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1	AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 2961
2	AMENDMENT NO Amend Senate Bill 2961 by replacing
3	everything after the enacting clause with the following:
4	"Section 5. The Food Handling Regulation Enforcement Act is
5	amended by changing Section 3 and by adding Section 3.05 as
6	follows:
7	(410 ILCS 625/3) (from Ch. 56 1/2, par. 333)
8	Sec. 3. Each food service establishment shall be under the
9	operational supervision of a certified food service sanitation
10	manager in accordance with rules promulgated under this Act.
11	By July 1, 1990, the Director of the Department of Public
12	Health in accordance with this Act, shall promulgate rules for
13	the education, examination, and certification of food service
14	establishment managers and instructors of the food service
15	sanitation manager certification education programs. Beginning
16	July 1, 2013, any individual seeking a food service sanitation

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1 manager certificate or a food service sanitation manager instructor certificate must complete a minimum of 8 hours of 2 Department-approved training, inclusive of the examination, 3 4 and receive a score of at least 75% on the examination. A food 5 service sanitation manager certificate and a food service 6 sanitation manager instructor certificate shall be valid for 5 years, unless revoked by the Department of Public Health, and 7 shall not be transferable from the individual to whom it was 8 9 issued. Beginning July 1, 2013, recertification for food 10 service sanitation manager certification Recertification shall 11 be accomplished by presenting evidence of completion of 8 hours of Department-approved training, inclusive of the examination, 12 13 and having received a score of at least 75% on the examination 14 ongoing food safety and food sanitation education 15 re examination, in compliance with rules promulgated by the 16 Director. Existing certificates shall expire on the printed 17 expiration date or 5 years from the effective date of 18 amendatory Act of 1989.

19 For purposes of certification and recertification for food 20 service sanitation manager certification, the Department shall 21 accept only Department-approved training and exams recognized by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI), 22 Conference for Food Protection, or their successors. Any 23 24 individual may elect to take the Department of Public Health 25 sanitation manager certification examination food service 26 take an examination administered by a testing authority

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previously approved by the Department. The Department shall charge a fee of \$35 for each new and renewed food service sanitation manager certificate and \$10 for each replacement certificate. All fees collected under this Section shall be deposited into the Food and Drug Safety Fund.

6 Any fee received by the Department under this Section that 7 is submitted for the renewal of an expired food service 8 sanitation manager certificate may be returned by the Director 9 after recording the receipt of the fee and the reason for its 10 return.

11 The Department shall award an Illinois certificate to anyone presenting a valid certificate issued by another state, 12 13 so long as the holder of the certificate has passed a 14 Conference for Food Protection-approved examination, or proof 15 of having passed a Conference for Food Protection-approved examination. The \$35 issuance fee applies. The reciprocal 16 Illinois certificate shall expire on the same date as the 17 presented certificate. On or before the expiration date, the 18 holder must have met the Illinois recertification requirements 19 20 in order to be reissued an Illinois certificate. Reciprocity is only for individuals who have moved to or begun working in 21 22 Illinois in the 6 months prior to applying for reciprocity. Any individual presenting an out-of-state certificate may do so 23 24 only once.

2	Sec. 3.05. Food handler training.
3	(a) All food handlers, other than someone holding a food
4	service sanitation manager certificate, must receive training
5	in basic safe food handling principles as outlined in
6	subsection (b) of this Section within 30 days after employment.
7	There is no limit to how many times an employee may take the
8	training. Training is not transferable between individuals or
9	employers. Proof that a food handler has been trained must be
10	available upon reasonable request by a State or local health
11	department inspector.
12	(b) Food handler training must cover and assess knowledge
13	of the following topics:
14	(1) The relationship between time and temperature with
15	respect to foodborne illness, including the relationship
16	between time and temperature and micro-organisms during
17	the various food handling preparation and serving states,
18	and the type, calibration, and use of thermometers in
19	monitoring food temperatures.
20	(2) The relationship between personal hygiene and food
21	safety, including the association of hand contact,
22	personal habits and behaviors, and the food handler's
23	health to foodborne illness, and the recognition of how
24	policies, procedures, and management contribute to
25	improved food safety practices.
26	(3) Methods of preventing food contamination in all

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1	stages of food handling, including terms associated with
2	contamination and potential hazards prior to, during, and
3	after delivery.
4	(4) Procedures for cleaning and sanitizing equipment
5	and utensils.
6	(5) Problems and potential solutions associated with
7	temperature control, preventing cross-contamination,
8	housekeeping, and maintenance.
9	(c) Training modules must be approved by the Department.
10	Any modules not approved within 90 days after the Department's
11	receipt of the business application shall automatically be
12	considered approved. If a training module has been approved in
13	another state, then it shall automatically be considered
14	approved in Illinois so long as the business provides proof
15	that the training has been approved in another state. Training
16	may be conducted by any means available, including, but not
17	limited to, on-line, computer, classroom, live trainers,
18	remote trainers, and food service sanitation manager
19	instructors. Nothing in this subsection (c) shall be construed
20	to require a proctor. There should be at least one commercially
21	available, approved food handler training module at a cost of
22	no more than \$15 per employee; if an approved food handler
23	training module is not available at that cost, then the
24	provisions of this Section 3.05 shall not apply.
25	(d) Food handler training is considered to be an exclusive
26	function of the State, and local programs are prohibited. This

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1	subsection (d) is a denial and limitation of home rule powers
2	and functions under subsection (h) of Section 6 of Article VII
3	of the Illinois Constitution.
4	(e) The provisions of this Section apply beginning July 1,
5	2015. From July 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015, enforcement
6	of the provisions of this Section shall be limited to education
7	and notification of requirements to encourage compliance.
8	Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon

9 becoming law.".
