## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

10 ILCS 5/4-50 10 ILCS 5/5-50 10 ILCS 5/6-100

Amends the Election Code. Provides that nursing homes shall be designated grace period registration sites for nursing home residents. Provides that a deputy registrar employed by each nursing home shall be designated to conduct all grace period registrations and address changes for that nursing home in the absence of an employee of the election authority. Effective immediately.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Election Code is amended by changing 5 Sections 4-50, 5-50, and 6-100 as follows:

#### 6 (10 ILCS 5/4-50)

7 4-50. Grace period. Notwithstanding Sec. any other 8 provision of this Code to the contrary, each election authority 9 shall establish procedures for the registration of voters and 10 for change of address during the period from the close of registration for a primary or election and until the 7th day 11 before the primary or election. During this grace period, an 12 unregistered qualified elector may register to vote, and a 13 14 registered voter may submit a change of address form, in person in the office of the election authority or at a voter 15 16 registration location specifically designated for this purpose 17 by the election authority. The election authority shall register that individual, or change a registered voter's 18 19 address, in the same manner as otherwise provided by this 20 Article for registration and change of address. To provide 21 nursing home residents an equal opportunity to exercise their 22 right to vote, each nursing home shall be designated a grace period registration site solely for purposes of registering and 23

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completing address changes for residents of that nursing home. 1 2 A deputy registrar employed by each nursing home shall be 3 designated to conduct all grace period registrations and address changes for that nursing home in the absence of an 4 5 employee of the election authority. Upon completion of a grace period registration or address change, the deputy registrar 6 shall deliver to the election authority within 24 hours all 7 completed forms, and the election authority receiving the forms 8 9 shall add the names of residents who have completed the forms 10 to the list of residents entitled to vote during the regular 11 nursing home voting period.

12 If a voter who registers or changes address during this grace period wishes to vote at the first election or primary 13 14 occurring after the grace period, he or she must do so by grace 15 period voting, either in person in the office of the election 16 authority or at a location specifically designated for this 17 purpose by the election authority, or by mail, at the discretion of the election authority. Grace period voting shall 18 be in a manner substantially similar to voting under Article 19 20 19. Nursing home residents who register or change their address 21 during the grace period shall be permitted to vote during the 22 regular nursing home voting period and shall not be required to 23 have submitted an absentee ballot request in advance.

Within one day after a voter casts a grace period ballot, the election authority shall transmit the voter's name, street address, and precinct, ward, township, and district numbers, as

the case may be, to the State Board of Elections, which shall 1 2 maintain those names and that information in an electronic 3 format on its website, arranged by county and accessible to State and local political committees. The name of each person 4 5 issued a grace period ballot shall also be placed on the appropriate precinct list of persons to whom absentee and early 6 7 ballots have been issued, for use as provided in Sections 17-9 and 18-5. 8

9 A person who casts a grace period ballot shall not be 10 permitted to revoke that ballot and vote another ballot with 11 respect to that primary or election. Ballots cast by persons 12 who register or change address during the grace period must be 13 transmitted to and counted at the election authority's central ballot counting location and shall not be transmitted to and 14 15 counted at precinct polling places. The grace period ballots 16 determined to be valid shall be added to the vote totals for 17 the precincts for which they were cast in the order in which the ballots were opened. 18

20 (10 ILCS 5/5-50)

Sec. 5-50. Grace period. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Code to the contrary, each election authority shall establish procedures for the registration of voters and for change of address during the period from the close of registration for a primary or election and until the 7th day

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1 before the primary or election. During this grace period, an 2 unregistered qualified elector may register to vote, and a registered voter may submit a change of address form, in person 3 in the office of the election authority or at a voter 4 5 registration location specifically designated for this purpose by the election authority. The election authority shall 6 7 register that individual, or change a registered voter's address, in the same manner as otherwise provided by this 8 9 Article for registration and change of address. To permit nursing home residents equitable access to grace period 10 11 registration, nursing homes shall be designated grace period 12 registration sites for nursing home residents. A deputy 13 registrar employed by each nursing home shall be designated to 14 conduct all grace period registrations and address changes for that nursing home in the absence of an employee of the election 15 16 authority. Upon completion of a grace period registration or 17 address change, the deputy registrar shall deliver to the election authority within 24 hours all completed forms, and the 18 19 election authority receiving the forms shall add the names of 20 residents who have completed the forms to the list of residents entitled to vote during the regular nursing home voting period. 21

If a voter who registers or changes address during this grace period wishes to vote at the first election or primary occurring after the grace period, he or she must do so by grace period voting, either in person in the office of the election authority or at a location specifically designated for this purpose by the election authority, or by mail, at the discretion of the election authority. Grace period voting shall be in a manner substantially similar to voting under Article 19. <u>Nursing home residents who register or change their address</u> <u>during the grace period may vote during the regular nursing</u> home voting period.

7 Within one day after a voter casts a grace period ballot, 8 the election authority shall transmit the voter's name, street 9 address, and precinct, ward, township, and district numbers, as 10 the case may be, to the State Board of Elections, which shall 11 maintain those names and that information in an electronic 12 format on its website, arranged by county and accessible to State and local political committees. The name of each person 13 issued a grace period ballot shall also be placed on the 14 15 appropriate precinct list of persons to whom absentee and early ballots have been issued, for use as provided in Sections 17-9 16 17 and 18-5.

A person who casts a grace period ballot shall not be 18 permitted to revoke that ballot and vote another ballot with 19 20 respect to that primary or election. Ballots cast by persons 21 who register or change address during the grace period must be 22 transmitted to and counted at the election authority's central 23 ballot counting location and shall not be transmitted to and counted at precinct polling places. 4 Sec. 6-100. Grace period. Notwithstanding any other 5 provision of this Code to the contrary, each election authority 6 shall establish procedures for the registration of voters and 7 for change of address during the period from the close of 8 registration for a primary or election and until the 7th day 9 before the primary or election. During this grace period, an 10 unregistered qualified elector may register to vote, and a 11 registered voter may submit a change of address form, in person 12 in the office of the election authority or at a voter 13 registration location specifically designated for this purpose by the election authority. The election authority shall 14 15 register that individual, or change a registered voter's 16 address, in the same manner as otherwise provided by this Article for registration and change of address. To permit 17 18 nursing home residents equitable access to grace period registration, nursing homes shall be designated grace period 19 20 registration sites for nursing home residents. A deputy 21 registrar employed by each nursing home shall be designated to 22 conduct all grace period registrations and address changes for 23 that nursing home in the absence of an employee of the election 24 authority. Upon completion of a grace period registration or 25 address change, the deputy registrar shall deliver to the

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election authority within 24 hours all completed forms, and the election authority receiving the forms shall add the names of residents who have completed the forms to the list of residents entitled to vote during the regular nursing home voting period.

5 If a voter who registers or changes address during this grace period wishes to vote at the first election or primary 6 occurring after the grace period, he or she must do so by grace 7 8 period voting, either in person in the office of the election 9 authority or at a location specifically designated for this 10 purpose by the election authority, or by mail, at the 11 discretion of the election authority. Grace period voting shall 12 be in a manner substantially similar to voting under Article 19. Nursing home residents who register or change their address 13 during the grace period may vote during the regular nursing 14 15 home voting period.

16 Within one day after a voter casts a grace period ballot, 17 the election authority shall transmit the voter's name, street address, and precinct, ward, township, and district numbers, as 18 the case may be, to the State Board of Elections, which shall 19 20 maintain those names and that information in an electronic format on its website, arranged by county and accessible to 21 22 State and local political committees. The name of each person 23 issued a grace period ballot shall also be placed on the appropriate precinct list of persons to whom absentee and early 24 ballots have been issued, for use as provided in Sections 17-9 25 26 and 18-5.

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1 A person who casts a grace period ballot shall not be 2 permitted to revoke that ballot and vote another ballot with 3 respect to that primary or election. Ballots cast by persons 4 who register or change address during the grace period must be 5 transmitted to and counted at the election authority's central 6 ballot counting location and shall not be transmitted to and 7 counted at precinct polling places. The grace period ballots determined to be valid shall be added to the vote totals for 8 9 the precincts for which they were cast in the order in which 10 the ballots were opened.
