### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Amends the Nurse Practice Act. Removes references to a written collaborative agreement throughout the Act. Provides that an advanced practice nurse's scope of practice includes collaboration and consultation with or referral to a physician or other appropriate health-care professional for patient care needs that exceed the APN's scope of practice, education, or experience. Provides that as part of the professional scope of advanced practice nursing, an advanced practice nurse possesses prescriptive authority appropriate to his or her specialty, scope of practice, education, and experience. Such prescriptive authority shall include the authority to prescribe, select, order, administer, store, accept samples of, and dispense over-the-counter medications, legend drugs, medical gases, certain controlled substances, and other preparations, including botanical and herbal remedies. Amends various other Acts to make related changes. Effective immediately.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Illinois Identification Card Act is amended
  by changing Section 4 as follows:
- 6 (15 ILCS 335/4) (from Ch. 124, par. 24)
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Sec. 4. Identification Card.

(a) The Secretary of State shall issue a standard Illinois 8 9 Identification Card to any natural person who is a resident of the State of Illinois who applies for such card, or renewal 10 thereof, or who applies for a standard Illinois Identification 11 12 Card upon release as a committed person on parole, mandatory 13 supervised release, final discharge, or pardon from the 14 Department of Corrections by submitting an identification card issued by the Department of Corrections under Section 3-14-1 of 15 the Unified Code of Corrections, together with the prescribed 16 17 fees. No identification card shall be issued to any person who holds a valid foreign state identification card, license, or 18 19 permit unless the person first surrenders to the Secretary of 20 State the valid foreign state identification card, license, or 21 permit. The card shall be prepared and supplied by the 22 Secretary of State and shall include a photograph and signature or mark of the applicant. The Illinois Identification Card may 23

be used for identification purposes in any lawful situation only by the person to whom it was issued. As used in this Act, "photograph" means any color photograph or digitally produced and captured image of an applicant for an identification card. As used in this Act, "signature" means the name of a person as written by that person and captured in a manner acceptable to the Secretary of State.

8 (a-5) If an applicant for an identification card has a 9 current driver's license or instruction permit issued by the 10 Secretary of State, the Secretary may require the applicant to 11 utilize the same residence address and name on the 12 identification card, driver's license, and instruction permit 13 records maintained by the Secretary. The Secretary may 14 promulgate rules to implement this provision.

15 (b) The Secretary of State shall issue a special Illinois 16 Identification Card, which shall be known as an Illinois 17 Disabled Person Identification Card, to any natural person who is a resident of the State of Illinois, who is a disabled 18 person as defined in Section 4A of this Act, who applies for 19 20 thereof. such card, or renewal No Disabled Person Identification Card shall be issued to any person who holds a 21 22 valid foreign state identification card, license, or permit 23 unless the person first surrenders to the Secretary of State 24 the valid foreign state identification card, license, or 25 permit. The Secretary of State shall charge no fee to issue 26 such card. The card shall be prepared and supplied by the

Secretary of State, and shall include a photograph and 1 2 signature or mark of the applicant, a designation indicating that the card is an Illinois Disabled Person Identification 3 Card, and shall include a comprehensible designation of the 4 5 type and classification of the applicant's disability as set out in Section 4A of this Act. If the applicant so requests, 6 7 the card shall include a description of the applicant's any information about 8 disability and the applicant's 9 disability or medical history which the Secretary determines 10 would be helpful to the applicant in securing emergency medical 11 care. If a mark is used in lieu of a signature, such mark shall 12 be affixed to the card in the presence of two witnesses who attest to the authenticity of the mark. The Illinois Disabled 13 Person Identification Card may be used for identification 14 15 purposes in any lawful situation by the person to whom it was 16 issued.

17 The Illinois Disabled Person Identification Card may be used as adequate documentation of disability in lieu of a 18 physician's determination of disability, a determination of 19 20 disability from a physician assistant who has been delegated the authority to make this determination by his or her 21 22 supervising physician, a determination of disability from an 23 advanced practice nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician that authorizes the 24 25 advanced practice nurse to make this determination, or any 26 other documentation of disability whenever any State law

requires that a disabled person provide such documentation of 1 2 disability, however an Illinois Disabled Person Identification 3 Card shall not qualify the cardholder to participate in any program or to receive any benefit which is not available to all 4 5 persons with like disabilities. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, an Illinois Disabled Person Identification 6 Card, or evidence that the Secretary of State has issued an 7 Illinois Disabled Person Identification Card, shall not be used 8 9 by any person other than the person named on such card to prove 10 that the person named on such card is a disabled person or for 11 any other purpose unless the card is used for the benefit of 12 the person named on such card, and the person named on such 13 card consents to such use at the time the card is so used.

14 An optometrist's determination of a visual disability 15 under Section 4A of this Act is acceptable as documentation for 16 the purpose of issuing an Illinois Disabled Person 17 Identification Card.

When medical information is contained on an Illinois Disabled Person Identification Card, the Office of the Secretary of State shall not be liable for any actions taken based upon that medical information.

(c) Beginning January 1, 1986, the Secretary of State shall
provide that each original or renewal Illinois Identification
Card or Illinois Disabled Person Identification Card issued to
a person under the age of 21, shall be of a distinct nature
from those Illinois Identification Cards or Illinois Disabled

Person Identification Cards issued to individuals 21 years of
 age or older. The color designated for Illinois Identification
 Cards or Illinois Disabled Person Identification Cards for
 persons under the age of 21 shall be at the discretion of the
 Secretary of State.

6 (c-1) Beginning January 1, 2003, each original or renewal 7 Illinois Identification Card or Illinois Disabled Person 8 Identification Card issued to a person under the age of 21 9 shall display the date upon which the person becomes 18 years 10 of age and the date upon which the person becomes 21 years of 11 age.

12 (d) The Secretary of State may issue a Senior Citizen 13 discount card, to any natural person who is a resident of the 14 State of Illinois who is 60 years of age or older and who 15 applies for such a card or renewal thereof. The Secretary of 16 State shall charge no fee to issue such card. The card shall be 17 issued in every county and applications shall be made available at, but not limited to, nutrition sites, senior citizen centers 18 19 and Area Agencies on Aging. The applicant, upon receipt of such 20 card and prior to its use for any purpose, shall have affixed 21 thereon in the space provided therefor his signature or mark.

(e) The Secretary of State, in his or her discretion, may
designate on each Illinois Identification Card or Illinois
Disabled Person Identification Card a space where the card
holder may place a sticker or decal, issued by the Secretary of
State, of uniform size as the Secretary may specify, that shall

Self-administration of medication. 10 (a) In this Section: 11 "Asthma inhaler" means a quick reliever asthma inhaler. 12 "Epinephrine auto-injector" means a medical device for 13 immediate self-administration by a person at risk of 14 anaphylaxis. 15 "Medication" means a medicine, prescribed by (i) a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches, 16 17 (ii) a physician assistant who has been delegated the authority 18 to prescribe asthma medications by his or her supervising 19 physician, or (iii) an advanced practice registered nurse who 20 has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating 21 physician that delegates the authority to prescribe asthma 22 medications, for a pupil that pertains to the pupil's asthma 23 and that has an individual prescription label. 24 "Self-administration" means a pupil's discretionary use of 1

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and ability to carry his or her prescribed asthma medication.

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(b) A school, whether public or nonpublic, must permit the self-administration of medication by a pupil with asthma or the use of an epinephrine auto-injector by a pupil, provided that:

5 (1) the parents or guardians of the pupil provide to 6 the school (i) written authorization from the parents or 7 guardians for the self-administration of medication or 8 (ii) for use of an epinephrine auto-injector, written 9 authorization from the pupil's physician, physician 10 assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse; and

11 (2) the parents or guardians of the pupil provide to 12 the school (i) the prescription label, which must contain the name of the medication, the prescribed dosage, and the 13 time at which or circumstances under which the medication 14 is to be administered, or (ii) for use of an epinephrine 15 16 auto-injector, a written statement from the pupil's 17 physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse containing the following information: 18

19 (A) the name and purpose of the epinephrine20 auto-injector;

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(B) the prescribed dosage; and

(C) the time or times at which or the special
 circumstances under which the epinephrine
 auto-injector is to be administered.

The information provided shall be kept on file in the office of the school nurse or, in the absence of a school nurse, the 1 school's administrator.

2 (c) The school district or nonpublic school must inform the parents or guardians of the pupil, in writing, that the school 3 district or nonpublic school and its employees and agents are 4 5 to incur no liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any injury arising from the self-administration 6 7 of medication or use of an epinephrine auto-injector by the 8 pupil regardless of whether authorization was given by the 9 pupil's parents or guardians or by the pupil's physician, 10 physician's assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse. 11 The parents or guardians of the pupil must sign a statement 12 acknowledging that the school district or nonpublic school is to incur no liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, 13 14 as a result of any injury arising from the self-administration 15 of medication or use of an epinephrine auto-injector by the 16 pupil regardless of whether authorization was given by the 17 pupil's parents or guardians or by the pupil's physician, physician's assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse 18 19 and that the parents or guardians must indemnify and hold 20 harmless the school district or nonpublic school and its employees and agents against any claims, except a claim based 21 22 willful and wanton conduct, arising out of on the 23 self-administration of medication or use of an epinephrine auto-injector by the pupil regardless of whether authorization 24 25 was given by the pupil's parents or guardians or by the pupil's 26 physician, physician's assistant, or advanced practice

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1 registered nurse.

2 (d) The permission for self-administration of medication 3 or use of an epinephrine auto-injector is effective for the 4 school year for which it is granted and shall be renewed each 5 subsequent school year upon fulfillment of the requirements of 6 this Section.

(e) Provided that the requirements of this Section are 7 8 fulfilled, a pupil with asthma may possess and use his or her 9 medication or a pupil may possess and use an epinephrine 10 auto-injector (i) while in school, (ii) while at. а 11 school-sponsored activity, (iii) while under the supervision 12 of school personnel, or (iv) before or after normal school 13 activities, such as while in before-school or after-school care 14 on school-operated property.

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Sec. 24-5. Physical fitness and professional growth.

School boards shall require of new employees evidence of 18 physical fitness to perform duties assigned and freedom from 19 20 communicable disease, including tuberculosis. Such evidence 21 shall consist of a physical examination and a tuberculin skin 22 test and, if appropriate, an x-ray, made by a physician licensed in Illinois or any other state to practice medicine 23 24 and surgery in all its branches, an advanced practice nurse who 25 has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating

physician that authorizes the advanced practice nurse to 1 2 perform health examinations, or a physician assistant who has been delegated the authority to perform health examinations by 3 his or her supervising physician not more than 90 days 4 5 preceding time of presentation to the board and cost of such 6 examination shall rest with the employee. The board may from 7 time to time require an examination of any employee by a 8 physician licensed in Illinois to practice medicine and surgery 9 in all its branches, an advanced practice nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician 10 11 that authorizes the advanced practice nurse to perform health 12 examinations, or a physician assistant who has been delegated the authority to perform health examinations by his or her 13 supervising physician and shall pay the expenses thereof from 14 school funds. School boards may require teachers in their 15 16 employ to furnish from time to time evidence of continued 17 professional growth.

Sec. 24-6. Sick leave. The school boards of all school districts, including special charter districts, but not including school districts in municipalities of 500,000 or more, shall grant their full-time teachers, and also shall grant such of their other employees as are eligible to participate in the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund under the

1 "600-Hour Standard" established, or under such other 2 eligibility participation standard as may from time to time be 3 established, by rules and regulations now or hereafter promulgated by the Board of that Fund under Section 7-198 of 4 5 the Illinois Pension Code, as now or hereafter amended, sick 6 leave provisions not less in amount than 10 days at full pay in 7 each school year. If any such teacher or employee does not use the full amount of annual leave thus allowed, the unused amount 8 9 shall be allowed to accumulate to a minimum available leave of 10 180 days at full pay, including the leave of the current year. 11 Sick leave shall be interpreted to mean personal illness, 12 quarantine at home, serious illness or death in the immediate family or household, or birth, adoption, or placement for 13 14 adoption. The school board may require a certificate from a 15 physician licensed in Illinois to practice medicine and surgery 16 in all its branches, a chiropractic physician licensed under the Medical Practice Act of 1987, an advanced practice nurse 17 who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating 18 19 physician that authorizes the advanced practice nurse to 20 perform health examinations, a physician assistant who has been 21 delegated the authority to perform health examinations by his 22 or her supervising physician, or, if the treatment is by prayer 23 or spiritual means, a spiritual adviser or practitioner of the teacher's or employee's faith as a basis for pay during leave 24 25 after an absence of 3 days for personal illness or 30 days for 26 birth or as the school board may deem necessary in other cases.

If the school board does require a certificate as a basis for 1 2 pay during leave of less than 3 days for personal illness, the 3 school board shall pay, from school funds, the expenses incurred by the teachers or other employees in obtaining the 4 5 certificate. For paid leave for adoption or placement for adoption, the school board may require that the teacher or 6 7 other employee provide evidence that the formal adoption 8 process is underway, and such leave is limited to 30 days 9 unless a longer leave has been negotiated with the exclusive 10 bargaining representative.

11 If, by reason of any change in the boundaries of school 12 districts, or by reason of the creation of a new school 13 district, the employment of a teacher is transferred to a new 14 or different board, the accumulated sick leave of such teacher 15 is not thereby lost, but is transferred to such new or 16 different district.

For purposes of this Section, "immediate family" shall include parents, spouse, brothers, sisters, children, grandparents, grandchildren, parents-in-law, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, and legal guardians.

24 Sec. 26-1. Compulsory school age-Exemptions. Whoever has 25 custody or control of any child between the ages of 7 and 17

years (unless the child has already graduated from high school) 1 2 shall cause such child to attend some public school in the 3 district wherein the child resides the entire time it is in session during the regular school term, except as provided in 4 5 Section 10-19.1, and during a required summer school program Section 10-22.33B; provided, 6 established under that the 7 following children shall not be required to attend the public 8 schools:

9 1. Any child attending a private or a parochial school 10 where children are taught the branches of education taught 11 to children of corresponding age and grade in the public 12 schools, and where the instruction of the child in the 13 branches of education is in the English language;

14 2. Any child who is physically or mentally unable to 15 attend school, such disability being certified to the 16 county or district truant officer by a competent physician 17 licensed in Illinois to practice medicine and surgery in all its branches, a chiropractic physician licensed under 18 19 the Medical Practice Act of 1987, an advanced practice 20 nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a 21 collaborating physician that authorizes the advanced 22 practice nurse to perform health examinations, a physician 23 assistant who has been delegated the authority to perform 24 health examinations by his or her supervising physician, or 25 a Christian Science practitioner residing in this State and listed in the Christian Science Journal; or who is excused 26

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1 for temporary absence for cause by the principal or teacher 2 of the school which the child attends; the exemptions in 3 this paragraph (2) do not apply to any female who is preqnant or the mother of one or more children, except 4 5 where a female is unable to attend school due to a 6 complication arising from her pregnancy and the existence 7 of such complication is certified to the county or district 8 truant officer by a competent physician;

9 Any child necessarily and lawfully employed 3. 10 according to the provisions of the law regulating child 11 labor may be excused from attendance at school by the 12 county superintendent of schools or the superintendent of the public school which the child should be attending, on 13 14 certification of the facts by and the recommendation of the 15 school board of the public school district in which the 16 child resides. In districts having part time continuation 17 schools, children so excused shall attend such schools at least 8 hours each week: 18

Any child over 12 and under 14 years of age while in
 attendance at confirmation classes;

5. Any child absent from a public school on a particular day or days or at a particular time of day for the reason that he is unable to attend classes or to participate in any examination, study or work requirements on a particular day or days or at a particular time of day, because the tenets of his religion forbid secular activity HB1682

on a particular day or days or at a particular time of day. 1 Each school board shall prescribe rules and regulations 2 3 relative to absences for religious holidays including, but not limited to, a list of religious holidays on which it 4 shall be mandatory to excuse a child; but nothing in this 5 paragraph 5 shall be construed to limit the right of any 6 7 school board, at its discretion, to excuse an absence on 8 any other day by reason of the observance of a religious 9 holiday. A school board may require the parent or quardian 10 of a child who is to be excused from attending school due 11 to the observance of a religious holiday to give notice, 12 not exceeding 5 days, of the child's absence to the school principal or other school personnel. Any child excused from 13 14 attending school under this paragraph 5 shall not be 15 required to submit a written excuse for such absence after 16 returning to school; and

6. Any child 16 years of age or older who (i) submits to a school district evidence of necessary and lawful employment pursuant to paragraph 3 of this Section and (ii) is enrolled in a graduation incentives program pursuant to Section 26-16 of this Code or an alternative learning opportunities program established pursuant to Article 13B of this Code.

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Sec. 27-8.1. Health examinations and immunizations.

(1) In compliance with rules and regulations which the 2 Department of Public Health shall promulgate, and except as 3 hereinafter provided, all children in Illinois shall have a 4 5 health examination as follows: within one year prior to entering kindergarten or the first grade of any public, 6 7 private, or parochial elementary school; upon entering the 8 sixth and ninth grades of any public, private, or parochial 9 school; prior to entrance into any public, private, or 10 parochial nursery school; and, irrespective of grade, 11 immediately prior to or upon entrance into any public, private, 12 or parochial school or nursery school, each child shall present 13 proof of having been examined in accordance with this Section and the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder. Any child 14 15 who received a health examination within one year prior to 16 entering the fifth grade for the 2007-2008 school year is not 17 required to receive an additional health examination in order to comply with the provisions of Public Act 95-422 when he or 18 she attends school for the 2008-2009 school year, unless the 19 20 child is attending school for the first time as provided in 21 this paragraph.

A tuberculosis skin test screening shall be included as a required part of each health examination included under this Section if the child resides in an area designated by the Department of Public Health as having a high incidence of tuberculosis. Additional health examinations of pupils, including eye examinations, may be required when deemed necessary by school authorities. Parents are encouraged to have their children undergo eye examinations at the same points in time required for health examinations.

5 (1.5) In compliance with rules adopted by the Department of 6 Public Health and except as otherwise provided in this Section, 7 all children in kindergarten and the second and sixth grades of 8 any public, private, or parochial school shall have a dental 9 examination. Each of these children shall present proof of 10 having been examined by a dentist in accordance with this 11 Section and rules adopted under this Section before May 15th of 12 the school year. If a child in the second or sixth grade fails to present proof by May 15th, the school may hold the child's 13 report card until one of the following occurs: (i) the child 14 15 presents proof of a completed dental examination or (ii) the 16 child presents proof that a dental examination will take place 17 within 60 days after May 15th. The Department of Public Health shall establish, by rule, a waiver for children who show an 18 undue burden or a lack of access to a dentist. Each public, 19 20 private, and parochial school must give notice of this dental examination requirement to the parents and quardians of 21 22 students at least 60 days before May 15th of each school year.

(1.10) Except as otherwise provided in this Section, all children enrolling in kindergarten in a public, private, or parochial school on or after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly and any student

enrolling for the first time in a public, private, or parochial 1 2 school on or after the effective date of this amendatory Act of 3 the 95th General Assembly shall have an eye examination. Each of these children shall present proof of having been examined 4 5 by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches or a licensed optometrist within the previous year, in 6 7 accordance with this Section and rules adopted under this Section, before October 15th of the school year. If the child 8 9 fails to present proof by October 15th, the school may hold the 10 child's report card until one of the following occurs: (i) the 11 child presents proof of a completed eye examination or (ii) the 12 child presents proof that an eye examination will take place within 60 days after October 15th. The Department of Public 13 Health shall establish, by rule, a waiver for children who show 14 15 an undue burden or a lack of access to a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches who provides eye 16 17 examinations or to a licensed optometrist. Each public, private, and parochial school must give notice of this eye 18 19 examination requirement to the parents and guardians of 20 students in compliance with rules of the Department of Public Health. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to allow a 21 22 school to exclude a child from attending because of a parent's 23 or guardian's failure to obtain an eye examination for the 24 child.

(2) The Department of Public Health shall promulgate rulesand regulations specifying the examinations and procedures

that constitute a health examination, which shall include the 1 2 collection of data relating to obesity (including at a minimum, 3 date of birth, gender, height, weight, blood pressure, and date of exam), and a dental examination and may recommend by rule 4 5 that certain additional examinations be performed. The rules and regulations of the Department of Public Health shall 6 7 specify that a tuberculosis skin test screening shall be 8 included as a required part of each health examination included 9 under this Section if the child resides in an area designated 10 by the Department of Public Health as having a high incidence 11 of tuberculosis. The Department of Public Health shall specify 12 that a diabetes screening as defined by rule shall be included as a required part of each health examination. Diabetes testing 13 14 is not required.

15 Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all of its 16 branches, advanced practice nurses who have a written 17 collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician which authorizes them to perform health examinations, or physician 18 assistants who have been delegated the performance of health 19 20 examinations by their supervising physician shall be responsible for the performance of the health examinations, 21 22 other than dental examinations, eye examinations, and vision 23 and hearing screening, and shall sign all report forms required 24 by subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to those 25 portions of the health examination for which the physician, physician 26 advanced practice nurse, or assistant is

responsible. If a registered nurse performs any part of a 1 2 health examination, then a physician licensed to practice 3 medicine in all of its branches must review and sign all required report forms. Licensed dentists shall perform all 4 5 dental examinations and shall sign all report forms required by 6 subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to the dental examinations. Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all 7 8 its branches or licensed optometrists shall perform all eye 9 examinations required by this Section and shall sign all report 10 forms required by subsection (4) of this Section that pertain 11 to the eye examination. For purposes of this Section, an eye 12 examination shall at a minimum include history, visual acuity, 13 subjective refraction to best visual acuity near and far, 14 internal and external examination, and a glaucoma evaluation, 15 as well as any other tests or observations that in the 16 professional judgment of the doctor are necessary. Vision and 17 hearing screening tests, which shall not be considered examinations as that term is used in this Section, shall be 18 conducted in accordance with rules and regulations of the 19 20 Department of Public Health, and by individuals whom the Department of Public Health has certified. In these rules and 21 22 regulations, the Department of Public Health shall require that 23 individuals conducting vision screening tests give a child's parent or quardian written notification, before the vision 24 25 screening is conducted, that states, "Vision screening is not a 26 substitute for a complete eye and vision evaluation by an eye

5 (3) Every child shall, at or about the same time as he or 6 she receives a health examination required by subsection (1) of 7 this Section, present to the local school proof of having 8 received such immunizations against preventable communicable 9 diseases as the Department of Public Health shall require by 10 rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to this Section and 11 the Communicable Disease Prevention Act.

12 (4) The individuals conducting the health examination, dental examination, or eye examination shall record the fact of 13 14 having conducted the examination, and such additional 15 information as required, including for a health examination 16 data relating to obesity (including at a minimum, date of 17 birth, gender, height, weight, blood pressure, and date of exam), on uniform forms which the Department of Public Health 18 19 and the State Board of Education shall prescribe for statewide use. The examiner shall summarize on the report form any 20 21 condition that he or she suspects indicates a need for special 22 services, including for a health examination factors relating 23 to obesity. The individuals confirming the administration of required immunizations shall record as indicated on the form 24 25 that the immunizations were administered.

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(5) If a child does not submit proof of having had either

the health examination or the immunization as required, then 1 2 the child shall be examined or receive the immunization, as the 3 case may be, and present proof by October 15 of the current school year, or by an earlier date of the current school year 4 5 established by a school district. To establish a date before 6 15 of the current school year for the health October 7 examination or immunization as required, a school district must 8 give notice of the requirements of this Section 60 days prior 9 to the earlier established date. If for medical reasons one or 10 more of the required immunizations must be given after October 11 15 of the current school year, or after an earlier established 12 date of the current school year, then the child shall present, by October 15, or by the earlier established date, a schedule 13 14 for the administration of the immunizations and a statement of 15 the medical reasons causing the delay, both the schedule and 16 the statement being issued by the physician, advanced practice 17 nurse, physician assistant, registered nurse, or local health department that will be responsible for administration of the 18 19 remaining required immunizations. If a child does not comply by 20 October 15, or by the earlier established date of the current 21 school year, with the requirements of this subsection, then the 22 local school authority shall exclude that child from school 23 until such time as the child presents proof of having had the 24 health examination as required and presents proof of having 25 received those required immunizations which are medically 26 possible to receive immediately. During a child's exclusion

from school for noncompliance with this subsection, the child's 1 2 parents or legal guardian shall be considered in violation of Section 26-1 and subject to any penalty imposed by Section 3 26-10. This subsection (5) does not apply to dental 4 5 examinations and eye examinations. Until June 30, 2012, if the 6 student is an out-of-state transfer student and does not have 7 the proof required under this subsection (5) before October 15 8 of the current year or whatever date is set by the school 9 district, then he or she may only attend classes (i) if he or 10 she has proof that an appointment for the required vaccinations 11 has been scheduled with a party authorized to submit proof of 12 the required vaccinations. If the proof of vaccination required 13 under this subsection (5) is not submitted within 30 days after 14 the student is permitted to attend classes, then the student is 15 not to be permitted to attend classes until proof of the 16 vaccinations has been properly submitted. No school district or 17 employee of a school district shall be held liable for any injury or illness to another person that results from admitting 18 out-of-state transfer student to class that has 19 an an 20 appointment scheduled pursuant to this subsection (5).

(6) Every school shall report to the State Board of Education by November 15, in the manner which that agency shall require, the number of children who have received the necessary immunizations and the health examination (other than a dental examination or eye examination) as required, indicating, of those who have not received the immunizations and examination

as required, the number of children who are exempt from health 1 2 examination and immunization requirements on religious or medical grounds as provided in subsection (8). Every school 3 shall report to the State Board of Education by June 30, in the 4 5 manner that the State Board requires, the number of children 6 who have received the required dental examination, indicating, of those who have not received the required dental examination, 7 8 the number of children who are exempt from the dental 9 examination on religious grounds as provided in subsection (8) 10 of this Section and the number of children who have received a 11 waiver under subsection (1.5) of this Section. Every school 12 shall report to the State Board of Education by June 30, in the 13 manner that the State Board requires, the number of children 14 who have received the required eye examination, indicating, of 15 those who have not received the required eye examination, the 16 number of children who are exempt from the eye examination as 17 provided in subsection (8) of this Section, the number of children who have received a waiver under subsection (1.10) of 18 this Section, and the total number of children in noncompliance 19 20 with the eye examination requirement. Failure of any 24 25 individual to submit to mental or physical examination, when 26 directed, shall be grounds for suspension of his or her license

until such time as the individual submits to the examination if 1 2 the Disciplinary Board finds, after notice and hearing, that the refusal to submit to the examination was without reasonable 3 cause. If the Disciplinary Board finds a physician unable to 4 5 practice because of the reasons set forth in this Section, the 6 Disciplinary Board shall require such physician to submit to 7 care, counseling, or treatment by physicians approved or 8 designated by the Disciplinary Board, as a condition for 9 continued, reinstated, or renewed licensure to practice. Any 10 physician, whose license was granted pursuant to Sections 9, 11 17, or 19 of this Act, or, continued, reinstated, renewed, 12 disciplined or supervised, subject to such terms, conditions or 13 restrictions who shall fail to comply with such terms, 14 conditions or restrictions, or to complete a required program of care, counseling, or treatment, as determined by the Chief 15 16 Medical Coordinator or Deputy Medical Coordinators, shall be 17 referred to the Director for a determination as to whether the licensee shall have their license suspended immediately, 18 19 pending a hearing by the Disciplinary Board. In instances in 20 which the Director immediately suspends a license under this 21 Section, a hearing upon such person's license must be convened 22 by the Disciplinary Board within 15 days after such suspension 23 and completed without appreciable delay. The Disciplinary Board shall have the authority to review 24 the subject 25 physician's record of treatment and counseling regarding the

impairment, to the extent permitted by applicable federal

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statutes and regulations safeguarding the confidentiality of medical records.

An individual licensed under this Act, affected under this Section, shall be afforded an opportunity to demonstrate to the Disciplinary Board that they can resume practice in compliance with acceptable and prevailing standards under the provisions of their license.

8 The Department may promulgate rules for the imposition of 9 fines in disciplinary cases, not to exceed \$5,000 for each 10 violation of this Act. Fines may be imposed in conjunction with 11 other forms of disciplinary action, but shall not be the 12 exclusive disposition of any disciplinary action arising out of 13 conduct resulting in death or injury to a patient. enter into supervising physician agreements with no more than 2
physician assistants.

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(b) A physician licensed to practice medicine in all its 1 2 branches in active clinical practice may collaborate and consult with an advanced practice nurse in accordance with the 3 requirements of the Nurse Practice Act. Collaboration is for 4 5 purpose of providing medical consultation, and no the 6 employment relationship is required. A written collaborative 7 agreement shall conform to the requirements of Section 65 35 of the Nurse Practice Act. The written collaborative agreement 8 9 shall be for services the collaborating physician generally 10 provides to his or her patients in the normal course of clinical medical practice. 22 (2) Practice guidelines and orders are developed and 23 approved jointly by the advanced practice nurse and 24 collaborating physician, as needed, based on the practice 25 of the practitioners. Such guidelines and orders and the 26 patient services provided thereunder are periodically

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reviewed by the collaborating physician.

2 (3) The advance practice nurse provides services the 3 collaborating physician generally provides to his or her 4 patients in the normal course of clinical practice, except 5 as set forth in subsection (b 5) of this Section. With 6 respect to labor and delivery, the collaborating physician 7 must provide delivery services in order to participate with 8 a certified nurse midwife.

15 "Collaboration" means a process involving 2 or more health 16 care professionals working together, each contributing one's 17 respective area of expertise to provide more comprehensive 18 patient care.

19 "Consultation" means the process whereby an advanced 20 practice nurse seeks the advice or opinion of another health 21 care professional.

22 "Credentialed" means the process of assessing and 23 validating the qualifications of a health care professional.

"Current nursing practice update course" means a planned nursing education curriculum approved by the Department consisting of activities that have educational objectives,

instructional methods, content or subject matter, clinical practice, and evaluation methods, related to basic review and updating content and specifically planned for those nurses previously licensed in the United States or its territories and preparing for reentry into nursing practice.

6 "Dentist" means a person licensed to practice dentistry7 under the Illinois Dental Practice Act.

8 "Department" means the Department of Financial and9 Professional Regulation.

Inpaired nurse" means a nurse licensed under this Act who is unable to practice with reasonable skill and safety because of a physical or mental disability as evidenced by a written determination or written consent based on clinical evidence, including loss of motor skills, abuse of drugs or alcohol, or a psychiatric disorder, of sufficient degree to diminish his or her ability to deliver competent patient care.

17 "License-pending advanced practice nurse" means а registered professional 18 nurse who has completed all 19 requirements for licensure as an advanced practice nurse except 20 the certification examination and has applied to take the next available certification exam and received a temporary license 21 22 from the Department.

"License-pending registered nurse" means a person who has passed the Department-approved registered nurse licensure exam and has applied for a license from the Department. A license-pending registered nurse shall use the title "RN lic

2 "Physician" means a person licensed to practice medicine in

Podiatrist" means a person licensed to practice podiatry

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(7) the issuance of business or appointment cards.

(8) Unlawful taking, theft, selling, distributing, or
 manufacturing of any drug, narcotic, or prescription
 device.

4 (9) Habitual or excessive use or addiction to alcohol,
5 narcotics, stimulants, or any other chemical agent or drug
6 that could result in a licensee's inability to practice
7 with reasonable judgment, skill or safety.

8 (10) Discipline by another U.S. jurisdiction or 9 foreign nation, if at least one of the grounds for the 10 discipline is the same or substantially equivalent to those 11 set forth in this Section.

(11) A finding that the licensee, after having her or his license placed on probationary status or subject to conditions or restrictions, has violated the terms of probation or failed to comply with such terms or conditions.

17 (12) Being named as a perpetrator in an indicated 18 report by the Department of Children and Family Services 19 and under the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act, and 20 upon proof by clear and convincing evidence that the 21 licensee has caused a child to be an abused child or 22 neglected child as defined in the Abused and Neglected 23 Child Reporting Act.

(13) Willful omission to file or record, or willfully
impeding the filing or recording or inducing another person
to omit to file or record medical reports as required by

law or willfully failing to report an instance of suspected
 child abuse or neglect as required by the Abused and
 Neglected Child Reporting Act.

4 (14) Gross negligence in the practice of practical,
 5 professional, or advanced practice nursing.

6 (15) Holding oneself out to be practicing nursing under 7 any name other than one's own.

8 (16) Failure of a licensee to report to the Department 9 any adverse final action taken against him or her by 10 another licensing jurisdiction of the United States or any 11 foreign state or country, any peer review body, any health 12 care institution, any professional or nursing society or 13 association, any governmental agency, any law enforcement 14 agency, or any court or a nursing liability claim related 15 to acts or conduct similar to acts or conduct that would 16 constitute grounds for action as defined in this Section.

17 (17) Failure of a licensee to report to the Department surrender by the licensee of a license or authorization to 18 19 practice nursing or advanced practice nursing in another 20 state or jurisdiction or current surrender by the licensee 21 of membership on any nursing staff or in any nursing or 22 advanced practice nursing or professional association or 23 society while under disciplinary investigation by any of those authorities or bodies for acts or conduct similar to 24 25 acts or conduct that would constitute grounds for action as 26 defined by this Section.

1 2 (18) Failing, within 60 days, to provide information in response to a written request made by the Department.

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(19) Failure to establish and maintain records of patient care and treatment as required by law.

(20) Fraud, deceit or misrepresentation in applying for or procuring a license under this Act or in connection with applying for renewal of a license under this Act.

8 (21) Allowing another person or organization to use the
9 licensees' license to deceive the public.

10 (22) Willfully making or filing false records or 11 reports in the licensee's practice, including but not 12 limited to false records to support claims against the 13 medical assistance program of the Department of Healthcare 14 and Family Services (formerly Department of Public Aid) 15 under the Illinois Public Aid Code.

16 (23) Attempting to subvert or cheat on a licensing
 17 examination administered under this Act.

18 (24) Immoral conduct in the commission of an act, 19 including, but not limited to, sexual abuse, sexual 20 misconduct, or sexual exploitation, related to the 21 licensee's practice.

(25) Willfully or negligently violating the
 confidentiality between nurse and patient except as

25 (26) Practicing under a false or assumed name, except

1 (27) The use of any false, fraudulent, or deceptive 2 statement in any document connected with the licensee's 3 practice.

(28) Directly or indirectly giving to or receiving from 4 5 a person, firm, corporation, partnership, or association a 6 fee, commission, rebate, or other form of compensation for 7 professional services not actually or personally rendered. 8 Nothing in this paragraph (28) affects any bona fide 9 independent contractor or employment arrangements among 10 health care professionals, health facilities, health care 11 providers, or other entities, except as otherwise 12 prohibited by law. Any employment arrangements may include provisions for compensation, health insurance, pension, or 13 14 other employment benefits for the provision of services 15 within the scope of the licensee's practice under this Act. 16 Nothing in this paragraph (28) shall be construed to 17 require an employment arrangement to receive professional fees for services rendered. 18

19 (29) A violation of the Health Care Worker20 Self-Referral Act.

(30) Physical illness, including but not limited to deterioration through the aging process or loss of motor skill, mental illness, or disability that results in the inability to practice the profession with reasonable judgment, skill, or safety.

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agreement or the prescriptive authority delegated to a licensee by his or her collaborating physician or podiatrist in guidelines established under a written collaborative agreement.

5 (32) Making a false or misleading statement regarding a 6 licensee's skill or the efficacy or value of the medicine, 7 treatment, or remedy prescribed by him or her in the course 8 of treatment.

9 (33) Prescribing, selling, administering, 10 distributing, giving, or self-administering a drug 11 classified as a controlled substance (designated product) 12 or narcotic for other than medically accepted therapeutic 13 purposes.

14 (34) Promotion of the sale of drugs, devices,
15 appliances, or goods provided for a patient in a manner to
16 exploit the patient for financial gain.

17 (35) Violating State or federal laws, rules, or
 18 regulations relating to controlled substances.

19 (36) Willfully or negligently violating the
20 confidentiality between an advanced practice nurse,
21 collaborating physician, dentist, or podiatrist and a
22 patient, except as required by law.

23 (37) A violation of any provision of this Act or any24 rules promulgated under this Act.

25 (c) The determination by a circuit court that a licensee is
26 subject to involuntary admission or judicial admission as

The suspension will end only upon a finding by a court that the 3 patient is no longer subject to involuntary admission or 4 5 judicial admission and issues an order so finding and 6 discharging the patient; and upon the recommendation of the 7 Board to the Secretary that the licensee be allowed to resume 8 his or her practice.

If the Department or Board finds an individual unable to 14 15 practice or unfit for duty because of the reasons set forth in 16 this Section, the Department or Board may require that 17 individual to submit to a substance abuse evaluation or treatment by individuals or programs approved or designated by 18 19 the Department or Board, as a condition, term, or restriction for continued, reinstated, or renewed licensure to practice; 20 or, in lieu of evaluation or treatment, the Department may 21 22 file, or the Board may recommend to the Department to file, a 23 immediately suspend, revoke, or complaint to otherwise discipline the license of the individual. "Other authorized licensed personnel" means a licensed respiratory care practitioner, a licensed registered nurse, or a licensed practical nurse whose scope of practice authorizes the professional to supervise an individual who is not licensed, certified, or registered as a health professional.

"Proximate supervision" means a situation in which an individual is responsible for directing the actions of another individual in the facility and is physically close enough to be readily available, if needed, by the supervised individual.

"Respiratory care" and "cardiorespiratory care" mean

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preventative services, evaluation and assessment services, 1 2 therapeutic services, and rehabilitative services under the order of a licensed health care professional or a certified 3 registered nurse anesthetist in a licensed hospital for an 4 5 individual with a disorder, disease, or abnormality of the 6 cardiopulmonary system. These terms include, but are not 7 limited to, measuring, observing, assessing, and monitoring 8 signs and symptoms, reactions, general behavior, and general 9 physical response of individuals to respiratory care services, 10 including the determination of whether those signs, symptoms, 11 reactions, behaviors, or general physical responses exhibit 12 abnormal characteristics; the administration of 13 pharmacological and therapeutic agents related to respiratory care services; the collection of blood specimens and other 14 bodily fluids and tissues for, and the performance of, 15 16 cardiopulmonary diagnostic testing procedures, including, but 17 limited to, blood analysis; not qas development, implementation, and modification of respiratory care treatment 18 plans based on assessed abnormalities of the cardiopulmonary 19 20 system, respiratory care guidelines, referrals, and orders of a 21 licensed health care professional; application, operation, and 22 management of mechanical ventilatory support and other means of 23 life support; and the initiation of emergency procedures under 24 the rules promulgated by the Department. A respiratory care 25 practitioner shall refer to a physician licensed to practice 26 medicine in all its branches any patient whose condition, at the time of evaluation or treatment, is determined to be beyond
 the scope of practice of the respiratory care practitioner.

3 "Respiratory care education program" means a course of study leading to eligibility for registry 4 academic or 5 certification in respiratory care. The training is to be approved by an accrediting agency recognized by the Board and 6 7 shall include an evaluation of competence through а 8 standardized testing mechanism that is determined by the Board 9 to be both valid and reliable.

10 "Respiratory care practitioner" means a person who is 11 licensed by the Department of Professional Regulation and meets 12 all of the following criteria:

(1) The person is engaged in the practice of
 cardiorespiratory care and has the knowledge and skill
 necessary to administer respiratory care.

10 "Department" means the Department of Professional 11 Regulation.

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"Director" means the Director of Professional Regulation.

"Genetic anomaly" means a variation in an individual's DNA 13 14 that has been shown to confer a genetically influenced disease 15 or predisposition to a genetically influenced disease or makes 16 a person a carrier of such variation. A "carrier" of a genetic anomaly means a person who may or may not have a predisposition 17 18 or risk of incurring a genetically influenced condition and who 19 is at risk of having offspring with a genetically influenced 20 condition.

21 "Genetic counseling" means the provision of services, 22 which may include the ordering of genetic tests, pursuant to a referral, to individuals, couples, groups, families, and 23 24 organizations by one or more appropriately trained individuals 25 to address the physical and psychological issues associated with the occurrence or risk of occurrence or recurrence of a genetic disorder, birth defect, disease, or potentially inherited or genetically influenced condition in an individual or a family. "Genetic counseling" consists of the following:

5 (A) Estimating the likelihood of occurrence or 6 recurrence of a birth defect or of any potentially 7 inherited or genetically influenced condition. This 8 assessment may involve:

9 (i) obtaining and analyzing a complete health 10 history of the person and his or her family;

(ii) reviewing pertinent medical records;

12 (iii) evaluating the risks from exposure to
13 possible mutagens or teratogens;

14 (iv) recommending genetic testing or other 15 evaluations to diagnose a condition or determine the 16 carrier status of one or more family members;

17 Helping the individual, family, health care (B) provider, or health care professional (i) appreciate the 18 19 medical, psychological and social implications of а 20 disorder, including its features, variability, usual 21 course and management options, (ii) learn how genetic 22 factors contribute to the disorder and affect the chance 23 for recurrence of the condition in other family members, 24 and (iii) understand available options for coping with, preventing, or reducing the chance of occurrence or 25 recurrence of a condition. 26

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1 (C) Facilitating an individual's or family's (i) 2 exploration of the perception of risk and burden associated 3 with the disorder and (ii) adjustment and adaptation to the 4 condition or their genetic risk by addressing needs for 5 psychological, social, and medical support.

Genetic counselor" means a person licensed under this Actto engage in the practice of genetic counseling.

8 "Genetic testing" and "genetic test" mean a test or 9 analysis of human genes, gene products, DNA, RNA, chromosomes, 10 proteins, or metabolites that detects genotypes, mutations, 11 chromosomal changes, abnormalities, or deficiencies, including 12 carrier status, that (i) are linked to physical or mental 13 disorders or impairments, (ii) indicate a susceptibility to 14 illness, disease, impairment, or other disorders, whether 15 physical or mental, or (iii) demonstrate genetic or chromosomal damage due to environmental factors. "Genetic testing" and 16 17 "genetic tests" do not include routine physical measurements; chemical, blood and urine analyses that are widely accepted and 18 in use in clinical practice; tests for use of drugs; tests for 19 20 the presence of the human immunodeficiency virus; analyses of 21 proteins or metabolites that do not detect genotypes, 22 mutations, chromosomal changes, abnormalities, or 23 deficiencies; or analyses of proteins or metabolites that are 24 directly related to a manifested disease, disorder, or 25 pathological condition that could reasonably be detected by a 26 health care professional with appropriate training and

1 expertise in the field of medicine involved.

2 "Person" means an individual, association, partnership, or 3 corporation.

"Qualified supervisor" means any person who is a licensed 4 5 genetic counselor, as defined by rule, or a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches. A qualified 6 supervisor may be provided at the applicant's place of work, or 7 8 may be contracted by the applicant to provide supervision. The 9 qualified supervisor shall file written documentation with the 10 Department of employment, discharge, or supervisory control of 11 a genetic counselor at the time of employment, discharge, or 12 assumption of supervision of a genetic counselor.

13 "Referral" written telecommunicated means а or authorization for genetic counseling services from a physician 14 15 licensed to practice medicine in all its branches, an advanced practice nurse who has a collaborative agreement with a 16 17 collaborating physician that authorizes referrals to a genetic counselor, or a physician assistant who has a supervision 18 agreement with a supervising physician that 19 authorizes 20 referrals to a genetic counselor.

21 "Supervision" means review of aspects of genetic 22 counseling and case management in a bimonthly meeting with the 23 person under supervision.

20 (b) Beginning 12 months after the adoption of the final 21 administrative rules, no licensed genetic counselor may 22 provide genetic counseling to individuals, couples, groups, or 23 families without a referral from a physician licensed to 24 practice medicine in all its branches, an advanced practice 25 nurse who has a collaborative agreement with a collaborating 26 physician that authorizes referrals to a genetic counselor, or

a physician assistant who has been delegated authority to make 1 2 referrals to genetic counselors. The physician, advanced 3 practice nurse, or physician assistant shall maintain supervision of the patient and be provided timely written 4 5 reports on the services, including genetic testing results, provided by the licensed genetic counselor. Genetic testing 6 shall be ordered by a physician licensed to practice medicine 7 8 in all its branches or a genetic counselor pursuant to a 9 referral that gives the specific authority to order genetic 10 tests. Genetic test results and reports shall be provided to 11 the referring physician, advanced practice nurse, or physician 12 assistant. General seminars or talks to groups or organizations on genetic counseling that do not include individual, couple, 13 14 or family specific counseling may be conducted without a 15 referral. In clinical settings, genetic counselors who serve as 16 a liaison between family members of a patient and a genetic 17 research project, may, with the consent of the patient, provide information to family members for the purpose of gathering 18 19 additional information, as it relates to the patient, without a 20 referral. In non-clinical settings where no patient is being treated, genetic counselors who serve as a liaison between a 21 22 genetic research project and participants in that genetic 23 research project may provide information to the participants, without a referral. 24

(c) Beginning 12 months after the adoption of the final
 administrative rules, no association or partnership shall

practice genetic counseling unless every member, partner, and 1 2 employee of the association or partnership who practices 3 genetic counseling or who renders genetic counseling services holds a valid license issued under this Act. No license shall 4 5 be issued to a corporation, the stated purpose of which includes or which practices or which holds itself out as 6 available to practice genetic counseling, unless it 7 is 8 organized under the Professional Service Corporation Act.

9 (d) Nothing in this Act shall be construed as permitting 10 persons licensed as genetic counselors to engage in any manner 11 in the practice of medicine in all its branches as defined by 12 law in this State.

(e) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize a licensed genetic counselor to diagnose, test (unless authorized in a referral), or treat any genetic or other disease or condition.

(f) When, in the course of providing genetic counseling services to any person, a genetic counselor licensed under this Act finds any indication of a disease or condition that in his or her professional judgment requires professional service outside the scope of practice as defined in this Act, he or she shall refer that person to a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches.

of the sexual assault.

7 (2) Each year over 32,000 women become pregnant in the
8 United States as the result of rape and approximately 50%
9 of these pregnancies end in abortion.

(3) As approved for use by the Federal Food and Drug
Administration (FDA), emergency contraception can
significantly reduce the risk of pregnancy if taken within
72 hours after the sexual assault.

14 (4) By providing emergency contraception to rape
15 victims in a timely manner, the trauma of rape can be
16 significantly reduced.

17 (b) Within 120 days after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, every hospital 18 providing services to sexual assault survivors in accordance 19 20 with a plan approved under Section 2 must develop a protocol that ensures that each survivor of sexual assault will receive 21 22 medically and factually accurate and written and oral 23 information about emergency contraception; the indications and counter-indications and risks associated with the use of 24 25 emergency contraception; and a description of how and when 26 victims may be provided emergency contraception upon the

written order of a physician licensed to practice medicine in 1 2 all its branches, an advanced practice nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician that 3 authorizes prescription of emergency contraception, or a 4 5 physician assistant who has been delegated authority to 6 prescribe emergency contraception. The Department shall 7 approve the protocol if it finds that the implementation of the 8 protocol would provide sufficient protection for survivors of 9 sexual assault.

15 (2)appropriate oral and written information 16 concerning the possibility of infection, sexually transmitted disease and pregnancy resulting from sexual 17 18 assault;

19 (3) appropriate oral and written information 20 concerning accepted medical procedures, medication, and 21 possible contraindications of such medication available 22 for the prevention or treatment of infection or disease 23 resulting from sexual assault;

(4) an amount of medication for treatment at the
hospital and after discharge as is deemed appropriate by
the attending physician, an advanced practice nurse, or a

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physician assistant and consistent with the hospital's current approved protocol for sexual assault survivors;

3 (5) an evaluation of the sexual assault survivor's risk 4 of contracting human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) from the 5 sexual assault;

6 (6) written and oral instructions indicating the need 7 for follow-up examinations and laboratory tests after the 8 sexual assault to determine the presence or absence of 9 sexually transmitted disease;

10 (7) referral by hospital personnel for appropriate 11 counseling; and

12 (8) when HIV prophylaxis is deemed appropriate, an 13 initial dose or doses of HIV prophylaxis, along with 14 written and oral instructions indicating the importance of 15 timely follow-up healthcare.

(b) Any person who is a sexual assault survivor who seeks emergency hospital services and forensic services or follow-up healthcare under this Act shall be provided such services without the consent of any parent, guardian, custodian, surrogate, or agent.

(c) Nothing in this Section creates a physician-patient relationship that extends beyond discharge from the hospital emergency department.

follow-up healthcare to a sexual assault survivor.

motor vehicle of the second division weighing no more than 1 8,000 pounds, accompanied with payment of the registration fees 2 3 required under this Code from a person with disabilities or a person who is deaf or hard of hearing, the Secretary of State, 4 5 if so requested, shall issue to such person registration plates as provided for in Section 3-611, provided that the person with 6 7 disabilities or person who is deaf or hard of hearing must not 8 be disqualified from obtaining a driver's license under 9 subsection 8 of Section 6-103 of this Code, and further 10 provided that any person making such a request must submit a 11 statement, certified by a licensed physician, by a physician 12 assistant who has been delegated the authority to make this 13 certification by his or her supervising physician, or by an 14 advanced practice nurse who has a written collaborative 15 agreement with a collaborating physician that authorizes the 16 advanced practice nurse to make this certification, to the 17 effect that such person is a person with disabilities as defined by Section 1-159.1 of this Code, or alternatively 18 19 provide adequate documentation that such person has a Class 1A, Class 2A or Type Four disability under the provisions of 20 Section 4A of the Illinois Identification Card Act. For 21 22 purposes of this Section, an Illinois Disabled Person issued 23 Identification Card pursuant to the Illinois Identification Card Act indicating that the person thereon 24 25 named has a disability shall be adequate documentation of such 26 a disability.

(b) The Secretary shall issue plates under this Section to 1 2 a parent or legal quardian of a person with disabilities if the person with disabilities has a Class 1A or Class 2A disability 3 as defined in Section 4A of the Illinois Identification Card 4 5 Act or is a person with disabilities as defined by Section 6 1-159.1 of this Code, and does not possess a vehicle registered 7 in his or her name, provided that the person with disabilities 8 relies frequently on the parent or legal quardian for 9 transportation. Only one vehicle per family may be registered 10 under this subsection, unless the applicant can justify in 11 writing the need for one additional set of plates. Any person 12 requesting special plates under this subsection shall submit such documentation or such physician's, physician assistant's, 13 14 or advanced practice nurse's statement as is required in 15 subsection (a) and a statement describing the circumstances 16 qualifying for issuance of special plates under this 17 subsection. An optometrist may certify a Class 2A Visual defined in Section 4A of the 18 Disability, as Illinois 19 Identification Card Act, for the purpose of qualifying a person 20 with disabilities for special plates under this subsection.

(c) The Secretary may issue a parking decal or device to a person with disabilities as defined by Section 1-159.1 without regard to qualification of such person with disabilities for a driver's license or registration of a vehicle by such person with disabilities or such person's immediate family, provided such person with disabilities making such a request has been

issued a Disabled Person Identification Card indicating that 1 2 the person named thereon has a Class 1A or Class 2A disability, or alternatively, submits a statement certified by a licensed 3 physician, or by a physician assistant or an advanced practice 4 5 nurse as provided in subsection (a), to the effect that such person is a person with disabilities as defined by Section 6 7 1-159.1. An optometrist may certify a Class 2A Visual defined in Section 4A of 8 Disability as the Illinois 9 Identification Card Act for the purpose of qualifying a person 10 with disabilities for a parking decal or device under this 11 subsection.

The Secretary shall prescribe by 10 11 rule a means to certify or re-certify the eligibility of 12 organizations to receive disability plates or decals and to 13 designate which of the 2 person with disabilities emblems shall 14 be placed on gualifying vehicles.

Applicants 13 shall obtain the proper application required by the Secretary 14 of State from their prospective or current employer and submit 15 the completed application to the prospective or current 16 employer along with the necessary fingerprint submission as required by the Department of State Police to conduct 17 fingerprint based criminal background checks on current and 18 19 future information available in the state system and current 20 available information through the Federal Bureau of 21 Investigation's system. Applicants who have completed the 22 fingerprinting requirements shall not be subjected to the fingerprinting process when applying for subsequent permits or 23 24 submitting proof of successful completion of the annual refresher course. Individuals who on the effective date of this 25

Act possess a valid school bus driver permit that has been 1 2 previously issued by the appropriate Regional School 3 Superintendent are not subject to the fingerprinting provisions of this Section as long as the permit remains valid 4 5 and does not lapse. The applicant shall be required to pay all related application and fingerprinting fees as established by 6 7 rule including, but not limited to, the amounts established by the Department of State Police and the Federal Bureau of 8 9 Investigation to process fingerprint based criminal background 10 investigations. All fees paid for fingerprint processing 11 services under this Section shall be deposited into the State 12 Police Services Fund for the cost incurred in processing the 13 fingerprint based criminal background investigations. 12. not have been repeatedly involved as a driver in 1 2 motor vehicle collisions or been repeatedly convicted of 3 offenses against laws and ordinances regulating the movement of traffic, to a degree which indicates lack of 4 5 ability to exercise ordinary and reasonable care in the safe operation of a motor vehicle or disrespect for the 6 traffic laws and the safety of other persons upon the 7 8 highway;

9 13. not have, through the unlawful operation of a motor
10 vehicle, caused an accident resulting in the death of any
11 person; and

12 14. not have, within the last 5 years, been adjudged to 13 be afflicted with or suffering from any mental disability 14 or disease.

(b) A school bus driver permit shall be valid for a period specified by the Secretary of State as set forth by rule. It shall be renewable upon compliance with subsection (a) of this Section.

(c) A school bus driver permit shall contain the holder's driver's license number, legal name, residence address, zip code, social security number and date of birth, a brief description of the holder and a space for signature. The Secretary of State may require a suitable photograph of the holder.

25 (d) The employer shall be responsible for conducting a 26 pre-employment interview with prospective school bus driver

candidates, distributing school bus driver applications and 1 2 medical forms to be completed by the applicant, and submitting the applicant's fingerprint cards to the Department of State 3 Police that are required for the criminal background 4 5 investigations. The employer shall certify in writing to the 6 Secretary of State that all pre-employment conditions have been successfully completed including the successful completion of 7 8 an Illinois specific criminal background investigation through 9 the Department of State Police and the submission of necessary 10 fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for 11 criminal history information available through the Federal 12 Bureau of Investigation system. The applicant shall present the 13 certification to the Secretary of State at the time of submitting the school bus driver permit application. 14

15 (e) Permits shall initially be provisional upon receiving 16 certification from the employer that all pre-employment 17 successfully completed, conditions have been and upon completion of all training and examination 18 successful requirements for the classification of the vehicle to be 19 20 operated, the Secretary of State shall provisionally issue a School Bus Driver Permit. The permit shall remain in a 21 22 provisional status pending the completion of the Federal Bureau 23 of Investigation's criminal background investigation based upon fingerprinting specimens submitted to the Federal Bureau 24 of Investigation by the Department of State Police. The Federal 25 26 Bureau of Investigation shall report the findings directly to the Secretary of State. The Secretary of State shall remove the bus driver permit from provisional status upon the applicant's successful completion of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's criminal background investigation.

5 (f) A school bus driver permit holder shall notify the employer and the Secretary of State if he or she is convicted 6 7 in another state of an offense that would make him or her 8 ineligible for a permit under subsection (a) of this Section. 9 The written notification shall be made within 5 days of the entry of the conviction. Failure of the permit holder to 10 11 provide the notification is punishable as a petty offense for a 12 first violation and a Class B misdemeanor for a second or subsequent violation. 13

(g) Cancellation; suspension; notice and procedure.

(1) The Secretary of State shall cancel a school bus
driver permit of an applicant whose criminal background
investigation discloses that he or she is not in compliance

19 (2) The Secretary of State shall cancel a school bus 20 driver permit when he or she receives notice that the 21 permit holder fails to comply with any provision of this 22 Section or any rule promulgated for the administration of 23 this Section.

17 Secretary shall notify the The of State State Education of and 18 Superintendent the permit holder's 19 prospective or current employer that the applicant has (1) has 20 failed a criminal background investigation or (2) is no longer eligible for a school bus driver permit; and of the related 21 22 cancellation of the applicant's provisional school bus driver 23 permit. The cancellation shall remain in effect pending the outcome of a hearing pursuant to Section 2-118 of this Code. 24 25 The scope of the hearing shall be limited to the issuance 26 criteria contained in subsection (a) of this Section. A

petition requesting a hearing shall be submitted to 1 the 2 Secretary of State and shall contain the reason the individual feels he or she is entitled to a school bus driver permit. The 3 permit holder's employer shall notify in writing to the 4 5 Secretary of State that the employer has certified the removal 6 of the offending school bus driver from service prior to the 7 start of that school bus driver's next workshift. An employing school board that fails to remove the offending school bus 8 9 driver from service is subject to the penalties defined in 10 Section 3-14.23 of the School Code. A school bus contractor who 11 violates a provision of this Section is subject to the 12 penalties defined in Section 6-106.11.

All valid school bus driver permits issued under this Section prior to January 1, 1995, shall remain effective until their expiration date unless otherwise invalidated.

16 (h) When a school bus driver permit holder who is a service 17 member is called to active duty, the employer of the permit holder shall notify the Secretary of State, within 30 days of 18 19 notification from the permit holder, that the permit holder has 20 been called to active duty.  Department of Professional Regulation of the State of Illinois
 or its successor agency.

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(m) "Depressant" or "stimulant substance" means:

(1) a drug which contains any quantity of (i)
barbituric acid or any of the salts of barbituric acid
which has been designated as habit forming under section
502 (d) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (21
U.S.C. 352 (d)); or

(2) a drug which contains any quantity of (i)
amphetamine or methamphetamine and any of their optical

12 (o) "Director" means the Director of the Department of 13 State Police or the Department of Professional Regulation or 14 his designated agents.

(p) "Dispense" means to deliver a controlled substance to an ultimate user or research subject by or pursuant to the lawful order of a prescriber, including the prescribing, administering, packaging, labeling, or compounding necessary to prepare the substance for that delivery.

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(q) "Dispenser" means a practitioner who dispenses.

21 (r) "Distribute" means to deliver, other than by 22 administering or dispensing, a controlled substance.

(s) "Distributor" means a person who distributes.

(t) "Drug" means (1) substances recognized as drugs in the
official United States Pharmacopoeia, Official Homeopathic
Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or official National

Formulary, or any supplement to any of them; (2) substances 1 2 intended for use in diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in man or animals; (3) substances (other 3 than food) intended to affect the structure of any function of 4 5 the body of man or animals and (4) substances intended for use as a component of any article specified in clause (1), (2), or 6 (3) of this subsection. It does not include devices or their 7 8 components, parts, or accessories.

9 (t-5) "Euthanasia agency" means an entity certified by the 10 Department of Professional Regulation for the purpose of animal 11 euthanasia that holds an animal control facility license or 12 animal shelter license under the Animal Welfare Act. 20 (B) the physician assistant has been delegated 21 authority by a supervising physician licensed to 22 practice medicine in all its branches to prescribe or 23 dispense Schedule II controlled substances through a 24 written delegation of authority and under the 25 following conditions: 3

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1(i) no more than 5 Schedule II controlled2substances by oral dosage may be delegated;

(ii) any delegation must be of controlled substances prescribed by the supervising physician;

6 (iii) all prescriptions must be limited to no 7 more than a 30-day oral dosage, with any 8 continuation authorized only after prior approval 9 of the supervising physician;

10 (iv) the physician assistant must discuss the 11 condition of any patients for whom a controlled 12 substance is prescribed monthly with the 13 delegating physician; and

14(v) the physician assistant must have15completed the appropriate application forms and16paid the required fees as set by rule;

(2) with respect to advanced practice nurses,

(A) the advanced practice nurse has been delegated 18 19 authority to prescribe any Schedule II <del>III</del> through V 20 controlled substances by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches or a podiatrist 21 22 in accordance with Section 65-40 of the Nurse Practice 23 Act. The advanced practice nurse has completed the 24 appropriate application forms and has paid the 25 required fees as set by rule; or

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(B) the advanced practice nurse has been delegated

authority by a collaborating physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches to prescribe or dispense Schedule II controlled substances through a written delegation of authority and under the following conditions:

6 (i) no more than 5 Schedule II controlled 7 substances by oral dosage may be delegated;

8 (ii) any delegation must be of controlled 9 substances prescribed by the collaborating 10 physician;

(iii) all prescriptions must be limited to no more than a 30-day oral dosage, with any continuation authorized only after prior approval of the collaborating physician;

15 (iv) the advanced practice nurse must discuss 16 the condition of any patients for whom a controlled 17 substance is prescribed monthly with the 18 delegating physician; and

19(v) the advanced practice nurse must have20completed the appropriate application forms and21paid the required fees as set by rule; or

(3) with respect to animal euthanasia agencies, the
 euthanasia agency has obtained a license from the
 Department of Professional Regulation and obtained a
 registration number from the Department.

26 (b) The <u>physician assistant</u> mid level practitioner shall

only be licensed to prescribe those schedules of controlled 1 2 substances for which a licensed physician or licensed 3 podiatrist has delegated prescriptive authority, except that an animal euthanasia agency does not have any prescriptive 4 5 authority. A physician assistant and an advanced practice nurse 6 are prohibited from prescribing medications and controlled 7 substances not set forth in the required written delegation of 8 authority.

9 (c) Upon completion of all registration requirements, 10 physician assistants, advanced practice nurses, and animal 11 euthanasia agencies shall be issued a mid-level practitioner 12 controlled substances license for Illinois.
