoned as industrial no later than at the time 22 the municipality by ordinance designates the redevelopment 23 project area, and which area includes both vacant land suitable for use as an industrial park and a blighted area or 24 25 conservation area contiguous to such vacant land.

(e) "Labor surplus municipality" means a municipality in 26 which, at any time during the 6 months 27 before the municipality by ordinance designates an industrial 28 park 29 conservation area, the unemployment rate was over 6% and was 30 also 100% or more of the national average unemployment rate for that same time as published in the United States 31 32 Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics publication 33 entitled "The Employment Situation" or its successor 34 publication. For the purpose of this subsection, if

unemployment rate statistics for the municipality are not available, the unemployment rate in the municipality shall be deemed to be the same as the unemployment rate in the principal county in which the municipality is located.

5 (f) "Municipality" shall mean a city, village or6 incorporated town.

7 (g) "Initial Sales Tax Amounts" means the amount of 8 taxes paid under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, Use Tax 9 Act, Service Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, the 10 Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, and the Municipal 11 Service Occupation Tax Act by retailers and servicemen on 12 transactions at places located in a State Sales Tax Boundary 13 during the calendar year 1985.

"Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts" 14 (g-1) means the 15 amount of taxes paid under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, 16 Use Tax Act, Service Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, the Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, 17 and the Service Occupation Tax Act by retailers and 18 Municipal 19 servicemen on transactions at places located within the State Sales Tax Boundary revised pursuant to Section 11-74.4-8a(9) 20 21 of this Act.

22 (h) "Municipal Sales Tax Increment" means an amount 23 equal to the increase in the aggregate amount of taxes paid to a municipality from the Local Government Tax Fund arising 24 25 from sales by retailers and servicemen within the redevelopment project area or State Sales Tax Boundary, as 26 27 the case may be, for as long as the redevelopment project area or State Sales Tax Boundary, as the case may be, exist 28 29 over and above the aggregate amount of taxes as certified by 30 the Illinois Department of Revenue and paid under the Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax Act and the Municipal 31 32 Service Occupation Tax Act by retailers and servicemen, on 33 transactions places of business located in the at 34 redevelopment project area or State Sales Tax Boundary, as

1 the case may be, during the base year which shall be the 2 calendar year immediately prior to the year in which the municipality adopted tax increment allocation financing. For 3 4 purposes of computing the aggregate amount of such taxes for 5 base years occurring prior to 1985, the Department of Revenue shall determine the Initial Sales Tax Amounts for such taxes 6 7 and deduct therefrom an amount equal to 4% of the aggregate 8 amount of taxes per year for each year the base year is prior 9 to 1985, but not to exceed a total deduction of 12%. The amount so determined shall be known as the "Adjusted Initial 10 determining 11 Sales Tax Amounts". For purposes of the Municipal Sales Tax Increment, the Department of Revenue 12 13 shall for each period subtract from the amount paid to the municipality from the Local Government Tax Fund arising from 14 15 sales by retailers and servicemen on transactions located in 16 the redevelopment project area or the State Sales Tax Boundary, as the case may be, the certified Initial Sales Tax 17 Amounts, the Adjusted Initial Sales Tax Amounts or the 18 19 Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts for the Municipal 20 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act and the Municipal Service 21 Occupation Tax Act. For the State Fiscal Year 1989, this 22 calculation shall be made by utilizing the calendar year 1987 23 to determine the tax amounts received. For the State Fiscal Year 1990, this calculation shall be made by utilizing the 24 25 period from January 1, 1988, until September 30, 1988, to determine the tax amounts received from retailers 26 and servicemen pursuant to the Municipal Retailers' Occupation 27 Tax and the Municipal Service Occupation Tax Act, which shall 28 have deducted therefrom nine-twelfths of the certified 29 30 Initial Sales Tax Amounts, the Adjusted Initial Sales Tax Amounts or the Revised Initial Sales Tax 31 Amounts as 32 appropriate. For the State Fiscal Year 1991, this calculation 33 shall be made by utilizing the period from October 1, 1988, to June 30, 1989, to determine the tax amounts received from 34

1 retailers and servicemen pursuant to the Municipal Retailers' 2 Occupation Tax and the Municipal Service Occupation Tax Act which shall have deducted therefrom nine-twelfths of the 3 4 certified Initial Sales Tax Amounts, Adjusted Initial Sales 5 Tax Amounts or the Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts as 6 appropriate. For every State Fiscal Year thereafter, the 7 applicable period shall be the 12 months beginning July 1 and ending June 30 to determine the tax amounts received which 8 9 shall have deducted therefrom the certified Initial Sales Tax Amounts, the Adjusted Initial Sales Tax Amounts or the 10 11 Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts, as the case may be.

(i) "Net State Sales Tax Increment" means the sum of the 12 following: (a) 80% of the first \$100,000 of State Sales 13 Tax annually generated within a State Sales 14 Increment Тах Boundary; (b) 60% of the amount in excess of \$100,000 but not 15 16 exceeding \$500,000 of State Sales Tax Increment annually generated within a State Sales Tax Boundary; and (c) 40% of 17 all amounts in excess of \$500,000 of 18 State Sales Тах Increment annually generated within a State Sales 19 Tax 20 Boundary. If, however, a municipality established a tax 21 increment financing district in a county with a population in 22 excess of 3,000,000 before January 1, 1986, and the 23 municipality entered into a contract or issued bonds after January 1, 1986, but before December 31, 1986, to finance 24 25 redevelopment project costs within a State Sales Тах Boundary, then the Net State Sales Tax Increment means, 26 for the fiscal years beginning July 1, 1990, and July 1, 1991, 27 100% of the State Sales Tax Increment annually generated 28 within a State Sales Tax Boundary; and notwithstanding any 29 30 other provision of this Act, for those fiscal years the Revenue shall distribute 31 Department of to those 32 municipalities 100% of their Net State Sales Tax Increment 33 before any distribution to any other municipality and regardless of whether or not those other municipalities will 34

1 receive 100% of their Net State Sales Tax Increment. For 2 Fiscal Year 1999, and every year thereafter until the year 2007, for any municipality that has not entered into a 3 4 contract or has not issued bonds prior to June 1, 1988 to 5 finance redevelopment project costs within a State Sales Tax Boundary, the Net State Sales Tax Increment shall 6 be 7 calculated as follows: By multiplying the Net State Sales Tax in the State Fiscal Year 1999; 80% in the 8 Increment by 90% 9 State Fiscal Year 2000; 70% in the State Fiscal Year 2001; 60% in the State Fiscal Year 2002; 50% in the State Fiscal 10 11 Year 2003; 40% in the State Fiscal Year 2004; 30% in the State Fiscal Year 2005; 20% in the State Fiscal Year 2006; 12 and 10% in the State Fiscal Year 2007. No payment shall be 13 made for State Fiscal Year 2008 and thereafter. 14

15 Municipalities that issued bonds in connection with a 16 redevelopment project in a redevelopment project area within the State Sales Tax Boundary prior to July 29, 1991, or that 17 entered into contracts in connection with a redevelopment 18 19 project in a redevelopment project area before June 1, 1988, 20 shall continue to receive their proportional share of the 21 Illinois Tax Increment Fund distribution until the date on 22 which the redevelopment project is completed or terminated. 23 If, however, a municipality that issued bonds in connection with a redevelopment project in a redevelopment project area 24 25 within the State Sales Tax Boundary prior to July 29, 1991 retires the bonds prior to June 30, 2007 or a municipality 26 27 that entered into contracts in connection with a redevelopment project in a redevelopment project area before 28 29 June 1, 1988 completes the contracts prior to June 30, 2007, 30 then so long as the redevelopment project is not completed or is not terminated, the Net State Sales Tax Increment shall be 31 32 calculated, beginning on the date on which the bonds are retired or the contracts are completed, as follows: 33 By 34 multiplying the Net State Sales Tax Increment by 60% in the 1 State Fiscal Year 2002; 50% in the State Fiscal Year 2003; 2 40% in the State Fiscal Year 2004; 30% in the State Fiscal 3 Year 2005; 20% in the State Fiscal Year 2006; and 10% in the 4 State Fiscal Year 2007. No payment shall be made for State 5 Fiscal Year 2008 and thereafter. Refunding of any bonds 6 issued prior to July 29, 1991, shall not alter the Net State 7 Sales Tax Increment.

(j) "State Utility Tax Increment Amount" means an amount 8 9 equal to the aggregate increase in State electric and gas tax charges imposed on owners and tenants, other than residential 10 11 customers, of properties located within the redevelopment project area under Section 9-222 of the Public Utilities Act, 12 13 over and above the aggregate of such charges as certified by the Department of Revenue and paid by owners and tenants, 14 15 other than residential customers, of properties within the 16 redevelopment project area during the base year, which shall be the calendar year immediately prior to the year of the 17 the adoption of ordinance authorizing tax increment 18 19 allocation financing.

"Net State Utility Tax Increment" means the sum of 20 (k) 21 the following: (a) 80% of the first \$100,000 of State Utility 22 Tax Increment annually generated by a redevelopment project 23 area; (b) 60% of the amount in excess of \$100,000 but not \$500,000 of the State Utility Tax Increment 24 exceeding 25 annually generated by a redevelopment project area; and (C) 40% of all amounts in excess of \$500,000 of State Utility Tax 26 Increment annually generated by a redevelopment project area. 27 For the State Fiscal Year 1999, and every year thereafter 28 29 until the year 2007, for any municipality that has not 30 entered into a contract or has not issued bonds prior to June 1, 1988 to finance redevelopment project costs within a 31 redevelopment project area, the Net State Utility 32 Тах 33 Increment shall be calculated as follows: By multiplying the Net State Utility Tax Increment by 90% in the State Fiscal 34

No payment shall be made for the State Fiscal Year 2008 7 and thereafter.

Municipalities that issue bonds in connection with 8 the 9 redevelopment project during the period from June 1, 1988 until 3 years after the effective date of this Amendatory Act 10 11 of 1988 shall receive the Net State Utility Tax Increment, subject to appropriation, for 15 State Fiscal Years after the 12 issuance of such bonds. For the 16th through the 20th State 13 Fiscal Years after issuance of the bonds, the Net State 14 15 Utility Tax Increment shall be calculated as follows: By 16 multiplying the Net State Utility Tax Increment by 90% in year 16; 80% in year 17; 70% in year 18; 60% in year 19; and 17 50% in year 20. (1) "Obligations" mean bonds, loans, debentures, notes,
special certificates or other evidence of indebtedness issued
by the municipality to carry out a redevelopment project or
to refund outstanding obligations.

25 "Payment in lieu of taxes" means those estimated tax (m) 26 revenues from real property in a redevelopment project area 27 derived from real property that has been acquired by a municipality which according to the redevelopment project or 28 plan to be used for a private use which taxing districts 29 is 30 would have received had a municipality not acquired the real property and adopted tax increment allocation financing and 31 which would result from levies made after the time of 32 the 33 adoption of tax increment allocation financing to the time 34 the current equalized value of real property in the

(I) if it concerns an industrial park conservation 10 11 area, the plan shall also include a general description of any proposed developer, user and tenant of any 12 13 property, a description of the type, structure and general character of the facilities to be developed, a 14 15 description of the type, class and number of new 16 employees to be employed in the operation of the facilities to be developed; and 17

(J) if property is to be annexed to the
municipality, the plan shall include the terms of the
annexation agreement.

The provisions of items (B) and (C) of this subsection 21 22 (n) shall not apply to a municipality that before March 14, 23 1994 (the effective date of Public Act 88-537) had fixed, either by its corporate authorities or by a commission 24 25 designated under subsection (k) of Section 11-74.4-4, a time and place for a public hearing as required by subsection (a) 26 Section 11-74.4-5. Part II of the housing impact study shall identify 10 inhabited residential units in the proposed 11 the redevelopment project area that are to be or may be 12 If inhabited residential units are to be 13 removed. removed, then the housing impact study shall identify (i) 14 15 the number and location of those units that will or may 16 be removed, (ii) the municipality's plans for relocation 17 assistance for those residents in the proposed redevelopment project area whose residences are to be 18 removed, (iii) the availability of replacement housing 19 for those residents whose residences are to be removed, 20 21 and shall identify the type, location, and cost of the 22 housing, and (iv) the type and extent of relocation assistance to be provided. 23

24 (6) On and after November 1, 1999, the housing
25 impact study required by paragraph (5) shall be
26 incorporated in the redevelopment plan for the
27 redevelopment project area.

(7) On and after November 1, 1999, no redevelopment
plan shall be adopted, nor an existing plan amended, nor
shall residential housing that is occupied by households
of low-income and very low-income persons in currently
existing redevelopment project areas be removed after
November 1, 1999 unless the redevelopment plan provides,
with respect to inhabited housing units that are to be

(q) "Redevelopment project costs" mean and include the sum total of all reasonable or necessary costs incurred or estimated to be incurred, and any such costs incidental to a redevelopment plan and a redevelopment project. Such costs include, without limitation, the following:

29 (1) Costs of studies, surveys, development of 30 specifications, implementation plans, and and 31 administration of the redevelopment plan including but not limited to staff and professional service costs for 32 architectural, engineering, legal, financial, planning or 33 other services, provided however that no charges for 34

7 (3) Costs of rehabilitation, reconstruction or 8 repair or remodeling of existing public or private 9 buildings, fixtures, and leasehold improvements; and the cost of replacing an existing public building if pursuant 10 11 to the implementation of a redevelopment project the existing public building is to be demolished to use the 12 site for private investment or devoted to a different use 13 requiring private investment; 14

15 (4) Costs of the construction of public works or 16 improvements, except that on and after November 1, 1999, redevelopment project costs shall not include the cost of 17 constructing a new municipal public building principally 18 19 used to provide offices, storage space, or conference 20 facilities or vehicle storage, maintenance, or repair for 21 administrative, public safety, or public works personnel 22 and that is not intended to replace an existing public 23 building as provided under paragraph (3) of subsection of Section 11-74.4-3 24 unless either (i) (a) the 25 construction of the new municipal building implements a redevelopment project that was included 26 in а redevelopment plan that was adopted by the municipality 27 prior to November 1, 1999 or (ii) the municipality makes 28 29 a reasonable determination in the redevelopment plan, supported by information that provides the basis for that 30 31 determination, that the new municipal building is required to meet an increase in the need for public 32 safety purposes anticipated to result from 33 the implementation of the redevelopment plan; 34

(6) Financing costs, including but not limited to 5 all necessary and incidental expenses related to the 6 7 issuance of obligations and which may include payment of 8 interest on any obligations issued hereunder including 9 interest accruing during the estimated period of construction of any redevelopment project for which such 10 11 obligations are issued and for not exceeding 36 months thereafter and including reasonable reserves related 12 13 thereto;

14 (7) To the extent the municipality by written 15 agreement accepts and approves the same, all or a portion 16 of a taxing district's capital costs resulting from the 17 redevelopment project necessarily incurred or to be 18 incurred within a taxing district in furtherance of the 19 objectives of the redevelopment plan and project.

9 (B) For alternate method districts, flat grant districts, and foundation districts with a district 10 11 average 1995-96 Per Capita Tuition Charge equal to or more than \$5,900, excluding any school district 12 with a population in excess of 1,000,000, by 13 multiplying the district's increase in attendance 14 15 resulting from the net increase in new students 16 enrolled in that school district who reside in housing units within the redevelopment project area 17 that have received financial assistance through an 18 agreement with the municipality or because the 19 incurs the cost of necessary 20 municipality 21 infrastructure improvements within the boundaries of 22 the housing sites necessary for the completion of 23 that housing as authorized by this Act since the designation of the redevelopment project area by the 24 25 most recently available per capita tuition cost as defined in Section 10-20.12a of the School Code less 26 any increase in general state aid as defined in 27 Section 18-8.05 of the School Code attributable to 28 these added new students subject to the following 29 30 annual limitations:

31 (i) for unit school districts, no more 32 than 40% of the total amount of property tax 33 increment revenue produced by those housing 34 units that have received tax increment finance

1 assistance under this Act; 2 (ii) for elementary school districts, no more than 27% of the total amount of property 3 4 tax increment revenue produced by those housing 5 units that have received tax increment finance б assistance under this Act; and 7 (iii) for secondary school districts, no more than 13% of the total amount of property 8 9 tax increment revenue produced by those housing units that have received tax increment finance 10 assistance under this Act. 11 (C) For any school district in a municipality 12 with a population in excess of 1,000,000, the 13 following restrictions shall apply to 14 the 15 reimbursement of increased costs under this 16 paragraph (7.5): (i) no increased costs shall 17 be reimbursed unless the school district certifies 18 19 that each of the schools affected by the assisted housing project is at or over its 20 21 student capacity; (ii) the amount reimburseable shall be 22 23 reduced by the value of any land donated to the school district by the municipality or 24 25 developer, and by the value of any physical improvements made to the schools by the 26 municipality or developer; and 27 (iii) the amount reimbursed may 28 not 29 affect amounts otherwise obligated by the terms 30 of any bonds, notes, or other funding instruments, or the terms of any redevelopment 31 32 agreement. Any school district seeking payment under this 33 paragraph (7.5) shall, after July 1 and before 34

22 (10) Costs of job training, retraining, advanced 23 vocational education or career education, including but not limited to courses in occupational, semi-technical or 24 25 technical fields leading directly to employment, incurred by one or more taxing districts, provided that such costs 26 (i) are related to the establishment and maintenance of 27 additional job training, advanced vocational education or 28 29 career education programs for persons employed or to be 30 employed by employers located in a redevelopment project area; and (ii) when incurred by a taxing district or 31 taxing districts other than the municipality, are set 32 forth in a written agreement by or among the municipality 33 and the taxing district or taxing districts, which 34

1 agreement describes the program to be undertaken, 2 including but not limited to the number of employees to be trained, a description of the training and services to 3 4 be provided, the number and type of positions available or to be available, itemized costs of the program and 5 sources of funds to pay for the same, and the term of the 6 agreement. Such costs include, specifically, the payment 7 8 by community college districts of costs pursuant to 9 Sections 3-37, 3-38, 3-40 and 3-40.1 of the Public Community College Act and by school districts of costs 10 11 pursuant to Sections 10-22.20a and 10-23.3a of The School 12 Code;

13 (11) Interest cost incurred by a redeveloper 14 related to the construction, renovation or rehabilitation 15 of a redevelopment project provided that:

16 (A) such costs are to be paid directly from
17 the special tax allocation fund established pursuant
18 to this Act;

(B) such payments in any one year may not
exceed 30% of the annual interest costs incurred by
the redeveloper with regard to the redevelopment
project during that year;

23 if there are not sufficient funds (C) available in the special tax allocation fund to make 24 25 the payment pursuant to this paragraph (11) then the amounts so due shall accrue and be payable when 26 sufficient funds are available in the special tax 27 allocation fund; 28

29 (D) the total of such interest payments paid 30 pursuant to this Act may not exceed 30% of the total 31 (i) cost paid or incurred by the redeveloper for the 32 redevelopment project plus (ii) redevelopment 33 project costs excluding any property assembly costs 34 and any relocation costs incurred by a municipality 1

pursuant to this Act; and

(E) the cost limits set forth in subparagraphs (B) and (D) of paragraph (11) shall be modified for the financing of rehabilitated or new housing units for low-income households and very low-income households, as defined in Section 3 of the Illinois Affordable Housing Act. The percentage of 75% shall be substituted for 30% in subparagraphs (B) and (D) of paragraph (11).

(F) Instead of the eligible costs provided by 10 11 subparagraphs (B) and (D) of paragraph (11), as modified by this subparagraph, and notwithstanding 12 any other provisions of this Act to the contrary, 13 the municipality may pay from tax increment revenues 14 up to 50% of the cost of construction of new housing 15 16 units to be occupied by low-income households and very low-income households as defined in Section 3 17 of the Illinois Affordable Housing Act. The cost of 18 19 construction of those units may be derived from the proceeds of bonds issued by the municipality under 20 21 this Act or other constitutional or statutory 22 authority or from other sources of municipal revenue 23 that may be reimbursed from tax increment revenues or the proceeds of bonds issued to finance the 24 25 construction of that housing.

If the low and very 32 33 low-income units are part of a residential 34 redevelopment project that includes units not

1 affordable to low and very low-income households, only the low and very low-income units shall be 2 eligible for benefits under subparagraph (F) of 3 4 paragraph (11). The standards for maintaining the low-income households 5 occupancy by and very low-income households, as defined in Section 3 of 6 7 the Illinois Affordable Housing Act, of those units 8 constructed with eligible costs made available under 9 the provisions of this subparagraph (F) of paragraph (11) shall be established by guidelines adopted by 10 11 the municipality. The responsibility for annually documenting the initial occupancy of the units by 12 13 low-income households and very low-income households, as defined in Section 3 of the Illinois 14 15 Affordable Housing Act, shall be that of the then 16 current owner of the property. For ownership units, the guidelines will provide, at a minimum, 17 for a reasonable recapture of funds, or other appropriate 18 methods designed to preserve the original 19 20 affordability of the ownership units. For rental 21 units, the guidelines will provide, at a minimum, 22 for the affordability of rent to low and very low-income households. As units become available, 23 they shall be rented to income-eligible tenants. The 24 municipality may modify these guidelines from time 25 to time; the guidelines, however, shall be in effect 26 for as long as tax increment revenue is being used 27 to pay for costs associated with the units or for 28 29 the retirement of bonds issued to finance the units 30 or for the life of the redevelopment project area, whichever is later. 31

32 (11.5) If the redevelopment project area is located
33 within a municipality with a population of more than
34 100,000, the cost of day care services for children of

(13) After November 1, 1999 (the effective date of 17 Public Act 91-478), none of the redevelopment project 18 19 costs enumerated in this subsection shall be eligible redevelopment project costs if those costs would provide 20 21 direct financial support to a retail entity initiating 22 operations in the redevelopment project area while 23 terminating operations at another Illinois location within 10 miles of the redevelopment project area but 24 25 outside the boundaries of the redevelopment project area municipality. For purposes of this 26 paragraph, termination means a closing of a retail operation that is 27 directly related to the opening of the same operation or 28 29 like retail entity owned or operated by more than 50% of 30 the original ownership in a redevelopment project area, but it does not mean closing an operation for reasons 31 beyond the control of the retail entity, as documented by 32 the retail entity, subject to a reasonable finding by the 33 34 municipality that the current location contained inadequate space, had become economically obsolete, or was no longer a viable location for the retailer or serviceman.

11 (r) "State Sales Tax Boundary" means the redevelopment project area or the amended redevelopment project area 12 boundaries which are determined pursuant to subsection (9) of 13 Section 11-74.4-8a of this Act. The Department of Revenue 14 15 shall certify pursuant to subsection (9) of Section 16 11-74.4-8a the appropriate boundaries eligible for the determination of State Sales Tax Increment. 17

"State Sales Tax Increment" means an amount equal to 18 (S) 19 the increase in the aggregate amount of taxes paid by retailers and servicemen, other than retailers and servicemen 20 21 subject to the Public Utilities Act, on transactions at 22 places of business located within a State Sales Tax Boundary 23 pursuant to the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Use Tax Act, and the Service Occupation Tax 24 25 Act, except such portion of such increase that is paid into the State and Local Sales Tax Reform Fund, the Local 26 Government Distributive Fund, the 27 Local Government Tax Fund and the County and Mass Transit District Fund, for as 28 29 long as State participation exists, over and above the 30 Initial Sales Tax Amounts, Adjusted Initial Sales Tax Amounts or the Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts for such taxes as 31 32 certified by the Department of Revenue and paid under those 33 Acts by retailers and servicemen on transactions at places of 34 business located within the State Sales Tax Boundary during

For the State Fiscal Year 1991, this calculation shall be made by utilizing the period 33 from October 1, 1988, until June 30, 1989, to determine the 34

1 tax amounts received from retailers and servicemen, which 2 shall have deducted therefrom nine-twelfths of the certified Initial State Sales Tax Amounts, Adjusted Initial Sales Tax 3 4 the Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts Amounts or as 5 appropriate. For every State Fiscal Year thereafter, the applicable period shall be the 12 months beginning July 1 and 6 7 ending on June 30, to determine the tax amounts received 8 which shall have deducted therefrom the certified Initial 9 Sales Tax Amounts, Adjusted Initial Sales Tax Amounts or the Revised Initial Sales Tax Amounts. 20 (u) "Taxing districts' capital costs" means those costs 21 of taxing districts for capital improvements that are found 22 by the municipal corporate authorities to be necessary and 23 directly result from the redevelopment project.

(v) As used in subsection (a) of Section 11-74.4-3 of 24 25 this Act, "vacant land" means any parcel or combination of parcels of real property without industrial, commercial, and 26 residential buildings which has not been used for commercial 27 agricultural purposes within 5 years prior to the designation 28 29 of the redevelopment project area, unless the parcel is 30 included in an industrial park conservation area or the parcel has been subdivided; provided that if the parcel was 31 part of a larger tract that has been divided into 3 or more 32 smaller tracts that were accepted for recording during the 33 period from 1950 to 1990, then the parcel shall be deemed to 34

1 City of Rock Island, or (K) if the ordinance was adopted 2 before December 18, 1986 by the City of Moline, or (L) if the ordinance was adopted in September 1988 by Sauk Village, 3 or 4 if the ordinance was adopted in October 1993 by Sauk (M) 5 Village, or (N) if the ordinance was adopted on December 29, 6 1986 by the City of Galva, or (0) if the ordinance was 7 adopted in March 1991 by the City of Centreville, or (P) if the ordinance was adopted on January 23, 1991 by the City of 8 9 East St. Louis, or (Q) if the ordinance was adopted on December 22, 1986 by the City of Aledo, or (R) if the 10 ordinance was adopted on February 5, 1990 by the City of 11 Clinton, or (S) if the ordinance was adopted on September 6, 12 1994 by the City of Freeport, or (T) if the ordinance was 13 adopted on December 22, 1986 by the City of Tuscola, or (U) 14 if the ordinance was adopted on December 23, 1986 by the City 15 16 of Sparta, or (V) if the ordinance was adopted on December 1986 by the City of Beardstown, or (W) if the ordinance 17 23, was adopted on April 27, 1981, October 21, 1985, or December 18 19 30, 1986 by the City of Belleville, or (X) if the ordinance was adopted on September 14, 1994 by the City of Alton and, 20 21 for redevelopment project areas for which bonds were issued 22 before July 29, 1991, in connection with a redevelopment 23 project in the area within the State Sales Tax Boundary and which were extended by municipal ordinance under subsection 24 25 (n) of Section 11-74.4-3, the last maturity of the refunding obligations shall not be expressed to mature later than the 26 date on which the redevelopment project area is terminated or 27 December 31, 2013, whichever date occurs first. 28

In the event a municipality issues obligations under home rule powers or other legislative authority the proceeds of which are pledged to pay for redevelopment project costs, the municipality may, if it has followed the procedures in conformance with this division, retire said obligations from funds in the special tax allocation fund in amounts and in such manner as if such obligations had been issued pursuant
 to the provisions of this division.
