HOUSE RESOLUTION

2 WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes the significant
3 impact of its spiritual leaders and pays particular honor to
4 its native born sons; and

5 WHEREAS, The State of Illinois values the contribution of
6 such individuals and extols the virtue of them as a means of
7 communicating its honor of such citizens as role models for
8 all; and

9 WHEREAS, Rabbi Daniel Moscovitz, of blessed memory, was
10 born and raised in Illinois and returned home to direct the
11 operation of and oversee the expansion of the activities of
12 Lubavitch Chabad of Illinois, the regional headquarters of the
13 worldwide Lubavitch movement; he subsequently expanded the
14 movement from a single office in Chicago into 40 centers of
15 goodness and kindness spanning the State from Carbondale to
16 Gurnee; and

19 values were embodied in Rabbi Moscovitz; and

20 WHEREAS, Rabbi Moscovitz was beloved by an entire community

2 Esther Rochel; his children, Mrs. Shterna Sara Newman, Rabbi

4 Yehoshua Zelik Moscovitz, Mrs. Rivkah Sternberg, Mrs. Chana
5 Teldon, Mrs. Chava Kagan, Rabbi Leibel Moscovitz, and Mrs.
6 Chaya Mushka Hecht; his parents; and his brothers, Rabbi Moshe
7 Moscovitz, Eli Moscovitz, and Rabbi Mendel Moscovitz;

9 RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
10 NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that
11 we, along with his family and friends, mourn the passing of
